Two charged in attemped robbery at Ohio Savings **Bank in Garfield Heights**



An attempted robbery at the Ohio Savings Bank in Garfield Heights led to charges being filed against two men last Saturday morning.

Two males, ages 32 and 16, have been formally charged with aggravated **Bedford PD** robbery in a foiled attempt to get money from the vaults at the Ohio Savings Bank on Turney Rd. in Garfield Heights last Saturday, according to Garfield Heights Police Lt. Robert Byrne.

The assistant branch manager told police she was in the process of opening the bank that morning, around 8:40 a.m., when she and her employees were approached by a man, later identified as Landon McFarland, 32, of Bedford, who allegedly forced them inside at gunpoint and told them to open the bank vault.

She told police that McFarland said, "Give me the money. I'm not playing, I don't want anyone dying today.'

The employee said a second male then entered, later identified as a 16year-old Clevelander, who also pointed a gun at them and insisted they open the vaults. The employee said the vaults could not be opened and the males became agitated and told the employees to go outside.

Once outside, one of the males took an employees' purse and told all of them to run away. As the employees got to the Shell gas station next door to call for help, one of them said she watched the males get into a darkcolored Dodge and flee onto Carpenter Rd.

While enroute to the bank, two GHPD officers on Libby Rd. passed a car matching the description of the robbers' car. As the officers turned around and began to follow it, the driver, allegedly McFarland, pulled over, got out of the car with his hands up and began walking backwards. One of the officers ordered him to the ground at gunpoint and arrested him, at which time the teen got out of the vehicle and fled on foot towards Broadway Ave.

The other officer chased him on Broadway Ave. to Friend Ave. in Maple Heights then lost sight of him. Awitness directed police to a wooded area where he spotted the teen, and a chase continued on Libby Rd. and across the street to the area of Baraona's Bakery. At that time, the officer was told by dispatch that a Maple Heights police officer had apprehended the teen in front of Shades Towing on the corner of Libby and Paine.

According to the report, as policewere handcuffing McFarland, he kept saying, "I am going to get 25 to life for this." Police asked what he was referring to and he allegedly said, "The bank robbery."

Police searched McFarland and found \$590 in his pants pocket, which he insisted had not come from the Garfield Heights robbery. Sgt. Jim Mendolera said police believe the money came from a robbery in Bedford the night before this incident. Bedford Police are still investigating.

Police said McFarland told them he had stolen the vehicle and had kidnapped the teen at gunpoint. He also told police he stopped his car and surrendered because he did not want any "shooting" or anyone to get hurt. The report said McFarland repeated, "I screwed up. I'm a bad person," numerous times.

Inside the vehicle police found a chrome Ruger and a revolver in the glove box. Acheck through LEADS found the Ruger was entered as stolen through Cleveland PD. The employee's black purse was found on the floor of the passenger side of the vehicle.

Both males have been charged with aggravated robbery. McFarland has also been charged with kidnapping and is being held on a \$250,000 first degree felony, and is expected bond, according to Sgt. Mendolera. Lt. Byrne said the teen will be to be indicted on robbery and kid-

arrests man on rape charges

The following information was reported by Bedford Police Department Detective Sergeant Brian Byard:

On August 24, at approximately 3:45 a.m., a female called Bedford Police Department to report that she had just been raped by a male at gunpoint.

The female reported that she had been walking northbound on Warrensville Čenter Rd., just past the Bedford Police Department, when a male ran up behind her sticking a gun to her head. The suspect forced the victim to a grassy area off the roadway, where he proceeded to sexually assault and rob the victim of \$300.

By Monday, Aug. 25, Bedford detectives obtained a possible susect, Montana Hudson, 23, from East 141st St. in Cleveland. The victim positively identified Hudson as the male who raped and robbed

On August 26, Bedford police, along with the U.S. Marshal's Violent Fugitive Task Force, set out to arrest Hudson. At approximately 3 p.m., Hudson was arrested without incident walking near an apartment complex in Warrensville Heights.

Bedford Police detectives interviewed the suspect and he subsequently admitted to the sexual assault. The gun used in the crime was recovered in a nearby home.

Hudson remains in Bedford City Jail on a \$500,000 bond and was expected to be transferred to Cuyahoga County Jail last Friday. Hudson was charged with rape, a napping charges as well.

Road work continues along Fleet Avenue



Yesterday work on the Fleet Avenue Rehabilitation Project was moved to the area spanning Independence Road to Broadway Avenue on Fleet Avenue. All westbound traffic is being maintained in a single lane.

All eastbound Fleet Avenue traffic is being detoured westbound onto Fleet Avenue, then southbound onto Washington Park Boulevard, then eastbound onto Harvard Avenue, then northbound onto East 71st Street back to Fleet Avenue.

Access to all driveways will be maintained during this phase of the project. On-street parking will be prohibited. This phase of work is expected to be in effect until December 2014.

The Fleet Avenue Rehabilitation Project is reconstructing 1.03 miles of Fleet Avenue including pavement replacement between Independence Road to East 65 Street and resurfacing Fleet Avenue from East 65 Street to Broadway Avenue.

Garfield Hts. vs. Collinwood football game cancelled after fights break out

During the third quarter of the Garfield Heights High School home football game against visiting Collinwood High School last Friday night, a series of fights in the stands and on the field led to the cancellation of the game, which Garfield Heights had been winning by a score of 26-6.

A total of 11 students, 7 of them football players and 4 high school non-athlete students, will face varying levels of consequences for their involvement in the altercation with Collinwood players, according to a statement issued yesterday by the Garfield Heights City Schools.

As stated in the police report on the incident, two GHPD officers working off duty at the game were checking to see if an injured player on the field needed a squad called when they saw a large fight in the south end of the Garfield Heights side of the stands.

Officers ran to the stands to assist school staff in dealing with the fight, and they escorted several juveniles to the parking lot with the help of other on-duty officers.

While this was going on police were advised of another fight in the stands and a fight on the field between the two football teams, with several fans entering the field of

One of the officers went onto the field to help GHHS Principal Tammy Hager with a female student who had run onto the field to fight, according to the police report. The female resisted and tried to get away from the officer and get placed under arrest and taken from

Cuyahoga Heights and Maple Heights police were called to assist as fighting on and off the field continued. The game was cancelled shortly after 9 p.m. and everyone was asked to leave the stadium.

Five students were arrested and taken to City Jail and charged with disorderly conduct. Two were later




