•	Purpose of the activity
	This activity has been designed to give zero-beginning students an opportunity to use their limited resources to interact and communicate ideas in English, both in realistic and pedagogical activities.
•	Type of activity
	 Communicative activity with production and reception sections. Classroom/seating arrangement: individual, pairs, groups of 3, whole group Setting: Classroom
•	<u>Objective</u>
	This activity practices asking for and giving information and reading comprehension. It also reviews the present tense: BE, verbs (I,YOU) in statements and questions.
•	<u>Duration</u>
	30-40 minutes

Activity

Structure/Vocabulary: Present Tense: BE, verbs (I,YOU) - statements and questions.

Functions: Asking for and giving information. **Materials:** Article (Reading comprehension).

PRE - ACTIVITY

Skills: Reading.

Organization: Individual, pairs, whole group.

Procedures:

- (1) Have students read the article and answer the comprehension questions.
- (2) Compare answers in pairs and correct with whole group.

ACTIVITY

Skills: Speaking, listening, writing.

Organization: Pairs, groups of three, pairs.

Situation

Part One: Students work for a newspaper. They are in charge of interviewing famous people for

feature articles.

Part Two: Pairs of reporters will interview famous person. Part Three: Reporters will collaborate to write the article.

Procedure:

Part One:

- (1) Put students into pairs to prepare a list of questions to use in an interview with a famous person.
- (2) Walk around and help with vocabulary.

Part Two:

- (1) Regroup. Keep 2/3 of the pairs together but 1/3 become famous people. (They can use their own identities or assume that of famous people they decide on or you assign).
- (2) Pairs of reporters interview famous person and take notes of the answers.
- (3) Then regroup again so that famous people can be reporters too.

Part Three: (1) Reporters get together and write an article about the famous people.

POST - ACTIVITY

Skills: Reading and writing. **Organization:** Pairs or individuals.

Procedures:

Students will be editors.

- (1) Collect articles written by students.
- (2) Hand them out again so that each student of pair of students have a copy.
- (3) Students read and correct articles. (This can be done as homework if it is done individually.)
- (4) Editors get together with reporters and discuss their corrections.
