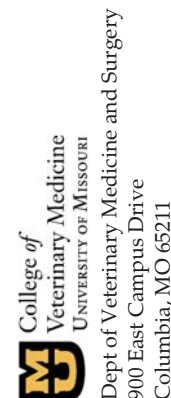
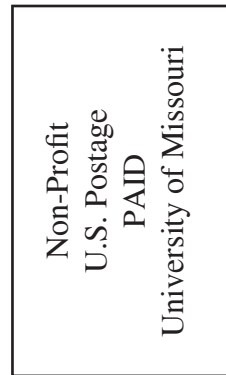

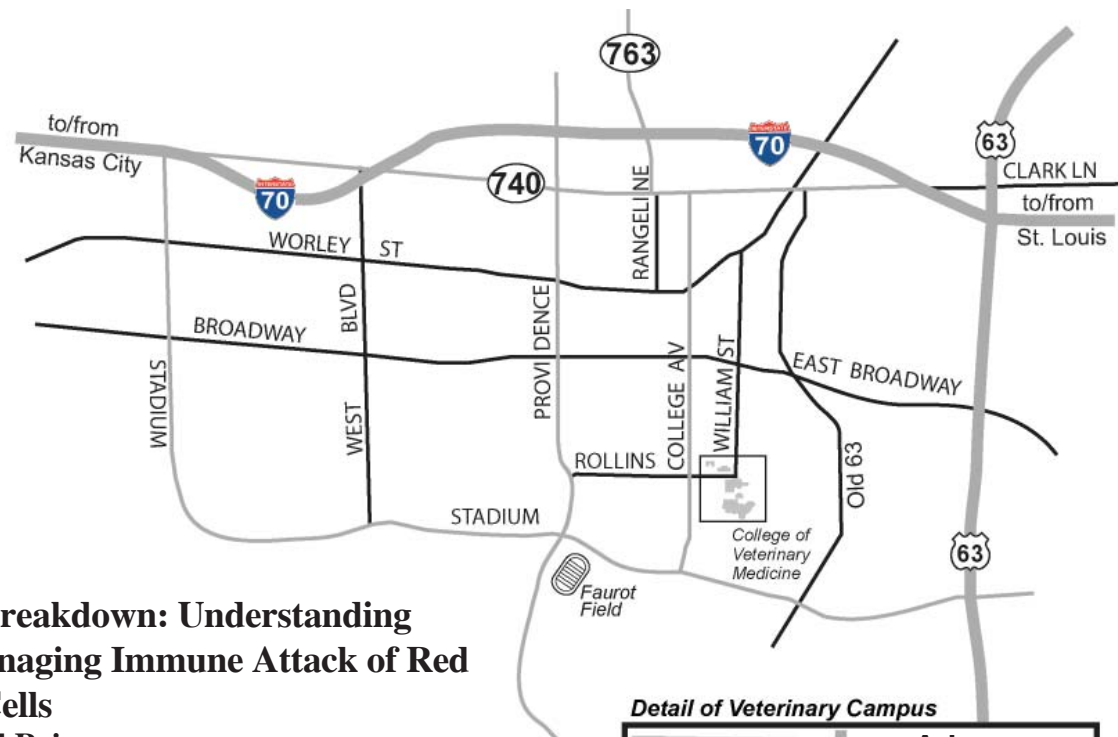
**Blood Breakdown: Understanding

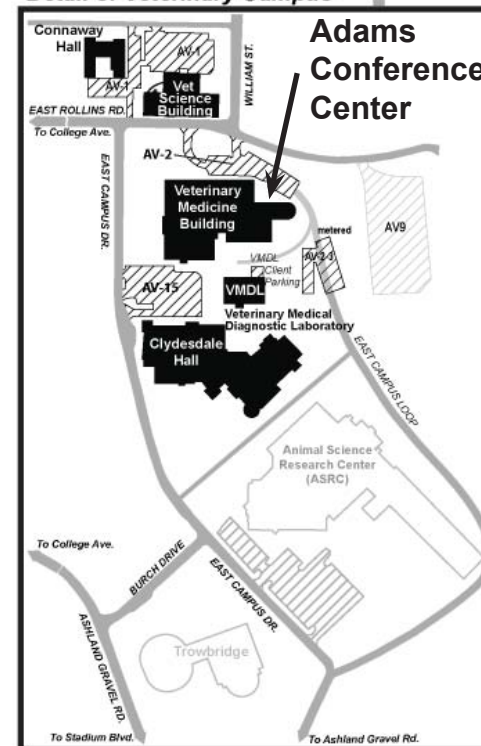
