## A GLIMPSE IN THE CLASSROOMS

## $6^{\text {TH }}$ GRADE

Science - Students have begun conducting experiments using the steps of the Scientific Method. They are now writing up their labs, identifying variables, analyzing and explaining results, answering the how and why questions of science. They will next practice measurement skills while completing a station rotation lab. They will use the basic units of the metric system and convert metric units. Next, we will be in for a "rock"ing time as we begin our geology unit.

Language Arts - Classes have taken their initial formative assessment to determine students' reading skills. We are now working on identifying the main idea and supporting details in a passage. Students will also be using text to draw conclusions and make inferences.

Math - Students have been working with the coordinate grid - locating quadrants, points, and intercepts. Students are beginning their study of exponents and order of operations. The next unit of study will be number theory - greatest common factor, least common multiple, divisibility, and factoring. Honors students will work additionally on integer operations.

Social Studies - Students are studying geography and its influences on the European continent.

Please remember - if it's not attached to your child - please write his/her name on it. We are finding notebooks, pencil pouches, sweatshirts etc. and do not know to whom they belong.

## $7^{\text {TH }}$ GRADE

Language Arts - Students will analyze informational text, identify or create a main idea for the text, and practice summarizing effectively. Students will also partake in text structure activities. *Reminder: Students need a copy of A Raisin in the Sun by 9/27/10

## Math -

Standard Plus: The students just finished the data unit and will be reviewing and broadening their understanding of exponents, scientific notation, order of operations, prime factorization, greatest common factor, and least common multiple this week.

Honors: Students finished up the data unit last week and will be examining exponents and radicals involving variables this week.

Social Studies - This coming week in 7th Grade Social Studies, we will conclude general geography and five themes activities during the first part of the week and begin the study of Southwest Asia and North Africa. We will begin with a power point presentation introducing the region with accompanying analysis questions and start key physical/political feature map locations.

Science - No information received.

## $8^{\text {TH }}$ GRADE

Social Studies - We will continue to compare and contrast the relative importance of differing economic, geographic, religious, and political motives for European exploration and the impact of the Columbian Exchange. They will understand why Europeans first explored North America, and what the consequences of such exploration were by completing a chart on the different explorers, a Columbian Exchange map, a children's picture book project on an explorer, and conducting research on a European explorer. In addition, students will understand the factors that lead to the founding and settlement of the American colonies including religious persecution, economic opportunity, adventure, and forced migration by writing stories, letters, working in cooperative groups to complete a jigsaw activity, and creating a cartoon comic strip.

Language Arts - Next week, language arts will begin with an overview of literary elements. We will focus in on mood and tone and how word choice and diction play a role in both. The texts we use will align with our "Strange and Mysterious" unit.

## Math -

Standard Plus: Students will finish Unit 1 which covers evaluating expressions, writing expressions and equations, solving one-step and two-step equations, and identifying and placing ordered pairs on a coordinate plan. Students will take a test on Unit 1 the week of September 20th. Student will begin identifying and manipulating rational and irrational numbers.

Algebra 1: Students will finish working on Unit 1 which includes exponent rules, operations with monomials and polynomials, and scientific notation. Students will be able to divide monomials and utilize their negative exponent rules. Students will also use FOIL and identify special cases when multiplying polynomials. Students will take a Unit 1 Test the week of September $20^{\text {th }}$.

Science - Next week in Science, the students will be taking their first test covering concepts covered in Chapter 1. We will begin to explore fossils and the types of rock that fossils form.

## ELECTIVES

## Drama -

$6^{\text {th }}$ grade: Students will implement theater vocabulary, audition skills, stage directions and whole group collaboration to rehearse 'story theater' of Where the Wild Things Are, by Maurice Sendak.
$7^{\text {th }}$ grade: Students will define theater vocabulary; explore pantomime; study theater history.
$8^{\text {th }}$ grade: Students will work on planning in small groups on "You Are What You Eat" skits; Students will utilize audience etiquette procedures while watching classmates perform.

## CTE -

Keyboarding (Semester): Students will examine and demonstrate proper keyboarding posture and technique when typing at a computer and execute the Touch Method of the alphabetic keys. Students will be learning the use of home row keys and using proper fingers. They will classify computer components, define and identify computer hardware, parts of a computer system, input and output devices, application versus operating system, IPOS, and peripheral devices.

Business Computer Technology (Semester): Students will identify and demonstrate appropriate techniques and identify ergonomic related issues. 1. Reinforce keyboarding posture and technique. 2. Explain GWAM and the method/technique that can be used to improve speed and accuracy.

Exploring Business Technologies (Semester): Students will compare the different types of economic systems: traditional, free enterprise, command, and mixed, interpret supply and demand graphs, and gain an understanding of how societies and people seek to satisfy needs/wants through incentives, choices, and allocation of resources.

Exploring Career Decisions (Semester): Students will understand personality and learning styles.

PE and Health: Students will fill out personalized goal sheets for the end of the semester. Students work toward their individual goals. Fitness Gram Fitness testing: mile run sit-ups push-ups, shoulder stretch, trunk lift, BMI, finish testing and cooperative games.

## Spanish -

$6^{T H}$ grade: Students will learn shapes, colors and sizes in Spanish. Students will identify classroom objects and commands in Spanish.
$7^{\text {TH }}$ grade: Students will use numbers $0-31$. Students will ask for and give phone numbers. Students will tell time. Students will give the day/date. Students will spell out loud. Students will use accents and punctuation.
$8^{\text {th }}$ grade: In eighth grade Spanish $1 \mathrm{~B}, 1^{\text {st }}$ quarter is a review of Spanish 1A. Students will use Spanish verbs ending in 'ar', 'er' and 'ir'.

## Band -

6th grade: primarily working on producing quality sounds on our mouthpieces, learning to properly assemble instruments and playing our initial notes.

7th grade: reviewing Concert Bb and Eb , refining eighth note patterns.
8th grade: working on ensemble playing, reviewing several scales and key signatures through new musical literature.

Art - All grades next week will be working on different difficulty levels of portrait drawing using correct proportion (front view, side view, and $3 / 4$ view). This will lead into an art project picture for the Patriotic Art Contest. The theme this year for the contest is Courage. Classes will discuss what courage looks like and transfer their thoughts into an image.

## 2010-2011 CRESTDALE CLUB and ORGANIZATION GUIDE

## - ADOPT-A-STREAM / GREEN MACHINE

"Green Machine" will operate as an extended arm of Beta Club this year, but service activities are open to all Crestdale students, parents, and staff. Our first Adopt-a-Stream clean-up will be held Saturday, September 18 from 9 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. Students need to bring a completed permission slip the day of the event and will meet between the baseball/softball fields behind the school. Garbage bags, gloves, and some waders will be provided, but all participants should wear clothing that they don't mind getting dirty!

Mrs. Anderson is also looking for students to participate in the "Water Watchers" committee. Once a month, after school on a Thursday, students will conduct a series of water tests in Irwin Creek to provide valuable data to the county.

In November and February, planting days will be scheduled [on a Saturday] to develop our outdoor classroom areas and gardens. As part of the Matthews Naturally initiative, we are looking to develop Crestdale as a certified wildlife habitat using native plants to attract and protect butterflies, birds, and other wildlife, providing hands on learning for students. At least one outdoor classroom area is also being planned.

Crestdale's team is selected by the coaches on the basis of extremely high academic ability demonstrated by EOG scores, GPAs, and teacher recommendations. Students meeting the criteria receive invitations to be a part of the team. The practice schedule is not yet available, but will be sent home with team members and sent via this newsletter. A Selection Committee comprised of 7th and 8th grade staff vote on the candidates based on teacher recommendations and the students' applications where they describe how they exemplify the five pillars of the Society: Scholarship(3.5+cumulative GPA), Service (school and community), Leadership (school and community), Character, and Citizenship. Selected candidates become members through an Induction Ceremony in May. The club meets once a month, and students are involved in a variety of service projects. ## - ODYSSEY OF THE MIND

OM is an international extracurricular program that provides creative problem-solving opportunities for students from kindergarten through college. Kids work in teams of 5-7 and are encouraged to think "outside the box" to creatively solve one of five problems of their choice. These open-ended problems range from building mechanical devices and robotics to presenting their own interpretation of literary classics in short 6-8 minute skits. Teams typically meet once a week for 3-4 months and bring their solutions to competition on the Local, State, and World level. Since 1978, thousands of teams from throughout the U.S. and from $\sim 25$ other countries such as China, Germany, Japan, Canada, and Poland have participated in the program.
