At the recent AGM I presented the accounts for 2013 and they are now available for you to view on the members' page of the Guild website. Postage costs had just been increased by a large margin and expenses relating to exam marking were running in excess of fees paid by members for marking. In addition the prolonged recession had meant that our numbers had started to diminish.

Therefore, the Committee had to take action otherwise our reserves would slowly get depleted over time. Subscriptions were increased in 2013 after being held for several years. In addition the exam marking procedure has now been completely reviewed and revamped so that exam fees paid now cover the costs involved. As a result our reserves now present a much healthier picture and subs for 2015 will remain at the same rates. Recently Celia Preston and Mary Price have been chasing up overdue subs for 2014 and I would be very grateful if you can respond to them or me as soon as possible if you have received an email. I will be on the Guild stand at the Bristol show so please come and say hello. We will be very pleased to see you.

The AGM was held on the 26 April in Lichfield, a big thank you to those who were able to attend – the meeting went well and I thank everyone for their contribution, especially about communications. One of the issues raised at the AGM was about taking exams – needless to say you don't have to take the exams if you become a guild member, but I am sure you will gain a sense of achievement if you try.

Jackie Rainbow – Membership Secretary

Thank you for allowing me to take on another year as Membership Secretary following my completion of three years in this role. I will be standing for an additional year rather than three as I am aware that the Treasurer and Membership Secretary roles were both filled in 2011 there was a real possibility that both posts could become vacant at the same time.

This means that this time next year the membership will have to vote again to fill the role. Before then, please consider whether you would be interested in taking on any role which may become vacant on the Committee and feel free to ask questions of those of us who are currently serving.

Following the AGM in Lichfield, changes in membership numbers were noted. These are as follows.4 European Members, 42 in Midlands, 38 in North East, 27 in North West, 19 Overseas, 10 in Scotland, 32 in South East, 39 in South, 65 in South West, 26 in Wales. On the face of it, that sounds very healthy and stable, but unfortunately 62 members have yet to pay their 2014 subscriptions and 10 are believed to have lapsed. Included in the above are 14 Life Members (members who have played more than their part in forming and/or promoting the Guild, and encouraging excellence), 8 Committee Members and two Judges.

I am now looking forward to the Bristol Parchment Exhibition and my role as Refreshment Steward. Sue Pritchard, Registrar

At our recent AGM queries were raised in regard to exams as the numbers passing has obviously dropped. The numbers were expected to drop in the early stages of the changes and two of the members present who had failed their exams were happy to discuss how they felt about it, both felt it was the right decision and it encouraged them to improve to reach the required standard.

This is also in part due to now having only two intakes per year but with 15% of the intake passing, this will still seem very low and I received a few complaints that candidates thought the papers were being marked more harshly than before. The judging panel were consulted regarding this and one of the options was to allow a couple of failed pieces at the lower levels. It was concluded that the marking had not changed as the criteria was being followed and by allowing pieces to fail was not in the candidates best interest because they could consistently fail at a particular discipline and struggle further at the next level. We base our exam system on excellence within the craft and this is the aim we are continuing and by removing the old percentage marking the candidate can see where their strengths and weaknesses lie and address where required.

It is often the case that new members to the craft undertake the exams too quickly and are not ready for them and we would urge all candidates to make sure they understand the technique and skill required before submitting work. The judging panel appreciate a lot of time goes into the pieces and believe me they want to give passes but can only do so if the piece is worked correctly.

Our next intake is: **Monday 08 Sept 2014** and I will shortly be putting a Guide on the website as a reminder of what you should send when submitting papers for marking.

And finally, I must congratulate Barbara who at her first attempt has passed all of her pieces taken in April 2014

My commiserations go to those, at all levels, who were unsuccessful. Some were very close with their pieces and taking on board the judges' comments and giving that extra push I am sure a certificate will come their way.

Hope to see you at Bristol where you can visit the Guild stand for advice and likewise Harrogate where Linda and Gail will be available but don't forget all of our judges are happy to hear from you and will help you with your queries.

Hello everyone,

News from Swansea is not good for parchment craft. As a result of cuts in funding to the adult learning sector, the thirty parchment craft students at the Swansea Lifelong Learning Service are facing a huge increase in enrolment fees next term. The service is a lifeline to crafters unable to afford private tuition but they will now have to pay almost three times more in order to keep classes

going. Many of the students have been coming to classes for over eight years and the weekly sessions have become a very important part of their lives. It is inevitable that a great number of students will not enrol again next term and with more cuts expected next year it looks like parchment craft will disappear from the list of courses (along with many others, no doubt). We are now trying to find cheap alternative venues so we can continue classes on our own if necessary.

All elected members of the committee must "hold a minimum of the Associate exam level" (to be removed) "have been a member of the Guild for a minimum of two consecutive years" (to be added)

Many questions were asked of the committee. The main one being about Guild exams. We were assured that they are still marking to the same criteria as always. The difference now is, in the past all marks for each piece were added together and became shown as a percentage, it depended on the percentage as to whether you had a pass, merit etc. Now everyone submitting exam papers must pass each piece. The testing board are looking for excellence in each of the pieces. The Testing Board's reasoning behind this, people who submit one or more poor pieces, because of the percentage system gained a pass, then went on to the next level, not correcting/improving in that particular technique. I know it can be difficult for people who are self-taught and have no Parchment craft teacher near to them. This shouldn't be a problem in the SW as there are several teachers in our area. If you do not know of anyone, who is a teacher, then please contact me and I will pass you on to someone in your County.

The next SW Guild Day will be on Saturday 4th October 2014, the invitation to members will be sent out early August. We will only be running three groups this time, so an early return of applications will be much appreciated. After listening to comments from last year the format will be slightly different. Heather Attwater in US/Canada



Celtic Hearts Pattern



Trace the outlines in white lead pencil. Remove from pattern, and rub tumble dryer sheet on back of work. Emboss all of the outlines with micro ball tool or scriber. If you prefer a wider outline, go over with a larger ball tool. Erase all pencil lines. Stipple areas marked S

Emboss the areas marked E (or colour or perforate every hole in fine grid).

Perforate the areas marked X and then cut with snips or scissors.

The corner hearts are quite small and can either be embossed or stippled.


Perforate the outer square, cut and attach to card stock.

Embellish as desired.

I have threaded ribbon through the centre of the main hearts and added a bow in the same colour. Brads or jewels will also enhance the piece.

Have fun, I am sure you will come up with your own ideas!

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AGM 2014 held in Curborough on April 26th.

Present: - 7 committee members plus 10 other Guild members. **Apologies for absence** from Coral Tomlin, Dorothy Holness, Marcia Wood-Krentz, Veda Gent, Pat Cairns and Alison Yeates.

- 1. The minutes of the 2013 AGM were read and agreed to be an accurate record.
- 2. Chair's report: Referring to the new exam system Linda said that what she would like to convey it is still in its early stages and continues to be 'fine-tuned'. She believes it to be a fairer system than the old one. Yes, there are unhappy candidates, but equally, this occurred with the old system too. Now we have a system to ensure that everyone who passes deserves to pass. When you pass an exam knowing that almost everyone passes it, then it's great, but not the achievement it should be and doesn't promote improvement. Under the new system, the candidate must improve in any areas that are not quite right before passing the whole exam. Linda stressed that this is not failure, the pieces that are good enough are passed and it's only necessary to resubmit the others. This has to be seen as promoting improvement. To pass an exam on the merit of some pieces alone gave a false sense of security. Many candidates then went on to other levels, some in a space of 3 months and made the same mistakes they did previously. Judges see this time and time again and it is frustrating as there is no greater feeling for a judge than to have a beautifully executed paper to mark. Every judge was once a candidate and some have known failure but persevered to reach their goal. Would that the roles were reversed so that candidates would appreciate what it is like to mark papers and then be subjected to wrath from those who fail. Every judge finds it hard and frustrating to mark papers. While judges mark to criteria an element of subjectivity can't be ruled out, hence the judging panel. Judges also keep in close contact and do their best to treat issues fairly. They all would prefer to mark a pass rather than a fail. Linda asked Dorothy Holness who is chair of the panel to write a few words.

Dorothy said, while trying our best to maintain a good standard, because of the subject there is no right or wrong answer. She reiterated Linda's comments about the differences between the old and the new system and said she believes that the news system is fairer. Personal preferences may have come to the fore when judges marked alone, but now by marking together, they can come to mutual agreement.

Linda thanked the committee for doing a super job and thanked Janice the secretary, (who was standing down) for her work on the news letter.

- 3. Treasurer's report. Janet's report is shown on page 2 of this newsletter.
- 4. Review of subscriptions. It was agreed unanimously to maintain the subscriptions at the same level.
- **5. Registrar's report**. Sue's report is shown on page 3 of this newsletter.
- **6. Membership Secretary's report.** Jackie's report is shown on page 2 of this newsletter.
- 7. Guild Facebook page: Discussion took place on the moderation of such a page. The suggestion was not supported.
- **8.** How to promote the Guild and the craft. Much discussion took place on this subject with various suggestions, including that a show 'offer' of the Guild book on Guidance for exams was made available at Harrogate and Bristol
- **9. Location and dates of AGM's**. The proposal that future AGM's should be held in areas that would not incur high costs for travel by the committee was agreed.

10. Election of committee and chair

Linda Williams announced she was standing down and Gail Sydenham agreed to step in for the year.

Jackie Rainbow continues for a further year as Membership secretary, Janet Snudden as Treasurer and Mary Price was voted in as secretary/newsletter editor.

The AGM for 2015 will be held on April 25th starting at 10am. Venue in South-West to be confirmed.
