

NOW AND FOREVER

In last week's column I made sure to call special attention to the work of the Art & Environment Committee which so creatively and beautifully again this year made Holy Name Cathedral look spectacular during the Christmas season which too

quickly ends after this Epiphany Day. Donna Cizsewski is the chair of that most hard working group. Her two dependable partners always are Ron Birch and Darren Milanowicz along with the help of others over the years including Diane Nockels, her son Michael Fuchs, and those noted here last weekend. When I arrived at the Cathedral early in 2002, there was a professional decorator and her family/company that were responsible for the Christmas, Lent, Holy Week, and Easter decorations at Holy Name and other parishes who hired her. She did pretty work which was timely; a complaint, however, was voiced by interested parishioners whose volunteer assist was resisted by her in order to expedite the professional group's multi-church timetable. The liturgy director who arrived with me was Father Ron Kunkel. He brought the volunteers' problem to me, and we considered how to approach our hired friends. It was not necessary. The paid company sensed our uneasiness with the exclusion of parishioners and voluntarily resigned their relationship with Holy Name Cathedral after Holy Week, 2003. Mary Jane Rouchka had been the most energetic A & E volunteer and accepted the organizing responsibilities of the first completely volunteer committee pricing flowers, buying flowers and other decorations, scheduling the long nights that made each liturgical day look as it should, and recruiting other helpers. I was nervous before Christmas, 2003; but I had no need to be nervous. Cardinal George expressed his opinion that the Cathedral that season never looked better. The following Christmas, new chair Donna Cizsewski took over the duties with Pat Still and Ron Birch; they enlisted Darren Milanowicz. Pat eventually became a full-time staff member in charge of special events and liturgies; but she continued to work with A & E until her sad death just before Holy Week in 2011. Meanwhile, Donna, Darren, and Ron remain the core. They appreciate the hard work of the maintenance crew. And I appreciate them. In cooperation with many others, they have never given us a problem as they have contributed so much to the liturgy at our most beautiful Cathedral under the liturgical leadership of Father Ron Kunkel, Father Paul Stein, Father Matthew Compton, and now Father Brad Zamora. Again, in the name of all of us and in the Holy Name of Jesus, I thank Holy Name Cathedral's expert, dedicated, proud, and superlative Art & Environment Committee. They make us look good.

Jeremiah Kinsella died on January 6, 1875 – 140 years ago this Wednesday, over ten months before the building we pray in today was opened. Father Kinsella was the founding pastor of Holy Name Parish. Kinsella followed Chicago's first bishop William Quarter, from New York City and arrived here on May 29, 1844; he was ordained a priest by Bishop Quarter 39 days later. On November 29, 1844, Father Kinsella was appointed as the first President of the University of St. Mary of the Lake, a Catholic school of higher education chartered on December 19 - three weeks after Kinsella's appointment, just five months after his ordination. The University building would be erected on the block bounded by Chicago, Cass/Wabash, Superior, and Wolcott/ State - the same block on which Holy Name Cathedral stands today. The property previously belonged to Chicago's first Mayor, William Ogden. Anxious to attract settlers, the Protestant Mayor donated half the land to the Catholic Church. University of St. Mary of the Lake was the first institution of

higher learning chartered in Illinois. Building began in the fall of 1845. The building was constructed on the south half of the block, facing about 100 feet off Superior. Three stories erected on a brick basement, the University was built with spacious lawns dotted with oaks, lindens, and elms. It cost a whopping \$12,000 to build. Classrooms were on the first floor; the second floor was divided between the library and living quarters for Father Kinsella and the professors. The third floor was the student dormitory. In the center of the first floor was the Chapel of the Holy Name. The scattered immigrants who populated the land north of the Chicago River in the 1840s were mostly German and Irish. The Germans had St. Joseph Church constructed on the northeast corner of Wabash and Chicago. Mass was in Latin. However, sermons and confessions were in German. The Irish came to the Chapel of the Holy Name at the University. Father Kinsella recognized their need. A free standing, small Church was built on the southwest corner of the University's grounds. Holy Name became a parish on November 18, 1849. Officially, Kinsella is listed as pastor from 1849-1851. Still, the administration of the parish/University remained intertwined in the same clerical hands. With Bishop Quarter's death, the administration never was close to the second Bishop, James O. Van de Velde, a Belgian Jesuit from St. Louis. They did agree that Holy Name needed a new Church. On August 3, 1853, a cornerstone laid by the Bishop at the southeast corner of State and Superior, across the street from where we pray today. That Church, built of brick, rose slowly. The roof was long delayed. Bishop Van de Velde, never comfortable in Chicago, finally got the Pope to appoint him to Natchez, Mississippi. His successor, Bishop Anthony O'Regan, an immigrant also from the St. Louis seminary, immediately was at odds with the administration of the University and of Holy Name. Some of the tussle was financial. Some was over the bishop's offer to Father Arnold Damen and Jesuits to take over Holy Name. When Damen decided instead to build Holy Family Church on the West Side, Bishop O'Regan unsuccessfully tried to lure the Holy Cross Fathers from South Bend. A new Holy Name Church opened on Christmas Day, 1854. The entire administration – Fathers Kinsella, Howry, Breen, and Hoey - resigned from parish and University the next month. Parishioners met (1) to express confidence in the priests; (2) to pledge themselves to completing the new Church if the priests were returned; (3) to express their respect to Church and bishop; and (4) to appoint a committee to draft their grievances to be forwarded to Rome. An internet search traces a Father Kinsella to St. Raymond Church in the Bronx, then to Immaculate Conception in Westchester County. I think that's our friend. On Wednesday, pray for Father Kinsella, our founder. It does not seem that he would share our warmth for our parish. He never realized that he had founded what would be recognized in the 21st century as one of America's great Cathedrals and the premier major seminary in the USA which operates in Mundelein, Illinois, under the original charter as the University of St. Mary of the Lake. Father Kinsella was our founder. God bless him. He was one of us.

Thursday, January 7, will be my 14th anniversary at our parish. I have been and remain proud and happy to be the pastor of the great Holy Name Cathedral, the most beautiful Church in Chicago, the place where Chicago goes to pray. For all that has been, thanks be to God. For all that will be, blessed be the Holy Name of the Lord – now and forever.





What must one do in order to receive the special Plenary Indulgence in the Year of Mercy?

In order to gain this special Indulgence, a Catholic is required to partake of the Sacrament of Reconciliation, receive the Eucharist at Mass, make a profession of faith and offer prayers for the intentions of the Pope each time one visits, in the course of a pilgrimage, Holy Name Cathedral, and there walks through the Holy Door of Mercy, and makes a visit.

Furthermore, the Jubilee Indulgence can also be obtained for the deceased. We are bound to them by the witness of faith and charity that they have left us. Thus, as we remember them in the Eucharistic celebration, thus we can, in the great mystery of the Communion of Saints, pray for them, that the merciful Face of the Father free them of every remnant of fault and strongly embrace them in the unending beatitude.

The Church's teaching about indulgences assumes that sins which have been forgiven can nevertheless still carry consequences, such as inordinate attachments to created things, damaged relationships, and various destructive effects. These consequences stand in need of purification. Indulgences, which invoke the treasury of grace entrusted to the Church, represent a means of purification. By obtaining indulgences, the faithful address the need for their own purification as well as that of those who have passed over to the Lord in death.

Having experienced the bountiful mercy of God in our lives, we are called—as Pope Francis insistently tells us—to be the instruments and hands of God's mercy in the world, especially through the spiritual and corporal works of mercy.

Dear Priests and Deacons:

My Christmas card this year was chosen to highlight that the Holy Family shared so much in common with refugee families throughout the world. That connection is brought home to us once again, as the Feast of Epiphany marks the beginning of the celebration in the United States of National Migration Week, January 3-10, 2016. For the 30th anniversary of this celebration, Pope Francis has chosen the theme "Migrants and Refugees Challenge Us: The Response of the Gospel of Mercy."

As he notes in the letter he issued for this year's celebration, all migrants are "our brothers and sisters in search of a better life, far away from poverty, hunger, exploitation and the unjust distribution of the planet's resources, which are meant to be equitably shared by all." They are seeking the same thing everyone seeks, he writes, "a better, more decent and prosperous life to share with our loved ones... indifference and silence lead to complicity whenever we stand by as people are dying of suffocation, starvation, violence and shipwreck."

"Today, more than in the past," Pope Francis observes, "the Gospel of mercy troubles our consciences, prevents us from taking the suffering of others for granted, and points out a way of responding" with practical works of spiritual and corporal mercy.

During National Migration Week, Catholics are called to participate through prayer and action to try and ease the struggles of immigrants and to reflect on the Church's obligation to welcome the stranger.

Throughout the month of January, I encourage you to use these related resources provided by the Archdiocesan Office for Immigrant Affairs, the Priests for Justice for Immigrants, and the USCCB Justice for Immigrants Office.




