They spoke with each child and presented a bag of gifts, as well as a hand-made candy cane reindeer made by members of the Grafton Leo Club. About 450 gifts were provided; our Club partnered with Jerry Bosserman, Grafton Leo Club, John H. The first trip was to the James Plantations; we had 40 on the bus and 5 other people met us at the Plantations. This first effort only brought in \$350 profit but we anticipated a better response in the future. SIGHT SERVICES: Our volunteers weekly work in the eyeglass recycling center. COMMUNITY SERVICES: Volunteers worked at Bridges and at the Wilderness Pantry this month. OTHER: 115 members. We took in four new members and had one resignation.

(December) PROGRAMS: Our program this month featured "Current Trends in Antiques" by a noted appraiser and owner of a long time Fredericksburg antique store. FUND RAISERS: We participated in the LOW Christkindlemart. We conducted a flea market and a Bake Sale. We also sold White House Christmas ornaments. SIGHT SERVICES: Lionesses continued to volunteer weekly at the eyeglass recycling center. YOUTH SERVICES: We wrapped over 100 presents for the youngsters at Child Help, a residential treatment program. We

collected donations for the children of SafeHouse. **COMMUNITY SERVICES**: Volunteers continue to work 3 days a week, every week, distributing food, stocking food, and delivering food to the elderly and those who are ill, for the Wilderness Pantry. Club members volunteered at Bridges a community program for persons with intellectual disabilities. **OTHER**: Membership is 114 - we had one resignation this month

(January) PROGRAMS: No meeting scheduled for the month of January. FUND RAISERS: No fund raisers are scheduled for January. SIGHT SERVICES: Club members continue to volunteer at the recycling center. OTHER: Membership is 114.

YOUTH SERVICES: Several Club members read for Project Read at McGaheysville Elem.; this program is for at risk children in 1st-2nd grade when they are read stories on Wed. mornings. COMMUNITY SERVICES: We rang bells for Salvation Army (see Fund Raisers above.) We also purchased the food for our Christmas in January project; we will provide boxes of food to 2 local Food Pantries in January, and hand them out with the aid of E. Rockingham H.S. students (help with the physical labor) which is so appreciated. OTHER Average Monthly Attendance:

MIDDLETOWN CHILDRENS FIRST (068683) (December) - YOUTH SERVICES: We had 6 children and their parents attend our December "Little Lions" session. After our regular work session with the children, Santa visited and gave the children gifts. OTHER: Average Monthly Attendance: 70.

ENVIRONMENT: Our Club donated \$200 to the Ride with Pride program, which helps disabled Veterans, the emotionally handicapped and those suffering bouts of depression. This gift went to the Thoroughbred Level. **COMMUNITY SERVICES**: Our Club also rang the bell for the Salvation Army Kettle on Dec.13, 2014; a total of 11 Lions and 1 friend participated. Each group worked for 2 hours. An enjoyable day, INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS: The Club sent a \$500 check to LCIF. **HEALTH SERVICES**: Staunton Lions donated \$200 to Ride with Pride to help injured veterans and individuals who enroll in the program for the disabled, emotionally handicapped and depressed. No doubt your club is preparing to elect its new officers soon. The 2015-16 club officers have to be reported on the dreaded PU-101 form by April 15. Secretaries: remember to update your meeting dates and places at the same time, please. That's where we get the information for our District Directory and for LCI's records.

Once again, the District will provide Incoming Officers Schools for President, Secretary, and Treasurer. Although arrangements are not quite complete, they will be held on Saturday mornings in late April and early May. Check next month's *Bark* for full details.

Next up, following club elections, installations, etc., is our State Convention. The dates are Friday, May 15 through Sunday, May 17, at the Sheraton Premiere at Tysons Corners (same place as last year). There will be more Incoming Officers Schools, Seminars, General Sessions, and lots of opportunities to learn what other clubs are doing for fund raising, projects, etc. And then on Sunday morning, we'll have our District meeting and the final General Session. On the ballot Sunday will be a proposal to split the State Secretary/Treasurer into two separate jobs, with the State Treasurer's position being a volunteer position. The rationale is to save money and avoid dipping into Reserve Funds to pay salaries, and to avoid a dues increase.

While you've got your calendar out, please note that District 24-C's Fall Conference will be at the Holiday Inn in Staunton on Friday, September 11 and Saturday, September 12, 1915. I look forward to seeing you at one, or both, of these events.

Retention - Follow up!

As I sat down to jot down a few thoughts for the February BARK, I took a quick look at the membership numbers reported on the LCI website. Almost overnight, we went from -3 to -14. Digging deeper, I see that many clubs documented the reason for leaving as "Resigned in good standing". This is a good time to talk to those members who resigned, or did not pay their dues to find out why they left. During PDG Marty Stoll's term as DG, he had a constant plea to "close the back door". That message is still applicable today. Over the past 7 months we lost more members than we brought into our Clubs. PDG Marty, along with all of the PDGs since have encouraged us to look at the reasons why Lions who enthusiastically joined to serve have suddenly decided to leave Lionism. Over the past two months I noted that 13 "resignations" had an average of 13 years of service or a combined 274 years have resigned. Why? Do you know? While you are busy recruiting, are you overlooking the internal health of your club? Each club should take a look at the exit interview process developed by LCI.

(http://www.lionsclubs.org/EN/common/pdfs/former member satisfaction survey.pdf). Review it, modify it to fit your needs and use it! LCI and IP Joe Preston have introduced the Keep 1 initiative - stressing the importance of keeping each one of your members actively involved! You may think you know why they left, but perhaps there is some underlying reason that your club could address that might result in better retention.
