

#### Integrated Reading and Writing Instruction, with a uniquely flexible structure

- Chapters 1-4 provide step-by-step instruction, with cross-references to the workshops and grammar chapters, and include a complete unit of readings on the theme of financial literacy.
- 16 reading and writing workshop chapters expand on key topics such as building vocabulary, developing a thesis, and main idea — where students might need help.
- 13 grammar workshops instruct by teaching students to find their own errors.
- Three additional themed reading units offer selections from many disciplines, including psychology, business, sociology, art, and education. Each unit also includes pre- and postreading apparatus and writing assignments.

## Scaffolded Pedagogy and Guided Practice

- Students learn by practicing basic skills as they acquire more advanced skills: For example, Chapter 1 introduces previewing, annotating, and summary writing; students use these skills in Chapters 2-4 as they practice critical reading and writing, in workshop chapters as they focus on particular skills, and in themed reading units where they read and write increasingly
- Practices, Projects, and Chapter Reviews include activities ranging from previewing readings and charting ideas to finding and correcting errors.
- Tips and Look Out boxes help students develop both competence and confidence by teaching them to avoid and correct common errors in their own writing.

#### Thematically Organized Readings

- Readings from a wide range of sources cover fresh topics relevant to college learners, including fame and celebrity, public art, and siblings.
- Online e-Pages offer multimodal readings that take advantage of what the Web can do. For example, in the Siblings unit, students respond to a 20/20 video about a teenage girl and her autistic brother.










Reading/Writing Instruction, from Pre-Reading *through* Proofreading



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
