From The Mayor

Our Town has lost a wonderful friend and model citizen - Mildred Finlon. She has already been missed at Town meetings, which she attended for decades. Her husband, Harold Finlon, served as a Town Councilman in the 1950's and 1960's. Mildred served on the Waterpark Committee and was extremely interested in Bayfront Park and the Boardwalk, from its inception to its completion. Mildred was our town memory - she rode the train, swam in the salt-water pool, fished in the bay and canoed in Fishing Creek. She sold popcorn and "sno balls" at Chesapeake Beach Park! She influenced countless people at Beach Elementary School, Beach Jr. High, and Union Church. She lived, loved and worked here. She was one of the reasons the town started Solid Gold Service – to take good care of those who have taken such good care of others. Even if you never met Mildred, you have probably been touched in some way by her life's contributions.

"Every day has its magic moments of one kind or another".

That quote was a favorite saying of Mildred Finlon, Town matriarch and historian, who enjoyed those magic moments for almost a century, and created magic moments for others for almost as long. Mrs. Finlon passed away January 28 at the age of 97. And although she spent her last months at the Hermitage in Solomons, she took part in Town life almost until the end, and was a constant and invaluable resource for anyone interested in county or Town history.

Google Mildred, and you will find references to the Railway Museum, which she co-founded; the public schools, where she taught, supervised, and helped oversee the system's integration; the library system, whose trustees she chaired; the boardwalk, for which she lobbied vigorously and which is dedicated to her memory; and on and on. Hers was a familiar name in the Newsletter, the source of much of the Town history recorded in past issues

Mrs. Finlon's father purchased lots in 1922 in the old "Campgrounds", where people summered in tents and cabins when the railway was new. The family rented a cabin that was little more than a shed, with no glass in the

windows, and Mildred recalled not just mosquitoes, but a donkey sticking its head into the house, prompting her father to build a more permanent cottage. The "sanitation system" was an oxcart "honey wagon" that came weekly to collect waste, but there were also the beach, the Bay and the amusement park, so summers were a pleasure. Mildred learned to swim in the Bay, and later taught others as well, a prelude to her education career. That started in D.C., but she and her husband Harold moved to Town, where he was the park superintendent, into one of two winterized cottages built by her father. Her parents lived in the other. There, Mrs. Finlon reared her two sons and she remained until her move to the Hermitage near the end of her life.

In the children's younger years, she helped establish and taught in a cooperative nursery school at the Naval Research Laboratory Bay installation, earning \$5 per week. She went on to be a key supervisor in the county schools, and started a sixthgrade outdoor education program. Possibly her greatest contribution to county and Town life, however, was joining with Bernie Loveless to establish the Railway Museum and shepherd it through its first 25 years. She had a great love for the carousel, and especially for her favorite steed, a kangaroo. By good luck, that creature was out being restored when Prince Georges County bought and moved the irreplaceable amusement ride to Watkins Regional Park, and it is now a favorite permanent exhibit at the museum. Well into her 90's, Mildred's preferred way to celebrate her birthday was with a picnic at that

park and a spin on the merry-go-round.

Appropriately, her last "official" appearance at the museum was for the swimsuit fashion show this summer, where other guests wondered at the bathing costumes of days gone by. For Mildred, however, they were, like the kangaroo and so much else of the Town's past that she worked hard to preserve, not history, but mementos of a life well lived, "magic moments" not just for herself but for generations yet to come.

What's with RV Zone?

Zoning Administrator Bill Watson would like to clear up any misconceptions that are cropping up about the new R-V Zoning District, which is not about recreational vehicles.

R-V stands for Residential Village - See the Zoning Map for the location. It is a new zone, introduced in the 2004 update of the Zoning Ordinance that allows limited commercial uses with some restrictions.

Use of this zone requires adequacy of parking, 20 to 30 foot separation from adjoining residential use lot line, and vegetative screening. If the business is for a professional, that professional must live in the house. There are limits on the amount or percentage of floor area in the building that can be dedicated to the use. If it is a new building, it must be architecturally compatible with the homes in the neighborhood.

Some purposes that this zone might be used for, if it meets the limiting conditions, include: home day care, professional office, business office, and government office. The zone may also be used for personal services including real estate, barbershops, travel agency, and insurance office. In addition to all other conditions, these uses MUST front on Bayside Road.

When a holiday falls on a regular trash or recycle collection day, **pick-up will be made on the next business day.** Note: The entire week will run a day behind.

Town Hall Reminds:

Things to Remember As Spring Tasks Start

The arrival of spring stirs all sorts of ambitious plans, and many of them involve things that Town Hall needs you to know.

Planning to **remodel**? Adding a deck or garage, putting in a new bathroom? Before beginning construction, you must first contact Town Hall for a **zoning permit.**

Landscaping? If you are clearing out old plants, or doing significant pruning, keep in mind that pick-up of yard waste and debris was suspended during the winter. It will resume every Tuesday beginning on April 10, 2007. If you do have yard debris to be picked up after that date, it must comply with Town trash rules. Sticks, twigs, and branches must be cut into three-foot lengths and bundled together. Leaves and grass clippings must be bagged. Yard debris will not be picked up if it does not comply with the above requirements.

After you do your clearing out, you can spruce things up with **new plants** for house and garden from the Garden Club **plant sale**, at the Railway Museum, May 12 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. You might even be able to find some unique Mother's Day gifts, and you will be supporting the club's projects to beautify the Town's surroundings.

"The Protector", our Zoning Administrator, suggests that your **outdoor spring cleaning** include the following:

Keep yards neat, mowed to less than 12 inches, pick up all trash, and trim bushes, especially those hanging across lot lines. Make outside repairs - replace roofs, repair siding, and install gutters.

And, if you are going to be **pruning** or cutting trees, keep in mind the

rules that were in the Holiday issue of the Newsletter, especially regarding trees in the Critical Area.

If you are doing major spring household cleaning, you might be generating some **Bulk Trash**. The policy defines Bulk Trash as appliances, furniture and outdoor equipment. Each household is entitled to pick-up of **four** items a month, **by advance arrangement**. Additional items will be picked up by arrangement, with payment in advance of \$150 per item. When renovating, remodeling, or emptying a house, you must call a trash contractor to have a dumpster placed on your property.

Finally, spring is a great time to go walking with your pets. **Dogs** must be on a leash and under your control when you take them or let them out of your yard. Please control your animals and clean up after them, so your neighbors will love them as much as you do.
