It is May and we have a WHOLE month of Easter! But I am still in Lent. In a way. I continue to inwardly digest the stories of life and faith offered during Lent Wednesday night evening prayer. They have left a mark on me.

There was Karin: speaking of the time when she was full of life, a fresh college graduate, vibrantly eager to make a difference in the world. Sent for service to Argentina, she was surrounded by people steeped in poverty; an observer of brutal abuse; a recipient of news that her friend (in Minnesota) had been murdered. Darkness and despair lingered. Her hopes were dashed. Where was God? That life chapter represents, for her, a change in season. And here she is among us now: a leader bearing both wounds and Christ's light.

There was Bob: positively influenced by the generosity of others throughout his life, and knowing himself to fall short of sharing this gift with others. There was Bob -testifying with honesty to the challenges in life that have interfered with his ability to change a habit. Why not foster greater generosity? Bob asked us, as a prophet would,. It is ours- a gift of the Holy Spirit. Indeed, why not?

Sally next: newly retired and new (again) to the grief over the death of a beloved parent. There was Sally, offering to us the truth about what it means to dislike a student and yet love them - pointing to the active movement of God's Spirit who makes such love possible - offering testimony to how God's work in her changed the way she thought about and interacted with this student. A change of circumstance, even when unwelcomed, so often carries in it God's grace.

What does it look like when one experiences a change of heart? Ask Mark. He'll tell you. He'll relay the deep wound of losing a father killed while serving in Vietnam. He'll speak about years of resentment that God's forgiving power - over time - crumbled. A change of heart can be both painful and freeing. It is very often on-going work.

Sometimes we *change our plans* because we have to, not because we choose to. Sometimes a dream dies so that a new one can be birthed. Erica shared with us what this has looked like in her life - when fear, financial woes, and bare tires propelled her across the country to safety, new fears, and greater financial woes. "God changes our plans and replaces them with a love broader and deeper than we could imagine," Erica said. Time and again God used surprising people (like Grace, the Lakota elder) to shine light on God's plan for her life.

I'm still in Lent. In a way. But I'm also in Easter. Each KoG woman and man spoke with courage, faith and conviction in a darkened room, surrounded by scripture spoken, prayed and sung, and within a community of people who bear their own stories of change – with all its' gifts and burdens.

What they revealed to us was Christ: crucified and risen. Finally, these are resurrection stories. The pain, the despair, the sense of not being good enough, the resentment, the fear, the loss, and even death itself – all of it – every last bit – is gathered into the heart of God. This is their witness.

The God of the cross enters our darkness and embraces us with unconditional love. The tree of suffering and shame is also our tree of life – for the God of the cross meets us profoundly in the darkest places and there defeats any power that would keep us from loving God and neighbor.

We are Easter people, you and I: bearers of both wounds and Christ's light; people gifted by the Holy Spirit and who endeavor to be generous with our time, talents and possessions; people who don't like everyone but open ourselves up to God's Spirit of love; people who have experienced both resentment and forgiveness; carriers of lost dreams and recipients of surprising grace. We are, people who courageously and communally move through the ongoing rhythm of death and resurrection, trusting that the future belongs to God.

King of Glory Endowment Fund

Have you considered a gift to the King of Glory Endowment Fund? Gifts to your Mission Endowment Fund may take many forms. The most common gifts are in the form of cash. These donations may be in memory of a loved one as a perpetual memorial, or in honor of an occasion (anniversary, achievement, or other significant event,) or solely to enhance the mission of King of Glory through the Fund.

Other types of gifts are in the form of transfer of securities (stocks, bonds, mutual funds, or similar assets.) You may name the Fund in a will bequest as a beneficiary. Life insurance policies may also be used as a gift by naming the Fund as the beneficiary. Gifting of property (real estate, vehicles, etc.) is another means to contribute to the Fund. In these types of transactions, tax advisors should be used to guide the process.

In any type of contribution to the Fund, the contributor has the knowledge that the impact of the gift will last well into the future. The monetary value is pooled with the other gifts that make up the King of Glory Endowment Fund. Earnings only from this collection of gifts are used. This ensures that the Fund will be a continuing factor in reflection of God's grace.

Harry S. Truman Scholarship Salima Etoka Trinity College

The Harry S. Truman Scholarship is a highly competitive and prestigious federal scholarship granted to U.S. college juniors for demonstrated leadership potential and a commitment to public service. The scholarship is in the amount of \$30,000 toward a graduate education. According to the Washington Post, the Truman Scholarship's "sole aim is to pick out people with potential to become leaders—then provide support to help them realize their aspirations." Congress created the scholarship in 1975 as a living memorial to the 33rd president of the United States. Instead of a statue, the Truman Scholarship is the official federal memorial to its namesake president.


Social Ministry committee members will deliver the items to Redeemer for distribution to low income families.
