PHILLIPIAN FOOTBALL NUMBER.

To Appear Saturday after Lawrenceville Game and Will Cost 12 Cents a Copy.

The PHILLIPIAN will not publish an extra on the Exeter game this afternoon, but will get out next Saturday a special eight page football number, containing a full account of the Lawrenceville game, statistics and group pictures of the Andover, Exeter and Lawrenceville teams, a number of individual pictures, and many other football features which will be given in detail in the Wednesday issue. Besides the additional cost of printing the PHILLIPIAN will incur a large expense by having the Lawrenceville game telegraphed and several cuts made, and it will be necessary to charge 12 cents a copy to subscribers and all. The Board of Editors will spend a good deal of time in getting out this issue and will try to show to some extent the school's appreciation of Captain Holt's team. The PHILLIPIAN hopes to commemorate victories over both Exeter and Lawrenceville. Wednesday full particulars concerning this number will be given and it is hoped that all who wish more than two copies will give in their order before Friday night so that the editors will know how large an edition it will be necessary to publish.

ANDOVER vs. EXETER.

Enthusiastic Mass Meeting Held Last Night—Speeches from Members of the Faculty—Close Game Expected—Good Prospects for an Andover Victory—The Line-Up.

An enthusiastic mass meeting to arouse spirit in the game with Exeter to-day was held in the chapel last night. Dreisbach '99 and Howell '00 presided. Cheers for the team were given and the songs for the Exeter game were sung. Professor Graves made the first speech. He said in part:

I understand that the storm of Athletic interest centres upon to-morrow's game. It is not at all strange for both schools have a very large alumni which is watching this game with great interest. Prof. Graves also spoke about the Gymnasium. He said that all but nine thousand dollars has been raised for the building and asked the fellows to do all they could to help raise the required amount. He ended by saying he felt confident Andover would be victorious and he knew the team would do its very best to win.

Mr. McCurdy was next to speak and said I have been asked many times to speak after a victory but never before a game, but I hope to be able to speak to you also on our victory after the game to-morrow. I have watched the games for several years and you cannot tell before hand how they will turn out,—a team is apt to have good days and off days, but if our team goes in the game to-morrow in good spirits, we have a good show to win and the other team had better look out for themselves.

really is enough, we don't need to say so. I have not seen such an exhibition of common school spirit in the ten years I have been here.

Professor Forbes was the next to speak. He said, "We are here to support our team whatever is the outcome of the game. Honest work, hearty play and manly conduct which characterizes Andover will win the game to-morrow."

G. P. Elliot, captain of the '97 eleven, predicted that Andover would win by a large score.

Mr. F. A. Goodhue made an enthusiastic speech in which he said there was nothing at Exeter to overcome this Andover spirit when it is at its best as was the case to-night.

C. N. Kimball, Alan Fox, Jesse Barker, captain of the '96 eleven, spoke, and the meeting adjourned.

Circumstances favor an Andover victory this afternoon. The score will probably be close as both teams will play strongly on the defensive. Andover's line should hold better than Exeter's owing to the superiority in weight. It is unfortunate that Matthews will be unable to play but Rafferty will ably replace him. Probably both Cross and McAbee will be tried at left half. It is certain that the good effect of Rodger's coaching will show up with telling effect this afternoon.

Henry S. Graves, P. A. '88, Yale '92 has been appointed assistant chief of the Forestry Division of the Agricultural Department at Washington, D. C.

Mr. Graves is son of Prof. Graves of the Faculty, and is an old Andover and Yale athlete. He made an unusually high stand in the civil service examination, obtaining an average of 98 per cent.

Andover vs. Exeter.

To-day comes our annual football game with Exeter, the game which, above all others, must be won. We feel, although without any over-confidence, that to-day we will triumph over our old New Hampshire rival, and our hopes do not seem by any means to be groundless.

We have a team this year which can be depended on to a man. They have worked faithfully and well, and the results of their endeavors are bound to make themselves manifest this afternoon. Each man will go into the contest realizing the responsibility which rests upon him as a representative of old Phillips, and the result will be a do or die spirit which cannot help but have a great influence on the final score.

From the student body we feel that the team will undoubtedly receive the support which it so well deserves. The old Andover spirit, the spirit which in itself means "victory" has been revived. When many of our alumni and others equally interested in the welfare of the school tell us that never before have they seen more enthusiasm and spirit in Phillips Academy than at present, we can depend upon what they say to be true. This hearty school support is bound to make itself felt upon every member of the team. Let every man put his whole heart and soul into the cheering and singing to-day in order that Capt. Holt and the team may know that the whole school is with them, whatever the outcome may be. Thus will our chances of victory be greatly increased.

In considering our chances to-day we must not forget the invaluable coaching which the team has received. Never before have our old players helped our team more, not only by

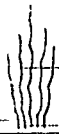

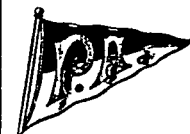

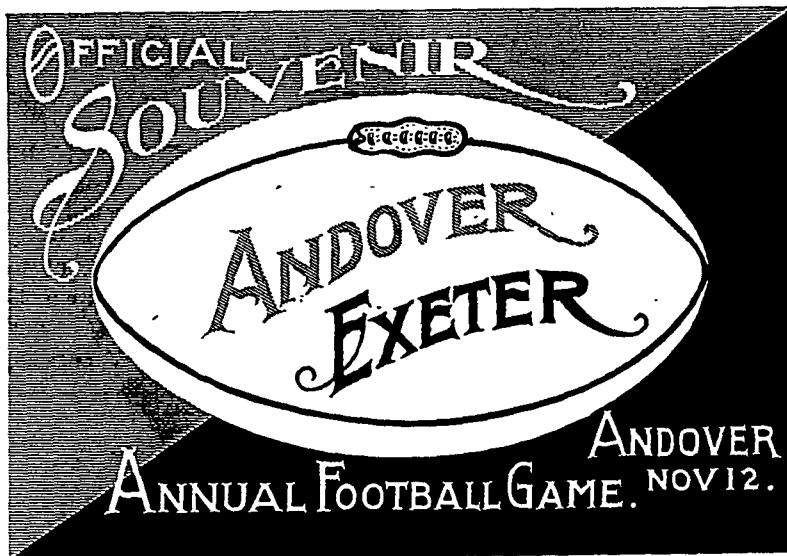
