The meeting was called to order by Rita Reandeau, chair, at 9:38 a.m. It was determined a quorum was present.

Minutes – February 4, 2011 & February 17, 2011 Meetings

Pat Clothier moved to approve the February 4, 2011 and February 17, 2011, Board meeting minutes. Nita Kamphuis seconded the motion. It was voted on and approved.

Board Finance Committee

The Board Finance Committee met this morning. The House, Senate, and Governor have submitted their budgets. More information will be shared as it is received. Also, once the March budget information has been received the Leadership Team determine whether we are financially able to add back furlough days in June.

Good News!

• Safety Net application has been submitted.

• DVR (Division of Vocational Rehabilitation) has agreed to help fund WSD's Post High School Program. They will be giving \$100,000 to bring this program back in the fall. Thanks to DVR for this wonderful gift!

The Kastel building project included a ground source heat pump which required extraction and injection wells. Eighteen months after the project was accepted the well system stopped working. Emergency funding was requested and approved by the Director of General Administration. The cost of digging new wells is approximately \$264,000. The courtyard project has been put on hold and the remaining monies from the 2009-11 Minor Public Works allotment will be used to partially cover the cost of new wells. The remaining monies will come from the 2011-13 Minor Public Works allotment.

Arts Commission: \$25,000 was set aside for artwork in the new academic building. Due to budgetary cuts throughout the state the Arts Commission may be dissolved. If this agency is closed what happens to the money that was set aside? The Director keep the Board updated as information is received.

The auditorium remodel funding has been re-appropriated to the next biennium which begins July 1, 2011. The design process is completed but additional asbestos issues were identified during a recent inspection.

Legislative Update (Larry Swift, Board member)

Our mission is to serve deaf and hard of hearing children throughout the state and it is the job of the Board to make sure that adequate funding is available to provide support for deaf and hard of hearing children to receive a quality education. The Board must focus their attention on a five year plan which outlines how to best serve deaf and hard of hearing children through partnerships with school districts, other agencies and organizations around the state.

At a future meeting, the Board members will revisit and redefine their role as it relates to connection with parents of deaf, deaf-blind, and hard of hearing children who reside in their district.

Math Competition (Stowe Beecher, WSD Teacher of the Deaf)

Four WSD students (Melissa Bascom, Jeremy Descloux, Miguel Peregrino, Randall Smith), along with math teacher Stowe Beecher, participated in the RIT-NTID Math Competition which was held April 8-10th in Rochester, New York. NTID (National Technical Institute for the Deaf) provided funding to send our students to the competition. What a great experience it was for all!

Bullying Awareness Week (Jason Cox, WSD School Counselor)

The week of April 18-22 is Bullying Awareness Week at WSD. Each day students and staff will wear different colors:

- Monday: Purple (respect)
- Tuesday: Yellow (support)
- Wednesday: Red (loyalty)

- Thursday: Pink (commitment to stop bullying)
- Friday: Any color

Several WSD students created a short video on bullying which was shared with the Board. The video will be shown during the week at various locations throughout campus.

All students and staff will be given a pink bracelet to wear during Bullying Awareness Week that says "Promise to STOP Bullying".

East-West USA Deaf Basketball tournament

Ron Spratlen, Athletic Director and Olivia Mackey, WSD senior, attended the East-West USA Deaf Basketball tournament held March 30-April 2nd in Bloomington, Minnesota. Olivia played for the West girl's team and was chosen co-MVP. Ron served as one of the two coaches for the West girl's team which won 65-53. Congratulations Ron and Olivia!

They reviewed behavioral information, toured facilities, and interviewed parents, students, and stakeholders. The exit meeting on April 14th was very positive. Several are planning to apply to the post high school program; others will attend community college and four year university programs. Seniors will be honored at the Superintendent's dinner 6/7.

<u>Workforce Internships:</u> Nick Ortiz and Olivia Mackey are part of the ESD 112 Youth Workforce. Olivia was recently interviewed by LSW Architectural firm and offered an internship that began May 24th. Placement is still being sought for Nick Ortiz in the HVAC industry. The Youth Workforce program offers 90 hour internship with a stipend.

<u>Prom</u>: High school students and staff experienced a night of magic at the 2011 prom May 12th. The junior class, led by sponsors Chris Fertig and John Thuahnai, did a wonderful job of planning, decorating, and hosting the event. The Water Resources Center on the Columbia River was a perfect venue; the weather cooperated, and the

prom attendees were decked out in their finest "black and white" attire. Highlights of the evening included the crowning of the King Nick Ortiz and Queen Vanessa Flores and a runway modeling competition.

<u>Summer Camp</u>: WSD is planning a summer camp for middle school deaf and hard of hearing students July 24 – 30. It will have a "water" theme, and will include day trips to Multnomah Falls, Tryon Creek and Mt. St Helens. Registration is limited to the first 56 students. A special feature of the week is "parent camp." Parents of campers are invited to come to WSD Friday afternoon to participate in parent support activities that evening and the following morning. Camp will conclude with a barbeque Saturday. Ron Spratlen and April McArthur are camp co-leaders.

<u>Special Speakers</u>: Our Washington Reading Corps (WRC) tutors, Caitlin Williams and Julie Mason, arranged for several special presentations second semester.

- Jonathan Hill, a graphic novel illustrator, came to talk to the student body about storytelling through illustration. He held an art auction to benefit WSD, which brought in \$850 and other in-kind donations after the Columbian did a feature on WSD and graphic novels.
- Austin Welborn, a young Deaf man with a master's in micro-engineering, works at Sandia National Laboratories in New Mexico. He held an "Engineering Day" where students were able to get hands-on with different construction and engineering activities, one of which was a large bridge building competition using only Popsicle sticks to support heavy weights.
- Colleen Houck, author of <u>The Tiger's Curse</u>, spoke to students about her experience writing the book and getting it published, and about the upcoming release of the second in the five book "Tiger" series. She is an American Sign Language interpreter currently residing in Salem, Oregon.
- Catherine Anthony, a Deaf apparel designer at Nike in Beaverton, brought various clothing she had designed herself, including a pair of BMX pants from the Olympics. She showed students the process of designing clothes, from concept sketches to measuring each other to product visualization.

<u>Special Olympics</u>: Our Terriers took first place at Regional's in May. With the first place finish we now advance to the State Tournament June 3-5 at Fort Lewis in Tacoma. Great games were played by Maria Preciado., Tanner Stinson, Ashley Medlock, Antonio Guijarro, Jeremy Descloux, Enrique Rodriguez, Cesar Sanchez, Patrick Saturay, Anna Fish and Keysi Severino. The Terriers won the first game 7-0 and the second game 4-2. Congratulations to a great group of athletes, and good luck at State!

<u>All Star Day</u>: May 26 parents were invited to spend the day with their students in classes and attending awards programs. The elementary department had their awards program in the afternoon, followed by a literacy activity for families. The senior class sponsored a carnival after school. Parents were invited to have dinner in Kastel, and then the secondary department awards were presented that evening.

<u>Lions' Club Presentations</u>: The Superintendent has made presentations to two Vancouver area Lions' Club in April and May. The Sunrise club presented WSD with a check for \$750. The money will be used to purchase industrial strength blenders for each of the cottages and materials for the library.

<u>Behavior Group</u>: A team of 9 people is reviewing various behavior programs/strategies in preparation for establishing a consistent school wide approach to student behavior. The team consists of: Alfred Malone, elementary teacher; Piper Gallucci and John Thuahnai, secondary teachers; Jason Cox, counselor; Carole Kaulitz, SLP and behavioral supports; Nancy Sinkovitz, Bill Newell, Donna Sorensen and Jane Mulholland, administrators. <u>Post High School Program</u>: Thanks to a grant from Department of Vocational Rehabilitation, the Post High School Program (PHS) is being reopened this fall. We will be able to serve 10 students. Dan Crady will continue to lead the PHS program with support from job coaches and the PHS committee. We are grateful to DVR for it's support and very excited to be resuming this important program.

<u>See What I'm Saying</u>: WSD sponsored a special viewing of the ASL movie, "See What I'm Saying," at Skyview H.S. in April. Proceeds from this and other special events go to the Deaf Artist Series, which is designed to bring cultural events for the Deaf Community to WSD and the Vancouver area.

础 Who are we?

- TPS has long-standing history of providing services to Deaf and Hard of Hearing students
- TPS wants to sustain services to this population and continue through a Collaborative Governance Model
 - Listening and Spoken Language (LSL) Preschool
 - ASL Preschool and Self-Contained Program Preschool to age 21
 - Itinerant Support Services for Hearing Impaired Students outside of the Self-Contained Program; supporting attendance and the student's home school

Tacoma & CDHL (continued)

- TPS Program seemed somewhat fragmented in defining service delivery and staff could not clearly define what the Deaf/HH program was or wasn't
- Adding LSL Preschool and Itinerant Services brought the fragmentation to the service; administration and staff recognized the need to move to a more cohesive model
- Support from CDHL essential in helping administration and staff implement program change yet continue to support students and families already being served in the self-contained program.
