

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


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

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Amendment Recap

On Tuesday, November 5, Texans will go to the polls to decide the fate of nine amendments to the Texas Constitution. Early voting begins on Monday, October 21 and continues through Friday, November 1, at the county clerk's office.

The current Texas Constitution was written in 1876 and is the seventh Constitution in Texas history. The other six were the Constitution of Coahuila y Tejas, the 1836 Constitution of the Republic of Texas and the state Constitutions of 1845, 1861, 1866, and 1869.

The current Constitution is among the longest of state constitutions in the United States. Since its initial adoption, as of November 2011 a total of 653 amendments have been proposed, of which 474 were approved by voters and 179 were rejected.

To be place on the ballot, a proposed amendment must receive a two-thirds vote in both the Texas House of Representatives and the Senate. Unlike other legislation, the signature of the Governor is not required.

Texas Constitution states that the State of Texas has only those powers explicitly granted to it.

Over the past few weeks, the Herald has offered an analysis of each amendment and given voting recommendations. Below is a summary of those recommendations.

I Yes □ No Amendment 1 — "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services of the United States who is killed in action."

If Yes □ No Amendment 2 — "The constitutional" amendment eliminating an obsolete requirement for a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of which is operational."

TYes □ No Amendment 3 — "The constitutional amendment to authorize a political subdivision of this state to extend the number of days that aircraft parts that are exempt from ad valorem taxation due to their location in this state for a temporary period may be located in this state for purposes of qualifying for the tax exemption."

▼Yes □ No Amendment 4 — "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization."

☑ Yes □ No Amendment 5 — "The constitutional amendment to authorize the making of a reverse mortgage loan for the purchase of homestead property and to amend lender disclosures and other requirements in connection with a reverse mortgage

▼Yes □ No Amendment 6 — "The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the State Water Implementation Fund for Texas and the State Water Implementation Revenue Fund for Texas to assist in the financing of priority projects in the state water plan to ensure the availability of adequate water resources."

Yes □ No Amendment 7 — "The constitutional amendment authorizing a home-rule municipality to provide in its charter the procedure to fill a vacancy on its governing body for which the unexpired term is 12 months or less.

Yes □ No Amendment 8 — "The constitutional amendment repealing Section 7, Article IX, Texas Constitution, which relates to the creation of a hospital district in Hidalgo County."

∀Yes □ **No Amendment 9** — "The constitutional" amendment relating to expanding the types of sanctions that may be assessed against a judge or justice following a formal proceeding instituted by the State Commission on Judicial Conduct."

Remember, an uniformed voter is a dangerous voter. Be informed before you cast your ballot in the November 5 Amendment Election, either on Election Day or during the Early Voting period in the County Clerk's office on the Second Floor of the Courthouse.

Also, the courts have ruled that you can bring this guide to the polls with you to help cast your ballot.

Court rejects case against election law

AUSTIN — A three-judge panel of the U.S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals on Oct. 3 rejected a case challenging the constitutionality of a 2011 Texas election law regulating deputy voter registrars.

In a 2-1 ruling, the majority of the panel said the plaintiffs Voting for America Inc., Brad Richey, Penelope McFadden and Project Vote Inc. "have not made a clear showing" that certain provisions of the law violate their First Amendment rights or are preempted by the federal Voting Rights Act.

Plaintiffs challenged these five points in the state elec-

(1) Prohibition of nonstate residents from serving as volunteer deputy registrars;

(2) Prohibition of a volunteer deputy registrar from serving as such in more than one county;

(3) A compensation provision;

(4) Prohibition from photocopying or scanning voter registration applications submitted to a deputy voter registrar but not yet delivered to the county registrar; and

(5) Prohibition of voter deputy registrars from sending completed voter registration applications via U.S.

The appellate court's ruling reversed a lower court ruling and ordered that the case be sent back to the district court level for further proceedings. Fifth Circuit Judge W. Eugene Davis dis-
