DG Dennis' Message

March is Literacy Month for Rotary International. We have a District Literacy Committee that is looking into how to best serve our area. Lately, there is a lot of focus around our country on raising the academic standards for our children. The purpose of adopting the Common Core Standards being discussed in local school districts and in the media is to "raise the bar" for our students and make them more competitive for careers and college. This also is having a huge impact on adult literacy.

Did you know that the GED Test that was used for over 70 years to measure adult high-school equivalency was dropped by the State of New York as of the end of 2013? Well it was! New York is now using a test called the TASC (Test Assessing Secondary Completion) to measure an adult's ability to demonstrate a level of education equivalent to that of a graduated high-school student. As with the children, the "bar has been raised" for the adults, and this test is considerably more difficult than was the old GED Test. Dropping out of school was never a good idea, but now abandoning the public-education process could prove to be an even more disastrous decision for a young person.

Rotarians have always worked hard and effectively whenever literacy was involved. The need has never been greater than it is today. Anything that your club, or you as an individual Rotarian, can do with a local school or adult education facility to help educate our children and adult learners would be a significant help.

I would be remiss not to mention Rotarians Ray and Linda Allen (North Utica / Whitestown RC & Utica RC) and the Dolly Parton Imagination Library for Herkimer and Oneida Counties (DPIL-HOC) project. This wonderful project is bringing books to young children in selected parts of the two-county area. This project is partnering with many of our District's Rotary clubs, area libraries, and commercial businesses as well as community organizations like the Community Foundation of Herkimer and Oneida Counties. A big "thanks" to Ray and Linda for spearheading this literacy project.

Youth Exchange

Meet "Bambam" from Thailand

Natnicha Padungpattanodom, or Bambam, is only 16 years old and a 30-hour flight from her home in Thailand. She is living with her

second of three host families in Skaneateles as a Rotary foreign exchange student. Attending school in Central New York is different than in her hometown of Banpong, where she

weeks living in a boarding school in Bangkok since she was 7, only coming home to her family on weekends. The first time her parents left her at boarding school, she cried and cried, she said. Now, "I like it because I have friends."

CNYIG: What were you most nervous about coming to Central New York to live?

NP: I was most worried about my English. If I cannot speak, I will not understand anything, and I would be a quiet girl and stay in my room. And so before I came here, I tried hard to learn English ... I used an English website (for foreigners who want to learn English), and watched English movies and listened to English songs ... because in Thailand we don't

have a lot of English speakers or teachers.

CNYIG: How did you get to be a foreign exchange student?

NP: Actually I would just like to go to America, and my dad is a Rotarian in my district. He asked me if I wanted to go. I am the first one to ever go in my district and in my hometown in Banpong. We don't know about foreign exchange students. So I had to do all the work myself because we don't have anyone else for me to ask. I had to fill out a long application by myself.

CNYIG: How are the clothes different and have you been shopping here for clothes?

NP: In Thailand we wear summer clothes all year like T-shirts and shorts and flipflops. Here it is so different because I need snow boots and jacket and scarf and hat. (We wear blue jeans too ...it is not so much a difference in fashion but a difference in temperature).

CNYIG: What do you like to eat here? What is the food like in Thailand?

NP: Here I love mac and cheese. In Thailand we have rice at almost every meal. At the table we would have rice in a big bowl, and then smaller bowls of fish and chicken and vegetables. Please look up Thai food on the Internet! You will love Thai food. (It is delicious and sometimes too spicy!)

CNYIG: Do you have siblings?

NP: I have three sisters, one older and two younger. Their nicknames are Nupnub, Bb and

Boomboom. My nickname in Thailand and here know me as Bambam. We all call each other by our nicknames. I use my real name for applications and homework ... and at school. My full real name is Natnicha Padungpattanodom.

CNYIG: How do you use technology to stay in touch with your family and friends in Thailand? Is it affordable?

NP: I Skype with my parents two times a month. I have my own computer from home and I can connect whenever I have Wi-Fi. So I connect on Facebook too. On my iPhone I connect my friends on "Line" a special app where you can text and send photos and videos and voice messages. It includes cute stickers

to express emotions. It is an app more popular in Asia.

CNYIG: What are some of the fun things you do with new friends in school?

NP: With the Interact Club at Skaneateles High School I en- joyed Haunted Hallways at Halloween and making cookies for Christmas. I enjoy playing on the tennis team and now with the basketball team.

CNYIG: What would you tell a CNY student if they were thinking about being a foreign exchange student in Thailand or another country?

NP: I think the exchange student program is a wonderful experience. One year you live with people in another country ... you learn how they live, how they eat, everything new that you cannot know if you just travel ... or from a book. You learn this by yourself ... it is real.

Start Your RYLA Participants Selection Now

 ${f N}{\mbox{ow}}$ is the time for Rotary clubs to be choosing

teens to attend RYLA, our district's Rotary Youth Leadership Awards seminar. It will be held July 11-13, 2014, at Cazenovia College.



If you wait too long, many of your potentially best students will have already made summer plans. *Pick them while you have first choice.*

The 4-page RYLA application can be printed from the district's web site. Go to www.rotary7150.org and then click on the RYLA button at the top. Once there, look at the list on the left and click on "Student Application."

Your club benefits from sponsoring teens to attend RYLA in a number of ways:

- The teen has an obligation to come back from RYLA and oversee completion of a community service project.
- The teen will present a program on RYLA for one of your club meetings.
- The teen will gain leadership skills that likely will be used to make communities better.
- The parents of the teen, who normally attend the RYLA recognition banquet, are introduced to part of Rotary and could be potential Rotary members.

If your club doesn't already have a RYLA chairperson, name one quickly. The chairperson can find qualified teens to apply for RYLA by contacting high school administrators, guidance counselors, coaches, music teachers and activity advisers. Often church leaders also have insight to which teens might do well at RYLA or could benefit greatly by attending.

Guidelines for picking a teen to sponsor are simple: The teen should be in his or her junior year of high school now, demonstrate leadership potential and a willingness to serve others

Your club should distribute RYLA applications to potential candidates, then have the completed applications returned to your club RYLA chairperson for evaluation and selection. Your club should complete your part of the application, then forward it and the sponsorship cost of \$300 to the address on the application.

And there goes another truckload of Books



The Zimbabwe Clean Water Project is one of the most successful water projects within district 7150. In collaboration with our host club, Belmont Rotary Club in Bulawayo Zimbabwe, we submitted our final report to The Rotary Foundation on January 15th, 2014 and was approved on January 16th, 2014.

The success of this water project is owed mainly to its sponsors and supporters and particularly to the leadership and guidance of the Late Assistant Governor Joette Dean, PDG, Don Reese and PDG, Ward Vuillemot. ZCWP is a project sponsored by several district 7150 clubs through Syracuse Sunrise Rotary Club led by water chair, Rev. Blessed Sikhosana and Past President Kevin Fallis.

"It was Kevin Fallis that introduced me to Assistant Governor, Joette Dean, commonly known as the "water lady" of district 7150. We met for the first time for lunch in 2010 at Wegmans in Dewitt New York and from that meeting a motherdaughter relationship ensued." It was amazing because when we left that meeting it was like Joette and I had known each other for many years. I can testify to this, Joette was a warm, loving person and very knowledgeable about the water project processes. I liked her a lot like my own mom. I will always remember just before I left to supervise the drilling of the water wells in Zimbabwe, Joette and her husband Barry organized a special dinner for me. They invited me over to their camp, oh! What a day that was. We spent most of the day in the water just riding around the lake in their lovely boat. What a loving couple.

Needless to say that Joette Dean was not only like my American mom but more so she was a cheerleader who always was there for me at every step of the water project. She cared greatly about the success of the ZCWP in providing sustainable safe water solutions to the villagers in Zimbabwe and to other developing countries or in any other disaster areas for that matter.

"Mama Joette" as I affectionately referred to her, approached all her work with a sense of urgency and a commitment to excellence. Her faith and belief in the sanctity of life compelled me to work harder in developing and implementing the best community development meetings in Zimbabwe so that, through our Rotarian work, God will be honored and glorified and 3000 lives will be transformed for perpetuity. Polio Eradication

U.S. Commits \$205 million to Polio Eradication

President Barack Obama signed an omnibus appropriations bill in January that provides \$205 million to support polio eradication in 2014, through the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and U.S. Agency for International Development.

The largest government donor to polio eradication, the U.S. has contributed more than \$2.3 billion since the mid-1980s, when 125 countries were polio endemic and the disease afflicted 350,000 people annually. Today, only Pakistan, Afghanistan, and Nigeria are endemic, and in 2013, the combined incidence of polio in those countries fell to a record-low 157 cases. Last month, India reached a three-year milestone without polio, paving the way for the entire Southeast Asia region to be certified free of the disease.

"Eradicating polio will leave a lasting legacy of health care infrastructure, experience, and expertise that is already being used to benefit a broad range of global public health efforts," says James Lacy, chair of Rotary's Polio Eradication Advocacy Task Force for the United States and past president of Rotary International.

The task force leads Rotary's efforts to inform the U.S. government and other funding sources of the urgency and benefits of supporting the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI).

One of Rotary's chief responsibilities in the GPEI is advocacy. In addition to contributing more than \$1.2 billion to the initiative, Rotary has helped secure over \$9 billion from donor governments since the GPEI was launched in 1988.



Contributions to Eradicate Polio

New contributions of US\$ 475 million for 2013-2015 were received during the period from February to Many 2013, helping to further reducing the 2013 gap of US\$ 217 million and allow the Initiative to carry out planned activities and respond to ongoing outbreaks. In 2012, the GPEI received US\$ 1.16 billion in contributions.

Financing the 2013 budget of US\$ 1.054 billion: US\$ 837 million in contributions with a gap of US\$ 217 million



Other' includes: the Governments of Brunei Darussalam, Finland, Luxembourg, Monaco and Nepal, plus the GOOGLE Foundation/Matching Grant.

- Celebrating 3 years polio-free in India: on 11 February, dignitaries from around the world came together at a celebratory event in Delhi. The President of India, Shri Pranab Mukherjee, was joined in the celebrations by Prime Minister Dr Manmohan Singh, Union Health and Family Welfare Minister Ghulam Nabi Azad, Chairperson of the National Advisory Council Sonia Gandhi, Leader of the Opposition Shushma Swaraj, WHO Director-General Dr Margaret Chan, Rotary International President Ron D Burton and other high-level representatives. The Regional Certification Commission (RCC) for the Southeast Asia Region is expected to convene at end-March and review data from the entire Region, to determine if it will
- In Afghanistan, an immunization response is ongoing to last week's reported case in Kabul. It was the first case in the province since 2002, and is linked to transmission in neighboring Pakistan. Afghanistan continues to make strong progress towards polio eradication. This latest case in Kabul underscores the ongoing risk polio continues to pose to children everywhere.

The Fulton Sunoco plant is a Zero Waste Facility. They recycle all their water and produce only 1 dumpster of waste product every 2 weeks. 85 % of the corn used at the plant is purchased in New York State and most is grown within 100 miles of Fulton. The Fulton facility produces the green ethanol that NASCAR uses. Another product they produce is distillers grain which is used for livestock feed. A new product last year, corn oil (not the cooking kind) is turned into biodiesel and sold in Pennsylvania. The Fulton plant produces 25% of Sunoco's ethanol needs. Another by-product of the plant are various gases given off during the processing of corn.

Oswego student starting fundraiser for poor mothers

OSWEGO — An Oswego High School student is starting a fundraiser to purchase baby blankets and other supplies for impoverished mothers in Surat, a metropolitan city in the Indian state of Gujarat.

Lauren Wallace, 16, traveled to India as part of the Rotary Youth Exchange program in July, and took the opportunity to continue her community and charity work that she has enjoyed since she was a small girl, she said during a recent email interview.

Wallace's host grandmother invited her to an event called Mother Milk Donation at an Indian rotary club, where women donated breast milk to feed babies whose mothers have died or are too ill to feed them.

"The reason is that in India, there are many babies who are put in the hospitals because their mothers are ill or have passed

away, so the babies aren't being fed. These women come to this donation, sacrificing food for their own children, so their breast milk can be donated and sent to be pasteurized and used to keep motherless babies alive," Wallace said.

In return for their donation, the women get a bag with some food and other items for their own children, added Wallace.

According to Wallace, approximately 125 women came to the most recent Mother Milk event; of that number, she estimated that 70 percent were women who had little money.

"I saw a lot of babies in tattered clothing and blankets that look like they've been chewed on by a dog. Seeing that made me sad, made me think in the cold of the night these little babies don't have much to keep warm," she wrote.

Wallace described holding a baby at the event who was 4 months old, and yet weighed only 2 pounds.

"A home delivery, no doctor, no clothes, extremely premature and the only cloth covering her tiny body was probably 9 inches long. I held her and I just wanted to cry. Eventually I had to give her back to her mom. She was so weak and fragile. I thought maybe I can convince people to fundraiser something," she wrote.

Wallace hopes to raise enough money to purchase 150 baby blankets in India, with any leftover funds used to purchase socks and the "special protein" that mothers feed their babies in India.

She added that items such as blankets and formula are much cheaper in India than in the United States, so she could purchase more items in India with the donated money.

Initially, Wallace and her father, Jeff, planned to purchase the blankets in Oswego and mail them to India.

Those plans changed when the pair realized that the cost of shipping the blankets to India could cost approximately half of the amount raised, and that the blankets would take two weeks to arrive in India, according to Wallace.

Instead, they decided to have people donate money so that she could purchase the blankets in India.

People can donate by sending checks to The Sunrise Rotary Club, PO Box 42, Oswego, with the checks made out to the Sunrise Rotary Club. Donors are asked to mark checks as "Lauren Wallace India Mother's Milk Donation."

Donations can also be made on Facebook. People looking to donate can go to the "Oswego Sunrise Rotary Club" Facebook page, and click on the photo of Wallace on the right side of the page, titled "Lauren Wallace 'Give."

Clicking on the photo will send donors to a description of Wallace's project, at the bottom of which is a button named "Donate." People can then click on the button, which will take them to a PayPal page, where they can make their donation.

According to Wallace, the next Mother Milk Donation will occur on March 9 and 10.






