



LITURGY CORNER

22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Nothing that enters one from outside can defile that person; but the things that come out from within are what defile." In the days of Jesus, this issue was about performing empty external rituals of cleanliness instead of purifying the heart. For most of us, the issue is probably a bit different. Our fixation on externals is not so much with religious prescriptions and practices; instead, our daily obsession tends to be with appearances in general. In our media-saturated culture, we are extremely tuned

in to how things look. We are trained to respond to current fashion trends in clothing, hair, makeup, and accessories. Even bodies, cars, houses, and landscaping all fall into the realm of highly marketed images. The risk for us is to be so concerned with having the right "look" on the outside that we fail to consider what's happening on the inside.

Life is about more than what we have or what we parade around for others to see. As human beings we are a unity of body and soul, and if we neglect our souls, then we are neglecting the fulfillment of our human nature. We need to make sure we are not like the Pharisees in today's reading who were too concerned with outside appearances. Jesus tells us in response to them that "from within people, from their hearts, come evil thoughts, unchastity, theft, murder, adultery, greed, malice, deceit, licentiousness, envy, blasphemy, arrogance, folly. All these evils come from within and they defile." This list makes a good starting point for some personal meditation on our interior life. Let's ask ourselves, "Which of the behaviors on this list threaten to defile my soul?" Then, let's ask the Holy Spirit to help purify us of that spiritual ugliness so we can appear beautiful in the sight of God.

Over the past 15 years, our young Church has come to a better understanding of God's word in the Sunday scriptures through Children's Liturgy of the Word. Our plea this year for volunteer ministers needed to continue this ministry yielded no new leaders. This, like all ministries, is truly a response to God's call from those willing to give back to God


what has so generously been given them. We do have regular helpers to sit with the children and encourage their participation. Teens, siblings, parents, grandparents...we are grateful for your dedication. Yet, we are critically short of volunteers who feel confident to lead CLOW. It is not as daunting as it may seem. With enough help, leaders would be responsible for CLOW about once every 5 weeks. Scheduling is flexible to your availability.

The team gathers about every 6 weeks to offer ideas for a reflection on the Sunday readings and raise questions that will help the children open up and hear what God is saying to them. No one is alone in leading the children's prayer. Anyone can be trained by attending a simple workshop. It is rewarding, enjoyable, and an opportunity to be connected to a small community.

As mentioned in previous articles, the current leader core ministers are women who have been serving for more than 10 or 12 years. They began when their children were young, now many are college graduates. In a Parish the size of St. Hubert, it seems there would be at least 2-3 parents, grandparents, women, men...anyone who values this ministry provided for our children, who are growing in their understanding of the Mass and scriptures that would be able to lead. Without more parishioners taking on the role of leader of Children's Liturgy, this ministry will be inactive at the beginning of fall. We are eager to continue without delay. So please, if you can give 20 minutes occasionally when you come to 9:00 AM Mass and you feel you'd like to begin as a helper, please contact Maria Deelsnyder, mdeelsnyder@comcast.net or Yvonne Cassa, y.cassa@sainthubert.org.



ANOINTING OF THE SICK AT MASS

The Anointing of the Sick will be celebrated at our next regular weekend liturgy, Sunday September 13th at the 7:30 AM Mass. One of the Church's most beautiful and consoling rituals, this sacrament keeps the Church's promise: "We will not abandon you" in your sickness, suffering, weakness, or struggle.

Please join us! Whether you want to receive the sacrament yourself or pray with and for those who are receiving it, we invite your participation in these liturgies.

Those desiring to receive the sacrament are asked to follow these steps:

- Sign in at a table in the Narthex of the church and receive a name badge. Wear it plainly visible so the priest can call you by name.
- Sit near the end of a row so that the priest can reach you easily. You need not stand during the whole anointing ritual; if you are able, rise when the priest is about two people away from you. If not, have your companion stand.
- If you are with a family member, friend, or caregiver, that person should sit with you and place a hand on your shoulder as a sign of support while you are being anointed.
- One of St. Hubert's Ministers of Care will also stand with you as a sign of community support.

Saturday September 5 Colossians1:21-23 Ps 54:3-4,6,8 Luke 6:1-5 In the Gospel reading, Jesus chastises the Pharisees for honoring God only with their lips, not their hearts; love was missing when they judged that Jesus and his disciples sinned by disobeying a Jew-

ish rule about cleanliness.

The rule was more important to them then the person. They had the self-righteous attitude of: "I know better than you, and I am better than you, proven by the fact that I obey the laws that you're breaking."

Obedience, when motivated by a self-righteous adherence to rules, is hypocrisy. It uses the law to feel superior to others. A modern example might be when someone tells a priest that he is sinning because he isn't adhering exactly to the norms for Mass as prescribed in the General Instruction of the

Roman Missal. If he or she doesn't stop to understand why the priest believes the adaptations are allowable and pastoral, who really is the sinner?

When this happens, "in vain do they worship me," Jesus says. The meaning of the Mass has been lost.

There is a hierarchy of rules and laws. Some rules change with the needs of the times. Of greatest importance are the Commandments of God, the Moral Laws, which never change.

It is right to speak up when we witness disobedience, and we should

> do it, but only because we care about the sinner's spiritual growth and only when we can handle it without ignoring the reasons behind the disobedience. We are most successful in guiding others into

greater holiness when we take the time to first understand the roots of their disobedience and then address those concerns with love.

This is how we become, as the second reading says, "doers of the word and not hearers only", because, as James adds, "pure" religion is caring for others. The Pharisees in the Gospel story didn't care about the hunger of the disciples.

Reflect & Discuss:

- 1. How do you know when you're being hypocritical in your faith?
- 2. How do you handle the discovery that you've done something uncaring?
- 3. Give an example of a Moral Law and an example of a regulation that was instituted by the Church to address a specific need for a specific time. How do they differ in importance?
- Name one of the 10 Commandments or a teaching of the Church and explain how it became an opportunity for you to become more like Christ.

Following Jesus—Be Ready for Some Surprises

Following Jesus is not without its surprises. It's best to be forewarned. Here's fair warning:

Soren Kierkegaard once said that what Jesus wants is followers not admirers. He's right. To admire Jesus without trying to change our lives does nothing for Jesus or for us. Yet how exactly does one follow Jesus? Classically we have said that we do this by trying to imitate him. But that posits a further question: How do we imitate Jesus?

A negative example might be useful here: Many of us remember the "Jesus people" of the late 1960s, with their rather raw, literal approach to following Jesus. They tried to look like he looked. They put on flowing white robes, grew beards, walked bare-foot, and tried, in appearance and dress, to imitate the Jesus that centuries of Western artists painted for us. Obviously this is not what discipleship means, not only because we don't know what Jesus looked like (although we do know that he was not the fair-skinned, fair-haired young man of Western art), but, more importantly, because attempts to mimic Jesus' physical appearance miss the point of discipleship entirely.

More subtle is the attempt to imitate Jesus by trying to copy his actions. The algebra here works this way: Jesus did certain things, so we should do them too. He taught, healed, consoled the downtrodden, went off into the desert by himself, stayed up all night occasionally and prayed, and visited the homes of sinners. So we should do the same things: We should become teachers, nurses, preachers, counselors, monks, social workers, and non-judgmental friends to the less-than-pious. In this view, imitation is carrying on the actions of Jesus.

This kind of imitation, however valuable as ministry, still is not quite what is required in terms of real discipleship. In the end, it too misses the point because one can be preacher of the gospel and not really be imitating Jesus, just as one can be a truck driver (not something Jesus did) and be imitating him. True imitation is not a question of trying to look like Jesus, nor of trying to duplicate his actions. What is it?

Perhaps one of the better answers to that question is given by John of the Cross, the great Spanish mystic. In his view, we imitate Jesus when we try to imitate his motivation, when we try to do things for the same reason he did. For him, that is how one "puts on Christ". We enter real discipleship when, like Jesus, we have as our motivation the desire ("proper regnum Dei") to draw all things into one – into one unity of heart, one family of love.

John of the Cross then offers some advice regarding how this can be done. We should begin, he says, by reading the scriptures and meditating the life on Jesus. Then we should pray to Christ and ask him to instill in us his desire, longing, and motivation. In essence, we should pray to Jesus and ask him to make us feel the way he felt while he was on earth.

Some surprises await us however, he points out, if we do this. Initially, when we first begin seriously to pray for this, we will fill with fervor, good feelings, a passion for goodness, and a warm sense of God's presence. We will feel that we feel like Jesus – and that will be a very good feeling indeed. However, if we persevere in our prayer and desire to imitate him, things will eventually change, and in a way that we least expect. The warm feelings, fervor, and passion – that snug feeling that we feel like Jesus – will disappear and be replaced by something infinitely less pleasant. We will begin to feel sterile, dispassionate, dry. God's presence will feel neither warm nor steady and we will be left wondering: "What's wrong? How did I lose the way?"

However, as John of the Cross assures us, nothing is wrong. Rather our prayer has been answered. We prayed to Jesus, asking him to let us feel like he felt, and he granted our request. Exactly. For a large part of his life and ministry Jesus felt exactly as we are now feeling – dry, sterile, and not buoyed up by any warm feelings of God, even as he remained faithful in that darkness. Strange how it can feel, feeling like Jesus.

There's a fervor that comes from the wetness of fertility that can make the soul swell with feelings of creativity, warmth, and immortality. God is in that. But there is also an aridity the comes from a deeper place, a heat that threatens to dry out the very marrow of the soul, a dryness that shrinks all swelling, especially pride, and leaves us vulnerable and mortal by bringing the soul to kindling temperature. God is in that dryness no less than in the wetness of fertility because in that painful longing we feel the eros of God and the motivation of Christ.

WOMEN AT THE WELL™ September 15th at 7:00—9:00 PM ST. TERESA OF AVILA 1515-1582

Presented by Marcia Whitney-Schenck

Marcia Whitney-Schenck is a Chicago-based writer, artist, and performer, who is interested in interpreting the lives of women of faith in a dynamic way for contemporary audiences. By using visual arts, photographs,

music, dance, and monologue, she interprets the lives of saints. In the character of St. Teresa, she will be asked about her spiritual thoughts and vocation. St. Teresa's thoughts about prayer will deepen and enhance your own spiritual journey.

St. Teresa of Avila, 1515-1582, born 500 years ago, was a prominent Spanish mystic, Carmelite nun, and theologian of contemplative prayer. She was a reformer of the Carmelite Order. Forty years after her death, she was canonized in 1622; and named Doctor of the Church in 1970, only one of five women so honored.




