TOUGH BUDGET THIS YEAR

City Schools announced a budget that will mean \$275,000 fewer dollars for HHA. Part of the drop in funding is due to lower enrollment in City Schools even though we are bursting at the seams and expect record numbers of HHA students next year. The other factor is Governor Hogan's state budget reduces funding to City Schools by \$25M. The ACLU and the Baltimore Education Coalition are working hard to restore at least some of those cuts. Mr. Hornbeck met with the School Family Council (SFC) Monday, February 29th to discuss ways to mitigate these cuts. We hope to preserve all staff and programming, but it's going to be a year to tighten our belt. Stay tuned.

STATE TEST NEXT MONTH

The second year of Maryland's new assessment in grades 3-8 called the Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC) is scheduled to begin in April. The PARCC will be administered just one time this year. The multiple choice questions ask students to select an answer, and then the next question asks them to select how or why they know their answer to the previous question is correct. Our students are ready. Parents can help by making sure students are relaxed, rested and have a good breakfast on test days. Look for a complete testing schedule in the April newsletter.

To emphasize attendance, effort, and conduct during testing weeks, students will be eligible to earn tickets for special raffles or participation in pizza parties organized by their teachers. Prizes and/or pizza parties vary by grade. Ask your child's homeroom teacher for more information. Staff addresses are located at www.hha47.org. Encourage your child to come to school with a relaxed, positive view of the test and to be on time and try their best.

HHA HONORED AT EGATE AWARDS

HHA shined at the EGATE awards held Wednesday, February 24th! This year the Maryland State Department of Education recognized four schools in Maryland with programs that meet the rigorous standards for Excellence in Gifted and Talented Education (EGATE). Out of 27 applicants across the state, HHA received the award along with three other newly recognized schools. HHA has created and implemented structures that meet the special needs of our gifted and talented students. The important changes to our program include: Updated criteria for identifying students, creation of individualized learning plans, mid-year progress reports and monitoring, and universal screening of all students in grades K-1.

In addition to the award, HHA has also been named as a GAL (Gifted and Advanced Learning) site by City Public Schools. As a result of his honor, a middle school honors program and honors level coursework for qualified students in grades 6, 7 and 8 has been created. UPDATE ON NEW SCHOOL IN CANTON — VERY IMPORTANT

Mr. Hornbeck recently met with the consultant working for the Southeast Community Development Center (SECDC) to discuss HHA's interest in the building at 801 South Highland Avenue, as well as our interest in seeing new schools and additions to existing schools throughout southeast Baltimore City. The SECDC, under Chris Ryer, is organizing a committee to study and discuss school attendance areas/zones, the development of new and existing buildings, and what the community wants in terms of public education. Of particular interest to the SECDC is the acquisition and development as a school of three parcels of land currently utilized as garages on Fayette Street. HHA's operator and families are not interested in reducing our attendance zone. We would definitely consider expanding our zone if HHA added an additional campus at the site of the former Friendship/Canton Middle building. Let your voice be known in this process.

News From the Teams

PREK

Students celebrated the 100th day of school, and continued learning about animals and the winter season. In math, they also worked on counting and recognizing numbers from 0-10. Please practice these math skills at home with your child. Next units of study will be measurement and animal habitats. The weather is still cold! Please make sure your child wears a coat to school every day. Help them learn to button and zip the coat. Also, remember to put children to bed at an early and regular time. Please reach out to your child's teacher with any questions!

KINDERGARTEN

Students celebrated the 100th day of school by making over 300 lunches to be used at Our Daily Bread. This is an activity that students take part in each year. Everyone is so proud of the students and enjoyed seeing their excitement as they decorated lunch bags and made lunches for those less fortunate. The service project created great conversations about helping others in the community.

Students will continue to study the signs of winter and will soon start fairy tale stories and stories about plants. In math, help your child practice their math skills at home with counting, adding, and subtracting along with reading every night. Also, please have your child read the day's story three times and sign their charts. Students are also practicing tying shoes, zipping and buttoning coats, and trying hard not to lose mittens. Continue to encourage your child to dress themselves and tie their own shoes. In the near future, kindergarten students will begin a problem solving club. They will be rewarded for taking initiative and solving their own problems without teacher intervention. Encourage your child to advocate for themselves by identifying the problem and either asking for help or trying to figure out a solution on their own. As a reminder, permission slips for Peter and the Wolf are due March 11th at noon. Please talk to your child's teacher if you have any questions. Also, please do your best to keep your child coming to school and on time. The teachers will support your child as much as they can at school, and as always, thank you for your help and support!

GRADE 1

Students celebrated the 100th day of school with fun activities including creating a picture with 100 pieces, making cereal necklaces that included 100 pieces divided into groups of 10 and having two "Zero the Hero's"! Students also received their animal habitats project, which is a 2-step project with the first part due March 14th. The second part of the project will be due April 22nd. This project is a culminating activity for the animal habitat unit that students finished in Core Knowledge. The next unit of study in Core Knowledge will be Astronomy. Finally, students will take a field trip in April to see a production of *Seussical the Musical*. Look for information to be sent home soon.





GRADE 2

Students had their winter Audubon sessions and learned how to use binoculars and identify birds. They will be ready to go bird watching in Patterson Park during their spring session. They are now getting ready to go to the Franklin Institute in Philadelphia on March 17th. The money for this trip is due by March 10th and should be paid in cash. There is room for five chaperons per homeroom due to the limited space on the bus. It is a first come first serve for chaperons. If you are not chosen as a chaperon, you are welcome to follow the bus.

The 1st and 2nd grade teachers remind you to check your child's folder every night and to check their reading homework. Be sure they are completing their homework and reading each night. Have a safe and relaxing spring break.

GRADE 3

Reading: The reading groups will begin to read a series of stories about scuba diving in the Atlantic Ocean. They will learn about coral reefs, unusual sea animals and being brave in dangerous situations. They will also finish reading about the organs and other major systems in the human body. All 3rd grade students will continue to work on reading fluency. Please read with your child every day even on the weekends.

Language: The language groups are learning a variety of information. They have begun to learn about a brand new part of speech: adjectives. In addition, they are learning to read and edit a passage for clarity. During this task, students are expected to read a passage, find any unclear pronouns and replace those pronouns with specific names. They are also learning how to use the reference tools (table of contents and index) in their reading textbook. In addition, they continue to practice the use of commas when applied to dates and addresses. One group will begin the study of poetry. During this unit, students will practice their rhyming abilities. In addition, they learn how to form stanzas and how to incorporate stylistic writing elements into their poems. Please check your child's agenda each night so that you know when your child will be taking a test so you can monitor your child's studying habits in preparation for the test.

Math: Students have finished Unit 5, Length and have spent some time on a mid-year review. They will now move on to Unit 6, Mass and Weight. They have also been hard at work on their 3rd quarter portfolio projects. They are choosing to create a song, story, poem, or comic strip about multiplication and division. Their work will include at least five problems and answers. Students are following the stages of the writing process to complete the drafts in school, and they will create their final copy for homework. Information about this project will be sent home soon. As always, please continue to practice multiplication and division facts at home!

Science: Students in all groups have almost completed the water and climate unit. The last assessment of this unit will consist of an in-class portfolio project. Students will write a creative piece that requires them to detail the steps of the water cycle through the eyes of a water droplet. Next, students will move onto the motion and matter unit. Please feel free to contact your child's teacher if you have any questions about the science fair. Although the actual science fair board is not due until after spring break, it is always a smart idea to get started as soon as possible.

GRADE 4

Reading: Groups are reading Beauty and the Beast and Sara Crewe. Students should be reading nightly. Grade reports are sent home on Fridays. Please review, sign and return the report to school. Weekly homework sheets are being sent home on Monday and are due back on Fridays.

Language: Groups are learning the very challenging skill of structuring sentences to build arguments. Some students are working in Reasoning and Writing Level D and others are writing paragraphs that infer about events that must have happened. All groups continue to rise up to the rigorous writing each week.

Math: Groups are learning about decimals, and about tenths, hundredths, thousandths, how decimals relate to fractions, and how we apply decimals to money. They are also reviewing long division, bar models and operations on fractions. Some math students have finished the second unit on fractions and have moved on to measures, where they are learning all about the various units of measurement. They will also be converting, adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing different measurements. All students should continue practicing their multiplication and division facts at home so they can excel in their classwork.

Social Studies: Class scientists are learning to be good thinkers and observers. Students finished the fossil's unit strong! The students were able to spend the day with a MICA graduate student, Jennifer Burt, to learn about community arts and print design. It was a wonderful experience, and the students made excellent fossil prints. They are now into the unit on Earth and Its Resources. They are learning about earth's different landforms and how they are shaped by weathering and erosion.

GRADE 5

Reading: The groups have completed *The Cruise of the Dazzler* by Jack London, and are currently reading an autobiography about Harriet Tubman. Students are researching the Civil War using computers, maps and texts. Some of the students have completed *Holes* by Loius Sachar, and are completing their final essays and research on desert animals. Their next novel will be *Kira Kira*. Remember that students have homework each Monday through Thursday and novel choice on Fridays. Coach class in on Tuesdays from 2:45 to 3:30 pm in room 302.

Language: Students continue to refine their writing skills.

Math: Students are working on decimals. They are adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing decimal numbers, and have started new portfolio project. Students will apply what they have learned in class to the real world situation of going to the grocery store. They are also learning their multiplication and division facts using Rocket Math.

Science: Students are transitioning out of learning about the earth and the sun and are rocketing into living systems. As a conclusion to the earth and sun unit, students are creating meteorology reports.

GRADE 6

Humanities: Students are currently reading *Flesh & Blood So Cheap: The Triangle Fire and Its Legacy* by Albert Marrin. As they read, students are examining how individuals overcome challenges with a focus on the perspective of early 20th century immigrant workers. On Friday, March 11th, the students will travel to New York City to visit the Statue of Liberty, Ellis Island, Chinatown and Little Italy.

Math: Students will begin the geometry unit and will learn how to construct circles as well as create a geometry handbook for circles, triangles and quadrilaterals.

Science: Students just finished exploring the geologic timeline and Earth's history. Students are now beginning a unit on weather and climate. Quiz yourself and see if you can answer the following questions and then quiz your child:

- What was the first organism on Earth and in which era did this occur?
- What are mega-mammals and in which era did they exist?
- When was the biggest mass extinction in Earth's history?

6TH GRADE SNACK SALE

The 6th grade students wanted to thank the parents, teachers, students and the Canton community for donating baked goods. GRADE 7

Language Arts: Students have finished the study of Inside Out and Back Again, and looked at the refugee experience after the character Ha left Vietnam and resettled in America. In addition, students discussed the challenges of adapting to a new culture and place-- particularly, the challenges of learning a new language and culture. For their final project, students are going to look at another story about a refugee and create a poem chronicling the refugee's experience.

Math: Students will finish Domain 4 Geometry and start Domain 5 Statistics and Probability. Students will work on sampling and using Mean and Mean Absolute Deviation.






Science: Students will complete the study of the kingdom animalia. They have spent the last month exploring characteristics that define invertebrate and vertebrate species, and will connect what they have learned about animals to the next unit on the human body. The study of human body systems will take place until the 4th quarter.

GRADE 8

Language Arts: Students are very excited that they have finished their projects for the project fair. The projects will be judged Friday, March 4th. Each child is presenting their influential person, time period or topic and sharing their research with the judges. After the project fair, students will begin reading *My Brother Sam is Dead* which aligns with the Revolutionary War unit. Students will also begin to prepare for the PARCC test.

Math: Students started a unit on functions. They started with defining functions and learning all the different ways functions can be represented. After learning the representations, students learned how to evaluate functions when given different domains. They also learned how to write the equation of linear functions when given in a different representation. At the end of the month, students were introduced to non-linear functions. In March, students will to learn to average rate of change and will use functions to model real life scenarios.

Science: Students have started the next

unit on Energy. They will learn how the universe is comprised of energy that it is constantly being transformed from one form to another. This unit will include an inquiry-based project on thermal conductors and insulators, as well as a persuasive writing project about renewable and non-renewable energy resources. This month students will also prepare for the Maryland State Assessment (MSA) in science that will be administered over two days in mid-March.

Leaders Go Places:

Middle school students recently attended LGP Homeroom Advisory, a bi-quarterly opportunity for students to calculate their GPA and receive an update on their leadership level status. Students who submit at least one service learning hour to Mrs. Seymour by Friday, March 11th will be eligible for a special "citizenship" recognition pin.

RESOURCE NEWS

ART

All students had the opportunity to complete Square one Art this past month. Look for the order form to be coming home in your child's folder. Please complete the form and return it to school before the deadline.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Students in grades PreK – K will conclude large group games and will begin 50 yard dash skills. Students in grades 1, 2 and 3 will conclude station activities and begin 50 yard dash skills. Students in grades 4 and 5 will conclude volleyball activities using the beach ball and will begin 50 yard dash skills. Students in grades 6 and 7 will conclude volleyball and begin the dodge ball unit. Students in grade 8 will be tested on the five elements of fitness and will also begin the dodge ball unit. Students in grades 6, 7 and 8 will also be tested on the volleyball unit.

CORE KNOWLEDGE EXTENSION

Prek and K are singing songs, doing movements with songs, listening to books and coloring pictures related to the songs. Students in grades 3 and 4 are learning about the classification of animals, and students in grade 5 are learning about explorers and the thirteen colonies. Students in grade 7 are working on Duolingo Spanish or French, and students in grades 6 and 8 are continuing to write a variety of articles in journalism.

FOOD FOR LIFE

Students in Food for Life have been busy reading nutrition labels and learning how fats affect the heart and circulatory system. Students in grade 1 and 2 are beginning a unit on vitamins, and students in grades 3 and 4 will do a unit on botany and explore grains, fruits, legumes and vegetables. Students in grades 5-8 are learning about seasonings, before beginning their cooking units. Students in grades 5 and 6 will learn about various cooking methods like sautéing and roasting, and students in grades 7 and 8 will make foods from around the world.





MUSIC LESSONS

Orchestra students are diligently working on concert music for the spring community arts night. Beginners have been working with the G string and scale extensively. Advanced students are also working with the G string as well as longer pieces of music.

Band students have also begun working on concert music. They are preparing a longer selection as well as a few shorter ones. They are also starting to play duets and solo pieces as well.

All students are continuing to expand their musical vocabulary as well as strengthen their note and rhythm reading skill.

HEALTH

PreK and K students are learning their emergency phone numbers by making "High Five" posters to help them with memorization. Students in grades 1 and 2 summed up their conflict resolution unit by creating a "Don't be an Angry Bird" book, and students in grades 3 and 4 are learning about spiritual wellness through yoga. Students in grade 5 and 6 students have begun discussing bullying, and students in grade 7 and 8 have completed their introduction lesson to the family life unit.

DRAMA

Ms. Durkin is having a lot of fun getting to know her new PreK and K students. Students have learned what it means to be an actor, practiced observation skills, and learned about personal space. All students in grades 1 - 8 are engaged in a unit on devising and performing original theatrical works.

On Thursday, February 18th, four HHA students participated in the citywide student Shakespeare Festival held at the Chesapeake Shakespeare Company. They were joined by students from Baltimore City College, Roland Park and Augusta Fells Savage Institute of Visual Arts. Jorge Sanchez-Alvarez (Benedick) and Jordan Turowski (Beatrice), 7th grade students, presented a dramatic scene from *Much Ado About Nothing*. Madison Bunce (Nurse) and Shayla Chapple-Bell (Juliet), 8th grade students, presented a comedic scene from *Romeo and Juliet*. The students did a fantastic job performing on a professional stage and received feedback from professional actors of the Chesapeake Shakespeare Company. We look forward to taking more students to this wonderful event next year!

NATURE EXPLORATION

Because of all the weather events, classes have only met one to two times this semester. However, students have begun to explore the different components of ecosystems and are beginning to look a bit more in depth into the relationships between the biotic and abiotic factors. In the lower elementary classes, students will explore how animal adaptations help them to survive in the winter. In the upper middle school classes, students

have been exploring chemical change and the pH of different solutions. The goal is for students to make the connection between the pollutants that we put into our atmosphere and the consequences of acid rain and increased acidity in our oceans and on the wildlife living in the oceans.

Even though winter is still here, classes will go outside to experience nature first hand, so please send your student to school with appropriate outer gear!

The HHA library has many new books perfect for young ones to learn about animals that they love. Beautiful pictures and beginner reader text make these perfect for young readers!


Upper Elementary:



HEALTHY TIPS FROM THE WELLNESS COMMITTEE

National School Breakfast Week is March 7-11. Did you know that breakfast is the most important meal of the day? Research shows that students who eat breakfast are able to focus in the classroom and perform better on tests. What does your child like to eat for breakfast? Check out the first floor bulletin board to see what kids around the world eat for breakfast. Everyone knows mornings are hectic, and it can be hard to fit breakfast in, but your child can have free breakfast every day at school, starting at 7:40 am.

Blueberry Oatmeal Muffins

These Blueberry Oatmeal Muffins are the perfect thing for the kids! Tossing frozen blueberries with flour before adding them to the batter keeps them from turning the batter purple while they bake. If you use fresh blueberries, skip that step.

Yield: 16 adult servings (serving size: 1 muffin)

Ingredients

1 2/3 cups quick-cooking oats

3 ounces all-purpose flour (about 2/3 cup)

2.33 ounces whole-wheat flour (about 1/2 cup)

3/4 cup packed light brown sugar

2 teaspoons ground cinnamon

1 teaspoon baking powder

1 teaspoon baking soda

3/4 teaspoon salt

1 1/2 cups low-fat buttermilk

1/4 cup canola oil

2 teaspoons grated lemon rind

2 large eggs

2 cups frozen blueberries

2 tablespoons all-purpose flour

Cooking spray

2 tablespoons granulated sugar

Preparation

- 1. Preheat oven to 400°.
- 2. Place oats in a food processor; pulse 5 to 6 times or until oats resemble coarse meal. Place in a large bowl.
- 3. Weigh or lightly spoon flours into dry measuring cups; level with a knife. Add flours and next 5 ingredients to oats; stir well. Make a well in center of mixture.
- 4. Combine buttermilk and next 3 ingredients. Add to flour mixture; stir just until moist.
- 5. Toss berries with 2 tablespoons flour, and gently fold into batter. Spoon batter into 16 muffin cups coated with cooking spray; sprinkle 2 tablespoons granulated sugar evenly over batter. Bake at 400° for 20 minutes or until muffins spring back when touched lightly in center. Remove from pans immediately; place on a wire rack.
