Emma and Sophie had some respiratory problems and received care for six days at Dartmouth's Neonatal Intensive Care unit then reunited with their mom and sister at WDH. Becky said, "the nurses and doctors were fantastic ... so pleasant and reassuring."

Joint Replacement Surgery

"There's always a first time for everything," said Pauline Johnson of East Rochester. Although she really wasn't sure what to expect with her hip replacement. She discussed her options with Dr. Moby Parsons of Seacoast Orthopedics & Sports Medicine. He suggested she have surgery at Wentworth-Douglass Hospital where she would benefit from "Joint Camp" a pre- and post-surgery program offered through the Hospital's Joint Replacement Center.

"It was better than what I expected. Like having a first child, you just don't know what will happen. Dr. Parsons was incredible," Pauline said. "I cannot say enough about that man and the Joint Replacement Center was very thorough, really very good."

Walking without a cane or a limp for the first time in a long time, and just weeks after surgery, Pauline attributed her successful recovery to a positive attitude, a personal connection to Jesus, her minister husband of 52 years, three daughters, five grandchildren and two great grandchildren. Pauline explained, "I am a woman of great faith with great support from my family and a really great Doc."

Following his robotic-assisted prostate surgery, Eric Brooker wrote a letter to Gregory Walker, WDH President & CEO. The following is an excerpt:

"From the time Dr. Roger Evans of the Manchester Urology Associates of Dover diagnosed me with prostate cancer, to my follow up with surgeon Dr. Sandy Chin, my experiences with everyone I came in contact with could not have been any better. My original consultation with Dr. Chin for surgery and Dr. James Becht for radiation turned a very scary thing for me into a more controlled and less threatening experience. Their professionalism, cordial demeanor, and just plain 'likability' put me at ease immediately and allowed me to make the decision to undergo surgery a very easy one."

Eric continued, "You and your staff are to be commended for turning a very frightening experience into one that was about as painless and pleasant as one could hope for under the circumstances. My laparoscopic robot-assisted radical prostatectomy was a success. I had little pain after surgery and I've healed well."

Thirty-one years of painful periods ended for Dawn Welch thanks to the precision of a robot in the skilled hands of John Schorge, MD, a Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH) Gynecologist/Oncologist working at Wentworth-Douglass Hospital with local Gynecologists.

Dawn tried drug trials and various medications to get her monthly pain under control and asked her Gynecologist, Teresa Vanderlinde, DO, what else she could do. Dr. Vanderlinde referred her to Dr. Schorge for robotic surgery to relieve Dawn's pain from polycystic ovarian syndrome. "He talked about the robot's precision and explained every step in the process," Dawn remembered. "I was instantly comfortable with him."

Dawn went home the day after her surgery and in just a few weeks after surgery, she said, "I was dancing the Electric Slide at a wedding."

After her recovery, Dawn returned to work as a nurse at Wentworth-Douglass Hospital.

Devin Donnelly Diabetes Patient

Halloween, Valentine's Day, and even birthday parties can be tough times for Devin Donnelly, who was diagnosed with type one diabetes at the age of six. "I can't have candy." Devin, 16, said. "I can have sugar-free candy, and once in a while pizza, but I'm OK with it."

Thanks to help from her caring grandmother, Jeannine Donnelly, and a team of specialists in Diabetes Services and CHaD at WDH's center for pediatric specialty medicine, Devin learned to balance her intake of carbs with protein and eliminated the need for six to eight insulin injections a day by using an insulin pump. Careful control of her blood sugar gives Devin the freedom to enjoy an active life at Noble High School and her favorite sports, basketball and softball.

Hairdresser, mother of three children and grandmother to eight, Linda is now sleeping well and feeling better than ever. Her primary care physician, Shirley Frederick, MD, referred Linda to sleep specialist and neurologist Gary Usher, MD, who conducted a sleep study at Wentworth-Douglass Hospital's Sleep Disorders Center. "They told me I stopped breathing 96 times an hour. They fitted me with a C-PAP so I could breathe normally and it's made all the difference," she said. "I'm very comfortable using it."

The C-PAP or "continuous positive airway pressure" is a device that makes breathing easier for people like Linda with sleep apnea, a condition often manifested by loud snoring interrupted by periods of silence when there is no breathing.

Linda's now indulging in her life's passions — playing cards with friends, following her grandchildren's sporting events and testing her luck on her annual trek to Vegas with "the girls."

Phil Von Hemert fell one morning putting on his running shorts. His speech was garbled, he couldn't see out of one eye and his right hand had no strength. His wife Susan, a nurse, knew something was terribly wrong and said, "My God, he's having a stroke." She called Dover Fire & Rescue to transport Phil to WDH.


In less than an hour, Phil was in the Emergency Department having a brain scan to determine the type of stroke. Following the scan, a WDH neurologist conferred with neurologists at Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH). They determined Phil should receive the clotbusting drug tPA, which can only be used within the first three hours of a stroke. Susan agreed.

Ten hours later Phil was feeling close to normal. Two days later he walked out of the Hospital and back to his regular life.

All the dots connected for Phil. Susan and the EMTs got him to the Hospital quickly. WDH's high level stroke care and affiliation with MGH resulted in a quick diagnosis and treatment right in Dover.

Phil and Susan are still running thanks to fast action and expert care.


Emily never did not have the time to speak with us about our father's condition and went out of her way to make him and us comfortable. Her nursing skills are impeccable; she was truly concerned about him and

Susan Serfass, RN, CRNI Laurie Lindsay, RN, BEHS Surgery

Susan and Laurie are key members of the Nursing Practice Council at WDH, which gives nurses at the bedside a strong voice to identify problems and a structure to find solutions. As co-chair of the Council, Susan Serfass, Same Day Surgery nurse, explained the benefits for nurses and patients. "When we first started the council we didn't really know what it could achieve, but ultimately it's really good for improving patient outcomes." Sue said. "It's a place where creativity can happen, where we collaborate, where we're supportive. It's a safe zone where we can all talk to each other."

In the example case of hard-to-locate IV pumps, Laurie Lindsay, Surgical Services Nurse and Chair of the OR/PACU unit of the Council, said the team invited other departments to their meeting to get asense of the bigger picture. "We acted like detectives working on the problem," she said. "We stopped blaming other departments and started working together."

The Nursing Practice Council tackled interdepartmental communication and discovered other departments working separately on the same issues. Sue said, "There were seven different groups working on this and now we're all working together."






Myhanh Nguyen, MD Minesh Patel, MD

Hospitalists

As specialists in inpatient medicine, Hospitalists are focused on improving patient safety and the quality of care provided at Wentworth-Douglass Hospital. Hospitalist, Myhanh J. Nguyen, MD, explained the acute care aspect of internal medicine. "Hospitalist Medicine draws upon many of the skills we develop in residency. In-house hospitalists can make care more efficient and effective."

Working alongside Dr. Nguyen as part of the Hospitalist team is Minesh Patel, MD. Dr. Patel demonstrates how the staff all work together to bring better care to patients, from admission to discharge. "There is no waiting around, we are always in house 24/7. So it's easy to build up a trust, and I think trust is very important in a doctor-patient environment."

Hospitalists at WDH also coordinate tests and treatments and facilitate communication between the members of the care team, including the patient, nursing, therapists, specialists and family members.





Niki Connors, Stroke Program Coordinator, and Lynn Chabot, Emergency Department Clinical Educator, are more than Emergency co-workers, nurses and best friends, they're "lifers."

He brought her a lot of comfort and happiness. I was there on the day she passed. She had Liam's ball right beside her."

The clinic offers a comprehensive multidisciplinary approach to care for patients with a known or suspected malignancy of the chest and provides a forum for a multidisciplinary team second opinion.

A cancer genetics counselor from MGH is available at the Seacoast Cancer Center to meet with patients and discuss genetic issues related to their diagnosis.

CARDIOVASCULAR SERVICES (603) 740-2121

The Cardiovascular Care Center offers a variety of diagnostic and therapeutic procedures, including echocardiography, EKG, pacemaker insertions, Holter monitoring, stress testing, nuclear stress testing, vascular studies, SPECT (3D nuclear imaging) and invasive cardiac catheterization.

CARE-VAN (603) 740-2520

The Care-Van Service is a courtesy, patient transport system for patients (without means of transportation) receiving scheduled treatments for Hospital services.

CENTER FOR PAIN MANAGEMENT (603) 740-2276

The Center for Pain Management provides interventional pain management services for patients with acute and chronic pain in collaboration with the dual-board certified physicians and practitioners from Seacoast Pain Institute.

CHILDREN'S SERVICES

WDH cares for children of all ages. The inpatient pediatric service is part of the Women's & Children's Center. WDH is one of a few hospitals to offer the expertise of Child Life Specialists trained to reduce the anxiety and concern associated with pediatric surgery, procedures and testing.

CHaD at Wentworth-Douglass Hospital (603) 740-2366

This Children's Center for Specialty Medicine at WDH is a collaboration with Children's Hospital at Dartmouth (CHaD). The Center cares for children with chronic illnesses. Pediatric specialists from CHaD include cardiology, urology, endocrinology, gastroenterology and genetics.

Family Resource Coordinators connect the families and their children with chronic health conditions to community programs including child life and social work support.

WDH offers financial assistance for patients at or below 300% of the federal poverty level. Qualified patients receive care at no charge for hospital services and visits at medical practices owned by the Hospital. Payment plans and early pay discounts are available.



Medication Assistance Program (603) 740-3376

WDH offers this resource for low income, working poor or elderly patients needing assistance in obtaining free or reduced cost medications. The program is available for patients who have a primary care physician at WDH.

DIABETES SERVICES

WDH offers a broad range of educational and support programs for diabetes patients, families and community. Education is provided individually, in groups, during monthly support groups, at community screenings and events.

EMERGENCY & EXPRESS CARE SERVICES

WDH's Emergency Department (ED), open 24/7, is fully staffed by boardcertified emergency medicine physicians, physician assistants, nurse practitioners, trauma certified nurses, Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners, registered paramedics, case managers and social workers. Express Care, within the ED, provides care for non-critical patients.

The Endoscopy Unit's highly skilled nurses and technicians deliver specialized care to patients suffering from disorders of the gastrointestinal tract.

HOSPITALISTS

Hospitalists are specialists in inpatient care focused on improving quality and patient safety. The WDH Hospitalist team includes physicians, nurse practitioners, and physician assistants that provide round the clock care for patients from admission through discharge.
