Information about the success of our programs comes from a wide variety of student assessments. These assessments are based on clear expectations for all learners, consistent with those described in *The Ontario Curriculum*. The primary purpose of student assessment is to improve learning. Assessment has the greatest potential to improve learning when it is an integral part of classroom activities. Teachers assess student progress towards achieving the expectations on an ongoing basis by using strategies such as projects, class presentations, homework assignments, classroom observations, portfolios of student work, and tests.

Schools use assessment information and information from other sources to make informed decisions for school improvement planning. Schools identify areas of strength as well as areas that require improvement. Input is obtained from a variety of sources such as student assessments, teacher feedback, parent feedback, and community surveys. In this way, schools monitor, celebrate and improve their efforts in providing a supportive and challenging learning environment for all their students.

# WHAT OUR SCHOOL IS PLANNING FOR THIS YEAR

We have developed the following strategic plan for our school based on the feedback from parents, teachers, students, assessments and the local community.

## LITERACY:

promote early literacy programs in Senior Kindergarten and Grade 1 update and involve parents in the language program through ongoing communication and review at parent/teacher conferences ensure that the Learning Resource Centre is available to all students on a regular basis for research, writing and reading support encourage parents to read to students at home and encourage students to take home books implement a variety of assessment techniques maintain a 'book room' in both languages for access to all teachers

# NUMERACY:

- ensure that all strands of the mathematics curriculum are adequately taught develop a 'math. room, with current resources and manipulatives
- encourage the use of manipulatives in classrooms
- use a variety of methods, including mathematics journals, to teach children to use more precise language to fully explain reasoning when problem solving


