On the sporting fields, our Athletics team has once again been highly successful at the Eastern region championships. The final results saw RSC victors by 260 points from Vermont SC who were in second place. Next week there are 24 individual event winners and 4 relay teams participating at State level finals at Albert Park Lakeside Stadium . Good Luck to all our competitors.

I am particularly looking forward to our Art and Technology show at the end of next week. It is a great showcase of student talent in these areas and always a highlight of the annual calendar.

Three of our Year 8 boys: Caleb Lindner, Lincoln Meyer, and Rory Smyth, have won the 2012 RACV Transmission film competition. The competition is open for all Year 7 to 12 students in Victoria, and calls for films that tackle a road safety topic relevant to young people, like driver distraction, texting, speeding, and wearing seat belts.

This means that they have taken 3 out of the possible 5 prizes awarded in this film competition! Well done boys and thanks to Ms Asbury for her support of this initiative.

We value the correct wearing of our uniform and ask parents and guardians to assist us with implementing our uniform policy.

As the weather improves during Term 4 students will be wearing summer uniform, and as a reminder to college members, the correct summer uniform is listed below.

GIRLS:

College dress or grey College brand tailored shorts or grey slacks, white socks, green College jumper, College polo shirt or white short/long sleeved shirt and black polishable leather/vinyl T-bar or lace up shoes.

BOYS:

College polo shirt, grey College jumper, grey College brand shorts or trousers, white socks, grey shirts with College tie and black polishable leather/vinyl lace up or zip up shoes.

The following items are not to be worn:

• Rugby tops with dresses, pants or shorts. Rugby tops are part of the PE uniform.

- Light grey trousers, Jeans or shorts
- Non-regulation shorts for girls. Shorts that are not of the required length are not permissible.

• Non regulation shoes such as: canvas shoes, ballet flats or sports shoes

Also, a reminder to students and parents that facial piercings, other than those stipulated in the student diary, are not permitted, even if covered by a dressing. Students wearing unacceptable piercings will be asked to remove these items and may also incur additional consequences for not adhering to our student dress code.

Council is pleased and enthusiastic at the Ringwood Trade Training Facility (RTTF) projections for an increase in numbers of enrolled students across all courses. This bodes well for the future with the trades that are on offer at our facility.

Council fully supports without question the letter sent by the principals of Ringwood Secondary College, Aquinas College, Our Lady's Primary School and Great Ryrie Primary School in regards to the urgent safety concerns of the Bedford Road / Great Ryrie Street Rail Crossing intersection. It is extremely disappointing that over a number of years with numerous representations and promises

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made, that nothing major has been done to address this most important issue of safety to our collective schools and the broader local community. It is also noted by council that on both the Belgrave and Lilydale train lines over the last few years, traffic lights have been installed at numerous other rail crossings. The most important crossing without question, which facilitates four local schools, is still being ignored! Council also acknowledges and appreciates the letter of support sent to VicRoads regarding this matter by the Member for Bayswater, Mrs Heidi Victoria, MP, Parliamentary Secretary to the Premier.

Council has endorsed the selection of builder to deliver the exciting expansion to the college technical office which will greatly increase staff space and student accessibility. Assistant Principal Chris Salisbury, who also wears the hat of College Facilities Manager, has been fully involved in this project and informs council that all is progressing well with a hopeful completion date prior to the end of this year. Youth in Philanthropy – Lord Mayor's Charitable Foundation

This year a group of five of us have been involved in the Youth in Philanthropy project which works with the Lord Mayor's Charitable Foundation. We were given control of \$15,000 worth of donations to distribute between our three charities based on their applications,



their needs and the outcomes they were able to achieve with the money they were given. The three charities we have worked with are:

The Wilderness Society which is a community based environmental protection organisation. They work to safe guard our sources of clean water and air to tackle the devastating climate change to create a safe future for life on earth and provide a better world for our children.

Safe Futures which is a women and children's refuge home based close to Ringwood, where those affected by domestic violence can recover in a secure, safe ans secret location.

Heathmont Interchurch Help which is a voluntary welfare organisation supported by the Christian churches in Heathmont, which provides practical care and support for those in need. They supply food parcels and other domestic requirements for the families in need in the Maroondah region.

We were provided with each organisation's grant application, supporting documents and an annual report. Careful and thorough assessment was made and several discussions held before we visited the charities. We also undertook our own research by visiting the



charities' websites. The presentation made by each of the charities we visited was a major influence on our decisions to grant \$5000 to Wilderness Society, \$4789 to Safe Futures and \$5211 to Heathmont Interchurch Help. Through participating in the Youth Grant Makers Program run by the Lord Mayors Charitable Foundation, we have gained a greater understanding how vital charities are to the helping families and worthwhile causes in the community. We have learnt how charities work and have had to think about things from each charity's perspective. It has been a great challenge in working out how much money to give each charity and work through differences in opinions. Our mentor Stephanie Orr has been invaluable in providing us with information and ideas into the way we think about the charities and without her the decision would have been a lot harder. Thank you for all your help Stephanie and for guiding us in the right direction. Also thank you to Kim and all the organisers of the Youth Grant Makers Program for providing us with this opportunity. Thank you to Kimberly Hall (our school co-ordinator) for making this opportunity possible.

SLEEP

As the Year 12 approach the exams you will be given many tips for your exams but a very IMPORTANT tip is 'keep your regular sleep routine'. This is because sleep is VITAL to your well being.

Not getting enough sleep can:

• Limit your ability to learn, listen, concentrate and solve problems.

Contribute to illness.

• Lead to aggressive or inappropriate behaviour such as yelling at your friends or being impatient with your teachers or family members.

• Cause you to eat too much or eat unhealthy foods like sweets and fried foods that lead to weight gain.

• Make you more prone to pimples.

Solutions:

• Make sleeping a priority – establish a routine, set a bedtime and a wake-up time and stick to those times. Decide what you need to change to get enough sleep for you to remain healthy.

• Make your room your haven, keep it dark and cool and free of distractions.

• Naps can help but if they are too close to bedtime they can interfere with your normal sleep.

• Try and have quiet time before going to bed – no computer, TV, phone etc and you will go to sleep much more quickly.

- Set a routine that you follow each night.
- 20 30 minutes physical exercise in the late afternoon.
- Avoid caffeine too close to bedtime so no tea, coffee, coke etc.

Studies have shown that most teens require 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ - 9 hours sleep a night to perform at their best, by following some of the above suggestions this may be possible.

This information is not only important for our Year 12 students but for all of us – the bottom line – we all perform better with a good night's sleep!





EMA - Newsletter Information 2013



Education Maintenance Allowance - information for parents currently receiving EMA

Changes to the Education Maintenance Allowance (EMA) for 2013:

The EMA continues to help families on lower incomes with financial assistance to cover the cost of educational expenses including **textbooks**, **stationery**, **uniforms** and **excursions** for their child up until the age of 16.

From 2013, the Victorian Government is restructuring the EMA to better target financial support to families on lower incomes. Payments made direct to parents will be increased for eligible recipients at all year levels up to age 16, with an additional increase for parents with students in Years Prep and 7 in recognition of the additional costs at these transition points.

In 2013 the annual EMA payment for families with children in primary school (years 1-6) will receive a payment of \$150. Families with children in secondary school (Year 8 up until the age of 16) will receive \$250.

The School Start Bonus which was previously received by EMA families has been discontinued as a separate payment from 2013 and added to the EMA. As a result, parents of children in Prep and Year 7 will receive boosted EMA payments of \$200 and \$300 respectively in those years.

From 2013, schools will no longer receive EMA payments on behalf of parents. However, \$62 million over four years will be redirected to the State's most needy schools to assist families on lower incomes. These funds will form part of the school Student Resource Packages to be allocated at the local level.

Eligibility:

To be eligible for the EMA in 2013, you must:

- be either a parent or guardian of a primary or secondary school student up to the age of sixteen; and
- be an eligible beneficiary of a Centrelink pension, allowance or benefit within the meaning of the State Concessions Act 2004* or be a Veterans Affairs (TPI) pensioner or be a temporary foster parent.
 - * i.e the parent/guardian must be the holder of a valid Health Care Card or valid Pension Card.

The eligibility criteria must be met as at 29 January 2013 (Instalment One) and 15 July 2013 (Instalment Two).

The EMA application form must be submitted to the school by 28 February 2013.

You can receive the EMA by direct deposit into your nominated bank account or by individual cheque which will be posted to the school for collection. You may also redirect your payment directly to the College which you can use towards educational expenses for your child.

Schoolkids Bonus:

From January 2013, a new payment called the 'Schoolkids Bonus' will be introduced by the Commonwealth Government. The Schoolkids Bonus will be paid by Centrelink in January and July each year to help families with school costs.

Families receiving Family Tax Benefit Part A will receive:up to \$410 for each child in primary school

• up to \$820 for each child in secondary school.

As we start Term 4 I thought it would be good to update parents and students about the school requirements in relation to all matters to do with attendance.

WHAT A STUDENT NEEDS TO DO IF THEY ARE LATE TO SCHOOL

- 1. Go to the Admin office and sign in even if you have a note
- 2. Do not go to class or your locker without doing step 1
- 3. If you have signed in with no note take the late slip home to be signed by your parent or guardian and return this way you will not be at risk of getting a detention.

Students with a history of being late to school with no note will be given a college detention and /or a letter sent home to parents or guardians advising them of the continuing lateness.

WHAT TO DO IF A STUDENT IS ABSENT FOR ANY REASON

- 1. Wherever possible please ring the attendance line on the day of the absence
- 2. if you are leaving a message remember to:
 - give the reason for the absence
 - the duration of the absence
 - and if you need a staff member specifically notified for any reason

HOLIDAY ABSENCES
