AACMA, formed in 1973, is the leading national association of qualified practitioners of acupuncture and Chinese medicine – dedicated to supporting, promoting and representing our profession. The AACMA Board of Directors and State Committees are democratically elected from and by the membership.

AACMA provides:

Who is eligible for AACMA Student membership?

Student membership is free for students enrolled in any AACMA-approved educational program.

All you need to do is complete the Student Member Application Form and send to AACMA with evidence of your enrolment.

What evidence of enrolment is acceptable?

Proof of enrolment includes at least one of the following items:

- copy of your student card (only if it shows evidence of current enrolment this means it must state the current year);
- copy of a letter/statement from the providing institution confirming current enrolment;
- copy of receipt for payment of student fees for the current year; or
- other evidence of enrolment issued by the providing institution.

How can I submit my Student member application?

Do I need to renew my Student membership each year?

Yes, you need to renew your student membership each year.

This is as simple as sending evidence of your current enrolment to the AACMA office by 31 March each year. AACMA will send you a reminder notice in January asking you to send evidence of current enrolment. You should also notify AACMA if you discontinue or have completed your studies.

What happens when I complete my studies?

Once you have met the requirements for graduation, you can apply for qualified membership of AACMA. You do not need to wait until the graduation ceremony but will need to get a statement from your institution that you have met the requirements for graduation. Once accepted, you will also be eligible for a significant discount on your first year's fees and the AACMA members' PII policy.

How to apply for qualified membership of AACMA

To apply for qualified membership, simply complete the application form and forward to AACMA with one certified copy of the following documents:

- your award (if issued) or a statement of program completion (if award not yet issued)
- an up-to-date academic transcript of your studies
- a current first aid certificate (Workplace Certificate II or Senior First Aid equivalent)
