AP Literature Summer Assignment

The Summer Reading is essentially the first chapter of *Literature & Composition*; students do not need to purchase this book as it will be our course book for AP Literature 2014-15. This chapter contains fundamental guidelines on how to read and think critically about literature, as well as numerous examples of literary texts which are analyzed in the way students are expected to. The Summer Reading is therefore crucial preparation for the AP Literature course and must be taken very seriously.

Breakdown of tasks:

- 1. Read pages 1-2 and make notes as you do so. Your notes should condense/paraphrase/explain (i.e. they should be in your own words as far as possible) points made in the original text, and should result in a collection of phrases, key-words, and short sentences which will enable you to reconstruct the mail arguments and explanations in the original. (Imagine you are teaching someone the content of the original: your notes should be your `lesson plan`.)
- 2. Read the poems on pages 2-4 and do the Activity on page 2. This should result in a brief essay of threequarters of a page to one page.
- 3. Read and make notes on :Why Study Literature?, pages 4-7, up to `ù join the conversation_. Then complete the Activity on page 7. This should result in as essay of one page.
- 4. Omit the text beginning `Discussing a work of literatureu _ (page 7); also omit the Activity on page 8.
- 5. Read and make notes on 'what Makes an Effective Reader_, pages 8-11, and complete the Activities, pages 9-10 (3/4 to 1 page) and on pages 11-12 (3/4 page).
- 6. Read and make notes on :Experience_, `Analysis_, and `Extension_, (pages 13-16), then complete the Activity, pages 16-17 (essay of one page).
