



Kelsey Beal receives 4-H Gold Star Award

At the annual Ochiltree County 4-H Awards Banquet, Kelsey Beal was presented with the 4-H Gold Star Award. The presentation was made by Ochiltree County Judge Earl McKinley.

“The Gold Star Award is the highest county award that can be given to a 4-H member,” Judge McKinley said. “The criteria is set by the Texas 4-H program. To be eligible the recipient must be a 4-H member for at least three years, must have participated in three or more project areas, be 15 years of age or older and turn in a complete record book.”

“Recipients receive a plaque from the county, a pin and a certificate from the state which will be awarded at the District Gold Star Banquet this year to be held on Oct. 21 in Canyon,” he added.

Beal has been a member of 4-H for nine years, following a family tradition with an older brother and older sister who were 4-H members.

She has participated in a variety of projects: consumer decision making, photography, foods and nutrition,

dog, livestock judging and the Beef Quiz Bowl.

Her favorite is the sheep project. She has fed and shown lambs every year she has been a member.

In addition to showing at the county show, she has shown at area jackpots, the Tri-State Fair, the State Fair of Texas and the San Antonio Livestock Show.

Beal takes great pride in taking care of her lambs each day and also enjoys teaching other 4-H members how to care for and show lambs.

“She has demonstrated her leadership skills by being a club officer, a county ambassador officer and now most recently a district 4-H officer,” Judge McKinley said. “She is a great example for the other members to follow. She is an excellent student at Perryton High School and is a member of FFA, National Honor Society and plays softball.”

“She is also a member of the First United Methodist Church,” he added. “Her future goals are to attend college and study agriculture.”

Also at the banquet, the Outstanding Leader Awards

for 2013-14 were presented to John Lilly and Lenna Lear.

The Friends of 4-H Awards were presented to Barbara Bolerjack and Bartlett’s Lumber and Hardware. Assistant manager Chris Adams accepted the award for Bartlett’s.

The Junior and Senior Leadership Awards, sponsored by North Plains Electric Cooperative, were presented at the banquet. The Senior Leadership Award was presented to Kelsey Beal and the Junior Leadership Award was presented to Isaiah Tanner.

The High Point Awards were also presented.

The High Point Senior Boy and Girl were Zane McCall and Jamie Lear. The High Point Intermediate Boy and Girl were Isaiah Tanner and Alexa Wilson. The High Point Junior Boy and Girl were Austin Merrick and Chloe Tanner.

Hangar issue draws crowd to commissioners court

The Ochiltree County Commissioners’ Court met with a packed house at their regular meeting on Monday, Oct. 14 at the courthouse.

Some 40 citizens, including county and city officials, were in attendance to take part in a discussion about the revision of lease contract agreements for the airport

hangars.

Commissioner Doug Barnes said that he felt several hangars were not in compliance with the lease contracts, which states that the hangar was erected for use for aviation purposes.

Barnes said that several pilots would like to hangar there, but they are all taken

up; some by planes, but some are taken up by RVs, cars, trucks, and used as general storage. He felt the county should be compensated for that, in an equitable amount, closer to what would be paid at a typical storage facility. Copies of a sample new contract were distributed.

Some discussion was had among those present. Several had concerns about their usage of the hangars, and how they felt about whether or not they could be used for anything other than a plane.

Commissioner Richard Burger brought up the possibility of grandfathering the current leases in the event any action was taken, and said, “I have a real problem telling people what to do with their own building.”

After a short recess, the discussion continued. David Landis spoke about his joint-ownership of a hangar at the airport, that throughout the year has been rented out overnight for aviation use, and many different airplanes have been housed there over the years; but the majority of the time it would be considered non-compliant in

regards to the contract.

Landis asked how often it would need to be used to house an aircraft to be considered in compliance, and Barnes said he hadn’t gotten that far into the issue at this point.

Doug Hale spoke up next, saying that he agreed that the lease contract needed some work, but didn’t think it was worthy of tripling the rent or moving to evict those using the hangar for storage. The new contract calls for a \$150 semi-annually payment in contrast to the \$100 yearly being currently paid under most leases.

County Judge Earl McKinley said that he doesn’t favor penalizing people that the county has allowed to do this, and that he personally had a hard time suddenly changing all these rules.

The creation of an airport

committee was discussed. Commissioner Burger said that one advantage of creating an airport board to make recommendations to the county would be the knowledge and experience they would have with the aviation industry.

Pshigoda mentioned he felt changes needed to be made to the existing contract, and nothing is said as to what can be stored out there. His suggestion would be to leave it alone, add some rent to it, and let everything else go.

After more discussion, the court tabled the issue and will put it on the next agenda to form a committee for the airport.

Also during the meeting, the commissioners held a public hearing to consider the application by Palo Duro (See County, Page 10)

On Tuesday, November 5, Texans will go to the polls to decide the fate of nine amendments to the Texas Constitution. Early voting begins on Monday, October 21 and continues through Friday, November 1, at the county clerk's office.

The current Texas Constitution was written in 1876 and is the seventh Constitution in Texas history. The other six were the Constitution of Coahuila y Tejas, the 1836 Constitution of the Republic of Texas and the state Constitutions of 1845, 1861, 1866, and 1869.

The current Constitution is among the longest of state constitutions in the United States. Since its initial adoption, as of November 2011 a total of 653 amendments have been proposed, of which 474 were approved by voters and 179 were rejected.

To be placed on the ballot, a proposed amendment must receive a two-thirds vote in both the Texas House of Representatives and the Senate. Unlike other legislation, the signature of the Governor is not required.

Texas Constitution states that the State of Texas has only those powers explicitly granted to it.

Over the past few weeks, the Herald has offered an analysis of each amendment and given voting recommendations. Below is a summary of those recommendations.

Yes **No** **Amendment 1** — “The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services of the United States who is killed in action.”

Yes **No** **Amendment 2** — “The constitutional amendment eliminating an obsolete requirement for a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of which is operational.”

Yes **No** **Amendment 3** — “The constitutional amendment to authorize a political subdivision of this state to extend the number of days that aircraft parts that are exempt from ad valorem taxation due to their location in this state for a temporary period may be located in this state for purposes of qualifying for the tax exemption.”

Yes **No** **Amendment 4** — “The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization.”

Yes **No** **Amendment 5** — “The constitutional amendment to authorize the making of a reverse mortgage loan for the purchase of homestead property and to amend lender disclosures and other requirements in connection with a reverse mortgage loan.”

Yes **No** **Amendment 6** — “The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the State Water Implementation Fund for Texas and the State Water Implementation Revenue Fund for Texas to assist in the financing of priority projects in the state water plan to ensure the availability of adequate water resources.”

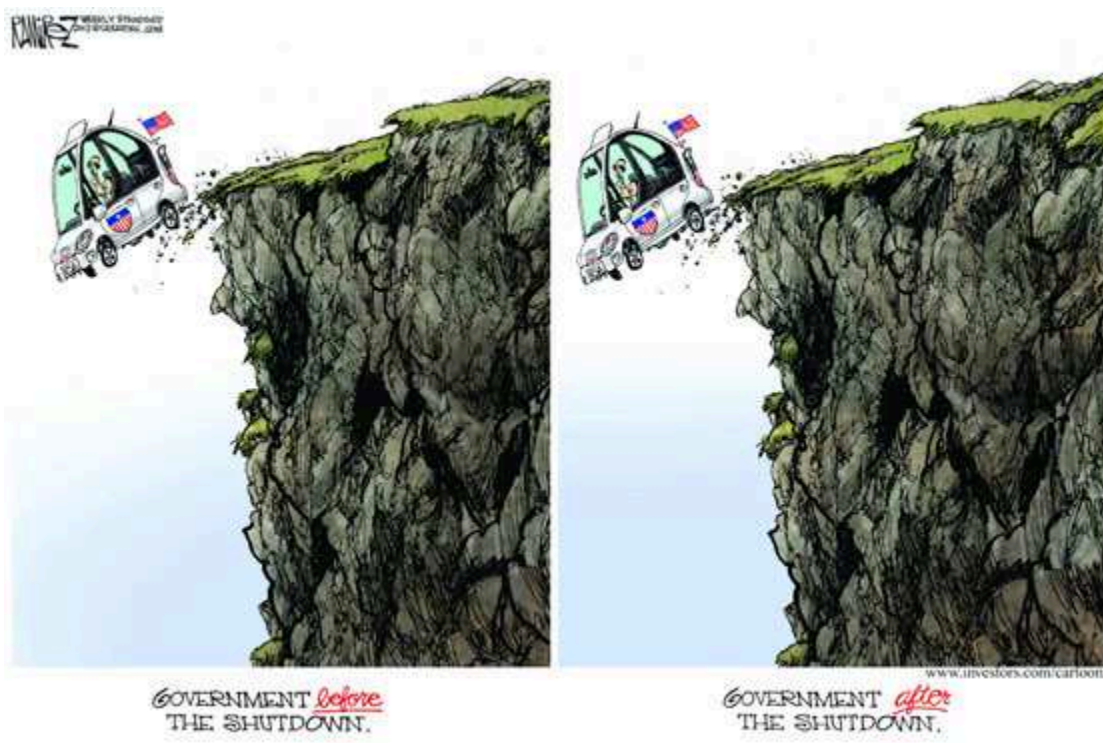
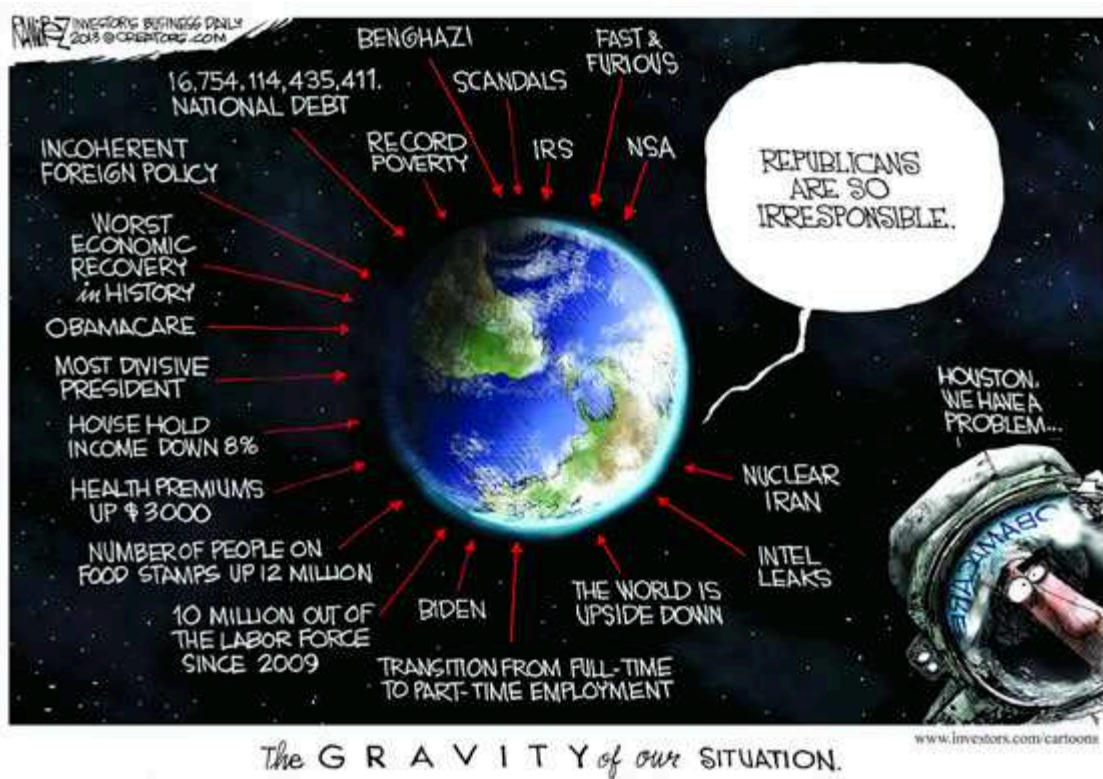
Yes **No** **Amendment 7** — “The constitutional amendment authorizing a home-rule municipality to provide in its charter the procedure to fill a vacancy on its governing body for which the unexpired term is 12 months or less.”

Yes **No** **Amendment 8** — “The constitutional amendment repealing Section 7, Article IX, Texas Constitution, which relates to the creation of a hospital district in Hidalgo County.”

Yes **No** **Amendment 9** — “The constitutional amendment relating to expanding the types of sanctions that may be assessed against a judge or justice following a formal proceeding instituted by the State Commission on Judicial Conduct.”

Remember, an informed voter is a dangerous voter. Be informed before you cast your ballot in the November 5 Amendment Election, either on Election Day or during the Early Voting period in the County Clerk's office on the Second Floor of the Courthouse.

Also, the courts have ruled that you can bring this guide to the polls with you to help cast your ballot.

Amendment 6

If Ochiltree County voters go to the polls November 5, there is no better reason than to vote for Amendment 6. That is the amendment that creates the State Water Implementation Fund.

It takes \$2 billion from the state “rainy day” fund and puts it in a special fund to pay for water projects across the state. The fund would be self-supporting with repayments to the fund financing other water needs.

With the fund in place, maybe the down state politicians will take their eyes off our water in the Panhandle.

I know it is good campaign politics, but it sticks in my craw every time that a candidate says he will “use our water.” The plan truth is that it is not “our water.” Under the Rule of Capture, the water that is underneath the land belongs to the landowner, not every citizen of the Panhandle.

Those rules were defined in a court case in 1904 between a landowner and a railroad. The Texas Supreme Court ruled that the owner of a piece of property has the right to everything that is underneath that piece of property to the center of the Earth.

The rule is the basis for oil and gas leases, coal mining leases and other mineral rights. It also includes water.

Those water rights can be sold. The City of Amarillo has purchased the water rights on 72,000 acres in Roberts County.

Also Amarillo gets a portion of its water from the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority (CRMWA). CRMWA holds the water rights to 60,000 acres of land in Roberts County.

One of the most uninformed statements that has been was that water should not be exported outside the Panhandle. I take that to

outside the 26 counties that make up the top of Texas.

I would like to inform you that water has been “exported” outside the Panhandle since 1971. A string of cities outside Amarillo — Plainview, Lubbock, Brownfield and Lamesa—receive water from the CRMWA pipeline. None of those cities are in the Panhandle.

Another fact is that municipal water use is a very small percentage of all the water used in the Panhandle. In the latest water plan, it accounts for only seven percent of the water used each year in the 26 county Panhandle area.

Animal production operations, including feedlots, pork production and wind-

mills filling stock tanks, uses only three percent of the water each year. The entire Texas Farm pork production complex only uses as much water as an irrigated section of corn each year.

That is where 90 percent of the water in the Panhandle is consumed each growing season — irrigation. The water is used to grow corn, some wheat and milo, cotton and soybeans. Once those crops are harvested they do not stay in the Panhandle. They are either consumed by cattle or pigs or shipped to market. Once the pigs or cattle are grown, they too are shipped to slaughter.

In a sense, the water of the Panhandle is exported all over the world.

What bothers me is the recent trend in the Texas Legislature. When the Legislature meets in January of 2015, over two-thirds of the members of the House of Representatives will come from only ten counties in Texas.

Will those ten counties start looking at “our” water as “their” water? Amendment 6 is needed to keep that from happening.

Capitol Highlights

Court rejects case against election law

AUSTIN — A three-judge panel of the U.S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals on Oct. 3 rejected a case challenging the constitutionality of a 2011 Texas election law regulating deputy voter registrars.

In a 2-1 ruling, the majority of the panel said the plaintiffs Voting for America Inc., Brad Richey, Penelope McFadden and Project Vote Inc. “have not made a clear showing” that certain provisions of the law violate their First Amendment rights or are preempted by the federal Voting Rights Act.

Plaintiffs challenged these five points in the state election law:

- (1) Prohibition of non-state residents from serving as volunteer deputy registrars;
- (2) Prohibition of a volunteer deputy registrar from serving as such in more than one county;
- (3) A compensation provision;
- (4) Prohibition from photocopying or scanning voter registration applications submitted to a deputy voter registrar but not yet delivered to the county registrar; and
- (5) Prohibition of voter deputy registrars from sending completed voter registration applications via U.S. mail.

The appellate court’s ruling reversed a lower court ruling and ordered that the case be sent back to the district court level for further proceedings. Fifth Circuit Judge W. Eugene Davis dissented.

TXDOT plans to name names
The Texas Department of Transportation on Oct. 2 announced it is notifying the top toll violators and giving them a deadline to pay their overdue tolls or be included on a list the agency will publish in the next two weeks.

Authority to report the names of violators publicly and other powers were provided by Senate Bill 1792 passed in the recent legislative session, TXDOT said, adding that drivers owe more than \$27 million in unpaid tolls—money that will be used to pay debt and fund operations on these roads.

“Everyone using our state’s toll roads is responsible for paying to use them. Chronic violators are ultimately taking from the majority of motorists who do things right and pay their tolls,” said Sen. Kirk Watson, D-Austin, the author of SB 1792. “The bipartisan support for SB 1792 reflects how strongly the legislature feels about going after toll road abusers who are looking for a free ride.”

Cuckoo protection is proposed
The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service on Oct. 2 announced its intention to propose to add the yellow-billed cuckoo to a list of protected animals under the Endangered Species Act of 1973.

Preferred habitat of the yellow-billed cuckoo, according to Texas Parks & Wildlife, includes open woodlands with dense undergrowth, overgrown orchards and pastures, moist thickets and willow groves along stream banks.

PHS & Junior High Cross Country

The PHS and PJH cross country teams competed in the Palo Duro Lake Cross Country Invitational at Spearman Oct. 12.

The PHS varsity girls placed second with 60 points, and the varsity boys were third in the event with 49 points.

17:27.66; Alexis Price, 79th, 17:31.06; Caleigh Johnston, 81st, 17:36.66; Paola Torres, 92nd, 18:25.72; Kate Ramirez, 95th, 18:39.44; Yamilet Calleros, 97th, 18:47.78; and Abbigayle Harris, 98th, 19:03.38.

"You might be surprised to know that frozen or canned options are just as nutritious as or sometimes even more nutritious than fresh fruits and vegetables," said Molly Gee, a registered dietitian at BCM.

Companies that make frozen or canned fruits and vegetables must pack the items at their peak, said Gee. While some vitamins and minerals are lost in the fresh foods due to the time it takes to get them from the field to the plate, these vitamins and minerals are present in the canned or frozen versions.

However, she warns that it's still important to read the labels on canned or frozen items to be sure that they are preserved in their own natu-

ral juices and that no sugar is added.

Frozen meals can also be a good option for saving some money and maintaining a healthy weight, said Gee, but make sure only 30 percent of the calories are from fat and consider low-sodium options.

Plant After Last Frost

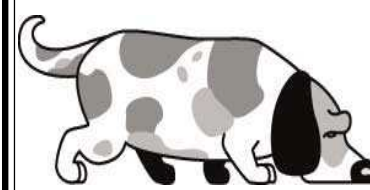
—approved a request by Sheriff Terry Bouchard to extend the maximum vacation days for deputies;
