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Tell Why You L 🧡 VE 4-H

Many people have heard about 4-H but don't understand what it is or where to go and because of our history people think 4-H is only about rural activities. 4-H is much more than that, it is about Youth Development.

One way you and your club can help promote 4-H and get more members for the program and your club is to make promotion one of your goals. Here are some ideas:

Happy members are the best promotion. Word-of-mouth is very powerful! If your members are happy with their 4-H experiences, they will tell others about them.

Welcome new members. When new members attend your meeting, make them feel welcome, be sure they are greeted and make them feel part of the group. Many children are shy and have a difficult time getting acquainted. If they don't have a good experience, they might not come back.

Promoting 4-H

- **Tell a positive and accurate story.** Perception is more influential than the truth, therefore, your promotional efforts should be positive and polished, per example: make sure the posters are neat and complete.
- **Promotion should happen all the time.** Special events are only part of the total effort. Promotion is a continual process, the public today is different than tomorrow.
- **Promotion should use different channels.** Vary your ways to promote 4-H, make posters, send announcements to the radio, write a letter to the editor at your local newspaper, use the 4-H Facebook page, etc.
- **Be creative.** People like to hear and try new things all the time. Try a new way to promote 4-H! Be unique and get noticed.

- **Other promotion ideas.** Use and adapt the ideas listed below as needed.
- * Join the celebration and participate in National
 4-H week, October 4 10, 2015
- * Wear your 4-H pride: t-shirts, buttons, etc.
- * Community service is a great way to create public relations.
- * Send announcements to your local newspaper, the Facebook page, etc.
- Host a "poster making" party/contest. Make sure to include details like: place and time of your meeting and contact numbers. Place the posters in public places (with permission)
- * Don't forget to send thank you cards to the people who helped you, great way to maintain their support.
- * Host an open house.

Purchase or create placemats and donate them to a local restaurant.

- * Arrange public presentations at school, libraries and community groups.
- * Participate in community functions: parades, Fondue Fest, etc.
- * Create a club banner to be used at public events.

The UW-Extension office will support your promotional efforts - send us pictures, articles, stories to be featured in the "Family Times" newsletter, Facebook, etc. We can also provide promotional materials such as 4-H brochures, flyers, stickers, etc.



My name is Jacob Loehr and I was selected as a delegate for CWF this year, and just went on the trip from June 13-21. This experience was a blast and included: A tour of the Gettysburg Civil War battlefield, a trip to Mount Vernon to see George Washington's home, a night tour of all of the monuments and memorials in D.C., a visit to the capitol and a chance to meet our state's senators, and going to the national mall and visiting any of the Smithsonian's you wanted to. Wood shavings, goat hair, and judging notebooks characterized my summers growing up, rather than the traditional sunscreen and bathing suits. I spent most of my time with Sarah, Ace, Geoffrey, and Habanero -- all sheep or goats in our show string.

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My 4-H career spanned nearly every conceivable event and team. I sewed, judged livestock, went to 4-H camp, learned to safely shoot BB guns, cured country hams, attended national conferences, and gave speeches. Dipping my toe into so many disciplines definitely made me a more well-rounded student, but my heart lied in the livestock program, specifically in Skillathon. I enjoyed that part of the livestock competitions the most because you relied solely on your ability and knowledge of animal science. Ten years of work and study culminated at the 2007 National 4-H Skillathon Contest in Louisville, Kentucky. My sister and I were on our county team (not to mention coached by our mother!) representing Kentucky 4-H and to our delight won the National Contest! This remains my proudest accomplishment as a 4-H member.

Certainly the more traditional 4-H projects continue to remain relevant and practical, but I learned some of my most important lessons in an initiative Christian County 4-H took on called Youth in Governance (YIG). This program trained youth in advocacy and how government worked. Through our efforts, youth were placed as nonvoting members of various boards and government agencies. We contended that the voice of youth was valuable and worth hearing. I was an ex-officio member of our local Economic Development Council (EDC), where I learned how industry impacts a community, how local governance works (or doesn't), and most importantly in my mind, the value of caring. When I was a teenager, it certainly wasn't "cool" to be passionate about something. Apathy was popular and being on the EDC as part of YIG showed me that people dedicated to a cause get things done in their community. That lesson has stayed with me and ultimately played a part in my decision to join the Peace Corps, where I'm still working with 4-H in Jamaica. Our YIG group went to the Citizenship Washington Focus in 2004 and happened to be there during President Reagan's funeral, certainly a memorable experience.

One of my most treasured memories in 4-H is when I was an adult counselor at 4-H camp. I always preferred to be in charge of the youngest girls, even though they were often plagued with homesickness; the drama and boycraziness of the older girls hadn't hit them yet, for which I was profoundly thankful. In Kentucky 4-H camps, a Spirit Stick is awarded to the teams with the most "spirit" at each evenings' activities; basically, the loudest ones. This always put my little ones at a disadvantage, but one night they pulled out all the stops and were awarded the Spirit Stick. To this day, I don't know why it touched me so much, perhaps we'd been denied it so long, but I was unbelievably proud of those girls.

My 4-H activities and animal science knowledge led me to receive my BS in Animal Science from the University of Kentucky and my MS, also in Animal Science, from Virginia Tech. The people I've met and friendships forged throughout the years have certainly enriched my life and made me a better person. I carry with me all the lessons that I learned through 4-H, especially applicable as I continue my Peace Corps service in Jamaica. I don't know what my next step in life will be, but you can bet 4-H will be part of it.

- With caller ID being so common, you may have the direct number to an educator. Because we are often at meetings or programs, your question might be answered faster if you call the main office and speak with an administrative assistant. They can tell you if someone is out of the office, so that you have a better sense of when to expect a reply.
- We have an answering service, so messages may be left in the evening or weekend.

Fond du Lac County 4-H Policy on

Membership

- Youth wishing to join Fond du Lac County 4-H must be enrolled in kindergarten (and be at least five years old by October 1, 2015) through one year after high school graduation. Youth in grades K-2 enroll in the Cloverbud project.
- Re-enrollment period is until October 31. New member enrollments will be accepted until Jan. 31, 2016. Members not enrolled by the appropriate date will not be eligible to exhibit for a premium at the 2016 Fond du Lac County Fair. They may show for ribbon only. Youth will be able to participate in other club and county events. Memberships must be accepted all year long.
- 3. Dropping a project must be done in writing by the first Friday in April. Projects may not be added after the enrollment deadline.
- 4. Policy on re-enrollment of non-achievement members is left to the local club.
- 5. It is recommended that younger members take one project only, and a maximum of five projects be taken by older members.
- 6. A member should satisfactorily complete all pro-

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jects carried in order to be an achieving member. (See Fond du Lac County 4-H Achievement Policy)

- Members qualify for full graduation honors upon completion of high school, though they have the option to remain in 4-H one year past high school graduation.
- 8. A member is to enroll in one 4-H club during the enrollment year.

Notes on 4-H Enrollment

The 2015-2016 4-H year is fast approaching! General Leaders, or Enrollment Leaders, may pick-up enrollment information at the UW-Extension office. Starting September 3 each family can input and update their own on-line enrollment data. Members enroll based upon their grade as of October 1, 2015. This is when the 4-H year begins. You will specify literature requests in the on-line enrollment system. Re-enrolling deadline is October 31, and new enrollees is January 31, to be eligible to exhibit at the Fond du Lac County Fair for premiums. Volunteer leaders must re-enroll annually. The 2015-16 Enrollment Booklet and Policy Guide is available from your club lead-

er or at <u>http://fonddulac.uwex.edu/4h/</u>

enrollment/, and includes step by step enroll-

ment instructions. New this year, the guide contains county 4-H event information that will be especially valuable to newer families. We encourage your family to keep the guide as a reference throughout the coming year. If you'd like help entering your information, you may come to the UW-Extension office Monday through Friday from 8 am to 4:30 pm. Tina Engelhardt, UWEX Administrative Assistant will be the main contact person at the office regarding enrollments. She may be reached at 920-929-3171 or tina.engelhardt@ces.uwex.edu

Enrollment Fee

Each 4-H member is assessed an enrollment fee of \$4.00. This fee increased by 50 cents this year. It helps cover the cost of insurance, Wisconsin 4-H Foundation annual assessment, volunteer background checks and general 4-H programs. Typically, each club will collect these dues this fall. However, some clubs do not collect dues directly from members, but pay the cost through their general club fundraisers. Clubs are billed in the spring. Any clubs who pay the bill after the due date will be assessed

\$4.50/member. This additional fee for late payment is to encourage clubs to pay their bill by the due date.



Helpful Project Explanations

<u>Dairy</u> - members wishing to sign up for dairy may do so by enrolling in ONE of the following: Dairy 1, 2 or 3. This will make you eligible to take an animal to the fair. Dairy Management project, does not make you eligible to take an animal to the fair. It is a hands-on project that focuses on management skills in operating a dairy. It involves guest speakers and tours.

<u>Self-Determined</u> - is designing your own project. In order to exhibit in it at the fair you must be enrolled in it.
