

## Middle School security upgrade costs increase

Selctboard OKs additional spending

SOUTH HADLEY - Efforts to secure Michael E. Smith Middle School's front vestibule have nearly doubled in cost.

A total of \$70,400 was allocated to the project in a Town Meeting last year.

Bullet-resistant glass will be installed, as will advanced monitoring systems to view and contain visitors inside the school's front vestibule. South Hadley School Superintendent Dr. Nicholas Young declined to offer details of the project, citing the very nature of the need for security upgrades.

"I think it's really fair to say we've spent numerous hours in meetings and conversations looking at every angle to find the least expensive but safe alternative to bring forward," said Young Jan. 20 to the South Hadley Selectboard. "We didn't relish the idea of coming back on a proposal that required additional money, either.

We've been extremely financially responsible on the school department side."

Town Meeting approved of a May 9 warrant article asking for authorization to borrow funds for multiple capital projects in which this school project was included. Because the school security project cost has increased, the school department needed approval from the Selectboard to move forward with the upgrades.

Young said the \$70,400 figure was given as an initial quote. The schools went through a procurement process with an architect, but after the bidding process, bids to complete the project "came in even higher," he said.

Adjustments to lower the cost have been made after consultation with the South Hadley Police Department and the state police school safety unit. The revised proposal is \$149,000.

Selectboard member Sarah Etelman said she would like to see a complete plan that includes the two remaining schools that need


## Fleming on the front line of school safety

## Senate passes hands-free phone legislation

SOUTH HADLEY - A new bill that will make it illegal for people to talk on handheld phones while driving has passed the state senate and will head to the house for considera-

Sen. Eric P. Lesser joined the Massachusetts Senate to pass legislation requiring hands-free phone use while driving.

The fines would be \$100 for a first offense, \$250 for a second offense and \$500 for a third offense. These are the same fines that currently exist for texting while driving. There is an exception in the case of an emergency.

"Too many car accidents happen because drivers are distracted by their devices," Sen. Lesser said.

"This bill makes important updates to existing law to ensure that our roads are as safe as possible for all motorists and passengers," he said.

"One in four motor car accidents nationwide are now caused by cell phone use." he continued. "Requiring hands-free use phones and other devices while driving is an important step to making our roads safer. I'm glad the Senate passed this meas-

ure and am proud to have voted 'yes.'"

The bill requires drivers to use their

mobile electronic device in hands-free mode while operating a vehicle. For example, using the speakerphone setting to talk to someone while driving is not against the law. Distracted driving accounts

for more than 1 million crashes and 3,000 fatalities every year in the United States. The National Safety Council estimates that one in four motor vehicle accidents now involve cell phone use.

In 2010 the Massachusetts, the state legislature banned texting while driving and this is

another measure to keep the roads safe in

#### **Community Preservation Act informational** meeting set for Jan. 31

SOUTH HADLEY - On Sunday, Jan. 31 at 2 p.m. there will be an informational meeting to learn about and discuss South Hadley's prospective adoption of the Massachusetts Community Preservation Act (CPA) held at the South Hadley Public Library. This meeting is not sponsored by any official group or committee in town.

The CPA will be on the town ballot for the third time in recent history on April 12. The CPA is a smart growth tool that can help communities preserve open space and historic sites, create affordable housing, and develop outdoor recreational facilities. 160 Massachusetts communities have seen benefits from the their participation in the Community Preservation Act.

The CPA does require a property tax surcharge for homeowners. The CPA statute also creates a statewide Community Preservation Trust Fund, administered by the Department of Revenue, which provides distributions each year to communities that have adopted CPA.



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## Study finds library merger would improve services

SOUTH HADLEY - Unified services offered by the South Hadley Public Library and Gaylord Memorial Library is something library officials have long thought of as a positive move.

In 2012, library trustees from both groups began exploring the possibility of a merger. Research gathered by a Joint Integration Committee allowed trustees to identify advantages and draft an administrative struc-



A grant from the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners allowed consultant Cheryl Bryan to study this issue and report back to the joint committee.

Because Gaylord Memorial Library is a private organization that would merge with one that is public, Bryan's first recommendation is to clarify ownership of the Gaylord Memorial Library property.

"We all agreed in our discussions that should the integration go forward, this would quickly become a less significant issue," she wrote in her report.

During a Jan. 20 Selectboard meeting, Town Administrator Michael J. Sullivan said

the land on which the library stands is owned by the town but the building is owned by Gaylord Memorial Library. He recommended the town not pursue obtaining

Clarifying the ownership issue has been

"a stickler," said Sullivan. At the end of the day, he said, there's no intent by either party to abandon the library.

Selectboard Chair Frank DeToma said. "Since the Gaylord association continues to operate the Gaylord Library as a library, as long as it continues to do that, it's a moot issue. It's not relevant."

Bryan also recommends within the first year of integration the status of Gaylord employees be "in flux between private library and town employees." A timeline should be developed for staffing transitions. Meetings with Sullivan to develop the overall plan and to determine what approvals are needed are recommended as well.

The Gaylord Memorial Library building would still operate as a library and maintain similar hours. Its endowment fund would be saved for preserving the building.

The two library catalogs would combine as one collection, and the calendars of events would be unified, as would newsletters. The Gaylord Library would now have access to the CW MARS online catalog for borrowing. Residents would have the option to pick up their books either at the Gaylord Memorial Library or public library buildings.

Mitch Resnick, who is a member of the integration committee, said the group would like to see the merger happen over the course of three years.

Details still need to be worked out. Sullivan said some of the converted employee positions might have to be negotiated with the union.

The Library Integration Advisory Group will meet Friday, Feb. 5 at 2 p.m. in the public library's trustee's conference room.

## Sue Doran given Gallivan Award for parade work

HOLYOKE - Getting involved with the Holyoke St. Patrick's Parade Committee was the silver lining to the devastation Sue Doran and her late husband Dennis experienced in 1986 after their restaurant, Kelly's, burned down.

"It was like the hub of all Irish activity," remembers Doran. "A lot of the parade committee members used to come in there, and I got to know them. I saw the camaraderie among these people and I thought that would be something I would like to do."

At that time in the early 1980s, only men were allowed to join parade committee. But later, after Patti Devine became the first woman to join the Holyoke parade committee, Doran joined.

Initially, as a resident of Leeds, Doran joined the Northampton parade committee. She became the liaison from Northampton to the Holyoke committee. "Then I got involved with Holyoke, and the committee, and that's how I got to where I am," she said.

On Jan. 10, Doran was named the 2016 recipient of the Gallivan Award by the Holyoke parade committee. It's given to a member of the parade committee who has

made significant contributions to the overall success of the parade but is not a resident of Holyoke. Peter Krisak was the 2015 recipi-

During the presentation, the committee read background information about the recipient. "As soon as they got to Northampton, I just kind of lost it, and don't remember what was said after that," said Doran.

Having been selected makes Doran feel proud.

"I don't like to be in the limelight," she said. "I like to just be a little person and do what I can do and not get recognition." Although, she said, "It's wonderful to get their recognition."

Doran grew up with a strong Irish background. "I always loved all things Irish," she

Her uncle, Thomas "Jinx" Powers, was among the original members of the West Springfield parade committee.

"That was my first real connection to the parade, and from then on, I just went to all the parades," she said.

> Since then, Doran has chaired the golf committee, worked at the Holyoke Mall parade store, worked on the road race, helped with parade coordination and was a member of the board of directors and the former "love-in" commit-She received Northampton parade committee's

James Brennan Award in 2011. She calls members of the com-

mittees family. "It's such a great group of people, and everybody works hard," she said.

Doran loves every aspect of the Holyoke St. Patrick's Parade. "Usually on parade day, we are down in Holyoke at the crack of dawn and everyone has jobs to do and areas they're supposed to work in," she said. "Just the extent of the whole weekend, starting with the road race and then the parade" is

what she most looks forward to experienc-

While she has always fondly thought about her uncle who sparked her parade passion, Doran said she's thinking about him more now that she's been given the Gallivan Award. It's easy to draw a connection to Powers

"He was a huge Irish influence in my life," she said. "He loved to sing Irish songs and do all things Irish."

The West Springfield parade committee has an award named after him, the Thomas Jinx Powers Award. Similarly to the Gallivan Award, it is given to "someone that has worked hard for the betterment of the parade," said Doran.

The Holyoke St. Patrick's Parade is "the best parade ever," said Doran. "It takes a village to put on the parade, and everyone works for the greater good. Everyone is so happy to be doing what they're doing and they're a great group of people. I'm just very honored to be part of this committee and I'm very honored to receive this


department is contracting to perform the security upgrades is holding the \$149,000 price through the end of January. He expects the cost would rise if the Selectboard did not immediately approve of the spending.

Selectboard member Bruce Forcier said, "It's not going to impact borrowing," and voted in favor of the upgrades. "Going forward with the other schools," he said, "I think we have to have a larger discussion with Town Meeting in this regard."

The Selectboard unanimously voted in favor of the additional spending.

Work is set to begin in February.

aid and medication - for every classroom, emergency binders with information and contacts in every classroom, and securing school entrances.

"When I came in six years ago in my job, I just saw that it [security] was lacking," said Fleming. "I wasn't very happy with the safety and security of the schools. The old Plains School and Mosier School - they didn't have any locks on the classrooms."

Without revealing every detail of the updated security measures for safety's sake, Fleming said he has

worked well with South Hadley School Superintendent Nicholas Young, school administrators and South Hadley Police Chief David LaBrie in making the much-needed changes.

"Basically, I just saw that things weren't how they should be," said Fleming. For instance, students at South Hadley High School previously were able to enter the school through multiple entrances. Now, they're only able to enter through one.

"I think it's good for the whole

town, to be honest with you, but I don't want to take credit for everything," said the humble Fleming of the security updates. "You gotta have everybody on the same page.'

South Hadley staff will now be able and equipped to react to any situation.

> "Basically, the staff is a parent of the kids while they're in school," said Fleming of what he told teachers and administrators.

It was after Fleming collaborated with the state police on a lockdown drill for South Hadley teachers four years ago that he became more involved with the state police unit, specifically Troop B. Today, he works with the troop recommending and helping to implement safety

measures in schools throughout

troop "bridges a gap" between local and state police. Once every few weeks he collaborates with Troop B and a Massachusetts town or city, where he can offer a local perspective.

"Our school district is one of the districts they [CAT] look at for their shining star," said Fleming. "That's the example they show our school district. They even utilize things they've done

in our school district."

For his efforts, Fleming was recently honored with the state police superintendent's unit commendation.

"I think it was nice for them to include me," said Fleming of the award.

Fleming has worked with the South Hadley Police Department for a total of 27 years, and became the South Hadley SRO six years ago. He attended South Hadley High School and graduated from Westfield State College in 1989 where he majored in criminal justice. He lives in Granby and is married with two children.

"Steve has kind of been at the forefront for pushing for school safety here in South Hadley," said LaBrie who commended Fleming for his work. "He has been advocating for a more secure environment, being able to lock school doors or teachers being able to lock their own doors."

LaBrie praised Fleming for getting "the state police school safety team down here," he said. "They made recommendations for the town to consider. They've put most of these suggestions into place, and Steve has been at the forefront of the effort."

Both the police and school departments have received extensive training "and it's because of Steve's relationship with the state police school team," said LaBrie. "The state police themselves recognize how far Western Massachusetts has come in dealing with these school security

## Don't leave furry friends in the cold

hile Mother Nature has surely been wishy-washy with the weather this winter, its imperative we don't forget about our four-legged furry friends when it comes to their seasonal needs.

The Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency (MEMA) has offered tips to help pet owners ensure they are being responsible caregivers during these wonky winter months in New England.

First, do not leave your pet outdoors when temperatures drop below freezing. You wouldn't want to be out there - why would the dog?

They need outdoor exercise, but take care not to keep them outdoors for lengthy periods of time during very cold weather. Pets that are mostly indoors need time to adapt to cold temperatures by building up a thicker coat and toughening their footpads for ice and snow.

Short-coated dogs may feel more comfortable wearing a sweater during walks.

We shod our feet in thick winter boots that are weather and waterproof to prevent frostbite and the same goes for our pet; we need to care for their feet, too. If your pet walks on salted or chemically treated areas, be sure to wash its paws after your walk. Gently rub the bottom of the feet to remove these irritants as soon as your dog is off the road.

Many dogs need boots in cold weather, regardless of their coat length. If your dog frequently lifts up its paws, whines or stops during walks, it may be demonstrating its feet are uncomfortably cold.

Wind-chill is also a threat to pets, even those protected by shelters. Outdoor dogs must be protected by a dry, draft-free doghouse that is large enough to allow it to both sit and lie down comfortably, but small enough to retain body heat.

The floor should be elevated a few inches off the ground and covered with cedar shavings or straw. The entrance of the doghouse should be turned to face away from prevailing winds, and the entrance should be covered with a flap of heavy waterproof fabric or heavy plastic.

Though do remember the best place for them is really inside, enjoying the warmth of the bouse


And, just like the hot summer months, never leave a pet locked inside a car during extremely cold weather. Cars can actually act like a refrigerator, holding in cold air, putting your pet at rick

Also, be leery of frozen bodies of water. Always keep pets on a leash when walking near suspected frozen bodies of water like lakes or ponds. The ice may not be sturdy enough to support its weight. If a pet falls through the ice, do not attempt to rescue it yourself; call 911 or go for help.

Other big dangers of the winter months are antifreeze and de-icing chemicals, which can be extremely hazardous. Many types of antifreeze have a sweet taste that can attract animals, but if they ingest the chemical it may prove to be fatal. Always store antifreeze out of reach and clean up spills.

Finally, be sure to make sure there are no animals seeking warmth and shelter inside your car engine. Warm automobile engines are dangerous for cats and small wildlife.

Parked vehicles can attract small animals, which may crawl under the hood to seek warmth. To avoid injuring hiding animals, bang on your car's hood to scare them off before starting your engine.




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## Blood donor centers challenged as supply is low

hy not make a resolution to start a new habit in 2016? Give the gift of life, often.

Blood is traditionally in short supply during the winter months due to the holidays, travel schedules, inclement weather and illness.

January, in particular, is a difficult month for blood cen-

ters to collect blood donations, and a reduction in turnout can put the nation's blood inventory at a critical low.

Baystate Medical Center is joining hundreds of blood centers across the country in encouraging the public to become regular blood donors beginning this January as a tie-in to National Blood Donor Month.

"By donating blood you will become a hero to someone by making sure there is blood on our shelves when a patient desperately needs it. With just one donation – and blood is something that most people can spare – you could help save more than one life," said Dr. Chester Andrzejewski, medical director, Transfusion Medicine Services, Baystate Medical Center.

Every day in America, about 41,000 units of blood are needed in hospitals and emergency treatment facilities for patients with cancer and other diseases, for organ transplant recipients, and to help save the lives of accident victims. But, while some 38 percent of the American population is believed to be eligible to donate blood, less than 10 percent actually do

At Baystate Health, 100 percent of all blood and platelet donations made to its Blood Donor Program are used locally in western Massachusetts. Each year at Baystate, over 5,800 patients receive more than 23,000 transfusions of blood products.

Donors must be at least age 17, weigh at least 110 pounds, be in good health, and have a photo ID. Donors are able to give blood every eight weeks.

Currently at Baystate Medical Center and around the country there is an urgent need for new platelet donors. Platelets are important in the control of bleeding and are generally used in patients with leukemia and other forms of cancer, open heart surgery patients, transplant patients, and some trauma patients. Since they must be used within five days, maintaining an adequate supply is always a challenge. Baystate's Blood Donor Center now has new, state-of-the-art plateletpheresis machines called Trimas that are faster, provide a better end product, and use only one needle.

The Blood Donor Center at Baystate Medical Center is located in the hospital's Daly Building at 759 Chestnut St. in Springfield. Hours are Monday, Thursday, and Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Tuesday and Wednesday from noon to 8 p.m. Free valet parking is available at the Daly entrance.

At Baystate Noble Hospital, the Blood Donor Room is located on the first floor of the hospital located on 115 West Silver St. in Westfield. It will be open on Thursday, Jan. 28 from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Appointments and information are available by calling 413-794-4600. The public can also participate in one of the many blood drives during January sponsored by Baystate Medical Center's Blood Donor Center.

Each eligible donor at the January community blood drives can select one from among 10 "Pick Your Plastic" gift cards for groceries, shopping, coffee and more.

To book an appointment at one of the blood drives, call 413-794-4600. Walk-ins are also welcome. Donors with appointments will be seen first.

## Red Cross has emergency need for blood, platelet donations

REGION- The American Red Cross has an emergency need for blood and platelet donors. Severe winter weather since Jan. 1 has forced the cancellation of more than 300 blood drives across 20 states, resulting in more than 9,500 donations uncollected, further depleting an already low winter supply. Blood donation appointments can be quickly and easily scheduled by using the Red Cross Blood Donor App, visiting redcrossblood.org or calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767).

"Blood products are being delivered to hospitals as quickly as donations are coming in," said Nick Gehrig, communications director, Red Cross Blood Services. "Eligible donors are urged to make an appointment to give blood or platelets now and help ensure blood products are available for patients locally, and across the country, including areas severely impacted by winter weather."

The Red Cross must collect approximately 14,000 blood and platelet donations every day for the patients at about 2,600 hospitals and transfusion centers nationwide. Blood and platelets are needed to respond to patient emergencies, including accident and burn victims, heart surgery and organ transplant patients, and those receiving treatment for leukemia, cancer or sickle cell disease.

#### How to donate blood

A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age (16 with parental consent in some states), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood donors can now save time at their next donation by using RapidPass to complete their pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, from a home or work computer prior to arriving at the blood drive. 

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


