## 16. Abstract (Limit 200 words)

This 18th annual report on municipal solid waste disposal and remaining landfill capacity is arranged by Illinois EPA administrative regions. Featured are specification pages describing the chief characteristics of 57 municipal solid waste landfills; their status (active, inactive, closed, under development); locations and hours of operation; tipping fees; quantities of wastes received in 2002, 2003 and 2004; remaining capacities on Jan. 1, 2004, and Jan. 1, 2005; solid waste management fees paid in 2004; names, addresses and phone numbers of landfill owners and operators. Quantities reported by landfills are given in gate cubic yards; as a convenience to the reader, those volumes are divided by 3.3 to provide rough equivalents in tons. The report also includes scaled-down specifications for 103 municipal solid waste transfer stations and 47 compost facilities.

During 2004, 52 landfills reported receiving 53.8 million gate cubic yards of waste. This volume was almost 3.3 million gate cubic yards less than the total received during 2003, a 5.8 percent increase. As of Jan. 1, 2005, 51 landfills reported remaining capacities totaling 986.5 million gate cubic yards, or 311.8 million gate cubic yards more than on Jan. 1, 2004, an increase of 46.2 percent. Dividing wastes disposed during 2004 by capacity remaining on Jan. 1, 2005, suggests a landfill life expectancy in Illinois of 18 years, at current (2004) disposal rates, barring capacity adjustments, until capacity is depleted.
