Look at the actual size copy of BK 71b shown to the right: at first glance, it looks perfectly normal. A keen-eyed Winnipeg collector obtained this booklet from a machine when the issue was current and noticed that the top row 1 cent stamp was short printed on the LEFT. Now, short printed booklet 1 cent browns are well documented (see Doug Karns article in the last CDSG newsletter, No 78 p 702 ) where up to 1.1 mm of the right side of the brown 1 cent from BK 69 is missing.

If you look at the blow-up of the affected stamp shown below, you can see that the short-printing appears to be a little skewed; more of the top (about 0.3 mm ) and less of the bottom ( 0.1 mm ) is missing. Look over your stock of booklet 454 's and let me know if you can find copies with more or less of the left side missing


## CENTENNIAL SLOGANS

A review of Cecil Coutts' book on Slogan Postmarks in Topics Vol 59 No 4 p 71 caught my eye recently, especially the possibility of "custom sorts" by the author. I thought "wouldn't it be nice to have a list of Centennial slogans? I sent Cecil an e-mail at "cec.coutts@telus.net" Asking about a centennial sort of his database. Cecil replied that such a list, sorted by town, for all provinces in Canada for the period 1967-1975 would amount to 251 pages and would cost $\$ 12$, payable if the download was ok. Well it sure was!. Cecil provided the 251 page list as a microsoft "word" document, one page of which is shown on page 713. I believe the format is a little different than the book. In the book, slogans are listed alphabetically, one entry for slogans used in many towns for many years. I cannot remember the details, but I managed to "parse" (computer lingo for putting the text in various columns into the "boxes" of a spreadsheet) the document. Once the data is in a database, you can sort a column, say, alphabetically. That's what I did for the Winnipeg slogans. If you examine the Winnipeg slogans shown on pp 714 and 715 , you will see why the document Cecil sent (some 1.9 Mb -too much for 1 diskette) is so large: there are separate entries for each year a slogan was used.

Very little on Centennial Slogans appears in the CDSG newsletter. If you are interested in seeing the slogans for a particular town, drop me a line; I would be happy to share selected parts of the database with you gratis. One final comment: I do believe that more information appears in the download than in Cecil's book. A quick look at the ERD's listed by Cecil and my own collection indicates that some work could be done on updating the ERD's and LRD's, but that's another "kettle of fish".

# ANOTHER CENTENNIAL DISCOVERY

Some time ago I had occasion to purchase a large group of Opal Booklets (BK\#63). Over the holidays I found some time to have a look at those booklets, searching of course for some of the known varieties. I did not find any that I've been aware of but I did find something I've never seen before in the Opal Booklet Issue.

As you know the pane in this booklet is folded across the center portion, where the block of $4 \times 2 \mathrm{ct}$ above is separated from the block of $4 \times 3 \mathrm{ct}$ below. In Booklet 63 with the Horizontal Perforations, the fold will be directly along that line of perforations. This Booklet was to produce something quite different.

Not wanting to break the sealed/gummed covers I had been looking at the various panes from the side as I searched for those known varieties. I decided to open this specific booklet as I noticed that there was a substantial miscut of the pane to the Right. What I found when I separated the covers was quite unexpected -- a very short pane and then I saw the reason for it being so short. The top portion of the pane had been folded along the line of perforations separating R1 from R2, with a second error fold across the forehead of the Queen. The normal fold was now happening not in the center of the pane but along the top row of perforations on the 3ct stamps. Leo Beaudet speculates that "the variety was presumably caused because the pane buckled along this row of perforations as the booklet cover was being folded." No sooner had I realized that my Christmas Present had finally been delivered, when it occurred to me I was only a third of the way through the group of Booklets.

I set about Ferret-like to search through the remainder of that lot of Opal Booklets and to my pleasant surprise I discovered one more 'Folded Pane Variety.' When the excitement and joy of discovery had abated somewhat I began looking and considering my find with a more prudent philatelic approach, specifically could you fake this item? I took one of my other regular Opal Booklets and folded the pane as with my two discoveries. I was left with one very telling difference, namely the crease or fold in the center of the pane on my Regular Booklet. Would it be possible to erase that fold from the pane without it's prior presence being detected? I would not venture to say that it would be impossible, however to do so would I believe require some very specific 'faking techniques'.


Nonetheless, I was left with the same assurance I had many years ago when I opened a roll of the 6ct Black coil (468B) and found a strip of 13 with the double perfs. They might be faked later but at least I knew my discovery was genuine.

In any event, I've received my Christmas presents for this year and as a passionate fan of the Centennial Issue I'm fascinated that in the year 2003 we can still make 'new' discoveries with this wonderful Issue. I would appreciate comments from other members as to what I believe to be a new Centennial Booklet Variety.

While on the subject of Opal booklets, George Mayo provided the letter from Opal manufacturing shown on the next page. It explains why Centennial collectors occasionally run across manilla envelopes with 20 cents in postage (centennial and caricature) inside. Page 299 of the newsletter has the "Information for Philatelists" sheet from Canada Post covering aspects of the Opal booklet.

During the past few weeks, we have received many requests for a new type of stamp booklet, which our company is supposed to be marketing through privately owned stamp vending machines.

A Winnipeg collector, Nick Fedorchuk, noticed the smudged 15 on the Bylot Island high value when it was in current use and purchased as many sheets as he could find. This variety, the so-called plastic flow variety is difficult to reproduce; most Centennial references have illustrations that do not allow one a clear view of this variety. Perhaps the best is Darnell's (Shown to the right). Nick's find clearly showed that the variety occurred on all stamps in column 5 and, to a lesser extent, on all stamps in column 4. The Plate position was also noticed by Ken Pugh
 and reported in Robin's book (p 64).

A few years ago I purchased a "toy" at Radio Shack called a digital microscope. It looked like a regular microscope, except that instead of peering into an eyepiece, you looked at the computer's screen. It was manufactured by Intel, of all people, and sold for about $\$ 100$. It is great for taking pictures of stamp varieties. Shown below are blow-ups of the "plastic flow" variety taken with the "toy": both are right margin copies and illustrate the inconstancy of this variety.
