We know back to what we anticipate will be a Wonderful, Invigorating year filled with lots of community building, collaboration, exploring of varied curricula and celebration. We extend a warm we know to those of you who are joining our school family. We assure you that you've selected a learning environment that merits itself on high standards and academic rigor, one that uses a constructivist philosophy to meet the needs of every child. During this new school year, we will continue to foster a learning environment that is child centered and enriching.

This year we will continue using both Social Studies and Science to enrich our curic ulum. Our students in Kindergarten through Grade Five will engage in the IIM method which will allow them to become more independent researchers. This instructional modelallows us to align our curic ulum with the Renzulli Learning System which continues to provide differentiated resources for our entire student body. Students in the Gifted and Talented Program as well as our General School program will be allowed to explore their personal interests as we tap into their learning styles, and talents. Our Compact learning methodology will also allow us to provide appropriate instruction to fit the needs of the entire student body. We will continue our tradition of having one Gifted and Talented class on each grade level, kindergarten through grade 5.

We will continue our partnerships with Columbia University (in support of our English Language Arts curiculum), City University (in support our math curiculum), and The University of Connecticut (in support our social studies, and science curicula.) Our new science lab is now located in room 110, and will be utilized mainly by grades 3-5. Our Early Childhood science specialist will provide science instruction for grades pre-k – grade 2, via their classroom. The science facilitator, on each grade level, along with our Enrichment Coordinator and Science specialists will collaborate in order to provide our students with a state of the art science experience this year.

Our Assistant Principal, Ms. Deborah Smith will continue to supervise the Special Education Department, along with Grades 4 and 5. I will continue to supervise our Early Childhood Division (Pre-K-Grade 3) and our English Language Learners Department.

We are fortunate to add exceptionally talented and energetic new members to our school family this year. They are:

- Ms. Kate Ofikuru: Kate comes to us after serving as an educator at P.S. 44 for a year. She is a recent graduate of Teachers College at Columbia University. She will be bringing herexpertise to Grade 1.
- Ms. Tameka Soso: comes to us from another public school in East New York, and has been a teacher for the past five years. She will be bringing her great experience and best practices to our second grade team. She is a graduate student at Brooklyn College.
- Ms. Karla Wurzel: joins our Grade 5 team as the self contained teacher for the bridge 3/4/5 class. She is currently receiving extensive training from the Fellows Program and is ready to provide our students with Best Practices on a daily basis. She received her undergraduate degree from Connecticut College, and is currently a graduate student at Long Island University.
- Ms. Rachel Zeff: Rachel joins our Grade 5 team as the special education teacher in the collaborative team teaching class. She received her undergraduate degree from Binghamton University and is currently a graduate student at Brooklyn College. She is also receiving extensive training from the Teaching Fellows Program.

Mission Statement



The mission of the Public School 9-Te unis G. Bergen is to teach our students how to maximize their potential through a constructive model of instruction. We be lieve in servicing the whole child through strong partnerships and we aim to create a community of life long learners who are highly motivated for success. We emphasize high standards, professional development and the individual needs of every student. We strive to involve our parents, community-based organizations and the community at large in the education of our children.



School Wide Enrichment Program

The school wide enrichment program at P.S. 9 provides all students with individualized instruction. All of our students will be provided with the opportunity to explore and develop their talents. Our second form of enrichment will be the offering of special interest courses. This segment will involve our entire school population. Enrichment courses will provide challenging, self selected, real world learning for all students, at any grade level, who share common interests in select courses of study. During the enrichment course, students and the facilitator will pursue challenging learning experiences that will lead to the production of an end product.

Students will be able to participate in type I, type II, or type III activities.

Type I

Students are exposed to a wide variety of experiences that may not be available in the essential curriculum. Guest speakers, demonstration, field trips, documentaries and other resources are available to expose students to a wide variety of disciplines, topics, occupations and hobbies. The goal of Type I activities is to stimulate new interests that individuals or small groups of students may choose to pursue through intensive study.

Type II

Students learn and develop advanced research skills such as critical inquiry, problem solving, and creative thinking. Activities or lessons usually occur in the classroom or in small group settings. These learning activities encourage high-level thinking and reasoning skills.

Type III

Individual students or small groups of students engage in research investigations in an area of personal interest. These learning activities allow students to think, feel, and act like a practicing professional. Students conduct research, gatherdata, solve problems, and create a final product that is shared with an appropriate audience.

What Enrichment Courses will look like at P.S. 9

Schedule:

Our Enrichment model has been woven throughout our curiculum. Enrichment clusters will meet every Friday, allowing our children to engage in project based learning, and self-interest courses. Support staff will pick students up from their classmom. Our Buschildren will bring their belongings to their session and will be picked up and escorted by the designated transportation teacher to the dismissal area.

Student Inventory:

Each student will be given an inventory to help identify his or her learning style and are as of high interest. Parent volunteers will conduct the inventory. Each class will have their inventory complete by the second week of September in order for the program to begin as soon as possible.

Course se le c tion (student):

Students will be given a course description of courses available to their grade. For grades K-3, parent volunteers will be available to aide in the selection process.

Our Curric ulum In Brief



Reading

Ms. Stephanie Durham is our Literacy Coach. She will work closely with the new teachers in the building. Ms. Durham will be one of the facilitators who will be instrumental in fostering an environment for the teaching of English language arts. Herroom is 124.

Oureducational philosophy at P.S. 9 is based on the belief that all students need authentic, organic instruction on a daily basis. We be lieve in and have embraced Balanced Literacy since it allows us to teach to the varied needs of our student population. In maintaining our standard based balanced approach to teaching reading, we will ensure that our practices are reflective as we continue to study and learn through Teachers College. Our approach at teaching reading will continue to e volve as our teachers participate in ongoing professional development and conduct their own classmom-based teacher research. For the past six years we have spent a lot of time on long term planning and c unic ulum development of our English language arts units.

P.S. 9's expectations for teaching reading include the following: In all classrooms, teachers read aloud daily from chapter books and pic ture books. The read aloud time is an important teaching time where different reading strategies are modeled. During read aloud the expectation is that children are not passive listeners, but rather are actively engaged in listening and responding to the text and practicing strategies that will help them in their independent or partner reading. Shared Reading (with an enlarged text such as a big book, a poem on a chart paper, a section of a text on an overhead) happens daily in prekindergarten, kindergarten and early first grade. It is used frequently in the rest of the grades as well.

Reading Workshop happens daily in our kindergarten to fifth grade c la ssrooms, a lthough in kindergarten it may be brief on some days and longer on some days. The usual format for Reading Workshop is a mini lesson (which may be based on a read aloud or shared reading); a time when children are reading (either independently, with partners, in reading centers, in book clubs, or in guided reading groups) and teachers are conferring or meeting with small groups; and a share time. Independent and partner reading is an essential part of our reading

curriculum. From pre-kindergarten on, children have time to read (or, in

Pre-kindergarten and kindergarten, look at) books on the irown and with another student. In Pre-kindergarten and kindergarten, it is appropriate for children to be looking at and talking about books that they cannot actually read. As our students enter first grade, the majority of their independent and/or partner reading time should be spent working on books that are at an appropriate level for them to read. In many classes, particularly in the lower grades, children have book bins, boxes, or bags where they keep 3-8 books they are working on.

ALL students must have book baggies in grades Kthrough 5. In our classrooms, we have a portion of our library in leveled books; our grades 1 and 2 classrooms must have more leveled baskets than other grades. When we speak about leveling books, we mean assigning books on the students' read ability, based on difficulty. Our leveling system created by Teachers College; however we also use the book by Irene Fountas and Gay Su Pinnell in <u>Guided Reading</u> and <u>Matching Books to Readers</u> to assist us in finding the levels for many of your books.

Math



Our Math coach is Ms. Cheryl Sealey. She will be located in moom 124. Her moom will be a resource moom for teachers and will contain a lending library. She will provide the staff with ongoing professional development in mathematics. She will also assist in establishing a lab site in grades K-2 and in grades 3-5. Math facilitators have been assigned on each grade level; the se teachers will continue to be trained and will work closely with her. Ms. Sealey will also engage in a team teaching session each week. Members of the staff will be invited to attend this session as a form of classroom inter-visitation and professional development.

This year we will continue with our curriculum in Everyday Math. We will follow the program the way it has been paced.



Social Studies

The goal of our Social Studies curriculum is to provide our students with an inquiry-based instructional model. One that will allow them to ask essential questions, probing them to learn more about the world beyond their classroom, in order that they develop awareness and a sense of social responsibility, justice, and commitment to humanity. We will provide our students with a coherent and sequential integrated social studies course of instruction from our early childhood division, through grade 5.

Our teachers will provide social studies instruction in the classroom at least two times perweek. All lessons will be taught using the workshop model, which will allow students to engage in a minilesson and group work before reconvening to share what they have leamed.

Essential que stions are the basis of all of our social studies units. Geography, culture, history, politics and economics will be woven throughout our interdisciplinary social studies curriculum. Teachers will use historical fiction, narrative accounts, primary sources, and other nonfiction writing to bring understanding to their students. Mapping will be inclusive of the study so that students can develop and expand their sense of place. Time lines will help students understand the when in history. Students will learn the art of note-taking and the difference between fact and opinion. Projects will be an essential part of the social studies curriculum and applied learning will tie into these studies. We will egage in the IIM method, which will allow our students to create projects that will include map making, murals, reports, biographies, student presentations, sing ing songs, dairies, three-dimensional models, and oral presentations. This instructional model will also enable our students to be independent re searchers. Field trips will allow teachers to use the city and beyond to give meaning to the curiculum. Throughout the studies, it is essential that the students relate what they are learning to their life in New York City. Reading and writing, science and math will all play a role in our social studies curiculum. Read "alouds", shared reading, independent reading and small group reading and writing, studies of myths and folktales, and re search skills are some examples of literacy as a part of social studies. Mapping skills, model making, time lines, grids and graphs are skills that use mathematical understanding. Social studies units will include both so cial and physical science. Students will learn about environments and he alth, animals and habitats, geology and ecosystems, natural resources and weather, as well as food chains and life cycles. They will also learn about various structures throughout NYC.

Sc ie nc e

We will continue our goal of enhancing our science curic ulum this year. Science will be taught two days per week by the classroom teachers in grades 1-5. Support staff/c lusters will be assigned to various classrooms to co-teach with the classroom teachers. This will occurperiods 1 and 2 on those days. Ms. Aie shah Deverte uil will be the science specialists in the lower grades this year. Ms. Ms. Stephanie Codring ton will serve as the upper grade science specialist. Our curriculum will be taken from the new scope and sequence which was developed through collaborative workgroups composing of regional staff, science experts from partnering institutions, college professors, teachers and administrators. Our objectives for this program are to:

- provide standard based science instruction.
- Link the science standards to the curriculum across the grades.
- Support the spiraling of our scope and sequence across throughout the grades.
- Integrate science content with other core curriculum social studies, literacy, and mathematics.
- Collaborate with specialists in other are as art, music, technology, physicaleducation/health and culinary arts
- Provide professional development to support science standards
- Seekout grants for science equipment, trips, and in-service programs.

With all of our objectives in mind, we hope to develop an awareness of curio sity about the natural and built world within our students' lives. Assist them in understanding key scientific concepts and content. Help them to develop the ability to use scientific processes. Provide them with joy as they explore the scientific world. Provide them with a good experience with technology design. Allow them to see and appreciate science as a dynamic discipline in which the quest for knowledge is on going. Our program will teach skills in a collaborative manner.

All classes seeing Ms. Deverte uil and Ms. Codring ton will be expected to maintain a science notebook which will be used to input their entries. We are asking our families to assist us in helping our students maintain their notebooks. Science grades will depend heavily on the students' work in the lab as well as the work being done in the science notebook. In an effort to have our students well adapted to the NYS science curic ulum, and in order to have them ready to take their grade 4 science assessment, students in Grades 3-5 will utilize the science lab in room 110. The lower grades will receive science instruction within their classroom.



This year we continue our school-wide home work policy which was created as a result of a previous parent survey. Children and/or their parents will be periodically asked to keep track of how long their home work is taking them to complete, so that teachers may determine how to adjust the amount of home work that is given.

Home work will be assigned Monday through Friday. During our Parent Orientation on the first day of school, teachers are expected to discuss the following:

- Explain our Homework Policy to children and parents
- Make their expectations clear regarding completeness and neatness of assignments (neatness should be emphasized)
- Explain the consequences of not completing home work
- Put in place a system for checking written homework which students and parents are aware of

Parents will also receive our home work expectations in writing.

Although we realize that home work will not take the same amount of time for all children, we believe that children should not have to do more than the maximum amount for their grade, assuming that they are working without breaks and distractions. We be lieve that it is always better to give home work that is of great quality, instead of quantity.



Academic Intervention Services (AIS) for At Risk Students

Students who are at risk for not meeting grade level standards will receive intervention services. Students in need of extra support will be identified and a sse ssed, to ensure that they receive additional support. Assessment to ols such as Teacher's College (Columbia University) and Scantron, as well as ongoing informal assessments, will help us in identifying such students. State and city assessments will also be utilized to determine the need for our students in the uppergrades. Care ful record keeping, including a necdotal/conference notes, running records, and work samples, will be used as important tools in helping us to determine a plan of action for our students. One of our focithis year will be to address the varied ways in which we can determine the best possible way to meet the needs of our "At Risk" population. Grade leaders, coaches and the administrative staff will be instrumental in providing the teachers with the needed professional development in these areas. All classroom teachers are required to create a list of a t-risk students. This should be done as so on as the Teacher's College assessments and an analysis of the student's performance from the previous school year have been completed. Teachers are also required to maintain record keeping that indicate the kinds of supports given to the se students (work folders and conference notes must support your plan of action). As a result of funding and as part of our knowledge of best practices; we must document our work. Educational assistants and the support services personnel who work with a t-risk students must also keep a log of their daily work with each student.

Our work with a t-risk students is being supported by regulations that require all schools in New York State to provide Academic Intervention Services (AIS) for students who score below the State-designated performance standards on State assessments and/or who are at-risk of not achieving the State Learning standards. AIS services are not special education services, but are additional instruction and support services which supplement the general curriculum. The emphasis on AIS is part of the larger move to reduce special education referrals and to instead try to provide funding to meet the needs of all of our students.

Our speech teachers, occupational therapists, physical therapists, guidance counselor and members of the SBST can also help us to meet the needs of our at-risk students. The se professionals can share their expertise by helping us to identify students with OT, PT, Speech and social emotional issues; while providing teachers with ideas for interventions.

We anticipate being able to have the following:

- Reduced class size (Grades K-5)
- Guided reading push-in/pull-out program (Grades K-5)
- Small group support (Grades K-5)
- Guidance services: emotional and social support
- The Mental Health Clinic: family/emotional support
- Educational Assistant support
- Learning Leaders support
- Professional Development in meeting the needs of struggling readers
- Professional Development in meeting the needs of students who struggle with mathematics
- Resource Room (K-5 and "At Risk" students)

ELL (English Language Learners)



Biling ualor non-English speaking children who score below a cut-off on an assessment (that is administered by our ELL teacher when the child is first admitted into the school), will be placed in our ELL day program. Ms. Shondra Hayward utilizes the Home Language Survey early in the school year to get a clearer picture on students who need this service.

Among the new mandates for EIL are ones that emphasize more coordination with ongoing curriculum. Our social studies and science curricula will support this mandate. Time will be provided for teachers to meet with Ms. Hayward so that they may discuss their collaboration for this year.

Moming And Aftemoon Dismissal Procedures



School begins at 8:40 am. Children may gather in the school yard from 8:30 am where they will be met by their teachers and escorted to their classrooms at 8:40 am. Children in Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten enter the school with their teachers from the school yard through doors which lead directly their classrooms. Children who eat breakfast in school may enter the building through the St. Marks Avenue school yard door from 8:00 am.

A care giver must escort Pre-Kindergarten children each day directly to their classroom in order to sign them in. At dismissal, they must be picked up from their classrooms. Please see our Family Assistant, Ms. Pride for more information.

When the weather is bad, all children will gather indoors until 8:40 am when the ir teachers will escort them to their rooms.

For the safety and security of all the children, parents of grades 1 through 5 may <u>not</u> escort their children into the building. We ask children and parents to use the Underhill Avenue doors only, when entering and exiting the school. This is for everyone's safety.

It is very important that your child a rives to school on time. Child ren who a rive a fter 8:45 am will be required to get a late pass from the main office before going to their classroom. Parents of grades 1 through 5 may NOTescort late child ren to their classroom. This is to reduce disruption to the classroom teachers and other students during our morning procedure.

Lateness is not only recorded on your child's permanent record, but often contributes to classroom difficulties.

Parental Involvement



Parent Associations and the Schools "Chancellor's Regulation CRA-660"

Parent Associations are the backbone of the public schools. They provide the parent leadership essential to developing school strengths, identifying and solving problems and building the partnership between schools, community and parents necessary to successfuleducation. The New York City Board of Education, recognizing the importance of parent associations to a school's success, issues this policy statement to foster strong and effective parent representation in every school and at every level of the school system.

The re is an active parent body at PS 9. Class Parents and Learning Leaders volunteers can be seen helping as reading tutors, trip chaperones, working in the schoolyard during morning line up and assisting with classroom projects. PS 9 is very fortunate to have a very active and vital Parent Teacher Association that has successful fundraising programs and is very supportive of the entire school community. There are many events and opportunities throughout the school year for parents to participate in the PTA and help build a greater sense of school community. Committee membership is open to all parents, family and community members.

On the first and third Friday of every month, all parents are invited to come into the classrooms to read with, or read to children, play math games, or participate in other curricular areas through our Family Reading and Math Buddy program. We look forward to this program including parents into our learning community in a very meaning ful way.

"The Chancellor's Plan for School Leadership Teams"



The fundamental purpose of the school leadership team is to determine the school's educational direction — that is, the school's overall educational vision, its goals and priorities, the strategies that will be used to achieve that vision, and the alignment of resources to accomplish those strategies. To be effective, the team will need to develop a culture in which there is a shared goal for all children to achieve high levels of learning and a spirit of partnership among all constituencies to achieve high levels of learning and a spirit of partnership among all constituencies to achieve this goal. To carry out this charge, the work of the team will focus on two core responsibilities:

- the creation of the schools Comprehensive Educational Plan (CEP), including annual goals and objectives, and
- the development of a school-based budget and staffing plan aligned with the CEP.

Within the context of New Standards, the district CEP, and other [Regional policies], teams will have significant discretion in developing their comprehensive educational plans and budgets in areas such as curriculum, instructional programs, parent involvement, staff development, pupil personnel services, and financial management.

Visiting the School



Parents are welcome to visit their child (ren)'s classrooms. There are many ways to be a volunteer in our school: Learning Leaders school volunteers, main office monitors, field trips, special curiculum projects, lunchroom clubs, etc... Your contributions to classroom life are crucial to our success. We want you to be informed about our school. If you'd like to visit, please arrange a time with the classroom teacher. You must stop at the security desk for a visitor's pass at the time of your visit. YOU MUSTHAVE A VALID NEW YORK STATE ID TO ENTER OUR BUILDING! Please do not "drop in" on teachers without an appointment. They will be unable to meet with you without notice.

Parent Reports and Conferences



There are two formal Parent/Teacher Conferences a year. One in November and the other in March. Additional conferences are usually given upon request. It is very important that parents make every effort to attend parent conferences.

Each fall we host a cumiculum night for all parents. Your child's teacher will describe in detail the plan and schedule for the year, as well as the procedures for many important routines for the class. Please be sure to attend.

Also in the fall teachers in grades 1 to 5 will send home a letter regarding home work procedures. It is very important that parents and children read this letter together in order to clarify and define routines for the year, which will assist children in doing their home work. [See our "Home work Policy" section]. We ask parents to review home work nightly.

Dogs and Bicycles

Please do not bring dogs into the school yard or school building. If you must tie your dog, please use the fence furthest away from the main doors. Some children are frightened by or allergic to dogs and some dogs get frightened by the large number of children milling about. Bicycles, scooters, roller skates and skate boards are not allowed in the school yard or the school building.

<u>The School Nurse - Illness</u>



Because a number of our children require daily medical attention to enable them to attend public school, we have a school nurse. Please be advised that our nurse may not treat children who come to school sick. We ask that you do not send your child to school if he/she may be ill. Children who become ill in school may be seen by the nurse before being sent home. Children usually wait in the office until some one can pick them up. Please sign your child out in the student sign out book in the main office before leaving with your child.

Parents are our first line of defense in preventing the spread of infection. If your child has an infectious illness, please let your child's teacher know by sending a note or making a phone call. The teacher can then inform the nurse of infectious illnesses in the school. Illness is a part of life and it is impossible to eradicate infectious illness from our school. Please be certain that your child is healthy before he/she is returned to school. Also talk to your children about washing their hands regularly and avoiding the sharing of food and drinks. It is school policy that children who are sent home sick may not return to the school later in the day.

Lost Clothing



Please use an indelible marker to write your child's name on all outer clothing (book bags, hats, gloves sweaters, boots...) and on lunch boxes. This will enable us to return lost articles. The volume and quality of clothing "found" is staggering. Please check the lost-and-found in both the lunchroom and the Nurse's wing.

Emergencies/Messages/ Early Pick-Up



- 1. Please be sure that you complete two copies of the "Blue Emergency Card" that is filed in the main office. This card should be updated during the school year with current phone numbers and clear directions of what is desired by parents in case of an emergency. If you change jobs or phone numbers, or if your backup emergency contact changes, please stop by the office and change your card. It is also a good idea to keep in mind that the school may need to reach you, so let your office or your backup know how you can be contacted when there are changes in your regularschedule.
- 2. The school <u>CANNOT</u> de liver phone messages to children. Make sure you make all after-school plans in advance.
- 3. If a parent wishes to pick up their child early, the classroom teacher should be informed in writing. Only a parent or designated guardian may pick up a child. All children who leave early must be signed out in the main office. Children may not leave school during the school day without an escort who is 18 years or older.
- 4. Please do not send us any information on the fax machine unless you have been directed to do so.

Ple ase Note: The school telephone system is not equipped to override Caller ID. We do not have the capacity to dial*82. This means that if your Caller ID restricts incoming calls, we may not be able to contact you in an emergency. Ple ase make every effort to have a telephone number available and known to us in the event of an emergency.

The method we will use most often to communicate with you is a notice that your child will bring home. Please checkevery day to see if there is a note in their lunch boxorbackpack.

School Meals



The Breakfast Program is available to all children at no cost. It begins at 7:45 am in the school's cafe teria. There is a School Aide assigned to the breakfast program along with the other cafe teria personnel.

Children may bring lunch or participate in our school's lunch program. If your child brings lunch, please be sure that no glass bottles or containers, soda, candy or gum are included. We are fortunate this year to continue our participation in the Universal School Meals (USM) Program, where our families DO NO Thave to complete lunch applications. All students are invited to participate in the School Meals lunch program daily.

- 2. The <u>second time</u> a rule is broken, the child will be a sked to write a letter of a pology addressed to the appropriate school authority (or classmate) and signed by the child's parent.
- 3. The <u>third time</u> a rule is broken, the parent will receive either a letter or a phone call from their child's teacher, and/or a Discipline Report Notification letter from the school.
- 4. The <u>fourth time</u> a rule is broken, the teacher will hold a conference with the teacher and parent.
