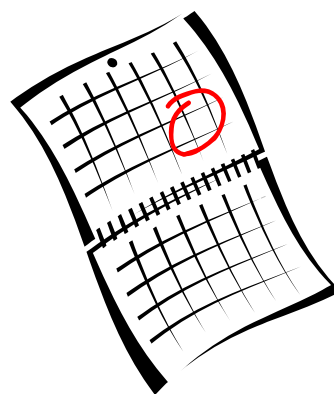

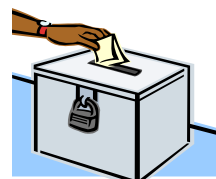


National Election

Fireflies By Gary Sander

While a group of us were seated around a campfire on a pleasant July night at our chapter campout we noticed that we were sharing the darkness with fireflies. As we were entertained by their flashing and darting about we began to speculate and offer what we thought what we knew about our visitors who were sharing the evening with us.

As we began this discussion we realized that we could only relay information that we had heard or speculations that we formed as children. And since none of us were entomologists or consulted an expert we soon realized that we knew very little accurate information about fireflies. Of course, we all knew that as children we delighted in capturing fireflies and watching them perform in our glass jar. Beyond that we knew very little about the real story about fireflies.

Someone then threw out the challenge that the calling should run a story about fireflies so that everyone could know and learn about our firefly companions. The following information was gathered from the Internet, and offers in this limited space, some basic information about fireflies.

The Firefly Story

There are about 2,000 firefly species. These insects live in a variety of warm environments, as well as in more temperate regions, and are a familiar sight on summer evenings. Fireflies love moisture and often live in humid regions of Asia and the Americas. In drier areas, they are found around wet or damp areas that retain moisture.

Females deposit their eggs in the ground, which is where larvae develop to adulthood. Underground larvae feed on worms and slugs by injecting them with a numbing fluid.

The mating season lasts for approximately two weeks each year. The date that the fireflies begin to display varies from year to year-scientists haven't figured out why, but it depends at least in part on temperature and soil moisture. It's impossible to predict in advance exactly when the insects will begin flashing each year.

As the season begins, a few insects start flashing, then more join the display as the days pass. They reach a "peak" when the greatest number of insects are displaying. After peak, the numbers gradually decline each day until the mating season is over. Since 1993, this peak date has occurred at various times from the third week of May to the third week in June.

During the two week long mating season, the quality of individual nightly displays can be affected by environmental factors. On misty, drippy evenings following rainfall, the insects may not readily display. Cool temperatures, below 50° Fahrenheit, will also shut down the display for the night. Moon phase has been observed to affect the timing of nightly displays-on nights with a bright moon, the insects may begin flashing a bit later than usual

Here are some facts about fireflies:

Fireflies, also called lightning bugs, are neither flies nor bugs. Fireflies are actually beetles.

Fireflies are the world's most efficient light producers. While an incandescent light bulb uses 10% of the energy to product light while wasting 90% as heat. The firefly produces no heat, only light. This light is the most efficient light source known.

Fireflies "talk" to each other using light signals. Fireflies don't put on those spectacular summer displays just to entertain us. You're actually eavesdropping on the firefly singles bar. Male fireflies cruising for mates flash a species-specific pattern to announce their availability to receptive females. An interested female will reply, helping the male locate her where she's perched, often on low vegetation.

Fireflies are bioluminescent throughout their life cycles. We don't often see fireflies before they reach adulthood, so you may not know that all stages of the firefly glow. Bioluminescence begins with the egg, and is present throughout the entire life cycle. In fact, all firefly eggs, larvae, and pupae known to science are capable of producing light.

Not all adult fireflies flash. Fireflies are known for their blinking light signals, but not all fireflies flash. Some adult fireflies, most notably those that inhabit the western areas of North America, don't use light signals to communicate. Many people falsely believe that fireflies don't exist west of the Rockies, since flashing populations are rarely seen there.

Some fireflies synchronize their flash signals. Synchronous fireflies are one of the seven wonders of the insect world. Imagine thousands of fireflies lighting up at precisely the same time, over and over, from dusk to dark. This simultaneous bioluminescence, as it's called by scientists, occurs in just two places in the world: southeast Asia and Great Smoky Mountains National Park, right here in the U.S.A. North America's lone synchronous species, *Photinus carolinus*, puts on its light show in late spring each year.

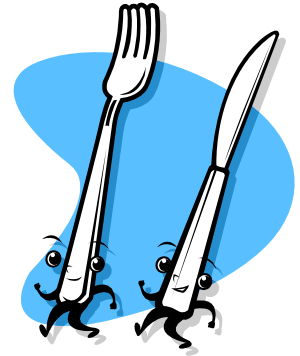

Cold Slaw

Cabbage
Carrots
Cauliflower
Sweet Potatoes
1 Tsp sugar
1 Tsp Vinegar
Salt
Enough vanilla ice cream to be used as dressing



Grate or shred equal amounts of cabbage, carrots, cauliflower and sweet Potatoes. Add Sugar, vinegar, salt and ice cream. Best if refrigerated overnight.

When you double the recipe increase herbs and spices by 1/2. taste and you can add more if needed.

| 1 - tsp. salt | 1 - cup water |
| 1 - cup granulated sugar | 3 - cups thinly sliced onions |
| 3 - cups sliced cucumbers | |

Place sliced cucumber and onions in a large container or bowl. In a separate bowl, stir vinegar, sugar, water and salt together until dissolved. Add celery seed. Pour mixture over cucumbers and onions and refrigerate.

Letter from Central Nebraska Child Advocacy Center of Grand Island

Dear June Bug Campers;

On behalf of Central Nebraska Child Advocacy Center (CNCAC), I would like to extend a heartfelt thank you for the invitation to come and spend some time with all of you on June 28th. My family and I thoroughly enjoyed the afternoon and were reminded of how fortunate we are to be surrounded by such great people who care about the lives of children. Your most generous financial contribution of \$254.00 is most appreciative and will be applied to the continued serving of children who are victims of abuse and sexual assault.

As a small non-profit organization with three full-time employees, we all wear multiple hats to provide the necessary services to child victims within the eleven counties in Central Nebraska. Since CNCAC is funded mainly on grants, community support, fundraising and state assistance, we rely heavily on the efforts and support of our community partners. With the increase of children seen at our center in the past few months, your support comes at a crucial time. Within the past six months, CNCAC has conducted an average of 23.3 forensic interviews per month, compared to 13.9 within the entire calendar year of 2013.

The increased cases stems from greater community awareness and training, resulting in more individuals making a report, as required by State Statute 28-711. In line with these larger numbers come increased forensic interviews, advocacy, case management, referral services and on-call requirements. With that being said, your most humbling financial contribution will have significant impact on the lives of child victims.

In closing, please accept our sincere appreciation for your support for the victims we serve. Please accept this as your receipt for your kind donation of \$254.00 to CNCAC. Please share this thank you with others in the June Bug Campers as you feel appropriate.
