Parents, please be certain to have your child(ren) stay home if they are throwing up or have a fever. No medications, cough drops, sunblock, etc. will be administered unless the form is complete and on file. Dr. Joyce Epstein, Director for the Center for School, Family, and Community Partnerships at Johns Hopkins University, identifies six types of parent involvement schools should consider:

- **Parenting** helping families create home environments that encourage children to be successful students (parent workshops, lending libraries)
- **Communicating** implementing effective ways to communicate with parents about a child's progress and general school information (newsletters, report cards, conferences)
- **Volunteering** recruiting and organizing parent volunteers in school settings
- Learning At Home providing parents with information and ideas for helping children with curriculum-related activities at home (parent handbooks, curriculum information, suggested home activities)
- **Decision Making** including parents in school decisions (school improvement teams, parent-teacher associations, individual educational planning team meetings)
- Collaborating with Community identifying resources and services from the

community to strengthen both school and family practices (counseling services, referral to community agencies)

2nd Grade News

The second graders have been very busy during the month of November. After reading about communities in our Social Studies book, the second grade decided to take on the task of building a replica of our community of Schroon Lake. Here is what we did:

First, we collected all sorts of boxes for the buildings, from cereal boxes for larger buildings to pop-tart boxes for smaller buildings. Then, with the help of Ms. Rosecrans, we were able to wrap the buildings in construction paper that matched their real color and we began adding lots of details to the buildings, like windows, doors, porches, railings etc. We used construction paper for some details and we colored other details onto the buildings. Next, Mr. Jenks helped us move a cafeteria table into our classroom to use as a base for our community. Mrs. Rose helped wrap the table in black paper for the blacktop roads. Mrs. Tyrrell helped us paint the sidewalks and Mrs. Shaughnessy added the yellow lines on the main road, and the cross walks. As we finished a building we placed it in the correct location in our community. It wasn't long before our community was really beginning to look like Schroon Lake. Once all the buildings were completed, our classroom helper, Mrs. Durkee, helped us write about each building and what goes on inside the building. Then, we moved the cafeteria table into the hallway and taped our buildings down. Some final touches were added to our community like trees, and lamp posts and matchbox cars. So far everyone has really enjoyed viewing our replica of Schroon Lake. It will remain on display for parent teacher conferences. A big thank you to all the people that helped us through this project!

3rd Grade Rocks

The 3rd Grade had a wonderful November. We finished up our study of North America with the country Mexico. The class explored the land, animals, and culture of the people there. We learned some Spanish with the help from our aide, Mrs. Tyrrell. The students made clay people to simulate the clothing that is worn in their hot climate. We also looked at the rock that Mexico is famous for, the geode. Geodes are gas bubbles that formed underneath volcanoes there. There are mined by heavy machinery and then sent all over the world for people to sell. They are then cut by diamond bladed saws and polished. People use them for decorations in their homes. The class looked at many different ones to realize that no two geodes are alike and you can't tell what is inside of them until you cut them open. The inside depends on how much heat and pressure it got and what minerals were in the water where the geode formed. Mexico was a fun place to study.

Our new adventure led us to the continent of South America where we studied Brazil. We ventured deep into the largest rain forest in the world to see the many layers that make it up. Spin took us to see the interesting plants and animals that live in the different layers. We explored the second largest river in the world, the Amazon River. It winds its way through Brazil and neighboring counties. It is a major source of transportation and water for the people and animals that live there. We learned that many valuable things that we use everyday come form the rain forest. Medicines, spices, cocoa, coffee, fruits, and nuts are only a few materials that are exported all over the world from the rain forest of South America. We also looked at three main minerals that come from Brazil. Amethyst, the February birthstone, is found in Brazil and is used in purple jewelry and decorations all over the world. Citrine is shade of brown to orange and is also a member of the quartz family. Brazilian agate is a banded colored mineral that is carved into figurines and wind chimes. Brazil had a lot of unique surprises waiting to be discovered.

In math we continue our exploration of multiplication and will be using our facts to solve problems. Please practice multiplication facts at home that include, 0,1,2,3,4,5,10, and 11. We will continue learning more facts, see how they are used in real life, and see how they relate to division.

Our reading this month centered around our study of the five classes of vertebrates; mammals, birds, fish, amphibians, and reptiles. We explored these animals as we traveled around North and South America. The students used reading strategies to find information in the text and writing skills to answer questions. We will continue to work on these skills in December, the parts of speech, and our vocabulary development. The class also sent our pen pals turkeys this month to wish them a Happy Thanksgiving.

I am sending home a reading incentive from Great Escape that will allow your child to earn one free ticket to the park for reading 6 hours between now and February break.
