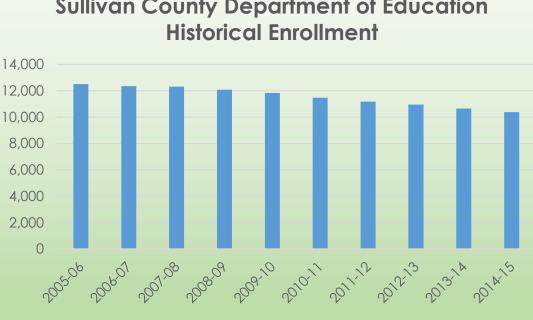

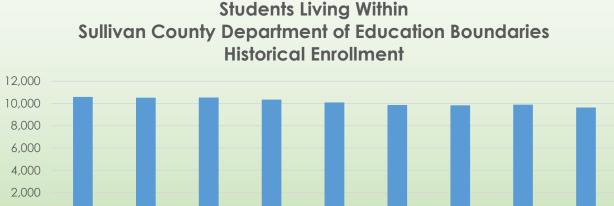

- <u>Middle Schools</u> Facility conditions range from good to poor. Average age of schools is 70 years. Disconnected buildings, life safety and ADA issues, coupled with accumulated 'wear and tear' are concerning key issues.

<u>High Schools</u> – High School facilities are in good condition with infrastructure needing improvements.
