The Rothschilds

For the last 150 years, the history of the House of Rothschild has been, to an amazing extent, the backstage history of Western Europe. "The Rothschilds" name now gleams of gold and treasurers. It is a tale of monumental wisdom and success. It whispers of mysterious governmental powers, of eminence, of elegance. But once it was different.

By their very existence and by their decisive actions, the family became the great protectors of their people.

This exciting story of struggle and success, by the same people who wrote "Fiddler on the Roof," has received rave reviews from all critics as well as Tony Awards for Best Musical Drama of that season. Administrator's Report

Thank you for affording me the opportunity to attend the 59th National Association of Temple Administrators (NATA) annual conference in November. Of the 220 members of NATA, 180 of them gathered for this five-day meeting in Cleveland.

The conference highlight was a symposium addressing *The Complex Triad of Synagogue Leadership* on synagogue governance. This in-depth study featured sessions on *The Structure of Positive Partnering* with Alice Korngold, president & CEO of Business Volunteers Unlimited; on *Transparent Decision Making* with Eric Clay, PhD, Cornell University scholar and mentor to leaders involved in personal and organizational change and a consultant to congregations in crisis or transition; and *Effective Relationship Building Between Administrator*, *Rabbi and President*, with a panel of rabbis, congregational presidents and administrators.

Each of these study opportunities was followed by break-out sessions, facilitated by community professionals. It was interesting to hear that various board/synagogue structures can be effective in positive partnering as long as the mission/vision is clear; the board and staff ask "the tough questions" of each other; sufficient human resources (staff and volunteers) are available to address the workload; and all are engaged in long-range planning together.

I was fascinated with the discussion of "transparent decision-making," the underlying principle of which is that honest dialogue is only possible when all parties are aware of each other's motivations. Our board and staff have been working toward the goal of becoming "transparent" – to congregants and to each other – so that our motives and motivations are clear to all.

Daily workshops included sessions on congregational budgeting, human resource management, Jewish identity, Reform ritual, insurance, time management, crisis management, Israel, security, ethical decision-making, communications, facility management, construction, Jewish texts.

We studied the unique, collaborative environment that occurs in a synagogue – different from the "corporate" environment or the "non-profit" environment. The spiritual leader – the rabbi – and the governing head – the president – and the operational chief – the administrator – all play key roles in keeping, what has been termed, "the three-legged stool" in an upright and functioning position. All three legs must be strong to maintain balance. Positive partnering and transparent decision-making support the stool's "legs" so that the seat (congregation) remains level and strong.

When I began in this position 2-1/2 years ago, Temple Israel provided me with the opportunity to study for a week at the NATA Institute at HUC-JIR in California. Having completed and passed the six courses and exams (congregational budgeting, facility management, synagogue communications, personnel, Jewish history, and Hebrew reading), I felt prepared to begin work in synagogue administration. Today, I look forward to continuing to apply all that I have learned to issues relevant to synagogue life. Thanks again for the opportunity to continue learning.

End-of-Year Giving

Three Year-End Questions

As you tidy up your financial affairs for 2002, you will likely be thinking about your charitable goals and aspirations. Here are a few questions to help you plan:

Q: Am I able to make a charitable gift to Temple Israel in 2002 at this late date?

A: Absolutely. As the year closes, you will likely receive mail from various charities requesting your financial assistance. During this period, we hope you will remember Temple Israel and our ongoing financial needs. We are eager to conclude this year in good financial shape, so we can confidently face the opportunities and challenges of the future. Your special yearend gift will strength us considerably.

Q: What are my tax obligations for 2002?

A: Many taxpayers consult an accountant before the end of the year to determine tax liability. Perhaps you've already done this or maybe your simply have a good idea where you stand. In any case, we encourage you to take advantage of tax benefits offered by the government. The income tax charitable deduction can allow you to give more than you might otherwise be able to give.

Are your taxes likely to be high this year? Then it may be a good time to increase your giving. You might even consider moving forward some of next year's giving into 2002 so you can utilize the tax benefits this year.

Q: How does one fund an income-for-life gift arrangement through appreciated stock or real estate?

A: You may find your self in a situation where you want to give more to Temple Israel but cannot afford to decrease your annual income. Consider a gift annuity program through the Temple Israel Foundation. This can be made possible through a gift of stock, and, in many cases, you would receive more income than you are currently receiving from the stock. Also, the annuity payments from the Temple Israel Foundation would continue for the rest of your life.

Did you know that Temple Israel Foundation has created an Annual Gift Endowment Society (AGES), whereby a congregant can endow his/her annual dues contribution for life? Tod Friedman, Foundation president, will be happy to discuss with you how this arrangement works.

The most important thing about year-end giving is starting early, especially if you are planning to use stock or real estate. Religious/Hebrew School

MITZVAH PROJECTS In addition to our extensive Tzedakah program and Mitzvah Mall, our students are helping others in various ways. The 6th grade class has a Chavurah (buddy) program, through which it volunteers during school time to help the 1st grade class, establishing role-modeling relationships by helping the 1st graders with projects and lessons and by getting to know each other. The 8th grade continues with their social action projects in the community. The students and their parents have visited Wexner Heritage House, Ronald McDonald House, the Capital Humane Society, and have created a booth at Temple Israel's Mitzvah Mall wrapping gifts for Children's Hospital. Future projects in the community include, a visit to Nancy's Place Faith Mission, cooking for the homeless, a visit to Main Street Synagogue, spending time with our homebound congregants, and lastly organizing a team for Mitzvah Day. We are proud of all our students who volunteer at Temple Israel and in the community. Students in grades 4-8 cook for the homeless, making sandwiches, packing vegetables, and serving food at Faith Mission Homeless Shelter. This program is coordinated by Bev Darwin through Sisterhood. December Mitzvah Project: Bring in warm coats and blankets for the homeless.

MADRICHIM Students in grades 9-12, who participate in Temple Israel's High School have the opportunity to work with teachers in the classroom serving as *madrichim* (student aides/role models). These students return year after year and have a major impact in the classroom. This year we have placed eleven students in the classroom for paid positions. Through the Commission on Jewish Education, the students participate in further training and support in their positions as madrichim.

SCHOOL NEWSPAPER The 8th grade class is working with David Lamden and Jack Schreibman on a newspaper for our Religious/Hebrew School. The paper will be printed every two months. Students will be in charge of different sections and write creatively as well as report about what is happening in our school.

This past Sunday, I was interviewed by two students. Jeffrey Lustig and Jordan Greenberg also shadowed me for a part of the morning to witness my role as school director first hand.

ASSEMBLIES The 5th grade was featured in our November assembly. On December 15, 11:25 am, Katie Goodman will make a presentation about Goldman Union Camp (GUCI) for families and students in grades 2-7. Future assembly dates: February 23, March 16, and April 27.

SHABBAT SERVICES Please to join us on December 6 as we celebrate Chanukah with a 6:00 pm service followed by dinner. During the service the kids will sing Peter Yarrow's *Light One Candle* and families will light their menorahs. During the dinner, we will do Israeli dances. Pamela Feldman-Hill will be teaching our students a few simple dances on November 24 during Sunday School. The children will then teach their families! On December 14, 7th & 8th grades will participate in Shabbat Morning Services, followed by a dairy potluck lunch for everyone. UAHC/NELC Convention

The UAHC/NELC (Union of American Hebrew Congregations-Northeast Lakes Council) Regional Biennial, held in Toledo on November 8-10, was a wonderful opportunity to study, meet people with similar values and challenges, find resources for leading our synagogue, hear talented, knowedgeable and inspirational leaders and to energize our own spirits. Following are highlights of what we learned from the sermons, workshops and conversations.

The most financially successful congregants have a high rate of membership participation in a range of synagogue activities from worship services to special events. The Jewish population study revealed that the major cause of the decline of Reform Jews is low birth rate rather than interfaith marriages. A synagogue isn't a business although it must be run on business principles and practices. The Torah must be used by leaders as a guide for making "Jewish" decisions.

Marci Delson, Chair of the Youth Activities Committee, shares her observations: "The NELC Regional Biennial was an informative, action-packed weekend. I attended workshops dealing with Youth Activities, discussing how to keep our college-aged children linked with their home synagogue and a way to keep Judaism in their life through their college Hillel programs and college town congregations through E-Tone. The middle-school children pose different challenges, especially post B'nai Mitzvah age. We need to keep these students interested, giving them space to express themselves Jewishly, while keeping their natural development factors in mind. More to come from both of these areas in the coming year from the Youth Activities Committee."

Barbara Seeder, member of Temple Israel and past President of Temple Israel Sisterhood completed her term as Vice President of the NELC Council. Tussy Shnider, Associate member of Temple Israel and past President of Temple Israel Sisterhood, became the First Vice President of the NELC Council. *Mazel tov* and *todah rabah* to Barbara and Tussy.

Technology Corner

A relatively new feature of the Temple Israel web page is the discussion board. You can reach the board by either clicking on the TI Discussion Board link on the navigation bar of the Temple Israel web site (http://www.templeisrael.org) or by going directly to http://bb.templeisrael.org.

Each user is required to register and create their own username and password for the discussion board. Registering is as simple as clicking on the Register button near the top of the page, accepting the terms of use and filling out the required information. Once registered you can log in and post responses to other people's posts or you post your own questions, statements or comments.

The discussion board will allow people the opportunity to freely discuss things that involve and revolve around Temple Israel. For example, there is a forum specifically for the participants of the Intro to Judaism class. Between the weekly sessions of the class, participants can continue the discussions that make the class so interesting.



October 2002 Board Highlights

Finance: Ted Smiley, Chair, stated that the profit/loss statement from the first quarter July 1-September 30 reflects that we are on target in all income areas. A list of financial concerns that are unbudgeted expenses was reported. The Finance Committee will be monitoring this.

Honors: Barbara Robins, Chair, announced that Irv Boiman was the committee's selection as New Members Class Honoree. New Members Shabbat is set for Friday, November 22. In lieu of a dinner, it will include a special Oneg Shabbat.

Facility: Harvey Schwager, Chair, reported that the committee has dealt with varied issues, including the recall of sprinkler heads. The Guidelines for Use of Facilities has been fine-tuned with an additional piece added for B'nai Mitzvah and weddings. A sub-committee, chaired by Jeff Langer, is looking into rental options, including criteria for whom we would want to rent to, fees, as well as the possibility of engaging a manager who would work for a percentage of the profit. In anticipation of renting the facility to the community, the committee will look into how to lock off certain sections of the building. The HVAC contract is being reviewed. The fire hydrants have been flushed & winterized and load occupancy signs have been ordered, in compliance with the Fire and Building Code regulations. Landscaping needs are being reviewed in terms of developing an on-going maintenance agreement that includes bed maintenance as well as mowing. A meeting will take place with the assistant curator of the Columbus Art Museum to assess Temple Israel's art collection and gather suggestions about what should be displayed and how. Additional lighting for the parking lot is also being reviewed. Assisted hearing devices are being investigated for the Prayer Space. Babysitting for member events has been rejected due to liability issues. The committee will come to the Finance Committee before going to the Board with recommendations that are not budgeted.

Shabbat & Holiday: Jeri Korby reported that Temple Israel will

pilot a new *siddur*, along with 200 other congregations around the country, for the next 4 months. As part of this project, 25 people are needed to attend 8 of 12 services in order to be surveyed about the *siddur* itself. As new prayerbooks will be created by the CCAR for distribution in spring 2005, the committee is dealing with transitioning using the dedications from the gray prayerbooks to the new prayerbooks.

Board Retreat: An updated agenda will be forthcoming for the December 7 retreat. The cost of the retreat is \$33 to cover the cost of meals. The goals of the retreat include learning together, growing together as a Board, and establishing a sense of where the board wants to go in the future. The retreat is being held in lieu of a December Board meeting.

Membership: The Membership and Finance committees will be meeting jointly to discuss specific member issues.

Fundraising: A discussion was held about the speaker choice for a major fundraiser to take place in the spring. The results of a poll of the board, 14 sponsors & potential sponsors, past presidents and the Fundraising committee were presented. "The God Squad," consisting of Rabbi Mark Gellman & Monsignor Tom Hartman, was approved.

Columbus Jewish Federation Campaign: Michael Canter, Campaign chair, offered the case for giving to the 2003 Jewish Community Campaign and distributed a campaign brochure. He stated that the Federation supports Temple Israel in the following ways: \$47,000 [direct]; \$30-35,000 [indirect]; \$10,000+ in community health care program savings. He announced the Campaign goal of \$7.4 million, a 10% increase over last year's campaign achievement of \$6.8 million. He also pointed out that \$2.1 million was raised through Israel Emergency campaign efforts.

Administration: Pre-School teachers and some staff have been trained in CPR. Temple Israel was included in the October 18 Faith & Values section of the Columbus Dispatch in an article about church/synagogue building renovations.

Congregants are welcome to attend board meetings. All meetings begin at 7pm. Upcoming board meetings will be held January 28, February 25, March 25, April 29, May 27 and June 24. If you have a question or topic that you'd like to have addressed, or would like a copy of the agenda, contact Susan Schubert (614-864-5111) or Elaine Tenenbaum (614-866-0010 x115). Complete copies of Board minutes are available in the synagogue office.


Jewish Children's Literature Program



Nominating Committee

According to the Constitution and By-Laws of Temple Israel, the following Section (4.03) refers to the Nominating Process for the election of officers and trustees. *Procedures: Nominations for the election of officers and trustees shall be made by the Nominating Committee and shall be submitted to the President, in writing, by the chairman of the Nominating Committee, on or before February 1, and notice of the names of the nominees shall be promptly printed in the Temple Bulletin. Additional nominations for trustees or for any office may also be made by petition of fifty (50) members of the Congregation, which must be delivered to the Secretary of the Congregation on or before March 1. Notice of the names of the nominees by petition shall be promptly printed in the Temple Bulletin [Note: Because the deadline for the Bulletin is the 1st of the prior month, any names submitted will be included in a special mailing.] <i>Number: The persons nominated by the Nominating Committee shall consist of one nomination for each office, whose term shall expire at the end of the then current term of office year, and nominations in number equal to no less than one, nor more than one-and-one-half, times the number of trustees to be elected to three year terms as determined by the Nominating Committee. No person shall be a candidate for both an office and a trustee in the same election.
