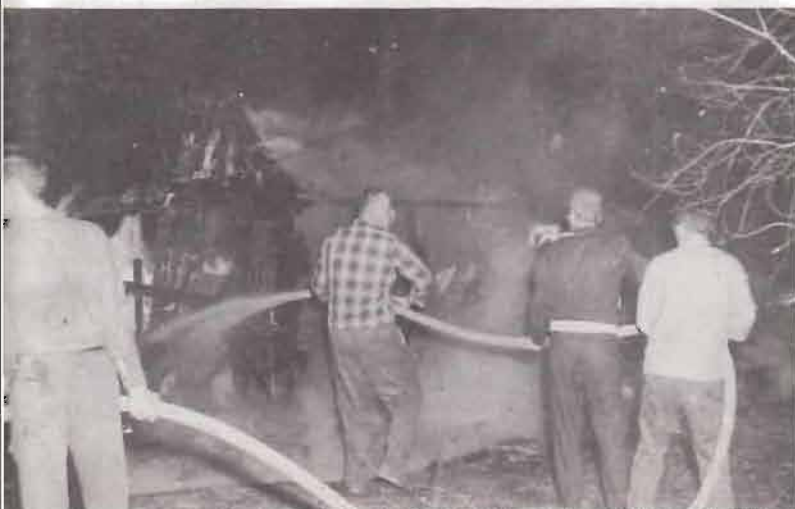

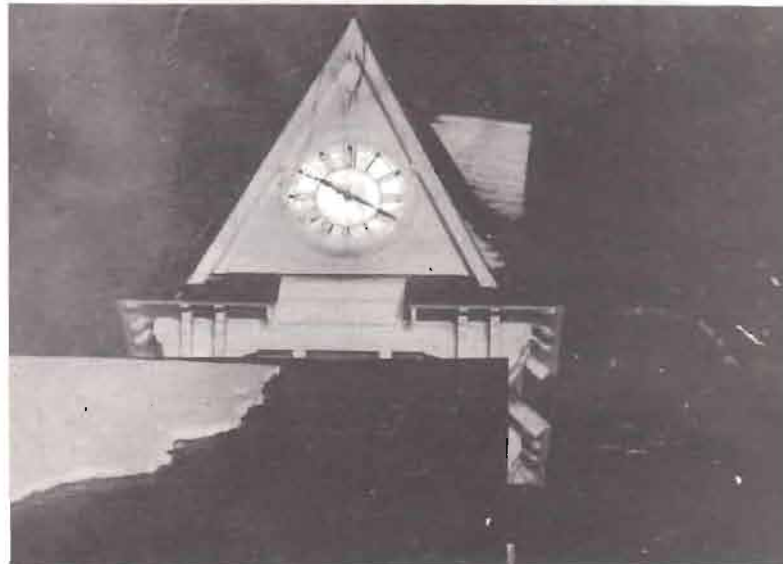
## Unexplained Fires

# "A Conglomeration Of Words"

We hear so much on TV and radio about "New improved" washing material, cake mixes, and whatnot that we can't help but wonder what it was like before they improved it. Anything that hasn't been improved just isn't worth considering. It reminds me about a fellow who had to take his wife to the hospital for a stay of a week or so. Each day the husband would call the hospital and ask about his wife, and got the standard reply "She's improving". He kept this up for over a week and got the same answer. The only time he called and, much to his surprise, they told him they were sorry to have to tell him his wife was dead. After partially getting over his surprise he asked, "What did she die of, improvements?"

Here is a little story which is worthy of parent's attention. Children are great little imitators! A small girl watched with absorbing interest everything that happened at her mother's card party. She observed how her mother dressed, how she dealt out the cards, how the woman drank cocktails, and how freely they smoked cigarettes! The next day the little girl gathered her mother's clothes. She dressed herself in some of her mother's clothes. Then, slipping into mother's room she got mother's cigarettes. Returning to her little playmates she put a cigarette into her mouth and struck a match, and while trying to light the cigarette she accidentally ignited the oversized dress she was wearing. Parents if your child tries to imitate you, will you always be proud of what it does? Surely it may seem like an exaggeration, but it was cut from a reputable magazine, but it does contain a very important fact. If your son is an alcoholic it will be heartbreaking to watch the results, possibly wanted right before your eyes daily, but it will be a living hell to a parent if he or she was the one who set the example that sent the child of its downward way. As a parent looks down into the innocent face of a lovely child normal and healthy, God be merciful to that parent that, knowingly helps to instill "a child" a habit which makes life less sweet than it was before it imitates its parent. Jesus Christ said that "It were better than a millstone be hanged around your neck and you be drowned in the depth of the sea than you should put a stumbling block in the way of one of the least of these my little ones." It's heart rending enough to know that you may have unknowingly put a stumbling block in the way of your child, but it must be almost unbearable to know that life shows you deliberately set an example that eventually put a stumbling block in the path of your child on life's sometimes torturous high-

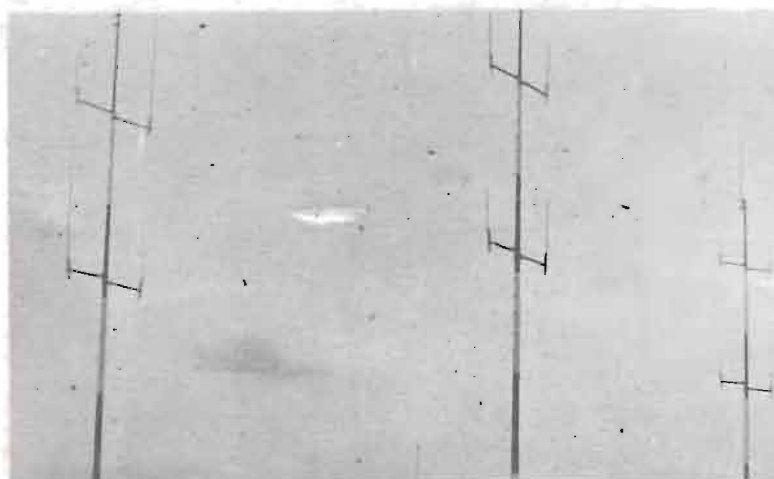
# New Radio Towers at CD Center

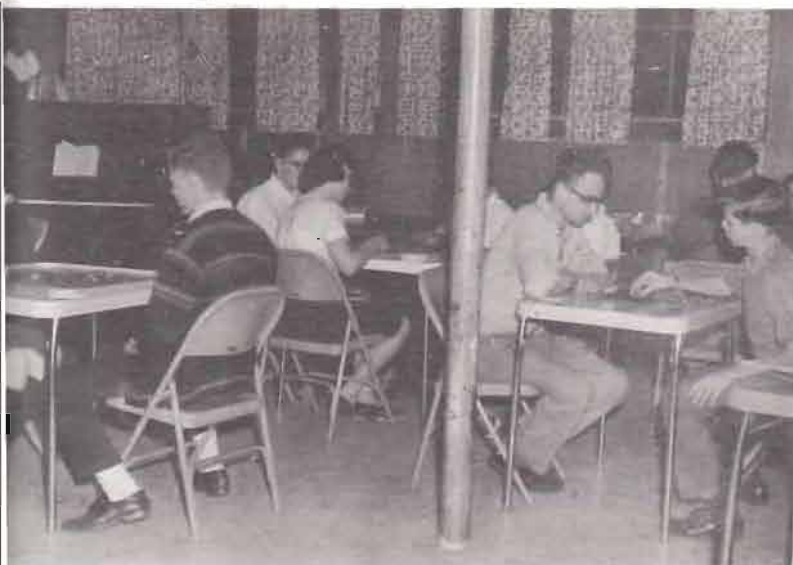

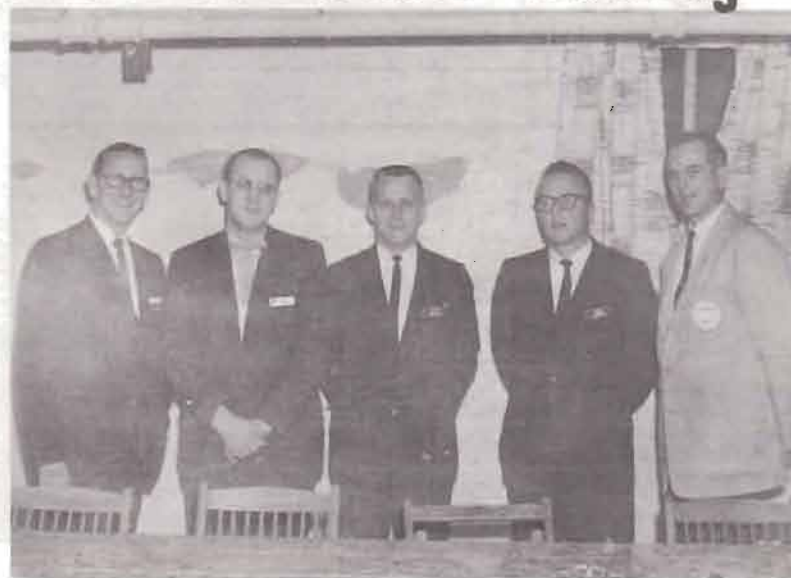

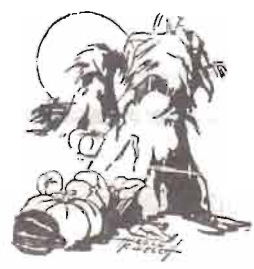

EXTENSION SERVICE NEWS RELEASE

An advisory group has made a trip into Gulf Hagas, scenic mountain gorge in Piscataquis County. The Technical Action Panel for Rural Area Development, Piscataquis County made the trip on Wednesday, October 16. Members of the Panel making the trip were Robert Farris of Dover-Foxcroft, Soil Conservation Service; Elmer Leland of Greenville, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation; Frank Antville of Orono, Forest Sheldon of Dover-Foxcroft and Richard Hanson of Dover-Foxcroft, University of Maine Extension Service. Another member of the Panel, James LaCasce of the Maine Forest Service was unable to make the trip; Melvin Brown of Milo served as guide to the group and helped locate points of interest. Allen Horne of Milo provided a four wheel drive vehicle which enabled the group to travel into the so-called Hermitage before starting the trek by foot. Equal Employment Opportunity Regulation Explained---

Carlton M. Brackett, Area Supervisor, Farmers Home Administration spent Wednesday, Oct. 23, at the Newport FHA office explaining equal opportunity in employment under construction financed with a FHA loan. In attendance was Robert. C. Farris, County Supervisor at Newport.

Mr. Brackett pointed out that any construction project, such as a new home, poultry house, dairy barn or other type of real estate improvement costing in excess of \$10,000.00 to be financed in whole or in part with FHA loan funds, requires posting at the site notices of compliance with requirements of the President's Committee on Equal Opportunity as they relate to the promotion and assurance of equal employment opportunity for qualified persons without regard to race, creed, color or national origin.

This applies to loans approved by FHA on or after Oct. 3, 1963.

Heavy snow snapped off this utility pole on outer Pleasant Street. Snow and wind brought down trees and utility poles. Power was disrupted in Milo for forty-five minutes at noon and for a little over three hours in the evening. Snow plows and sand trucks were in operation by late morning. Bangor Hydro line crews worked in the wet snow repairing power cables in the woods between Milo and Howland. The storm greatly reduced the current fire danger from extremely dry woods and fields.

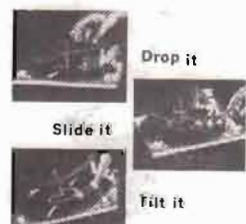
