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
#### Black Creek Events &

## **Boy Scout Requirement Changes ⋒**

Starting January 1, 2016 the new Boy Scout requirements become effective and the new Boy Scout handbook will be released. We know what many of you are wondering - wow will we transition youth into these new requirements? Lucky for us the National Advancement Team thought ahead and came up with the following solution.

For 2016:

- Boys joining on or after Jan. 1, 2016 MUST use the new requirements.
- Boys who have joined prior to Jan. 1, 2016:
- Who are working on the Scout badge MAY continue to work on the existing requirements, but MUST convert to the new requirements upon completion of the Scout badge.
- Who are working on Tenderfoot through First Class MAY continue to work on the existing requirements, but MUST convert to the new requirements upon attaining First Class.
- Who have completed First Class MAY complete the rank they are currently working on in the existing requirements, but then MUST convert to the new requirements for subsequent ranks.

For 2017: All Scouts MUST use the new requirements regardless of rank.



This month I just wanted to make you aware of some lodge and chapter events that will be happening soon including the Lodge Banquet, lodge officer elections, our Chapter Gathering, new member elections season and ceremonies and service to the Klondike.

First off The Lodge Banquet will be taking place in January at the Burgundy Basin Inn on January 17th 2016 from 4pm -8pm. This is an important event for Arrowmen to attend especially youth as it is when the lodges youth officer elections will be taking place. All youth are allowed to vote at this event so make sure that you are there and that your voice is heard. In addition two Arrowmen for our district are running for officer positions this year, Peter Huber is running for Lodge Chief and I am running for Chapter Chief.

Second, our Monthly Chapter Activity will be doing Cosmic Bowling on December 18th at 9pm. Prices will be released over Facebook and Email. Please send a note to blackcreekchief@googlegroups.com letting me know that you will be able to make it. In Addition there will be a raffle at this event for Youth Members so be sure to attend.

Third, new member election season is upon us once again. As with last month, Our Vice Chief of elections and I will be in attendance at Round Table this week during the Boy Scout breakout we will be in the back with a calendar come find us and we will help you schedule your Troops OA election or visit.

For an election we will come to your troop meeting on the date you give us and we will talk to your boys about the Order of the Arrow. Before the meeting you will have to get the names and contact info of all the boys that are eligible to be elected into the Order. After we speak about The Order we will conduct an election by secret ballot. In order to go on to the next step, The Induction, a scout must re-

ceive 50% + 1 votes from the boys present that night. For a visit we will show up at the meeting that you have specified and we will simply talk about the Order and its histo-



ry, how to identify an Arrowman, and how one joins the Order of the Arrow.

It is important to note here that adults are not elected as are youth. They are instead nominated by their troop's committee and if they are approved by the Lodges Adult Leaders they will be eligible to join the Order of the Arrow.

If you are a new Eagle Scout that would like to have the Four Winds ceremony contact us. 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## The Scoutmaster Guides the Boy in the Spirit of an

#### Older Brother ∞

As a preliminary word of comfort to intending Scoutmasters, I should like to contradict the usual misconception that, to be a successful Scoutmaster, a man must be an Admirable Crichton — a know-all. Not a bit of it.

He has simply to be a boy-man, that is:

He must have the boy spirit in him; and must be able to place himself on a right plane with his boys as a first step. He must realize the needs, outlooks and desires of the different ages of boy life.

He must deal with the individual boy rather than with the mass.

He then needs to promote a corporate spirit among his individuals to gain the best results. With regard to the first point, the Scoutmaster has to be neither schoolmaster nor commanding officer, nor pastor, nor instructor. All that is needed is the capacity to enjoy the out-of-doors, to enter into the boys' ambitions, and to find other men who will give them instruction in the desired directions, whether it be signaling or drawing, nature study or pioneering.

He has got to put himself on the level of the older brother, that is, to see things from the boy's point of view, and to lead and guide and give enthusiasm in the right direction. Like the true older brother he has to realize the traditions of the family and see that they are preserved, even if considerable firmness is required. That is all. The Movement is a jolly fraternity, all the jollier because in the game of Scouting you are doing a big thing for others, you are combating the breeding of selfishness.

Regarding the second point, the various handbooks cover the successive phases of adolescent life

Thirdly, the business of the Scoutmaster — and a very interesting one it is — is to draw out each boy and find out what



is in him, and then to catch hold of the good and develop it to the exclusion of the bad. There is five per cent of good even in the worst character. The sport is to find it, and then to develop it on to an 80 or 90 per cent basis. This is education instead of instruction of the young mind.

Fourth. In the Scout training the Patrol or gang system gives the corporate expression of the individual training, which brings into practice all that the boy has been taught.

The Patrol System has also a great character-training value if it is used aright. It leads each boy to see that he has some individual responsibility for the good of his Patrol. It leads each Patrol to see that it has definite responsibility for the good of the Troop. Through it the Scoutmaster is able to pass on not only his instruction but his ideas as to the moral outlook of his Scouts. Through it the Scouts themselves gradually learn that they have considerable say in what their Troop does. It is the Patrol System that makes the Troop, and all Scouting for that matter, a real co-operative effort.

In this season, let us give thanks, let us rededicate ourselves being difference-makers, and re-purpose to do the things that support the world's premier youth development program.

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## Nominate a Worthy Scouter for the Silver Beaver ∞

Tim Lynch has been the Chair of the Silver Beaver Selection Committee for the last four years. He has asked me, as Immediate Past Council President, to assume that responsibility in 2016. I am happy to take on that position and thank Tim for his past service.

As the new Chair of the Silver Beaver Selection Committee I thought it would be important to share some thoughts and explain the process so we are all on the same page.

The Council will be using the National Nomination Form for 2016. The Form is available on the Council and National websites, from District Executives and from Chris Crittenden at the Council Service Center (241-8580 or christine.crittenden@scouting.org).

All Nominations need to be submitted by March 1, 2016 to Chris Crittenden at the Service Center (Seneca Waterways Council, BSA; 2320 Brighton-Henrietta Town Line Road; Rochester, New York 14623).

The qualifications for a Silver Beaver Nominee are set forth on the application. Nominees must:

- Be a registered Scouter;
- Have made an impact on the lives of youth through service given to the Council.

The Selection Committee will meet at a mutually agreeable date in mid-March 2016 to select recipients. In advance of that meeting, Committee members will be provided with copies of all nominations.

My intent is to have at least one representative from each District participate on the Selection Committee. Each year I plan on having the prior year's recipients sit on the Committee (2015 recipients on 2016 Committee). If a District did not have recipient the prior year I will contact the District Chair to discuss an appropriate representative from the District.

Based on the number of units registered at the end of 2015, the Council should have seven or eight Silver Beavers to award in 2016. They Council also has a bank of five additional awards which could be accessed if we had an exceptional number of qualified candidates.

In that regard, my philosophy is that we should recognize only candidates that truly meet the criteria for the Silver Beaver award. That could result in awarding less than seven or eight Silver Beavers in 2016 or exceeding that number and using the bank to recognize all deserving nominees.



Finally, I urge all Districts to highly publicize the Award and nomination process to their Districts, and encourage the timely nomination of worthy candidates.


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## **Helping our Youth Achieve More ∞**

As scouters, we share the goals of the Boy Scouts of America.

"The mission of the Boy Scouts of America is to prepare young people to make ethical and moral choices over their lifetimes by instilling in them the values of the Scout Oath and Scout Law."

We also hope to see them become better leaders and role models for those around them. Respectively, the Eagle Scout and Summit awards for Boy Scouts and Venturers are symbols of that accomplishment. At the same time, they are preparing to graduate from High School and in many cases planning for college.



All youth suffer some anxiety going through the application process and waiting to hear if they've been accepted to the schools they hope to attend. A fringe benefit of the scouting awards is that they provide college admissions staff a tangible assessment of a youth's ability to deal with the rigors of academia in a setting where they must function independently and in a new social environment. This gives our youth an edge.

We can help them improve their chances even more by taking advantage of a program called the Congressional Award.

"The Congressional Award, a public-private partnership, established by Congress in 1979 under Public Law 96-114, is a non-competitive program open to young people ages 14-23, regardless of mental or physical challenges, or socioeconomic status. The Congressional Award Foundation teaches participants to set and achieve personally challenging goals that build character, and foster community service, personal development, and citizenship."

For both Boy Scouts and Venture Scouts, the program aligns very well with the things the youth are already doing as a part of the scouting program. In fact, the Congressional Award mirrors the Venturing achievements because it involves setting and achieving goals in the areas of:

- Community Service
- Personal Growth
- · Physical Fitness
- Expedition/Exploration

So how do we our scouts involved? Youth must first register with the program at www.congressionalaward.org. In order to register, a youth needs to list his/her congressional district and the name of their congressional member. They will also need to print out a waiver and send in a check for \$10.00 to finalize the registration process.

The registration form will ask for the name of the youth's advisor for this process. The Congressional Award program describes the advisor's role as:

- Meeting with the youth to set acceptable and challenging goals
- Staying in touch with the youth throughout their pursuit of the award
- Helping youth put together their award booklet to submit when they have completed their goals.

The advisor can be any adult who is not a member of the youth's family. Teachers, coaches, civic leaders, neighbors and close family friends can be excellent advisors.

Guess what? You are in a perfect role to help them!

Our youth are already doing things that satisfy the requirements for the Congressional Award. Why not present them with an opportunity to stretch a little more and earn an award that will help them in their struggle to be successful.

I hope you take advantage of this program to help your youth to do their best!

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#### **2017 National Scout Jamboree №**

The Jamboree is coming!

Believe it or not, we are already preparing for the 2017 National Scout Jamboree, to be held July 19-28, 2017 at the Summit, the new home of the Jamboree in West Virginia.

There are eight different canopy tours. (Ropes and platforms in tree tops.) Each course consists of multiple zip lines, bridges and self-rappel elements.

The skatepark presents a variety of elements - transition, street, bowls, vert and foam pits.

The BMX racing facility offers a variety of track configurations including jump, pump, downhil and flat.

The archery facility provides the chance to shoot static ranges of varying distances, sporting arrows (shooting discs out of the air) and the 3D walking range.

The shooting venue is home to trap, five-stand, sporting clays, long distance rifle and pistol ranges.

At the ropes area participants navigate a vast array of challenge course and high ropes activities. The Ropes offers four regular high ropes courses and the AEP Power Tower, a vertical challenge course that dares you to make it to the top

At the climbing walls, there is climbing, rappelling and taking the "Leap of Faith". Climbing routes have difficulty ratings from 5.5 to 5.11, making the climbing versatile for climbers of all ability levels

Our cross country mountain biking venue boast 19 miles of trails. Green, blue and black trails offer rides of varying difficulties. Advanced riders may tackle the 17 miles of downhill trails available at an advanced location also in camp.

This 3200 foot zip line speeds riders at speeds nearing 60 mph over the valley and BRAVO LAKE. The lake hosts swimming, kayaking, paddle boarding, and a wide variety of other water activities.



There will be huge stadium shows with national acts and important people. We have seen presidents, kings, celebrities and more at Jamborees.

All participants hike to the top of the mountain on site for a day of woodland games, OA offerings, and more traditional/classical scouting, including giant pioneering, etc.

There are countless displays showing sustainability, technology, and everything having anything to do with Scouting.

There is white water rafting on the New River, some of the best rafting in the eastern US.

## Eagle Scout Graduation Cords &

I recently read an article about scouts who have been awarded their Eagle Scout Badge prior to High School graduation being able to wear an "honors cord" with their cap and gown. According to the article, some school districts allow Eagle Scouts to be recognized for their accomplishments, just as other students are recognized for their other outstanding academic achievements.

One rationale of thought is the Eagle Scout Award is not an academic achievement and therefore not recognized. However, a different rationale is the Eagle Scout Award requires significant dedication, time, effort, contribution to the local community, and the receiving scout has learned a lot about themselves along with developing other skills; therefore, the graduation cord recognition is quite appropriate.

Some school districts also allow the inclusion of the Eagle Scout Award recognition in graduation programs and inclusion in the reading of honors recognition.

The associated rationales include the appropriate colors of the graduation cords. Some districts allow the standard "red, white and blue" colors while others may require the standardized colors of all of the school district honor groups, while yet others may require cords to reflect the school colors.

Eagle Scouts who have been awarded the Eagle Scout Award prior to high school graduation need to check with their school district to understand the proper procedure and to assist in setting up a revised policy if the school district does not currently have such an Eagle Scout recognition policy.

There are a number of websites available which sell the graduation recognition cords.

Like so many of these matters, it would be wise to check it out earlier rather than at the last minute.

An Oath Taken

Did you know that thousands go hungry every day in our community? Hunger affects the whole body and a child's physical and mental development. It's more than just missing a meal it's also about the nutritional value of the food they are eating. In our community, thousands of working families struggle to put food on the table. They rely on the low-cost or subsidized breakfasts and lunches provided at school to help provide their children with the nutrition that is vital to their overall health and development. When a child is hungry it is hard for them to concentrate on anything but their hunger and that affects their learning.

Hunger hurts and it is very, very real here in our own communities. It affects families from all backgrounds and the whole community! It's not contained to third world countries.

**Hunger Facts** 

1 in 7 Americans are hungry – including more than 1 in 5 children.

The state of hunger in Central and Western New York:

- 36% of clients served by Foodlink are children; 5% are elderly
- 26% of client households include at least one employed adult
- 82% of client households have incomes below the federal poverty level
- 30% of client households report having at least one member in poor health
- 23% of clients had to choose between paying for food and paying for medicine or medical care
- 50% of clients are white; 37% are Black; 11% are Hispanic; 2% are from other racial groups

Have you ever been hungry? Your stomach growls and you eat something as soon as you can. But there are children and families who don't have the food to quiet their growls. Their stomachs just ache most of the day because they may not have the benefit of three meals and snacks whenever their stomach begins to rumble. Thousands go hungry right here in our own communities. They don't go to McDonald's when it's convenient.

Our Scouts pledge an oath to help others at all times. Giv-

ing of yourself, in service to others is one of the ideals of Boy Scouting. It is spelled out in the Scout Oath and Law: "On My Honor, I will do my best... To help other people at all times" and "A Scout is Helpful" is the third point of the Boy Scout Law.

Community service is one of many ways to help others! The impact is enormous with a ripple effect throughout the whole community. Selfless caring and giving makes society a better place.

One of the many ways Scouts can help others in need is through the annual Scouting For Food Drive (March 11th and 19th). The more Scouts that are out helping collect food donations, the more families that can be helped. Hunger affects whole communities and helping ease the pain of hunger for thousands of families can happen when the whole (Scouting) community is involved.

What Can You Do?

Visit a Food Pantry – Scouts are encouraged to visit a Food Pantry (contact the Council for a listing) to truly understand how hunger affects families right in their own neighborhoods.

Participate 100% in the Food Drive – Engage the Scouts in your Pack and Troop in the Scouting for Food Drive.

Every Scout knows the slogan, "Do a Good Turn Daily." That doesn't mean once you've done the good deed for the day you should stop. Doing a good turn is an act of kindness, not just something done because it is good manners.

Think about what the Scout Oath means? Is it simply recited without consideration for what you are pledging to abide by daily? Without action and commitment, the Oath becomes just words strung together. Someone less fortunate needs your help. Just think if the tables were turned... and you found yourself in unfortunate circumstances needing help... will someone be there to Do a Good Turn for you!

#### The Scout Law and Cybersafety/Cyberbullying

Today we are online more than ever before. We use technology to save us time with research, connect with others, navigate, and have fun. Here are some ideas of how the digital world and the Scouting community can live side by side.

**Trustworthy.** Be truthful with others online, and be very careful of the information you share. Do the right thing when sharing other people's words or pictures. Make sure you have the owner's permission before using them.

**Loyal.** Share information about others only if you have their permission to share it. Uphold appropriate agreements you make with friends when you play games with them.

**Helpful.** Alert others to scams, cheats, and suspicious sites. Point them to reliable and accurate sources of information. Encourage people to report bad behavior online.

Friendly. Reach out to support others who are doing good things, like posting quality creative works. Support those who are bullied.

**Courteous.** Be polite and respectful. When you use other people's work, be sure to ask permission when necessary, follow fair use standards, and give credit to the people who created and own the work.

**Kind.** Treat people with respect when you are on social networks, playing games, talking or texting on a cellphone, or in other digital activities.

**Obedient.** When using digital devices, follow the rules set by your parents/guardians, teachers, and Scout leaders. Abide by the rules established by sites, services, devices, and games.

Cheerful. Use games, messaging tools, and social forums to build your relationships with others while having fun.

**Thrifty.** Be a smart consumer. Know your voice, text, and data plans and use them wisely. Be sure to study digital devices and services you want. Before buying them, make sure you're not overspending on functions and features you won't need. Be careful not to run up charges on apps and sites.

**Brave.** Stand up for what is right. Do not participate in mocking and bullying others, even if your friends are doing it. Report suspected abuse to a trusted adult, like your parent or leader; call 911 or call the Cyber Tip line at 1-800-843-5678. If the incident involves any part of the Scouting program, call your council Scout executive immediately or email youth.protection@scouting.org.

Clean. Use clean language and discuss only appropriate topics when using digital devices to communicate with others.

Reverent. Respect the feelings of other people. Do not use digital devices to spread irreverent ideas.

Remember that life is a balance. In Scouting, we focus on a balanced life through our aims: character, physical fitness, and citizenship. Technology is a tool to help us. It is not there to take the place of family, friends, the Scout Law, and staying physically fit. Stay ScoutSTRONG!

#### Warning to Skiers/Snowboarders

As the Event Coordinator, it is your responsibility to communicate the following to all participants. Please print out and pass along to pack and family members participating in the 2011-2012 Scout Night at Bristol Mountain. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated.

- 1. Skiers, snowboarders, and lift passengers are governed by the New York State Safety in Skiing Code, Article 18 of the NYS General Obligations Law. Before affixing your pass or allowing any pass to be affixed to your person, your attention is directed to a posted "Warning to Skiers" that is displayed in the Guest Services Office. The Safety in Skiing Code requires you to seek out, read, and understand the "Warning to Skiers" before you decide to participate in the sport of skiing.
- 2. Skiing and snowboarding, like many other sports, contains inherent risks, including, but not limited to the risk of personal injury or death or property damage. Therefore, Bristol Mountain takes appropriate measures to protect skiers from undue, unnecessary, and unreasonable hazards, including those created by skier conduct, excesses, and attitudes. Skiers who create such hazards for themselves, or other skiers, can be arrested under Article 18 of the NYS General Obligations Law and may be required to leave the area. They will be denied skiing and snowboarding privileges at Bristol Mountain. In such case, no refund of purchase price for lift ticket or pass will be made.
  - 1. Always stay in control, be able to stop or avoid other people or objects
  - 2. People ahead of you have the right of way. It is your responsibility to avoid them.
  - 3. You must not stop where you obstruct a trail, or are not visible from above.
  - 4. Whenever starting downhill or merging into a trail, look uphill and yield to others
  - 5. Always use devices to help prevent runaway equipment.
  - 6. Observe all posted signs and warnings.
  - 7. Keep off closed trails and out of closed areas.
  - 8. Prior to using any lift, you must have the knowledge and ability to load, ride and unload safely.
