FROM THE DESK OF +FR. PAUL COSTOPOULOS



OVERCOMING LONELINESS...

Loneliness is a malady that afflicts young and old alike. Philosophers, religionists and psychologists agree that the sources of loneliness for the most part are two-fold in nature. The one source is the absence of significant others (meaningful relationships) in one's life. The other —and not all agree upon this because all do not believe—is the absence of God from one's life. The two sources, in my opinion, are inextricably linked.

What is loneliness' antidote? To be sure! Being compassionate, loving and friendly toward others can go a long way in helping to eliminate loneliness. But unless one has God in his life, he will never totally overcome loneliness. Why? Because all have an "angst" (an emptiness) in their soul for a relationship with One who transcends human relationships! In the absence of that relationship, one will never be totally un-alone.

Attesting to the power of God to help one deal with loneliness are two wonderful books. I highly recommend you read them.

The one book is the *Philokalia*. The *Philokalia* is a compendium of spiritual writings of the Holy Fathers of our Church dating back to the fourth century. It was first compiled in the latter part of the 18th century by two saints of our Church St. Nikodemos

of the Holy Mountain and St. Makarios of Corinth. The book speaks to us about God, man, sin, the passions, and the ascetic initiatives that one must undertake to become one with God to actualize peace in life. Peace in life is the antithesis of loneliness.

The Bible is the other book. The Bible is the Scriptures of our Holy Orthodox Church. It is liturgically referred to as Wisdom. It contains the Word of God which is unto the cultivation of the Holy Spirit and the actualization of peace and salvation. Peace is a fruit of the Holy Spirit. St. Seraphim of Sarov tells us that the acquisition of peace is our purpose in life. One way to acquire peace is to regularly read the Word.

There is a common theme in both the Bible and the *Philokalia*. The theme is that God gives us the peace for which we pray at every Liturgy, and which dispels the loneliness that at times afflicts all. To overcome loneliness, therefore, one must come to an awareness of God through faith, and afterwards experience His grace. Scriptures and the *Philokalia* are replete with examples of persons who illustrate this truth.

In the Gospel of John 5:1-15, for example, we are told the story of the Paralytic read liturgically on the third Sunday after Pascha. To be sure! His story is about the healing power of Christ. But it is also about loneliness and how to overcome it.

The Paralytic had sat by the Pool of Bethsaida for 38 years. He like others believed that if he could make his way into the water at a certain time of the day, he could be healed. His response to Jesus' query is a poignant one. Jesus asked, *Do you want to be made well?* (John 5:6). Though surrounded by many people, yet the Paralytic was alone. The sick man answered him, *Sir I have no man to put me in the pool when the water is stirred up..." Jesus said to him,* "Rise, take up your bed and walk." And immediately the man was made well... (John 5:7-9).

No! The Paralytic did not have to read the *Philokalia* nor the *Bible* to come to an awareness of God. He had something better. He had the Incarnate Word of God, God Himself, who brought to him healing, life and peace. In Christ he discovered the truth which the Psalmist through the Holy Spirit found, *The Lord is my rock, and my fortress and my deliverer; my God and my strength in Whom I trust my shield and the horn of my salvation...* (Psalm 18:1-3). Thereafter he was never alone.

Yes! Companionship with and love of others is a powerful cure for loneliness. But in their absence—even in their presence—remember! God is the great antidote to loneliness because of the existential angst that exists in all. Only He can eliminate the angst. Therefore, seek Him through the Word and the *Philokalia*, (and also, through Prayer and the Church). By so doing you will discover Him. Or more accurately, you will be found by Him even as was the Paralytic. Recall if you will the words of St. Augustine. He once said, "He who seeks God has already been discovered by Him."

FROM THE DESK OF FR. MICAH HIRSCHY THE THEOTOKOS & THE CHURCH YEAR

The New Year begins September 1st according to our Orthodox Tradition and as we are all aware the first great Feast of the Liturgical year is the Birth of the Theotokos. It is fitting that we begin the year chanting, "Your birth, O Theotokos, brought joy to the whole world, for from you dawned the sun of righteousness, Christ our God. Freeing us from the curse, He gave us His blessings. Abolishing death, He granted us eternal life." This hymn brings to mind that the Theotokos is the mystical dawn who gave birth to the Sun of Righteousness and the hidden horizon that has brought forth the Light that was with the Father from before the creation of the world. We are reminded that this feast is the dawn of the New Year and that the true significance of this feast-day, the Birth of the Theotokos, and the Church year itself is the coming of Christ the God-Man, His trampling down death and granting eternal Life.

If the Church New Year begins with September and the birth of the Theotokos the year concludes with the month of August which has as its crowning Feast the Dormition of the Theotokos. At this feast we chant, "Neither the grave nor death could contain the Theotokos, the unshakable hope, ever vigilant in intercession and protection. As Mother of life, He who dwelt in the ever-virginal womb transposed her to life." It is in this hymn we encounter and celebrate the fulfillment of the hymn we sang in September. At the Dormition of His Mother our Lord reveals to us that death has been abolished and has become only a falling asleep.

The setting of the Sun leads us to a new day. The Falling asleep of the Panagia leads us to look forward to the Resurrection. The conclusion of the Church year and the beginning of the New leads us into the eternity that has neither beginning nor end!

PHILOPTOCHOS UPDATE

I hope all of you had a healthy, wonderful summer enjoying friends and family. Philoptochos, as usual, has been very busy, In addition to preparing for the Food Festival Philoptochos is always seeking new, and more, ways to help our people. Ever aware, striving to meet the continued needs of the past and seeking to meet the needs of the present.

The results of the Metropolis Clergy-Laity Conference that took place this summer is evidence of this. Some of the outcomes were:

- 1. Amazon Smile: A program that, when ordering from Amazon, if you specify a particular charity (Philoptochos) that charity will receive a certain percentage of your charges.
- 2. Scrip Program: If you purchase a "Scrip Card", from Target (a pre-set dollar amount credit card to be spent at Target) a percentage of that amount will be sent/credited to the charity of your choice, i.e. Philoptochos.
- 3. "Christ the Good Shepherd": This program began this year over the Memorial Day Weekend. Nine families from our Metropolis were hosted at the Diakonia Center. This year the focus was on families with an autistic child. Each year the focus will differ based on a family struggling with a different health problem.
- 4. College Outreach: Many of us have, had, or know of young people who are continuing their education away from home. These young people come to church to attend the Liturgy, as well as, to seek a base, a family away from home. What better place than Church? I personally have recently met young people from other states and countries. For most, the first step is the Outreach Table in the lobby (Great Job!!). Then they move on into the Banquet Hall for Coffee. I think sometimes this can be quite intimidating. Let us become more aware of, one sitting alone, someone just looking around, someone standing alone. Let us make a habit of approaching

and welcoming them. We are pretty good at it but let us continue and improve.

On an old tombstone in Locke Hill Cemetery located on a small plot off the expressway in San Antonio, Texas there are carved these words by Grace Smith:

Sleeps, but rests not. Loved, but was not loved. Tried to please, but pleased not. Died as she lived, alone.

Often, we neglect the suffering of others. Not out of malice or real unconcern, but due to our busy lives and involvements. The desperation of our fellow man (woman) is what Philoptochos tries to make easier and erase through love and works.





CATHEDRAL NOTES & NEWS

September 1 - Beginning of Church's New Year: The first day of the Church New Year is also called the beginning of the Indiction. The term Indiction comes from a Latin word meaning, "to impose." It was originally applied to the imposition of taxes in Egypt. The first worldwide Indiction was in 312, when the Emperor Constantine (May 21) saw a miraculous vision of the Cross in the sky. Before the introduction of the Julian calendar, Rome began the New Year on September 1.

According to Holy Tradition, Christ entered the synagogue on September 1, to announce His mission to mankind (Luke 4:16-22). Quoting Isaiah (61:1-2), the Savior proclaimed, "The spirit of the Lord is upon me; because He has anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor; He has sent me to proclaim release to captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, to proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord..." This scene is depicted in a Vatican manuscript (Vatican, Biblioteca. Cod. Gr. 1613, p.1). Tradition says that the Hebrews entered the Promised Land in September. - Adapted from OCA Website


