Additional Comments:

Question 13 D- A subcommittee should become a full committee only when appropriate, not to reward a Chairman for political loyalty. I believe that the number of full committees should be reevaluated for this reason.

17- Discretionary funds go to many deserving groups, doing important work at the grassroots level. These funds provide crucial lifelines for many New Yorkers. Need should be the only consideration when deciding how much money is allocated to each member. Using these funds to punish or reward individual members is completely inappropriate.

19- We can reduce the number of "stop and frisks" by ending quota driven mandates that police officers are forced to adhere to. Over 700,000 people have been stopped and frisked by this administration. While that number is boasted about over at city hall, it is a painful reminder for all those innocent individuals who have been subjected to a data scheme to make the mayor look effective. As a teacher, I am under pressure everyday to pass and graduate kids on time. If I don't, then my school can close and I will be out of a job. Passing kids doesn't mean they learn. It is once again a data scheme to make the administration look good.

24-26- These elected officials and government bodies provide services all New Yorkers rely on. Their funding should be independent of the Mayor's office and the City Council.

As an educator and organizer, I have devoted the past decade of my life to our community, both personally and professionally. For the past seven years I have worked at New Utrecht High School as a civics teacher and staff developer. For me, it's not about "education politics," but about what

works in the classroom and how to best give students the skills they need to compete in a global economy. I have also served as President of a grassroots political organization, that has been speaking up for the people of southern Brooklyn by creating active and engaged, multi ethnic coalitions to tackle community problems, and in some cases, get government to reverse their position. Running for City Council is simply an extension of the work I've done over the past decade. My accomplishments show that I will be a thoughtful, engaged and deliberate legislator.
