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MERRY CHRISTMAS AND A HAPPY NEW YEAR

The post card at right showing the 1983 twenty cent United States Christmas Stamp was mailed by John Wynns of Dayton, Nevada, to the editor, conveying Christmas Greetings. The card was mailed on December 7 and should have arrived at Vancouver within a week. This was not the case as it did not arrive until December 22. The fact that it depicted a nude child was spotted by an alert postal employee who, possibly as the result of the recent Little Sister Book Store ruling by the Canadian Courts, felt obligated to forward this pornographic post card to Canada Customs at Toronto for inspection and approval. After inspection by Customs Clerk 087 and another unidentified clerk it was approved for entry into Canada. The fact that Raphael painted *The Niccolini-Cowper Madonna* in 1508 and that it presently hangs in the National Gallery of Art in Washington, DC. may have prompted its release into the Canadian mail system.



NOW TO THE BAD NEWS

Since I started publishing the B.C. Postal History News Letter close to ten year ago, costs have been slowly rising and the recent hike in postal rates is a good example. 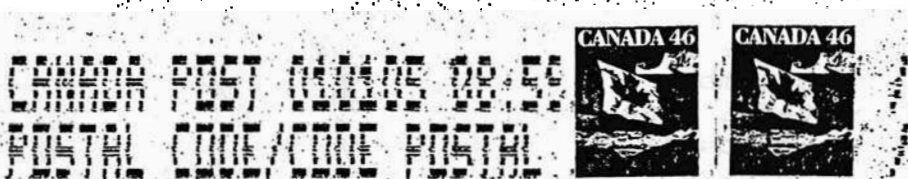
New CLEARWATER machine

Sometime over the Christmas period Clearwater was issued with an IPS rapid cancelling machine. The earliest reported date is 27 XII (2000) no year slug.

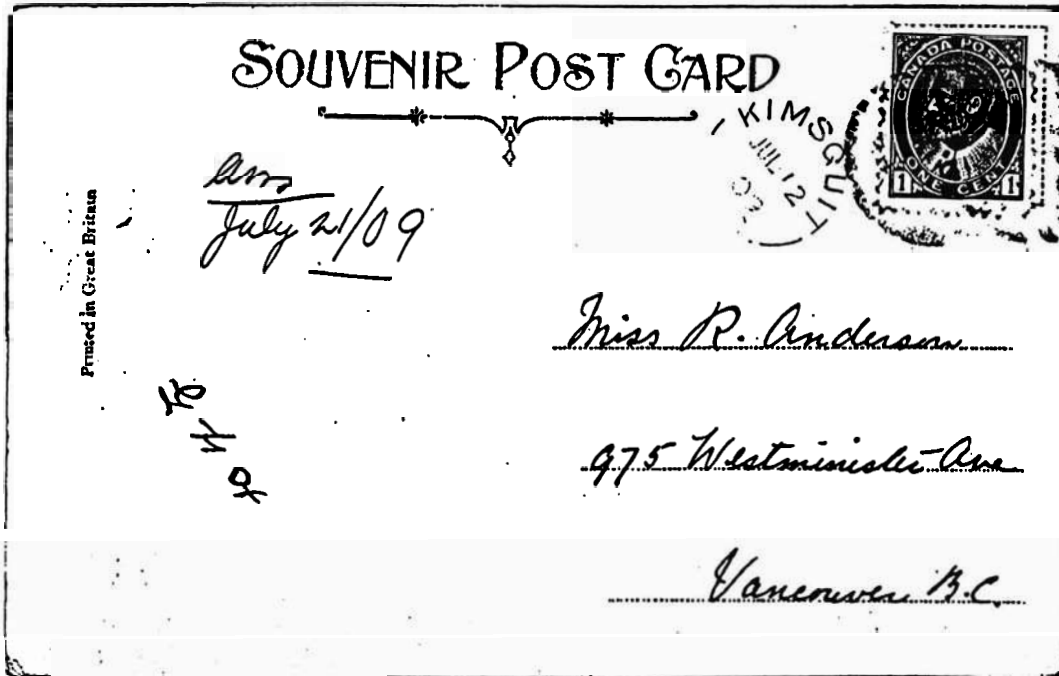


FLAT SORTING MACHINE cancel changed

POSTAL CODES

Canada Post — Postal Code Lookup <http://www.canadapost.ca/CPC2/addr/plookup/pclookup.shtm>

In addition to the many multi-purpose search engines that perform the postal-code finder function, the Canada Post lookup has a handy and quick resource for Canadian addresses. You can look up addresses for a given postal code, or look up postal codes by street address, rural address or post office boxes. The Canadian Addressing Guide also provides information on how the most technologically efficient formats for addressing items sent in the post. When addressing an envelope, for example, there should never be more than 40 characters per line, and characters in the address should never be underlined.

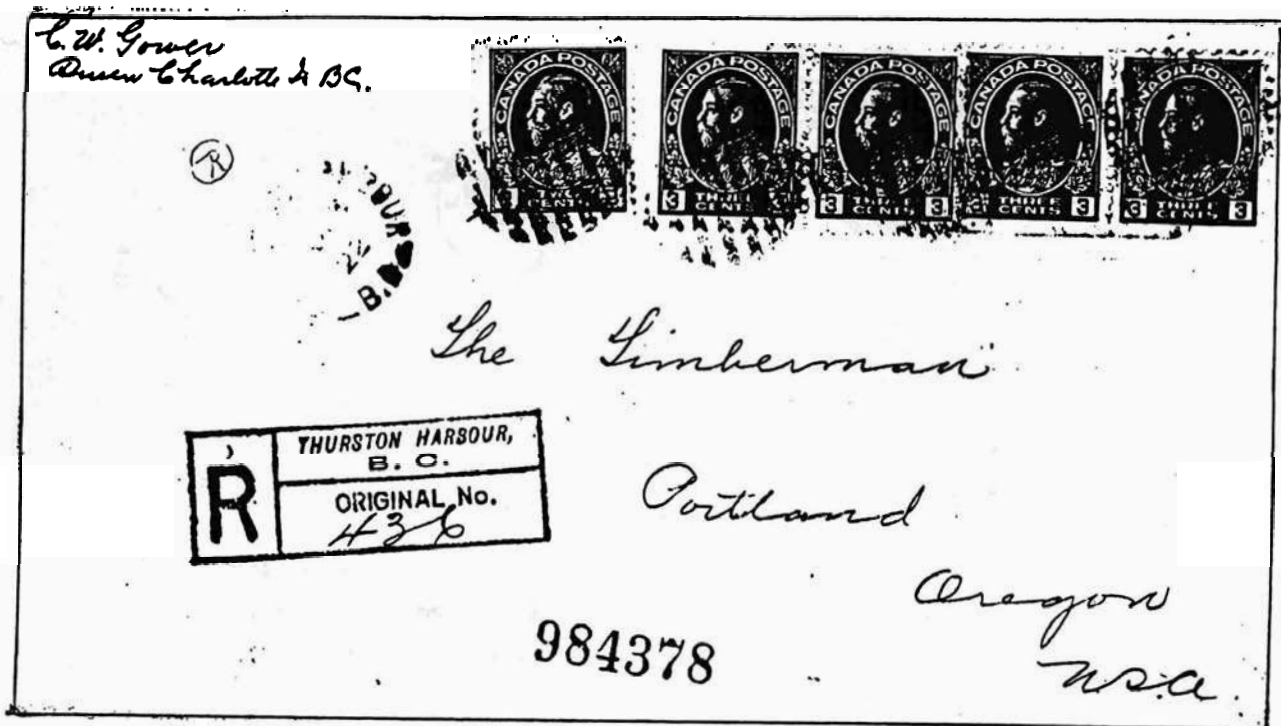

NEW REPORTS OF UNREPORTED MARKINGS

Reports continue to be received of previously unreported postal listings of British Columbia Post Offices. Recent finds by Andrew Scott and Pete Jacobi include: WESTERLY (2), KIMQUIT, a registered cover from THURSTON HARBOUR and a report of VANCOUVER - SUB OFFICE CEDAR COVE.

Thurston Harbour was a Queen Charlotte Islands post office and open from 1918 to 1926. It was located on the north shore of Talunkwan Island, to the east of Moresby Island and just south of Louise Island. The following information comes from Kathleen Dalzell's *Queen Charlotte Islands* (Vol. 2): The Imperial Munitions Board used the harbour as a collection base for aeroplane spruce (Sitka spruce) during World War I. No expense was spared, apparently, to turn the remote landing into a "miniature metropolis," complete with hospital, offices, houses, recreational buildings operated by the YMCA, wireless station and store, as well as a complete rafting camp. Three large sawmills were almost finished when the war ended. Everything was abandoned or sold for a pittance. After the war, Whalen Pulp and Paper used the harbour for their logging headquarters, and it remained a logging centre until at least the 1970s for a succession of companies. I had a chance to visit Thurston Harbour on a cruise in 1998. There was nothing left of the townsite, just a flat grassy area covered with alder. The hillsides around the bay are badly scarred with landslides that have resulted from poor logging and road-building practices. The whole place was quite a mess.

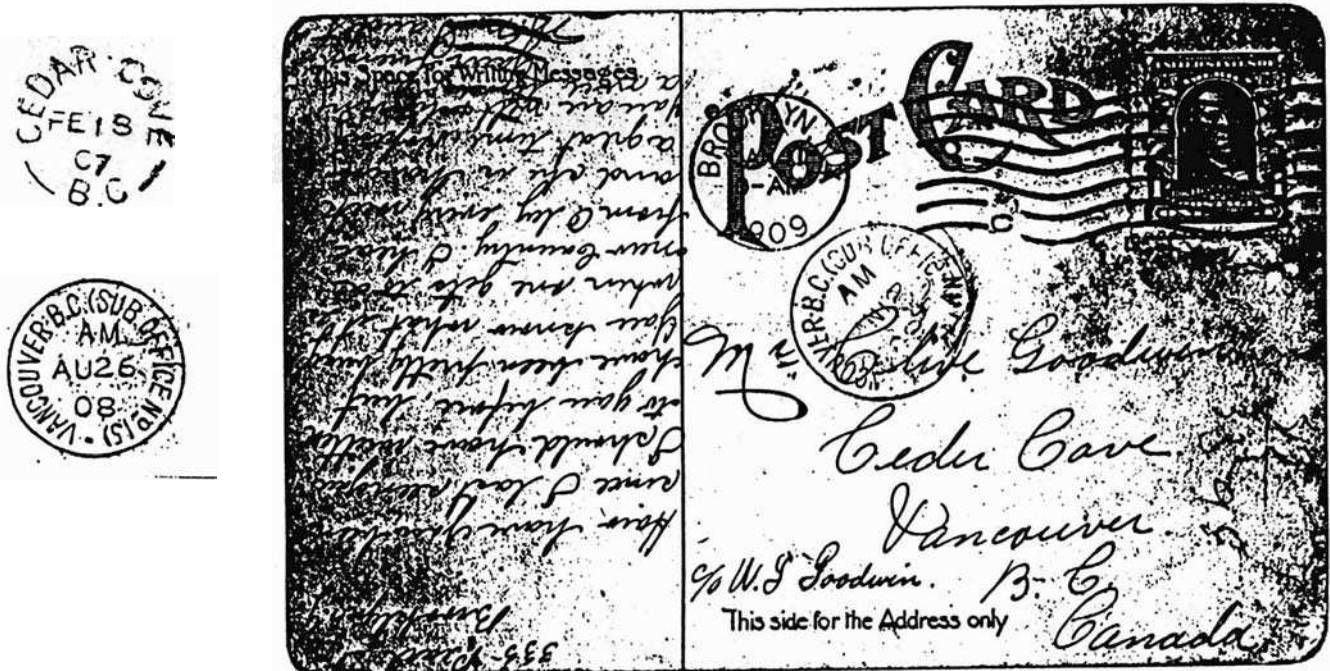

A "VANCOUVER-B.C. (SUB OFFICE CEDAR COVE)" hammer dated "PM JUL 23 08" was discovered by Albert Tanner and sold in the F.v.H. Stamps auction of December 1998. It has been correctly reported that the Vancouver - Cedar Cove Sub Office is not listed in the "Checklist of British Columbia Post Office" but is listed in Melvin with the note "Probably changed directly to Vancouver S.O. 15". The problem is that the records in Ottawa do not agree with those formerly housed in the Vancouver Post Office.

The "Cedar Cove" Post Office was authorized (PMG 117) on January 25, 1900 and re-authorized on February 22, 1900. The Post Office was established on March 1, 1900 (Canada Gazette March 1900) on Powell street at the North end of Victoria Drive with W. Seidelman as Postmaster. At some point the status of the "Cedar Cove" post office changed and it became "Cedar Cove Sub Office, Vancouver", but there is no record of this change of status in any of the official documents.

The Monthly Supplement for August-October 1908 show "Cedar Cove Sub Office" changing to "Vancouver Sub Cedar Cove" while the Vancouver Postal Records for July 1, 1908 show this order being cancelled and that the "Cedar Cove" office changed to "Vancouver Sub. 15" on September 1, 1908 with Mrs. E.M. McWhinnie as postmistress. No record of the change to Vancouver Sub. 15 is shown in the Monthly Supplements.

The Proof Book shows no proof for a hammer reading "Vancouver Sub. Cedar Cove", but it does show a hammer reading "VANCOUVER-B.C. (SUB.OFFICE No 15)", dated "AM AU 26 08". The post mark on the cover below is obviously Vancouver Sub. 15, but it is reported there is another cover dated July 23, 1908, which is the period when the Vancouver Post Office Records indicate "Cedar Cove" Post Office was closed. Can any one provide confirmation of the "Vancouver - Cedar Cove" marking?



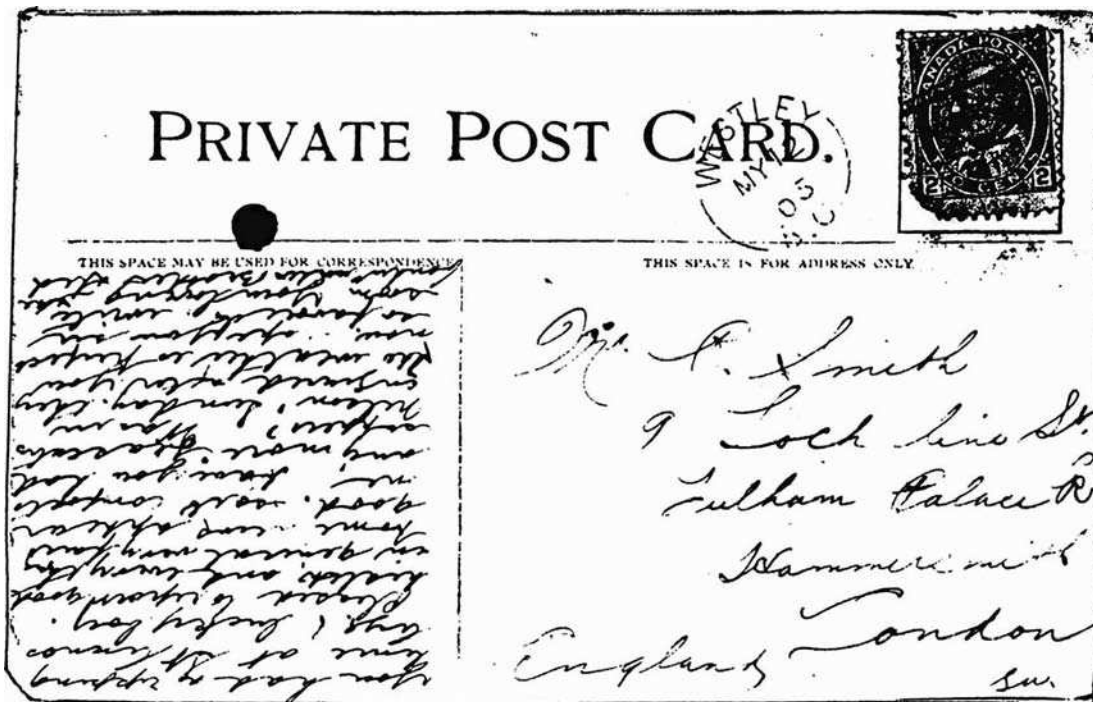
Westley

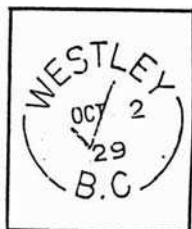
The location of this settlement was four miles west of Robson on the north shore of the Columbia River. It was a saw-mill site named after its owners. In 1909 a major fire devoured everything between the railway and the river. In the early 1930's the Westley mill was rebuilt by the Westley Lumber Co. only to be burned down again in 1934/35. The town never recovered.

The P.O. was opened on Aug. 1, 1903 and ran until Dec. 31, 1913 and after that was opened during one other brief interval of Oct. 1, 1929 to Nov. 30, 1930. A split-ring is the only known cancel type for both periods and no cancels of the second period have been found to date

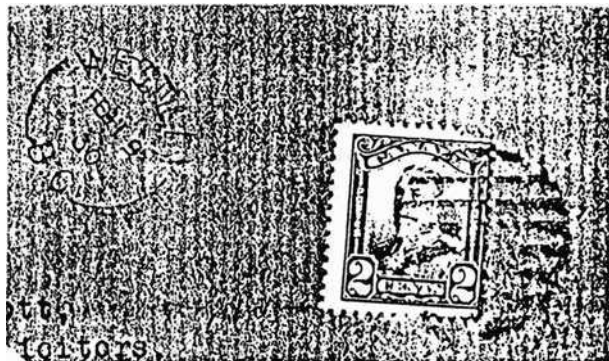

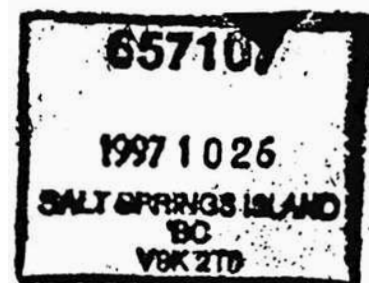
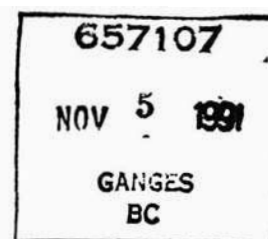

FROM CANADA POST

Thanks to the assistance of John Gannon, Cathy McCrimmon and other members of the Pacific Division of Canada Post, here is the listing of British Columbia post office changes up to January 1, 2001. The computer system at Canada Post is again being upgraded and as a result it has been difficult to crosscheck information and to see that all changes have been recorded. In some cases the name appearing is the name of the business in which the post office is located rather than the actual name of the office.

The POCON in use at the Ganges Retail Outlet (RC# 657107) is a good example of the problem. In 1997, the "GANGES" dater was replaced with one reading "SALT SPRING ISLAND" although the post office records still list the name as Ganges RO. A similar problem exists with the main Ganges Post Office (RC# 642630)

New Remote Readers arrive!

"How fast can you get it there and how reliable is the service?" In a world where customers are technologically savvy and expanding their horizons globally, it's not surprising they want quick and dependable service, particularly when sending international or U.S. mail.

Canada Post is responding with another new initiative to turn our vision, including rationalizing the operating network, into action. This fall, CPC will be upgrading its Multi-Line Optical Character Readers (MLOCRs) by adding Remote Computer Readers. The new Readers can "read" hand-written addresses, artistic fonts and black barcodes, further reducing the need for manual coding. This means faster mail processing and an improvement in customer service.

Current technology in the plants can read only machine-printed addresses and hand-written postal codes placed in dotted boxes. Addresses that can't be read are rejected and sent to Video Encoding Systems (VES) for manual coding. The rejected mail is then re-processed through the MLOCR.

Now our machines can even read...

CPC 4 state barcodes printed by Canada Post on redirection mail. These yellow barcode stickers designate redirected mail as the highest priority, and can be processed with a 98 per cent acceptance rate by the RCR.

Addresses written on dark-coloured backgrounds.

Addresses printed on patterned backgrounds (such as cheques).

Hand-written addresses (script).

Postnet barcodes are printed by the USPS to identify mail bound for Canada. By finding this barcode, the Remote Reader prevents redirected mail and return-to-sender mail from erroneously being sent back to the original destination address in the U.S.

CPC 4 state barcodes printed by customers. These barcodes, developed by Canada Post, can also be seen on the envelopes used to mail CPC employees' pay stubs.
