Mayor's Message

Greetings all. Firstly I'll just thank those of you who have made yourselves available for recent consultation meetings, which have been used to help councillors hear from their community about certain projects. The time and effort is much appreciated, and I believe it helps council make balanced decisions.

Community Land Revocation

As a way of investigating potential opportunities for funding aspects of the TB Urban Plan, Council looked at options for consolidation of some open space, especially on the island. The proposal was to annex a portion of some of this land and sell it to help raise some capital to help access Open Space grants which are available. There has been much community discussion and consultation in this process, and throughout it all I believe Council has approached it with an open and consultative attitude. After much opposition from those in close proximity to the parks, Council has decided not to proceed with this proposal. In regards to the Urban plan, Council will now have to reassess and reprioritise as a way of being able to investigate funding opportunities.

Tod Reservoir

Council has received a Development Application from SA Water which sets out their plan to essentially decommission the Tod Reservoir, and reduce its capacity to less than 10% of its constructed capacity. The reasoning behind this is that of safety and risk mitigation, with SA Water deciding the capacity is unnecessary as the Tod hasn't been used as a potable water supply for the EP in over a decade. Council believes this is short-sighted, and the loss of infrastructure capacity which is proposed is not acceptable, and limits any potential use of the water in the future, whether this is through desalination potential or non-potable users. This is an issue which I believe the public in our district should be involved in, and the decision should not rest on those sitting in offices in SA Water.

EPLGA Conference

Some of your councillors have recently attended the annual EPLGA Conference which was held this year at Ceduna. This is a chance for Tumby Bay to meet with other local councils, and look at some of the issues which are common for all areas of local government. On the agenda at the moment are aspects such as potentials for regional development and regional governance, and providing a means for more efficient councils.



Fox Bait Distribution Days!

The distribution of Fox Bait commenced this year at Ungarra on the 9th March at the LEADA Expo Day. If you missed this day, you can also pick up baits at Green Shed in Port Neill on the 16th of March, or see me at the Natural Resources Office Tumby Bay on Thursday the 17th March. Gemma will also be at Yallunda Flat Hall on the 18th March. Times for all distribution days are from 9:30 to 11:30am.

Fox Bait Distribution Days are about getting as many landholders as possible to bait at the same time. Therefore, the more landholders baiting, the greater the benefit of reduced fox numbers over a larger area. Autumn is the ideal time to bait foxes, as juveniles are dispersing and are easily attracted to a food source.

The locally made 1080 meat baits are free-of-charge, so remember to bring in your bucket with sealed lid. The manufactured FOXOFF will also be available at cost.

Rabbits

With good summer rains the green feed is up already, which is not ideal for baiting rabbits. Nevertheless, if you have rabbits you need to reduce numbers now. Call me to arrange use of the rabbit bait layer to start your 3-freefeeds, before picking up the poisoned 1080 oats at the Tumby Office.

We are also looking for information and samples of dead rabbits with RHDV2, to be able to monitor the timing, direction, rate of spread and impact.






The things we keep by Sally Hepworth

This is a bitter sweet book about love, memory and what we do to hold on to both.




Mercy Street by Tess Evans


How to be happy by David Burton





A Soldiers' Story

Sam was born at Wasleys (near Gawler SA) on 3 March 1899 to Richard Burton Jenkins and Jane Jenkins (nee Selich). There were 5 children in the family, 2 boys and 3 girls, of which Sam was the eldest. His father was a farmer, initially in the Wasleys area before moving with his family to Stokes.

It is thought that he started school at Gawler. After the death of his sister, Margaret, the family moved to the Stokes area and he completed his schooling at Stokes in a class room in the family house of the Provis family, which was also the Post office (the teacher was Miss Provis). After completing his schooling he worked on the family farm and other farms in the Stokes area until his enlistment at Port Lincoln in June 1917. At this time he gave his occupation as farmer and his postal address as Ungarra.

On enlistment he was sent to Mitcham for processing and then to 2nd Depot Battalion (Bn) for basic training, which he undertook between June and September 1917. He was then allocated to 10th Reinforcements/5th Pioneer Battalion (Bn) and undertook further specialist sapper training at Mitcham.

The 5th Pioneer Bn was raised in Egypt on 10 March 1916 and assigned to 5th Division. It then saw service on the Western Front. Pioneer Bns performed construction tasks in the forward areas not requiring the special equipment of engineers, such as constructing trenches and dugouts although they occasionally acted in an engineer role on tasks such as the construction of bridges. They were organised the same as infantry battalions and also served as infantry in the front line.

On 27 October 1917 Sam entrained for Melbourne and then embarked aboard HMAT "Aeneas" bound for Devonport (UK), disembarking on 27 December 1917. Whilst undertaking further training in the UK he was transferred to 32nd Bn on 2 January 1918. He remained on the strength of this unit for 3 months before again being transferred, this time to 48th Bn.

The 48th Bn was raised in Egypt on the same day as 5th Pioneer Bn (16 March 1916) as part of the reorganisation and expansion of the AIF following the Gallipoli Campaign. The unit's personnel were drawn mainly from SA and WA. The Bn was sent to the Western Front in June 1916.

In March 1918, following the collapse of Russia, the Germans launched the "Spring Offensive. As the Allies were pushed back, the 48th Bn undertook a defensive role around Dernancourt, blocking the Amiens Road, before joining the final Allied offensive around Amiens in August 1918. During the fighting, it suffered 843 killed in action or died of wounds and 1,628 wounded.

It was during the Bns last battle at Le Verguier, north west of St. Quentin, that Sam was wounded in action (WIA) with a gunshot wound to the leg on 18 September 1918. He was evacuated to 141 Field Ambulance for treatment but died of wounds (DoW) later the same day. After this battle the Bn was withdrawn from the line and did not see action again before the war ended in November 1918.

He was buried at Estrees on Chausee in France, 5¾ miles south east of Peronne. His body was exhumed and reinterred at Hancourt British Cemetery, 6 ½ miles east south east of Peronne on 14 April 1920. His name is recorded on the Tumby Bay Memorial.

His family moved from the Stokes area back to Adelaide in 1919.
