



Care to Learn Celebrates 5 Year Anniversary

Five years ago, Pink was on the top of the billboard charts with "So What," *The Bucket List* grossed more than \$19 million at the box office and Bigfoot was sighted in northern Georgia. At that same time in Springfield, Missouri, Care to Learn was founded.

Five years later, Pink is still searching for the answer, Bigfoot has a cable reality series and Care to Learn has provided assistance to students more than 150,000 times. This is remarkable in that during a period of financial uncertainty, Care to Learn has grown to serving ten communities. Our unique business model and support of generous donors have allowed us to meet the emergent needs of students in the areas of health, hunger, and hygiene. From the student in Springfield whose shoes are two sizes too small to the hungry child in Fordland and the homeless high school student in Nixa, Care to Learn has provided immediate, confidential solutions that keep children in school and restores their self-esteem and self-worth.

As we contemplate the next five years, Care to Learn is dedicated to sustainable growth and securing funding that will meet the needs of our students. Please consider what you can do to help. In Bolivar, a school student who had received Care to Learn assistance for food was selling magazines to raise money so he could go on the Senior trip to Washington, D.C. He had raised all his money, then abruptly announced he wasn't going. We discovered that he had received the list of "mandatory" clothing items, and he had none of them. Thanks to Care to Learn, we were able to quickly purchase the few items he needed to go on the trip. He called D.C. the most amazing place he had ever been in his life, and that it was the first time he had felt like "one of the guys."

Fordland

Fordland had a special needs child who could only wear Velcro shoes, but it was very difficult to find them in the correct size. Care to Learn was able to purchase a brand new pair of shoes for the child. The child's teacher said they have never seen a bigger smile, and that the child's attitude completely changed.

On a Friday in Clever, a volunteer was distributing backpacks that were full of food for the weekend. A little girl came running in, with a huge smile on her face. She said, "Thank you. I will never forget this. Thank you for filling this backpack each week; we really need this food at our house." Reactions of joy like this student remind each of us why Care to Learn is so important.

In Nixa, like communities Nixa across the country, homeless students struggle to make it on their own. Recently, a homeless student who was staying at a friend's house stated that the only food he had was from the weekend backpacks that Care to Learn provided him.

"DARE TO CARE" REUNION CONCERT BENEFITS CARE TO LEARN

"Don't Look Down," and "It's Alive." They reactivated in the late 1980's and in 1997, the group recorded and released their first album in many years titled "13." After 35 years of service to their craft, the music and the group have withstood the test of time and enjoy a cult popularity.

But the Daredevils are about more than their music. They are also about compassion and generosity, and that is why they have chosen to do a reunion concert on Saturday, April 6 to benefit Care to Learn. Very food insecure family. When he arrived at school, he would be explosively angry because he was very hungry. Thanks to Care to Learn, we are able to have food on hand and provide him a nutritional breakfast every morning. This student is now able to focus on his school work and not worry about being hungry.

Robberson Elementary in Springfield became Robberson Community School at the start of the 2012-13 school year. With 95% of the families on free and/or reduced lunch, this "holistic" approach to education provides additional support for student achievement and builds relationships with families. Care to Learn is providing "Breakfast in the Classroom" at Robberson as well as a food pantry where families can volunteer their time helping others and take home nutritional food that meets their needs.

At OTC, some of the dualenrollment students have difficulty with transportation to and from school. Care to Learn funds provide bus passes so that these students are able to come to class on time and ready to learn.

In Republic, a child was having difficulty with her speech. She could not articulate well and the nasal tone of her voice interfered with the production of sound. This made her difficult to understand causing problems with school work and social settings. It was discovered she had a severe sinus blockage. Care to Learn purchased needed medications for the student. This has had a huge, positive impact on her school work and interaction with peers.

In Willard, two brothers had to move in with an aunt while their parents were trying to find housing. The aunt went to the clothing bank to get clothes, but could

not find shoes that fit. Care to Learn provided a voucher to purchase new shoes for the boys. The aunt reported that the youngest child just sat and smelled his new shoes because he had never had a pair of new shoes before.
