
THE DARTS/Across \$8.98 List Produced by Tommy Boyce, Richard Hartley, The Darts & Phil Chapman.



Ready for WAR: CHANGE MEETS JOHN CALE

JOHN CALE has been an innovator and musical chance-taker since he and Lou Reed created the Velvet Underground in 1966. He has produced albums for such legendary performers as Nico and Patti Smith, and has been critically acclaimed for his own lps since his very first, Vintage Violence. He is currently on tour in the U.S., and has a brand new album, Honi Soit.

In an exclusive interview for the Pitch, John spoke with Charles Chance, Jr. by

John: So, how's Kansas City?

Chance: It's pretty hot and humid right now.

John: Sorry I didn't play there. '

Chance: Well, Lawrence is very nearby, and I came up for

John: You should've said hello!

Chance: I was hoping to meet you, but after the show you seemed pretty exhausted. But I'm glad we've connected up now.

up now.

John: Right---fire away!

You once described the music on your classic album.

Paris 1919 as "Procol Harum music." Do you have a
phrase or two to capsulize the kind of music you're
doing now? Do you feel very purposeful about your
music?

- J: Yes...'purposeful' has the connotation of force. I'm confident about it. I don't think what you're hearing on the record is what you would hear live.
- C: I got that feeling, too, seeing the concert after hearing the record--the two experiences were very different.
- J: Yes. Even though we play the songs that are on the record, I enjoy myself far more when I use the songs as a basis for developing other themes, improvising off of and away from them.
- C: I thought your band was very strong in Lawrence; there were times when the improvisation was on an extremely high level.....
- J: Yeah, it's getting where those guys are making it very hard for me to pull the rug out from under them. The first couple of times I pulled the rug out from under them, they were kind of taken aback by it, but what ever I do now they're right behind me...they're my shadow. And sometimes they're right with me. I don't have to say anything to them anymore—I can pull any kind of stunt—-and they'll go off on their own, and I'll go with them, and make new songs.
- C: Do you ever write material and then play it for them?
- J: No.
- C: How do you go about creating a song in the context of your band?
- J: On stage?
- C: Well, anywhere...even a new one that you just thought up.
- J: The onstage ones are what really interest me...when they happen right there. In Austin I turned Honi Soit into... I did my Jim Morrison number..(laughs)...Honi Soit runs into this song about an old man who had four sons, and he bought the sons four horses. The four sons grew up, and the four horses grew up, and they were the Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse. Apocalypse Now, and then, Pegasus. The Jim Morrison number came to mind when I said, "Pegasus...I want to kill you! He walks on down the hall..."
- C: "The End."
- J: Right. And then we were making noises...(John makes loud sound effects)

- C: Morrison once said that he wanted his band to sound like a group that had read a book."
- J: (Laughing) What a put-down! Jesus, I thought you were talking about Kenny Loggins for a minute!
- C: What do you like to read?
- J: Everything.
- C: Any poets? Dylan Thomas, perhaps?
- J: Yes. He was my inspiration.
- C: I've always enjoyed your experiments with orchestral composition, as on <u>The Academy In Peril</u>, and your trance music with Terry Riley...
- I. Voah
- C: Does that kind of thing no longer interest you?
- I can't feel really enamoured of them...it was done with such pressure. Except for "John Milton". "John Milton" has some textures in it, but the rest of the stuff isn't really effective: it comes off like diluted Vaughan Williams, or Holst. It was really difficult, because I wrote the music out without time signatures. The Royal Philharmonic were very patient with me when I did it. But they still had this...incredulous attitude, that tended to make them perform on a standard that was less than their usual professionalism. But there's always someone in an orchestra that will give me a hand. I had a friend in the Philharmonic who told me "Watch out for the principal violist. He's always troublemaking." You're dealing with a hundred people here, you know-you've gotta have their respect, otherwise you might as well blow out the candle. But the principal violist was my idol. I went up to him during a break, I shook his hand, I said, "Hey, you're my 'idol," and from that moment on, whatever misunderstanding there was between myself and the orchestra, he would turn around and explain it to them, not the violinist. And the real punk in the orchestra was the principal 'cellist, who I wanted to take outside and wrap the 'cello around his

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


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neck. And everybody was in awe of him because he'd gone to Cambridge or something and graduated in Mathematics

The Moody Blues

- C: A beautiful, spacious sound quality you captured on those tracks, though...
- J: I wanted to introduce him to the front of a mack truck...
 "Play this, motherfucker!" (Laughter)
- C: "Days of Steam" is one of my favorites from Academy.
- J: Yes. That tune was also used in Paul Morissey's film $\underline{\text{Heat}}$.
- C: Although your new album seems a successful synthesis of the two tendencies, in the past there seemed to be a dichotomy in your work--on the one hand, a kind of sophisticated, ironic lyricism, and on the other, this rhythmic, blues-rock kind of thing. I guess what I want to ask is, "Are you a mod or a rocker?"
- J: (Laughing) I like the question...now where's the bleeding answer? (Laughter) But being on stage, I think...now that's an area where you have to be particular. The sooner people understand that there's less deliberation about those songs than a record would have you believe, the better. Just because it's on the record a certain way, people have a tendency to believe "This is it." that it's written in stone. But the thing is, we perform it differently. I hope that people realize how exciting we are on stage, and how great this band is, because they don't confine themselves to rote performing of things imprisoned on vinyl.
- C: At your Lawrence concert there was a very strong reaction to the song READY FOR WAR. I was caught up in the reaction. Some people were ready to go. It seemed prophetic.
- J: What do you mean? Do you accept the principle of war as a historical inevitability?
- C: I don't accept it.
- J: What's prophetic about it?
- C: A shift in mood, perhaps, in audiences.
- J: Do you think there's a climate of opinion?
- C: I was wondering if you sensed that from the response.
- J: I made up my mind that there was going to be one. I didn't like the way people are explaining away the idea. I know that bureaucracy and government is like 'too many cooks spoil the broth' and the left hand doesn't know what

the right hand is doing. They'd better get their shit together because the confusion may be advantagious in certain circumstances like it was for the Carter administration. That was a brilliant strategy. He managed to handle the confusion of the bureaucracy very well and extended it to handle world political content.

- C: Do you get a chance to do any producing these days?
- J: I haven't been. I'm committed to doing this. (performing)
 I wish I could. I'd love to produce Captain Beefheart
 and the Split Enz.
- C: Together?
- J: No. I think Beefheart and I ought to collaborate on an album.
- C: I do too. His new material, DOC AT THE RADAR STATION for example, is brilliant.
- J: They ought to make a film of it. They should be in a wrestling ring, like mud wrestling.
- C: (Laughing) Run paint.
- J: Well, yea. We should all have cotton wool in our cheeks like Brando.
- C: And vampires on our knees... Getting back to your song READY FOR WAR...In Lawrence, people in the audience were standing, raising their fists, and yelling. They were getting their shit together in a negative and warlike fashion.
- J: Warlike is not negative. I really resent it when people think that song is anti-war. I don't mind a warlike response. I mean, that song was intended as a catalyst. It wasn't intended to polarize. I think somebody's goofing up, and doing a very bad job of making people understand that nuclear war is not the horror it's made out to be. Fifty varieties of nuclear weapons have been designed to produce blasts..It is possible to have limited nuclear exchange..they shouldn't be afraid of that. There should be a nuclear war somewhere just to get through it and get it over with. One way of doing it is to have a reactor go off and have people realize, "Hey,... wasn't that serious."
- C: It seems to be pointing in that direction, with the Israeli bombing of Irag's nuclear reactor.
- J: There was no fissionable material in the reactor. It sets Sadat up beautifully, back in the tradition as leader of the Arab world because he helped Begin by putting the word in the Saudi's ear and letting them fly over the territory. And having Sadat at the top of it is far better than having Hassad from Syria. Like Hassad told Israel-- if you go for those missiles, we're not going to stop there, we're going to strike deep within Israeli territory. And Israel said, "Ah, wanna know what deep is? Hey."

- C: So you believe in revolutionary thought and radical solutions.
- J: No...I think you can compare two things. The agreement between Portillo and Reagan has taken the state department a lead time of eight to nine months to set it up...If you ask someone who is a narcotics smuggler, "What's the lead time you need to set up a deal?" He'll say, "Ah, a phone call." Now that's expertise. Is the reason that Washington will not allow CNN, Cable Network News, into briefings because they can't handle the idea that there's a twenty-four hour news network here? And you've got to allow time for the other major networks to catch up, which they've been doing, creeping in and creeping in all the way from the introduction of NIGHTLINE on ABC, to the time now where CBS has a 2 o'clock NEWSBREAK, a 4 o'clock NEWSBREAK. They've putting in more and more news and creating a thirst for information.
- C: And you're saying that the government thinks that's dangerous?
- J: No. I think it's their way of securing an audience and what is a very powerful source of distributing information.
- C: So is the media being used by the government?
- J: To the extent that they only release official statements. The only difference between here and Russia is that Russia issues one statement everywhere and here you're issued so many different ones that you're in the same position.
- C: What do you think about the politics between individuals? Is it possible for people to meet and understand one another and not have conflict?
- J: There is a problem with rising expectations. Like people who expect the government to look after them. The government can't look after itself...The government you know is run on the telephone. That's silicon based and not hardened and will not survive a thermonuclear device. If someone were to cut the cables to all the national security centers in this country...Never mind national security...The government would collapse. You can do that through the sewer systems.
- C: The sewer systems?
- J: Yea, I mean plumbing, water.
- C: Underground railroad, huh?
- J: Yea.
- C: Getting back to personal relationships between people rather than governments, lyrics to some of your new songs seem to talk about failure of relationships between men and women.
- J: Yea, isn't it great?
- C: Do you get a kind of masochistic inspiration out of that?
- J: No, no, no. That's the magic of the human soul....

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EATING DUT AGAIN? WHY NOT TRY
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by R & S (the interviewers)

Livin' for the weekend, not only because the eagle flies on Friday, but because that's when THREE FRIENDS RESTAURANT & BBQ is open. Mattie & Jewell and all the people there are spending long hours seasoning chicken, frying catfish, and chopping vegies. These people care about their customers and you'll taste it in your meal and feel it when you walk in the door. They're open three days a week: Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Livin' for the weekend, not only

On a nice Saturday afternoon we had the pleasure of interviewing Mattie & Jewell Cornelius, the proprietors. THREE FRIENDS was originally owned by Mattie & Jewell Cornelius, Sammy & Jackie Smith and Henry & Flossie Peters. Like many good ideas, however, the restaurant has had it's share of hard times since it's founding more than 4 years ago. Mattie & Jewell Cornelius bought out the other two couples during a time when the restaurant wasn't doing so well. We are happy to say it is now on a steady rise. Following is an edited version of that interview. THREE FRIENDS was originally owned interview.

- R&S: How long have you been here?
- M: January the seventh it was 4 yrs so about 4 yrs and 4 mos.
- R&S: Why did you start the restaurant?
- M: My husband found out this lady My husband found out this lady had this place she wanted to get rid of. She wanted a small sum on it so we decided to buy it and then after buying it we said, well what we gonna put in? So we debated and we decided to put a restaurant in. Matter of fact, three of us wert in; my husband and I, my brother and his wife, and a friend and his wife. (Hence the name)
- R&S: We've noticed when we come in here the varied clientele, was it like that when you first
- M: It was mostly black and then the J C Nichols (reople) started coming in and putting articles in the paper and this brought on more whites so now we have quite a few come in.
- R&S: It was interesting to us be-cause people warned us about "this part of town" but when we (unescorted ladles) come in Jewell seems to keep an eye out for us and that kind of personal concern for the customer is great.
- M: Yes, we've never had any prob-lems here.
- s: We think that has to do with the good feeling you generate here. That's one of the reasons we get so excited about coming here, it's a total pleasure, not only for the palate.... Right now you're open Friday thru Sunday, do you want to keep it that way?
- We have been talking about opening Fri. & Sat for lunch

and dinner and closing at 1:30am and keeping our regular hours on Sun. It would give us more time for rest and sleep because three in the morning is quite late and then getting up the next morning to get ready for the next nite.

- : Do all the people you have working here have other jobs? We were talking to one of the cooks and he's a carpenter and cooks on the weekend for enjoyment.
- Yes, he has another job and Mitzi has another job but other than that these kids are out of school.
- R&S: What about you & Jewell?
- I worked for Jenny's for 26 yrs. After I left there I tell ya I don't want to be a full time worker anywhere. Just the three days here for me and my husband is enough. My husband worked for the Kansas City Southern RR. It's a job here, there's always something to do.
- R&S: This seems ideal time for your-self and all the food here has been wonderful and you keep the place clean and that we're al-ways impressed with.
- M: Well, that my husband does. He's very particular about his eatin'. When we go to places that's the first thing, he'll look around to see about the cleanliness.

At the time of the interview, they were planning their vacation, meaning the restaurant would be closed for one weekend before Father's Day but Mattie was very concerned that they be back in time for that holiday so as not to disappoint notical so as not to disappoint the customers. Mattie & Jewell are both from Louisiana which was to be the location for their vacation. They originally came to KC in 1947 so Jewell could find better work.

- R&S: Was this place a restaurant?
- M: No, it was a warehouse or storage place of some sort.
- R&S: So what did the place look like when you came here?
- Oh, my god, a dump. No windows, holes in the floor and walls. The three men did it all themselves..... We put in lots of effort, I'm really proud-I am. We season our food, try to keep the place clean, and to please our customers, that's the main thing.
- R&S: Well, we're certainly pleased.Do you ever do private parties?
- M: Yes, we do. During the week when we're not open for regular business. We can accomodate from 25 to 125 people.
- R&S: How is the work separated?
- M: Jewell mostly does the seasoning of the chicken and the fish (our nephew helps) and I do the side orders and make all the pastry, and Jewell also does all the barbeque.

Several items on the menu that we (the interviewers) would like to re-(the interviewers) would like to re-commend are: catfish, chicken, pork chops, rib tips, cole slaw, greens, black-eyed peas, yams, peach cobbler, sweet potato pie, German chocolate cake and the cheeseake. [Yes, all the desserts are made fresh by

- R&S: What do you like to do in your relaxation time?
- Sometimes I play cards. There's four of us ladies that play together, (chuckle) oh my god, we play spades, I love that game, I play spade really do.
- R&S: Is there anything else you like to do?

- M: After playing cards, I like to play dominoes.
- R&S: What does Jewell like to do?
- M: He plays dominoes and watches football games.
 chit chat chit chat....
 R&S: Is there anything you would like to say to the customers?
- M: Not exactly, only (I) think I really appreciate my customers. The main thing, I'm trying hard to please them--I'll put it that way. I put all my best effort into my cooking.
- R&S: We can tell that a lot of care goes into it. That's what brings us back.

At this point our lunch came and we At this point our lunch came and we ate and Mattie interviewed us..... We found out even when she relaxes she thinks about restaurant "things". Always thinking of items to add to the menu to increase her customers pleasure. During the interview Jewell didn't talk to us much (We think he was feeling kind of shy) but he's very friendly and chats with the people that come in.

Definitely check this restaurant out. Your palate will thank you, your wallet will thank you (the prices are reasonable), and we're certain Mattie & Jewell will thank you also.




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

This is some of the most exciting NON Sly & Robbie music to reach here yet. I say this because most of what is I say this because most of what is happening in Jamaica is cycled through the Sly & Robbie music machine. Not that that is bad by any means, but "The Rastafarians" is a welcome breath of fresh air with their skin-tight rhythm arrangements accompanied by soulfully seductive vocals. If a comparison is to be made I have to say "The Rastafarians" be made I have to say "The Rastafarians" convey a favorable similarity in message and sound with The Wailers, and I know that can be appreciated. There isn't a weak cut on the album. The lyrics, (printed on the back), deal with the usual Rasta interests - namely Jah and the dedication to their unified beliefs. Exceptional tracks include "Roll Call", with its fascinating melody and revealing lyrics; "Words of Wisdom" offers some tasteful organ and guitar licks again coupled with memorable vocals. "This yamsik" says it all with a list of pleasur musik" says it all with a list of pleasures derived by mere listening. I encourage you to check out "The Rastafarians".



Max Romeo has been around for quite awhile and released at least two LP's here in and released at least two LP's here in the mid-seventies. He hasn't really been heard from since until now. "Holding Out My Love To You" has been issued on the Shanachie label (they first brought us "Augustus Pablo Meets King Tubby In A Firehouse") and is partially produced by

Rolling Stone, Keith Richards, who according to the credits, also contributes lead guitar. This record has got alot going for it, what with an all-star back up band, including Richards, Sly and Robbie, "Chinna" and Augustus himself. There's a full, rich sound surrounding Romeos breathy vocals. The back up singers (reminiscent of the I-Three) provide a welcome embellishment that adds rather than detractic from Maylo 1-Three) provide a welcome embellishment that adds rather than detract's from Max's own appeal. Sly & Robbie wrote some of the best material. Their opening cut, "Wishing for Love", sets the pace with a mellow sax intro and funky bass/drum syncopation that's perfect for this seasoned vocalist. 



Finally, theres the new Peter Tosh album, "Wanted Dread and Alive" issued on EMI, again through Rolling Stone Records. What a rejuvenation! For the past few What a rejuvenation! For the past new years, Tosh seemed caught between a rock and a herd place. When he first left CBS to record on the Stones own label he seemed to feel it necessary to "cross over" by using disco rather than "roots reggae" to possibly reach a wider audience. Unfortunately this didn't work at all. He killed two birds with one stone by 1)Not reaching a new legion of fans due to flimsy material and 2)By alienating his original fans as well. I'm very happy to say that Tosh is now back on the right track and should be able to finally get the recognition he has sought for so long. "Wanted Dread and Alive" is simply... A great record! The brassy disco arrangements have been replaced with a more enlightening and invigorating "rockers" sound (courtesy of Word, Sound, and Power, another Sly & Robbie incarnation). Tosh, of course, was one of the original Wailers along with Bob Marley and Bunny Livingston (i.e. Wailer), and it seems that he is finally coming to terms with the kind of music that is appreciated and expected from such a prestigious background. background.



And now, with the extremely unfortunate and untimely death of Bob Marley, I feel we should look to his predecessors like Tosh and Bunny to continue bringing us Tosh and Bunny to continue bringing us the kind of sounds we so eagerly looked forward to with each new Marley release. I'm delighted to say Peter Tosh is persevering and by buying his record we'll each make our own contribution to seeing that reggae will continue to expand and enlighten. 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




Actually, one week a month, Warren lived and breathed the PITCH. It would be hard to describe how much work goes into this little paper from its beginnings to dis-



Do they still sell this kind of reverb for quitars? Sure, c/O H. Bosch.

S Paul Williams, in his excellent section on Their Satanic Majesties Request in Outlaw Blues, points out, the Stones at all times, like Virgil leading Dante through the Underworld, "get you safely to your door," as promised, by the end of the song. But meanwhile, the sometimes truly Shelley-like & visionary

lyrics of Jagger have indeed just led us to the brink of the abyss, & through apocalypse. "Gimme Shelter," "Sympathy for the Devil," (the lyrics of this song are very true poetry, although, like the Doors' "The End," not so pessimistic philosophically as they might first appear,) and even the more reassuring hypnosis &/or lyricism of songs like "Gomper," "She's A Rainbow," "Angie," "Melody," "You Got the Silver," "Moonlight Mile," "Prodigal Son," or the choruses on "Memory Motel," are marked by a timeless, or time-outside-time, sense-- truly an apocalyptic notion, but one usually balanced & kept alive by Jagger's humor & irony (with Keith & Charlie as his whimsical antagonists.) This tension/collaboration is what carries us, unmolested, safely through even the This tension/collaboration is what carries us, unmolested, safely through even the most surreal, subterranean soundscapes: the reductio ad absurdam of "Let It Bleed," the amusingly sinister music hall of "On With the Show." the true mystery encapsulated in "2000 Light Years From Home," and even the engagingly mindless rant of "Lies." which reminds me, Stones, that Emotional Rescue and Some Girls are good records, too: esp. "Just My Imagination," "Beast of Burden," and the ludicrous title track of Rescue. Rescue.



The <u>City Light</u> restaurant and bar is an unassuming looking restaurant from the outside, especially when viewed alongside its neighbors in the little shopside its neighbors in the little shopping center at 75th and Wornall. Outfront the old K.C. trolley car tracks go by, recalling the era when K.C. was a town where jazz was live and red hot. This tradition of live jazz is brought back the <u>City Light</u> every Thursday, Friday and Saturday evening by the Walter Ruff Orchestra. (Now if we can just get the city to bring back the trolley cars.) Inside, the decor is quiet and simple. We liked the basic brown color scheme and the low key decorating ideas. Our idea of a good restaurant begins with a simple decor that doesn't detract from the food at hand. Our meal started with the house salad, which was made with some nice, crispy and fresh tasting greens served with a wedge of tomato. The house dressing, a creamy spicy affair, was tasty and earned an excellent rating, but was put on too heavily, overpowering the light taste of the lettuce. The salad was followed by a curious concoction called Onion Gratine. It turned out to be somebody's version of French Onion soup, but we'd have never been able to tell in a blindfold test. Some element in the struggle to make this soup went wildly astray. The bullion was overflavored, drowning out the onion almost entirely and the cheese had a distinct funny flavor. Our dinner companion had the soup de jour which was vegetable. This attempt at soupmaking was more successful. The vegetables in the soup were done just right, not too the sould find the tright variety. The taste of pea was a bit overpowering but didn't detract much from this delicious dish. Our entree was Fettucine Primaveraaquite enjoyable dish. The fettucine itself was boiled/cooked perfectly "al dente" and the sauce of cheese and vegetables had nice earthy flavor. There are many ways to promote original songs. For new, unknown writers, the hardest part is getting your songs listened to. You may know someone yourself who is active or successful in the music industry. If so, present your songs to them for a critique. Many people can benefit from a mailing program. The best method I have found for mailing in terms of expense, offectiveness and time, is as follows:

- A. Research your areas of aspiration.
 B. Compile a mailing list of pros-

 - pective clients.
 Send a preliminary letter and a
 - return postcard.
 Respond appropriately to all
 - answers. Send one more letter to those who fail to acknowledge the first letter.
 - If they fail to respond the second time, eliminate them from the program.

There are many publications available to help, you in the construction of a mailing list. Most of them tell you how to contact the artist, their management firm and the label they work under. Billboard magazine has a book they publish annually, free of charge to subscribers. To the best of my knowledge, this is the only way to obtain this book. However, I have written Billboard for more data and will comment on this later. Another excellent book is "Songwriters Market". This book is also published annually by "Writers Digest Books". This years book was edited by Barbara Norton Kuroff. This company offers a variety of market books for artisans, writers, photographers, etc. graphers, etc.
Once your mailing list is compiled, you

should send each person or company a brief, personalized letter explaining why you thought they might be interes in your songs: bo not try to explain

In your songs. Do not try to explain how the song came to be. Do send a self-a iressed, stamped postcard with a simple questionnaire on the reverse side. Because artists, agents, managers, etc. are under a veritable deluge of new material from many, many writers. You should exhibit some respect for their time and make it easy to reply. You will certainly be received in a better light if you do.

SING THIS TO THE TUNE OF "POWN TOWN"

This postcard approach is of benefit on both ends of the exchange. First, it saves you the expense of buying, recording and mailing a tape to someone who has neither the time or inclination to listen. It also informs you of what forms (cassettes, reels, lyric or lead-sheets) the prospective buyer is interested in viewing. Lastly, it gives yourself a professional shine. When you show respect for their time, you build respect for yourself. This will be of great benefit to you should you reach the point of selling the song.

It is best to send no more than two songs to any client at one time unless they request a complete portfolio. Even if they consent to hear your songs, they will probably not take the time to hear more than two. When you submit the tape, be sure to put your name, complete mailing address and phone number on both the tape and tape case. If you wish to have the tape returned, also included a self-addressed envelope with the appropriate amount of postage.

When you go to make you "master tape", (the original recording) purchase the highest quality tape you can afford. The better the tape, the longer it last and the fidelity is much better too. The cassette or reel copies do not need to be of real high quality as their purpose is as a short term communication tool. Besides, you will have a high-quality master tape that will last for years if it's stored properly.

When making the master tape itself, it is not advisable to go to great lengths in arranging or producing the material. You are marketing a song, not a band. Selling a band is a completely different endeavor. Producers, artists, agents, etc. are thinking in terms of how their artists, arrangers, and their systems will produce the song. When you garbage up your demo with 10 instruments and what-not, it is not as easy for them to think in these terms. Although the song sounds basically empty, one instrument (piano or guitar) and the one instrument (piano or guitar) and the vocal is best. Never more than two or three instruments and the vocal unless re tryin' to promote your band as well.

If you are patient and handle this program professionally, you will get some response about your songs from the industry.

Hot summer days are here and so are possibly the three hottest blues albums of 'SI. Buddy Guy's recent album STONE CRAZY, released domestically on Alligator Records (Alligator 4723, list \$8.98), will blow your mind and elevate your soul. It's been 14 yrs. since his last album A MAN & THE BLUES recorded with longtime partner Junior Wells. STONE CRAZY is botter than the summer sum. His requires all the state of the summer sum of the state of the state of the summer sum of the state o with longtime partner Junior Wells. STONE CRAZY is hotter than the summer sun. His raw guitar style will make your soul sweat while his vocals send chills up your spine. Buddy has won the admiration of everyone who ever tried to pick blues on the guitar from B. B. King to Eric Clapton. Even Jim Thackery of the Nighthawks, who heard STONE CRAZY for the first time in Penny Lane, kept exclaiming, "How the first time in Penny Lane, kept exclaiming, "How can he do that!?!" And what does LeRoi say about this Guy? He say "Buddy Guy is the Jimi Hendrix of the Blues." Definitely this recording is Chicago

Another impressive Alligator release is PRINCE DIXON and the JACKSON SOUTHERNAIRES (Alligator 1201, list \$8.98). His early recording for Peacock, and his performances over the years, have earned him recognition and respect throughout the entire spiritual music field. The harmonies of the Jackson Southernaires compliment Prince Dixon's voice and add a spark of enthusiasm. These tunes will make your feet dance and your spirit come alive.

Finally there is COPELAND SPECIAL by Johnny Copeland (Rounder 2025, list \$8.98). This is a very special album indeed. Copeland's sensitive guitar playings and powerful vocals are enhanced by the talents of and powerful vocals are enhanced by the talents of George Adams on tenor and soprano saxes, and Arthur Blythe, alto sax, along with many others. Copeland has always attracted musicians of superior ability. He began in Houston, where his band featured luminaries like Don Wilkerson, Wilton Felder, and the legendary L. A. Hill. And we mean listen. Unfortunately, the restaurant is dissected by a wall—the result being many of the seats in the house have no view of the band. Our table was behind this obstruction and all we could see was the window into the kitchen. By the time we were leaving the <u>City Light</u>, it was beginning to fillup with its evening customers ready to listen to some good music.

Taken in it entirety, the City Light is really quite a pleasant little place. With the muted decor and attentive service, we felt we had found a restaurant that was relaxing and enjoyable, if not a gourmand's delight. The ambience was right for a place of its type, and many different kinds of people could go there and feel comfortable. We appreciated the food for its simplicity of preparation and presentation. We hope the owners of City Light can make a go of it, because Kansas City needs more places a person can go to and have a good inexpensive meal backed by some really fine music. There isn't nearly enough live jazz in the city, especially for a swing capital like K.C., and this restaurant does a nice job of helping to fill that void.

It's very hard to comment on this album at all, without going on about Her collaboration with Dizzy Gillespie on Night in Tunisia. Just the fact that Diz took time out from his thing to play is enough to merit attention. It's good to see Chaka

Reedus' style for this piece is a nice balance of cymbals and skins. Shaw is also accompanied by long time associates Steve Turre (trombone) and Stafford James (bass). Turre can best be heard on the tune Katrina Ballerina displaying his rich, fat sound, a nice vehicle for Steve as the piece alternates between 3/4 and 4/4 time. The icing on this musical cake is the appearance of Gary Bartz (alto sax) on two selections. Woody Shaw's Blues For Wood and the Cole Porter gem What is This Thing Called Love?. After hearing Gary now and comparing it to his last poor effort (BARTZ - Arista cut-out) all I can say is "Welcome Back Gary". United is an excellent mixture of new tunes and variations on old ones that will help jazz ears through the summer.


