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#### NATIONAL BUSINESS WOMEN'S WEEK

Women's leadership roles and the increase in their opportunities for advancement in the business world are worth celebrating and recognizing. October 22-26 is National Business Women's Week. NBWW gives communities, companies and organizations the chance to recognize the contributions of working women and companies owned and operated by females.

"I think it's great that there is a week that celebrates women's role and history in business," Carrie Rosenbalm, President of Gamma Phi Beta Sorority Alumna Board, said. "Women have played a significant role in this country's business industry, and it ought to be celebrated. It's also a great way to bring awareness to the inequalities that women still face in the work place such as lower pay for the same work and gender discrimination."

Emma Partridge, Executive Secretary of the National Federation of Business and Professional Woman's Clubs from 1924 to 1927, originated National Business Women's Week. Her goal was to "focus public attention upon a better business woman for a better business world." The first annual observance was held April 15-22, 1928. Since then, slowly, but surely, business have begun to recognize their female leaders.

"If a woman is direct and business oriented, she is often looked at as mean - where men are looked at as ambitious," Texas A&M-Commerce Student Nick Albritton said. "Society places more importance on the mothering role of a woman, instead of the professional one. Women deserve appreciation for being in the workplace and somehow navigating what I still consider 'a man's world'.

Each day of NBWW was devoted to something different. The week started off with Legislative Day, focusing on national, state and local legislation women; Education Day, dedicated to educational opportunities; Club Rally Day, for recruiting new members; Community Day, to honor leaders within the community; and last, but not least, Goodwill Day, devoted to women's organizations working together.

President Herbert Hoover was the first president to recognize NBWW and issued a letter, which moved the event to the third week in October.

"I feel that women have not been appreciated and celebrated properly for their accomplishments," Captain of the Lions Volleyball team Rachel Robertson said. "I think that being a woman has many more challenges than being a man. Society has made it harder for women to succeed than men. When a woman does something awesome or amazing it seems like it is a bigger deal than if a man did it. I don't know why women are seen as the underdogs. Fighting to get our rights was over in the 1920s, it is time for women to get the respect and recognition they deserve for our accomplishments."

## MIKE AND JEANENNE OGLESBY

Working to make Commerce beautiful has been one of Mike and Jeanenne Oglesby's goals for many years and still counting. Both alumni of Texas A&M-Commerce, they have pride in the school and hopes to see this town grow and continue to expand.

Mike was born in Commerce, interestingly enough in a hospital located where Oglesby Plaza now sits and the Sam Rayburn Student Center is situated on the site of his childhood home. "He graduated in '64 and spent two years in the Army," Jeanenne said. "I graduated in '66 and we married in '63. In fact, he was president of the student body when we got married, so I worked and he stayed in school and then I went back to school."

After they both graduated, they moved away for a while, living in the Rockwall area, and starting a family. After the death of their eldest son, at the age of 21, Mike decided to take up his father's trade, which was construction.

"He started development in '98 and it was complete in '99," Jeanenne said. "And then we started building homes. They were spec homes, but custom homes and there were a total of 11 houses. We bought the blueprints and he (Mike) was the general contractor. Recently, we drove through the area and we had been away long enough to really appreciate it. We were really proud. It looked better than we had remembered. Everyone had taken pride in their yard and it looked wonderful. We were pleased."

In Commerce, Mike and Jeanenne have about 35 rental units, which include houses, duplexes and apartments. After Mike's health started to fail, they decided living in Rockwall was too far to properly tend to their rental properties in Commerce.

"The rental properties brought us back to Commerce and Mike's health was failing so he couldn't do the driving back and forth from Rockwall," Jeanenne said. "It was just tiring. It's been very, very great to be this close. He needs a lot of assistance. It has been the best place for us to be this last year and a half. We've got doctors in Paris and doctors in Greenville. The only thing that would possibly motivate us to move is that this house is not real inductive to handicap."

All of the Oglesby rental properties are gone through and remodeled to their high standards. They would only rent out properties they would choose to live in themselves.

The building on Lee Street, next to the Baptist Student Ministries, holds a special place in the Oglesby's hearts. "We had an attachment to the building where College Corner Café was. When we were going to school, there was a restaurant there called Charquette and at that point, the student union, which was a wooden building, was right across the street," Jeanenne said. "I worked for the student union director and Mike was student body president so that's where we met. And the Charquette is where we would go have cokes and hamburgers. So, we watched that building for years and all the store front changes. And then it was abandoned. When it came up for sale, we knew we wanted it. It was more of an emotional thing than practical."

They purchased that building in spring 2010 and have had renovations and remodeling done. The upstairs of the building has five separate apartments and the downstairs is currently empty, but set up for a restaurant. They hope to get a restaurant up and running in there soon.

The Oglesbys are Chamber members and have been recognized for their efforts to improve Commerce's quality of living and appearance. Mike received a Builder Community Award in 2010.

"I am on the Foundation at Texas A&M," Jeanenne said. "Mike is on the Alumni Board and he received an award for partnership and all of the building he has done. The university has grown in size and enrollment terrifically. I think we had just under 3,000 students when we were in school. The school has had more press and certainly more people have heard about the campus."

This married couple has had many connections to the university and the community throughout the years. While they were students at the college, a women's organization on campus called the Tooanoowes, established the Gamma Zeta Chapter of Gamma Phi Beta Sorority on campus. Jeanenne was initiated into the organization soon after. "The Tooanoowes had just gone national the spring of '62, so I was in the second pledge class for Gamma Phi Beta in fall '62," she said. "It was a great experience."

The couple hopes to see the Commerce community progress and they plan to help as long as they can. "It's been very comfortable here," Jeanenne said. "We've enjoyed it and home is close to our rent properties."


#### HALLOWEEN ON THE SQUARE

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## A&M-COMMERCE DEAN LANGFORD STEPS DOWN, RETURNS TO FACULTY & ADMINISTRATIVE ASSIGNMENT

Dr. Hal Langford, dean of the College of Business and Entrepreneurship (CBE) since 2001, announced this week that he will step down from his post, effective September 19, 2012.

"As dean of the College of Business and Entrepreneurship, Dean Langford's work has touched virtually every student on campus." said university president, Dan Jones. "From the beginning, Dean Langford has been innovative, thought-provoking, and far-sighted. I'm grateful both for his service and for the fact he'll remain on our faculty to continue enriching the lives of our students."

Langford will return to a faculty position in the Department of Business Administration and MIS and will also serve as coordinator of recruiting and marketing for Texas A&M University-Commerce at Rockwall. He will begin by developing a marketing prospectus and will review and prepare curriculum for his upcoming teaching assignments.

The College of Business and Entrepreneurship is AACSB accredited, the highest level of accreditation for business schools. Only 25 percent of U.S. business schools achieve AACSB International accreditation, the hallmark of excellence in management education.

Under Langford's management, the CBE received several awards, including the AACSB Online MBA Rankings Best Affordable Accredited Online MBA Programs, Top Ranked Best Buy Masters Management/Administration, and the #5 Rank for Online MBA programs in US News & World Report.

"I've had mixed reactions to Dr. Langford's decision to step down from the deanship and return to the faculty" said Gary Peer, provost and vice president for academic affairs. "While his energy, creativity and good humor in the deanship and his forward thinking in the design and delivery of instruction will be difficult to replace, at best, his return to teaching will clearly be an asset to the College of Business and Entrepreneurship and, I trust, rewarding to him personally. I thank him for his many contributions and extend to him sincere best wishes in the years ahead."

Dr. Dale Funderburk, interim dean of the College of Business and Entrepreneurship will continue to serve in his current role until a permanent replacement for Dr. Langford has been identified.

#### RETIRED TEACHERS HOST LT. COLONEL GREG BARBER

During this time, he entered USAF Officer Training School, and after graduation, he completed Undergraduate Pilot Training at Reese AFB in Lubbock, Tx.

In 1988, Mr. Barber moved to Fairchild AFB to fly the B-52 for 6 years leading to a three-year stint as the bomber training manager at Langley AFB in Virginia. Then Mr. Barber's life took a complete turn. He relocated to Beale AFB and started flying the U-2 spy plane around the world. In 2004, Mr. Barber was chosen to work at the National Reconnaissance Office's Liaison to Headquarters US-European Command in Germany until he retired.

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# COOPER SELECTED FOR LEADERSHIP ACADEMY

Blake Cooper, Superintendent of Commerce ISD, has been selected to participate in the Lamar University Superintendent Academy, an advanced leadership training program on Lamar University's Beaumont campus. Cooper has received a scholarship to attend through The Center for Executive Leadership at Lamar.

According to its Executive Director Dr. Bob Thompson, participation in the Academy is by invitation only. The 22 superintendents in the 2012-2013 class were chosen from a list of approximately 75 nominees from Texas, Louisiana, and Oklahoma. To be selected is an honor not only to the superintendent, Thompson said, but also to his or her board and district. Without the support of forward-looking boards, no superintendent could have achieved the level of success and recognition necessary to be selected to the Academy, according to Thompson.

At the Academy, Cooper will review the latest technology for enhancing student learning, participate in advanced leadership training from some of the nation's foremost trainers of company executives, and get training in the Decision Support Center, a high tech laboratory for improving the speed and quality of management decision making. Cooper will also have an opportunity for field trips to visit other school districts to review practices that have helped make those districts be successful.

Thompson says the knowledge superintendents glean from work in the Academy is immediately applicable to any district, regardless of size or location. To assist districts in incorporating these management concepts, the Academy will host a three day Visioning session in the spring for Academy superintendents and their boards where they will be led through joint leadership training and planning activities. They will also meet with boards and superintendents from similar sized districts to share ideas for increasing student achievement and developing a vision for the future.

The year-long Academy is designed, Thompson says, to provide the most professional growth opportunities with the least amount of time away from the district.



The pantry, which is housed at the First Presbyterian Church, distributes non-perishable food items to needy families once a week at its location on Monroe Street. Families may apply to receive items to feed their families once a month.

Dr. James Norwood, a member of the Commerce Food Pantry board, says he has seen demand for help over the past 18 months increase from serving seven or eight families a week to approximately 30 families each week. Norwood said the pantry accepts donations of food or money through the church.

#### IPADS ABUNDANT AT COMMERCE HIGH SCHOOL

Every Commerce High School student will have an iPad 24/7 thanks to community support and a recent grant awarded to Commerce ISD. The devices, coupled with a strong technology infrastructure, set CHS on course for essentially unlimited potential in terms of internet and learning resources accessibility.

As a plan to bring more digital devices into school was formulated last spring, CISD administrators felt students would benefit most from owning their own device. To approach this goal, the Commerce Educational Enrichment Foundation pledged an initial amount of \$30,000 to reduce the iPad cost from \$379 to \$300. An additional effort to gain support from individuals in the community, called the I Give for IPad initiative, raised over \$6900, which included a \$2000 contribution from Cypress Bank.

After their initial purchase, parents with more than one child at CHS could purchase an additional iPad at half price. Parents were told students would have access to an alternate device if they did not want to take the opportunity to purchase one.

Sales for the iPads took place over the summer with an initial order placed for 113 devices. Guaranty Bond Bank helped by financing the iPads at a low interest rate over the school year without regard for credit history. Students not buying iPads during the summer were given another opportunity during the first week of school for the full price of \$359.75, which included insurance and sales tax. A total of 41 iPads were purchased during this offering.

Also during the summer, administrators applied for a Technology Lending Program Grant which would provide matching funds to purchase additional iPads. Through the \$50,000 grant, which administrators learned they received on August 31, and matching district funds, using the Instructional Materials Allotment, iPads will be available for every student at the high school who doesn't already have one.

Students will be able to use the district-owned iPads at home during the school year, but only applications used at school will be accessible. The district is purchasing over \$25,000 in apps (applications) for student use on the iPads.

"We are turning the page with our instruction this year. More teachers have been trained in electronic instruction and we expect that as the year progresses, we'll see more devices in the classroom. We truly believe this approach will increase our academic achievement," said Blake Cooper, Superintendent of Commerce schools.

"IPads will make learning more relevant and help our students be more "future ready" for life after high school," Cooper said.
