Comments on the 29th Port Hope-Cobourg Christmas Bird Count *by Dennis Garratt*

In the January 2000 issue of the Curlew, a comment was made that a rather low total of 65 species was found during the 29th Port Hope-Cobourg CBC. It should be noted, however, that this was actually the 6th highest record since the local count was initiated in 1971. The mean number of species found per year since 1971 is only 60.97. During the last 19 years, the mean increased to 63.4 and only 3 times in our history has it been 70 or greater.

1999 PRESIDENT'S REPORT

On our way into the new millennium, *Willow Beach Field Naturalists* is almost 50 years old and a respected member of our communities.

This year saw growth in membership (now more than 275); a continuation of our 'usual' activities (issues of *The Curlew*, meetings, outings, etc.) and many new initiatives -- like our Young Naturalist outings program. Frankly, *Willow Beach Field Naturalists* 'usual' activities were pretty extraordinary.

- Management of Peter's Woods Provincial Nature Reserve. Led by coordinators Russ Lake and Audrey Wilson, many volunteer-hours of work went into this labour of love, under contract with the Ministry of Natural Resources.
- Bird Counts and Marsh Monitoring. This important scientific work was continued by a team led by Elizabeth Kellogg and Roger Frost. Areas included: Willow Beach Marsh, Carr's Marsh and Port Hope shore marsh (near the mouth of Gage's Creek). Roger also led our 3rd Annual Summer and 29th Christmas Bird Counts.
- Local Habitat Projects. *WBFN* continued to support the Rice Lake Tall Grass Prairie; Lucas Point Park Naturalization (member Dennis Garratt); Hazel Bird's Blue Bird Habitat project (--this year requiring many volunteers to drive and assist Hazel's award-winning work); and restoration of the bird feeder area at Laurie Lawson Outdoor Education Centre.

Advocacy was an important emphasis for the *WBFN* this year.

- Dombind. Following action by the Federation of Ontario Naturalists, the Ministry of the Environment picked up on recommendations by *WBFN* (and others) to discontinue use of Dombind within the next 2 years. (Bob Short led this issue).

- Presqu'ile Provincial Park produced a draft Management Plan that considered many of the recommendations of *WBFN* and others. Unfortunately, the plan was temporarily derailed by local forces on some spurious issues. Members Bob Short and Clive Goodwin very capably represented *WBFN* on this issue.

This year in Northumberland County, the Willow Beach Field Naturalists helped win two new grants.

- The Northumberland Forest and Woodlot Survey Project is funded by the Trillium Foundation (\$14k) and is currently being conducted by *WBFN* with our managing project partner, the *Northumberland Stewardship Council*. The work is well underway and Bob Short and Terry Stopps are carrying our contribution.
- The Ganaraska Eco-Demonstration Park will provide demonstration areas for backyard habitat and other types of restoration. The park will be located on the headquarters property of *Ganaraska Region Conservation Authority*. *WBFN* member Sharon Keogh helped lead the GRCA project team for this (98k grant).

In 1999, our finances showed more revenues and more routine project expenses than ever before. We took in more funding, in part because of the generosity of members like Bill Crowley, who donated a framed photograph - The Birches - as a raffle fundraiser. We spent more money because of our own donations to causes like FON's purchase on Manitoulin Island. Both activities are typical of *WBFN*'s work reflecting an organization that is in active pursuit of its natural heritage goals.

As always, our members have been our strength. This year we were proud to see founding member and past-President, Alice

King Sculthorpe, invested as a member of the Order of Ontario. We also offer our appreciation for those who have served and are now moving on: Andy McLauchlan (Treasurer), Nancy Stopps (Secretary), and Cath Oberholtzer (FON Liaison).

Finally, our challenges for 2000 include:

- Managed Growth of *WBFN's* membership, providing opportunities for member involvement at individual, group and leadership levels;
- An Increased Community Awareness of *WBFN's* vision for preservation, renewal and enhancement of our natural heritage; and
- More Direct Action by *WBFN* to promote the enjoyment, development of knowledge and the documentation of natural heritage in Northumberland County and beyond.

BIRDING ALGONQUIN PARK IN JANUARY WELL NOT ACTUALLY... WE WERE NOT EVEN CLOSE

The annual WBFN outing to Algonquin Park was scheduled for January 8, 2000. It was however postponed... read cancelled, due to the lack of winter finches, etc. In its place, Bob and Marg Short, Russ Lake, Bryan Baxter, Bill Crowley, and Dennis Garratt toured the north shore of Lake Ontario in search of a few local rarities. We left Cobourg/Port Hope around 0700h. Russ's plan to search the local marsh for Virginia Rail and Sora had to be put on hold... The sun had not risen.

Our first stop was at Lynde Shores (Conservation Area) in Whitby in search of a Spotted Towhee, *Pipila maculatus*, which was found after a brief walk and excellent views of a light phase Great Horned Owl, possibly the Tundra subspecies *Bubo virginianus subarcticus*. The Spotted Towhee may not be readily identified as it was previously lumped with the Eastern Towhee as the Rufous-sided Towhee. Attempts to find a flock of Red and White-winged Crossbills nearby were, however, unsuccessful.

Our next stop was in Oakville, where we searched for and found a female Western Tanager, *Piranga ludoviciana*. While searching for another Great Horned Owl reported in the area, one of us chanced upon a Boreal Chickadee, *Poecile hudsonicus*. While certainly a species we would have hoped to find in Algonquin Park had we gone north, its presence in Oakville was a very pleasant surprise.

Leaving Oakville, we drove back east to Humber Bay in search of an Eared Grebe, *Podiceps nigricollis*. The bird was eventually found, though some debate was necessary to distinguish it from the Horned Grebe,

Podiceps auritus, which is somewhat similar in appearance when in winter plumage.

A brief stop for lunch at Toronto Harbour for the rarest find of the day gave us excellent views of a very tame 1st winter Heermann's Gull, *Larus heermanni*. While relatively common in Baja California and along the south-west coast of California, this gull is a decidedly rare visitor to the Great Lakes.

Braving a cold wind, four of us took an extended walk out the Leslie Street Spit in search of Common Redpolls, *Carduelis flamea*, a flock of which was eventually found. Also observed were three more Great Horned Owls, a Northern Saw-whet Owl, *Aegolius acadicus*, and a Glaucous Gull, *Larus hyperboreus*.

Our next stop was for coffee and donuts, after which we looked, albeit unsuccessfully, for Trumpeter Swans at Bluffer's Park in Scarborough.

Other species observed during the outing included: Mute Swan, Gadwall, Mallard, American Black Duck, Redhead, Canada Goose, Greater Scaup, Lesser Scaup, Oldsquaw (a.k.a. Long-tailed Duck), Bufflehead, Hooded Merganser, Common Merganser, Red-tailed Hawk, American Kestrel, Merlin, Ring-billed Gull, Herring Gull, Great Black-backed Gull, Rock Dove, Mourning Dove, Downy Woodpecker, Blue Jay, American Crow, Black-capped Chickadee, White-breasted Nuthatch, Brown Creeper, American Robin, European Starling, Northern Cardinal, American Tree Sparrow, White-throated Sparrow, Snow Bunting, House Finch, and the ubiquitous House Sparrow.

WBFN YOUNG NATURALISTS REPORT - 1999

summarized from a report prepared by Lori Wensley

Over the past year, *WBFN* has encouraged young naturalist participation in all of our regular events, including our speakers-series meetings; field work and outings; as well as publication in *The Curlew*.

In addition to these regular activities, *WBFN* ran a series of special events dedicated to young people.

Stream Investigation (August 1999) with Susan Casson and A.K. Sculthorpe at the Sculthorpe home in Port Britain, reported by Helen Stopps in the November 1999 issue of *The Curlew*.

Mushrooms and Fungi (September 1999), a trek through Peter's Woods with Gordon Vogg, with *WBFN* and *WBFN* Young Naturalists, reported by Alyson Parker in the October 1999 issue of *The Curlew*.

Monarch Butterflies (Summer 1999) - Audrey Wilson demonstrated the science of butterfly tagging and provided some hands-on experience for participants.

Bird Banding (Summer/Fall 1999) with Elizabeth Kellogg and Roger Frost. During the summer, banding excursions focused on Tree Swallows and Bluebirds. In the fall, daytime banding was done at their Durham Street backyard feeder. During October, night-time banding focused on Saw-whet Owls at Candlewick Woods.

The *WBFN* is planning future events for *Young Naturalists* for the winter of 2000, including winter bird banding and star gazing, weather permitting. (*Editor's Note: At this writing, the weather has not cooperated, providing cloud for the star gazing nights and not enough snow for trapping winter birds.*) For information about these events, contact Lori Wensley, Education Coordinator, *WBFN*, 372-6001.
