dvent. The season of "Peace." But, what kind of peace? As I write this, Israel and Gaza are locked in conflict. Syria continues to be a war zone. Iran's nuclear belligerence is as provocative as ever. It is hard to recall a more unstable period in the land of Jesus' birth - and that's saying something.

As we prepare to celebrate the birth of "The Prince of Peace," I want to offer the following:

The theologian and author, Frederick Buechner, in his book, *Listening to Your Life* (Harper, San Francisco, 1992), speaks these words to our souls: "It may not be the answer that we want - the kind of stopgap peace, the kind of easy security, the kind of end to loneliness that we are apt to pray for. Christ never promises peace in the sense of no more struggle and suffering. Instead, he helps us to struggle and suffer as he did, in love, for one another. Christ does not give us security in the sense of something in this world, some cause, some principle, some value, which is forever. Instead, he tells us that there is nothing in this world that is forever, all flesh is grass. He does not promise us unlonely lives. His own life speaks loud of how, in a world where there is little love, love is always lonely. Instead of all these, the answer that he gives, I think, is himself. If we go to him for anything else, he may send us away empty or he may not. But if we go to him for himself, I believe that we go away always with this deepest of all our hungers filled."

Note from the Associate Pastor

Dwight's Nonpartisan and (Hopefully) Reformed Guide to Election Year 2012 Part 12. Now the Real Work Begins

W ell, it's all over but the hard part.

Over the past eleven months, I've tried to make the case for informed involvement in the political process, arguing that it's part of our calling as Christians and of our heritage as Reformed, Presbyterian Christians to do so. Now, with 2012 election settled, we get down to our true business as informed, faithful citizens: no longer just supporting candidates or being involved in elections, but paying attention to policy decisions, advocating for policies that are consistent with our understanding of God's justice, and making our voices heard when elected leaders fail to live up to their callings.

In Romans 13, Paul writes, "Let every person be subject to the governing authorities; for there is no authority except from God, and those authorities that exist have been instituted by God." In our Presbyterian Book of Confessions, we read, "Magistracy of every kind is instituted by God himself for the peace and tranquility of the human race, and thus it should have the chief place in the world" (Second Helvetic Confession). We can argue about the specific claims in these statements, but the general principle is clear: Governments, and what they do, matter to God—so they ought to matter to us, too.

Session Notes — November



Trinity Elders met November 13, 2012 and enjoyed a joint pot luck dinner me

Minutes of the Stated Meeting of October 9, 2012 were approved.

Dick Bobb came to Session from the Finance Ministry to distribute a 2013 budget worksheet to each Ministry. The completed 2013 budget worksheets should be returned to the Treasurer by November 26, 2013.

Finance Report: Total income for October was \$41.3K versus Budget of \$58.7K, and Pledge Income was under budget by \$18.6K. This represents the largest monthly shortfall recorded this year and brings YTD Pledge Income to 98.1% of Budget. YTD Total Income is \$460.8K versus Budget of \$461.6K or 99.8% of budget. Total Expenses YTD continue to run below budget, \$442.9K versus \$462.4K. Favorable expense variances continue in Building and Grounds, Personnel, Wonderful Wednesday program and Witness and Evangelism. Thanks to better than budgeted Yard Sale results and strong scholarship support, Trinity Preschool is now slightly under budgeted support level YTD.

Motion from Finance Ministry was made and approved that the Elevator Dedicated Fund be closed and the balance of \$2,000 be transferred to the Long Range Maintenance Account.

The Revised Finance Charter was approved.

Session approved the Finance Ministry's motion that both Global Ministry and Local Mission Ministry be authorized to overrun their 2012 budget by \$1,000. A donation of \$2,000 has been given to Trinity with the direction that it is to be in excess of the currently budgeted expenditures.

- Ministry/Committee Support: Christian Nurture Ministry, Fellowship Ministry, Local Missions Ministry, Trinity Preschool Advisory Board, Visioning Task Force/Bible and Theology Subgroup, Advent Committee.

- Other: PW Bible study planning session, November 5; Co-led (with *Carol Steele*) a retreat for participants in the Presbyterian Student Association of Clemson University, October 26—27 at Montreat.

Session approval was given to allow Trinity members who choose to participate to provide Christmas gifts to several of the Black Mountain Home for Children and Youth.

Unfinished Business:

Consecration Sunday Update: On Consecration Sunday 116 giving units were received of which 69 increased financial commitment. Stewardship expects to receive additional Estimates of Giving (have already received 25 more cards since Consecration Sunday). The best estimate is that Trinity will receive \$457,000 (only received \$409,000 in 2012 – an increase of \$48,000.)

Session approved an overrun of \$300 for Stewardship Ministry for 2012. (there was no budget for this ministry in 2012). Most of the Stewardship expenses including the brunch and the luncheon were donated.

Trinity Memorial Garden

In the mid-1980's, Session appointed a committee to explore the possibility of establishing a Memorial Garden at Trinity. A plan was submitted that would place the garden in the wooded area on the north side of the church opposite the education wing. The plan was approved and in 1986 the garden was built. It includes a six foot diameter Sacred Circle, where ashes of members who had passed away could be interred. On the north side of the circle, a flower garden was built, that holds a plaque containing the names of those interred in the Circle.

In 2007, the original flower garden was replaced by a granite garden and two additional plaques. A new interment area was built in the new garden. Since 1986, the ashes of 75 church members have been interred in the Sacred Circle and the new interment area. The cost for interment in these areas is \$300.00.

In 1997, a study was approved by Session on the feasibility of building a Columbarium Wall in the Memorial Garden. The study showed that there was indeed an interest in building a wall by commitment of 22 church members. In 1998, Session approved building the Columbarium Wall in the Memorial Garden. The site chosen was on the south side of the Sacred Circle. The Columbarium consists of 68 niches, 28 in the center section and 20 niches in each of the side sections.

The niches will hold two burial urns or cremains. A niche for two cremains sells for \$900. A niche as a single, sells for \$600. As of October 31, 2012, 63 of the niches have been sold. 61 church members have been interred in the Columbarium. The name or names of those interred in a niche are engraved in the granite cover plate of that niche.

Since we have only 5 niches left to be sold, bids have been solicited to build two additional walls of 21 niches each to be added to the original Columbarium.

- Session approved a motion that *Russ Russell, Jim Norris, Ron Dalrymple, Bob Baker, Marian Lowry* and *Mark Stanley* meet to develop policies to supplement the Building Use Coordinator for Trinity Presbyterian Church and recommend who will be the Liaison to the Session for the Building Use Coordinator. An amendment added that it is understood that this person does not need to be a member of the

Session.

- Session endorsed *Leah Epps* for her application to Columbia Seminary in Decatur, GA.

- Elder *Harriet Bechtel* is on a three month leave of absence due to health problems.

- Interfaith Ministerial Association and United Religions Initiative received permission to use the sanctuary on December 31, 2012 at 6:30 p.m. for a program – "Visions of Transformation and Healing for the World".

Ministry Reports:

- Local Missions presented the Mission Statement for LEEP which was approved.

LEEP (Learning Enrichment Enhancement Program) Mission (11/7/12)

I. Trinity's Mission: "to minister to those in need, and to do all these things with joy, love, and compassion in the name of Christ the Lord."

II. Specific Goal: To enhance and enrich the education of some at-risk students in the community; to help them have academic success; and to graduate from high school.

III. Specific Measurable Results:

1. Coordinate with the students' parents to reach the students' teachers and to improve the parent/school relationship. (Kim)

2. School assigned homework is a priority.

3. Establish time and place for tutors to work with students. (Eleanor)

4. Summarize and prepare an annual report of results, as determined by the tutors. (Eleanor, Kim, Marian)

IV. Personnel and financial restraints:

1. No more than 12 students will be in the program for 2012-2013.

2. *Mike will prepare meals for six LEEP adults and 11 children.*

3. Eleanor Beardsley, or the church office, will receive calls by Monday morning from the parents if they, or their children, will not be present on a tutoring night

4. Kim Ball will work with the parents to seek support and information to develop a relationship with the students and the classroom teachers and between the parents and the school system.

5. *Kim will offer support for the parents who are unaware of community resources.*

6. Marian will work with the Local Missions Ministry as to how to fund the deficit incurred by the LEEP 'families' meals.

7. Eleanor, Kim, and Marian will report the number of hours donated by all involved adults, the number of tutored hours completed by students, the dollars spent to support these activities.

V. Annually decide if this activity should be expanded, curtailed or abandoned. Decide if the specific goal should be amended.

Building and Grounds: The pulpit and microphone cord were damaged while being moved after worship on November 4, 2012. The microphone cord has been repaired and the pulpit is undergoing repairs.

Session Meeting was closed with prayer at 8:47 p.m.
