## Updates/History of Briefing:

During Town Council deliberations for briefing item 2012-027 supporting the Wake County Transit Plan and Interlocal Agreement (ILA), Council directed staff to prepare a letter to the Wake County Commissioners urging them to place the one-half (½) cent sales tax on the November 2012 ballot and to make the decision in a timely manner allowing adequate time for public education. [Reference 2012-027]

#### **Executive Summary and Background Information:**

The Wake County Transit Plan is an implementation plan for a package of comprehensive transit improvements in the Triangle. The Plan is a combination of recommendations for commuter rail, light rail and enhanced bus services that could be implemented should the Wake County Board of Commissioners choose to place a sales tax referendum on next fall's ballot, and Wake County voters support said referendum. The goal of the Wake County Transit Plan is to connect all municipalities, city centers, employment centers, universities, and the airport.

#### The Plan consists of:

Core Services: Can be implemented with local funds (if the Wake County ½-cent sales tax is approved)

- Enhanced bus service: 2013-2017
  - New routes to unserved and underserved areas, circulators, premium transit corridors
  - Capital improvements, maintenance and operations costs
  - Essentially doubles service hours in the first five years (an additional 322,740 hours) 0
  - New routes in Morrisville serve key destinations like Grace Park, Bethany Village, Park 0 West Village, and Town Hall Drive neighborhoods and campus, and connects residents to Carpenter Village, Raleigh-Durham Airport (RDU), the West Regional library and the Cary Depot
- Commuter rail: 2019-2020
  - Greenfield Parkway in Garner to Triangle Metro Center in RTP 0
  - 9 stations (including one at McCrimmon and NC 54 in Morrisville) 0

o Services every 30 minutes peak and 60 minutes off-peak

Enhanced Services: Can be implemented with federal and state financial participation

- Enhanced bus service (same as Core Service Plan)
- Commuter Rail (same as Core Service Plan)
- Light rail: 2022-2035
  - o First phase: Downtown Cary to Millbrook Road
  - o Second/Third Phases: Downtown Cary to NW Cary/Milbrook to NE Regional Center

The implementation schedule for the Transit Plan is based on the assumption of a November 2012 referendum, which would allow voters to approve a one-half cent sales tax to pay for the Plan elements. The Regional Transportation Alliance (RTA) and various Wake County Chambers of Commerce will be working together to educate the public on the Plan components, financial assumptions, and financial impacts to voters should the referendum pass. Ideally these agencies would be allowed several months for public education; therefore the Morrisville Town Council has directed staff to prepare a letter to the Wake County Commissioners urging them to place the sales tax on the referendum and to declare this intention as soon as possible to allow time for public education.

#### Staff Recommendation:

Staff recommends approval of RES 2012-056, which authorizes and directs the Mayor to sign, on behalf of the Town Council, a letter to the Wake County Commissioners (as seen in ATTH 01) urging them to place the one-half cent transit sales tax on the November 2012 ballot and to make this decision in a timely manner to allow adequate time for public education.

## RESOLUTION 2011-056 PERTAINING TO A LETTER TO THE WAKE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS SUPPORTING A NOVEMBER 2012 TRANSIT TAX REFERENDUM

**WHEREAS,** in 2009, the region's two transportation planning organizations (Capital Area MPO and Durham, Chapel Hill, Carrboro MPO) completed work on the joint 2035 Long Range Transportation Plan which included increased bus and rail services for an ever increasing population; and

**WHEREAS,** the NC General Assembly authorized counties in the Triad and Triangle to hold a voter referendum on a one-half (½) cent sales tax for transit to pay for additional transit services identified in the 2035 Long Range Transportation Plans; and

**WHEREAS,** Wake County has released a draft Transit Plan, which includes a Core Service Plan that can be implemented with regional funding if the ½ cent sales tax is approved. The Core Service Plan includes enhanced bus service and commuter rail from Greenfield Parkway in Garner to Triangle Metro Center in RTP; and

**WHEREAS,** the Town recognizes the continuing growth of the region and sees the need for an enhanced transit system including commuter rail, light rail and bus services; and

**WHEREAS,** a number of Morrisville residents have participated in the regional transit public workshops and Town Transit Forum and flash polling activities held over the last eighteen months, and have submitted public comments expressing their desires for additional transportation options, with an emphasis on enhanced bus services in the Town; and

WHEREAS, public education is an important component for the half-cent sales tax referendum, and organizations such as Regional Transportation Alliance (RTA) and local Chambers of Commerce are ready to begin these efforts:

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT THE MORRISVILLE TOWN COUNCIL** hereby authorizes and directs the Mayor to sign, on behalf of the Town Council, a letter to the Wake County Commissioners, as seen in ATTH 01, urging them to place the one-half cent transit sales tax on the November 2012 ballot and to make this decision in a timely manner to allow adequate time for public education.

Dear Wake County Commissioners:

Thank you for the work that has been done to date to plan for expanded transit service in Wake County, as embodied in the draft *Wake County Transit Plan*. We believe this is an essential investment in protecting the economic success and quality of life in Wake County as it adds another 600,000 residents by 2035. We ask that you now take the next step and put the plan to the voters this fall to decide whether to support a  $\frac{1}{2}$  -cent sales tax to fund new bus and rail service to serve Morrisville and communities throughout the county.

Based on our conversations with residents, business leaders, and other community stakeholders, traffic congestion is the number one issue in Morrisville. We have more than 20,000 residents and 14,000 employees who live or work in our community, and thousands more people who pass through our town limits each day to travel to Research Triangle Park, Raleigh-Durham International Airport, and other destinations. Yet currently, we have a total of one bus stop.

Increasingly, we hear from residents who can't get to work in a timely or affordable way, businesses that can't attract and retain employees because of transportation issues, and stakeholders throughout the community who are tired of being stuck in traffic. We can't afford to wait to provide more transportation choices to the community we serve. Our need is now.

Please put the *Wake County Transit Plan* to the voters in November to decide whether to fund the  $\frac{1}{2}$  -cent sales tax for transit. Thank you!
