I will Improve access to SNAP by ensuring that the practice of fingerprinting applicants never returns to NYC and revoking the policy of asking and verifying one's marital status. We must expand access to healthy food options, especially for the 750,000 New York residents who live in food deserts, and promote greater Food Literacy through our schools, gardens and green markets.

## 3. How can food policy be used to promote economic growth and living wage jobs?

We have the opportunity to promote economic growth and living wage jobs by supporting small businesses looking to operate in areas where healthy food options are scarce. We must look to providing incentives for companies that promote healthy living.

### 4. What actions would you take to create more community gardens and urban farms?

Urban farms and community gardens provide excellent opportunities for interneighborhood collaboration. Our green spaces thrive through knowledge sharing and shared education. Programs for food waste composting will connect our homes to the fruits and flowers of the city. Additionally, I will work to expand the NYCHA Gardening and Greening program to support the gardening efforts of residents
