### THEATRE PRODUCTION CLASS FOR 2011-2012, INFORMATION AND REQUIREMENTS

The new theatre production class is a new class designed for students who plan to participate in the fall play and or one act play as actors or technicians. Those students who have participated in at least one play at Industrial High School will be enrolled into the class with out auditioning.

To be cast in any Industrial Theatre production a student MUST be enrolled in the theatre production class, which will be during the school day.

Those students who have never been in a theatre production at I.H.S. will have to audition before they will be enrolled in the theatre production class. Students will auditions with two contrasting monologues (one comedy and one serious). The monologues will be provided by Mr. Doggett. The last day for auditions will be Thursday, June 3, 2011. 8<sup>th</sup> grade students who have not been in the Jr. High Theatre class will audition during 2<sup>nd</sup> period on the Jr. High stage, let Mr. Doggett know what day you plan to audition.

There will be additional theatre production rehearsals outside of the school day that any student accepted into the theatre production class must attend. There will be some flexibility in the fall and very little during the spring one act play season. Rehearsal times outside of the school day during the fall will be announced at a later time but rehearsals for the one act play in the spring will be from 5:30 to 7:00 PM Monday through Thursday.

# **Theatre Production Grading Policy**

## **NOTIFICATION:**

Students who cannot attend a performance or outside of school rehearsal MUST notify the director in advance. Students or parents my phone the director at school (361-284-3226 ext. 1222) at home (361-676-6100) or email (mdoggett@iisd1.org) The director will make the determination if the absence is "excused" or "unexcused" based on the nature of the absence. Work or lack of transportation cannot be considered a legitimate excuse for absence. In most cases the only accepted excuses for a performance (major grade) will be death or sickness.

## DAILY WORK: 40%

The daily grade is the cumulative class participation grade. The student will receive a grade of 100% each day provided he/she is in class on time and prepared. The student must follow all rehearsal guidelines. The student must participate the full class period.

**TARDY:** Tardiness will result in a 70% grade for the day (out of school rehearsal). A student is tardy if they are not in the warm up circle at 5:30 PM. **EXCUSED TARDY:** An excused tardy (special circumstances worked out between student and director in advance or between teachers) will NOT result in the lowering of the daily participation grade.

**UNEXCUSED ABSENCE:** An unexcused absence from outside of school rehearsal will be recorded as a zero until a signed note or email from the parents is received. Unexcused absence grades cannot be made up.

## MAJOR WORK: 60%

All performances, clinics, tech and dress rehearsals one week prior to first performance.

**EXCUSED ABSENCE:** Any absence from any public performance, clinic or final rehearsal will result in a zero, unless arrangements are made between the student and director. At that point, a zero will be given until make up work and parent's signed note is turned in.

**MAKE UPWORK:** Make up work is for excused absences only. Make up work is posted on the theatre website or from the director. Make up work is due one week after the absence, a grade of zero will be recorded at the time of the absence and replace when all note and make up work is turn in. **UNEXCUSED ABSENCE:** Any unexcused absence from a public performance, clinic or final rehearsal will result in a zero. Unexcused absences cannot be made up.

## MAKE UP WORK FOR EXCUSED MAJOR GRADE ABSENCE:

Write a 3 page typewritten paper on one of the listed people below for each excused absence. In this paper, include a biographical sketch (birth date, early life, education, family relationships, location of residences, death etc.), current events of the time of the person, major works and influences. <u>THE</u> PAPER NEEDS TO BE SINGLE SPACED, SIZE 12 FONT AND ONE INCH MARGINS ON ALL SIDES. Other topics may be arranged with director approval.
