

#### **CONFERENCE DIRECTOR**

**Suzanne L. Keeley, Ph.D.**, is President of The Melissa Institute and a psychologist in private practice. She is also affiliated with Baptist Health South Florida. Dr. Keeley has had extensive clinical experience treating victims and perpetrators of violence.

#### PRESENTERS

**Roger Weissberg** is Professor of Psychology and Education, University of Illinois, Chicago and President of the Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning (CASEL). He has designed and implemented Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) programs and has worked with the Illinois State Board of Education to build SEL into the state's kindergarten through high school learning standards. Students who are enrolled in SEL programs rank 10 percentile points higher in academic

achievement than non-SEL students. These students also have better attendance records, fewer behavioral prob-

lems and are less likely to be suspended. ("*No emotion left behind*!" *is a byword of SEL programs*.) Dr. Weissberg will discuss how to implement and evaluate schoolwide SEL programs. (See *http://www.casel.org*)

J. David Hawkins is Endowed Professor of Prevention, University of Washington School of Social Work. He is the developer, with Richard Catalano, of the critically acclaimed Communities That Care prevention system. His community-based assessment tools and practical implementation guidelines help communities choose and use tested and effective

policies and programs to put children and families on a positive developmental trajectory. Dr. Hawkins will discuss how to use the Communities That Care system to improve outcomes for young people, community wide. He is one of the founders of Cognitive Behavior Therapy and Research Director of The Melissa Institute. He will discuss how social agencies can identify and treat high-risk youth and families. He will highlight ways to implement the Core Tasks of Psychotherapy/Counseling.
