**Title:** *Effectiveness of Support Groups for Caregivers of Individuals with Alzheimer's disease: Using an Evidence Based Approach.* 

**Abstract:** According to the Alzheimer's Association, there are 5.3 million people living with Alzheimer's disease and 10.9 milling people are informal caregivers to these individuals (Alzheimer's Association, 2010). The time and energy spent on taking care of another individual can cause high levels of physical and mental stress. This poster aims to report on how effective support groups are for caregivers using an evidence-based approach. In the social work profession, it is important to use evidence-based interventions in order to yield the intended results. The evidence based approach includes questioning, searching, analyzing and applying and evaluating. Using this approach, the author found that caregiver support groups are effective. Specifically, the evidence shows that support groups improve the quality of life and well-being of the caregiver.

**Title**: *Enhancing the Understanding of Complicated Grief in Older Adults:* Symptoms, Risk Factors and Intervention Options

**Abstract:** Complicated Grief is a recently defined condition estimated to affect 10% of the bereaved population age 65 and over. Complicated grief is associated with adverse physical and mental health outcomes and includes symptoms similar to those for depression and posttraumatic stress disorder (German, et al, 2006). Complicated grief is also associated with substantial decrements in quality of life, and that bereavement occurs most often when health and adaptive capacities may already be compromised (Chen, Gill & Prigerson, 2005). This presentation provides practitioners with information about risk factors and symptoms for complicated grief and describes recommended intervention options.

**Abstract:** The purpose of this presentation is to provide an overview of the Adult Day Program Social Model at St. Mary's. Through, MCOFA block grant funding and Medicaid, this program provides services for residents 55 years and older that quality exclusively in zip codes 14601, 14608, 14611, and 14621. This unique model provides protection from social isolation and provides meaningfulness in the lives of vulnerable Rochester residents. Through social interaction with peers and staff, St. Mary's provides a safe environment for elders to engage in meaningful daily activities.


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
