Superintendent's Message

THANK YOU FOR APPROVING MEASURE R PROBLEMS AHEAD FROM THE STATE

WOW! Thank you all for your support of Measure R, our \$29.5 million school bond issue that prevailed on November 4 with 57% YES. Spe-

cial thanks are due to those of you who worked on the campaign. The Facilities Planning Committee has met and the Board of Education is in the process of selecting a Project Management firm that will assist with prioritization of the projects, bidding, permits, application for state matching funds, and management of the projects. It is our goal to have projects underway this summer!

It seems like the problems at the state level are never ending. It was reported this month that the state budget is \$11.2 billion short in this fiscal year and that the governor is proposing that schools be cut \$2.5 billion in *this* school year. Remember that more than 80% of our funding in Oak Park (and for most public schools) comes from the State of California general fund. A special session of the legislature has been called and is underway as I write this in mid-November. By the time you read this it should be concluded and we should know more. At this time, based on the governor's proposal, the cuts for Oak Park would total \$1.2 million. Since 85% of our budget is expended on personnel and since there are strict state laws related to how employees can be released, we are perplexed at how to accomplish this level of reduction. The governor did propose allowing school districts to utilize unspent categorical funds, which would help us considerably with this problem; however, this has been proposed in the past and has been consistently rejected by the legislature. Categorical funds are special funds designed for specific purposes such as textbooks, library books, grants, etc. In the meantime, we are holding the line on any spending that is not absolutely necessary for the instructional program.

Sadly, the projection for next year is even worse. The Legislative Analyst Office is predicting a total state deficit of \$27.8 billion over the next 20 months due to declining tax revenues caused by the weak economy. We have convened the District Finance Committee to begin looking at the problem. This crisis in California public education is unprecedented and Oak Park will not be exempt.

People may wonder what the impact of our Measure C Parcel Tax and our Measure R school facilities bond will be. Facilities bonds are exactly that. Those funds may only be used for school facilities or equipment as enumerated in the measure. Of course, we are desperate for the repairs and this provides a source to fund them. These funds may not be used for general fund expenses.

The Measure C Parcel Tax is a huge help to us, however. It brings in almost \$1 million in local funds, which are used to support our program and represents about 4% of our budget. The problem is that the cuts the state is proposing are so gargantuan that no public school district will be immune from their effects. Exactly how this will play out is still a mystery to us at the time of this writing. I will endeavor to keep you well informed. As I recently heard Pam Brady, President of the California State PTA say, "This is not about a balance sheet, it's about our future."

MEASURE R <u>CITIZEN'S OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE</u> APPLICATION PROCESS

Pending the certification of the passage of Measure R, the Oak Park Unified School District Board of Education is in the process of selecting a Citizens' Oversight Committee for Measure R, our recently

passed \$29.5 million school facilities bond issue. The Committee will meet quarterly and has the responsibility of reviewing an audit of the Measure R accounts and making an annual report to the Board and the community regarding the District's adherence to the law and to the text and intention of the Measure related to expenditure of these funds.

State law requires that the Committee be composed as follows:

One member active in a business organization representing the business community located within the District.

One member active in a senior citizens' organization.

One member active in a bona fide taxpayers' organization.

One member who is a parent or guardian of a child enrolled in the District.

One member who is the parent or guardian of a child enrolled in the District and who is active in a parent-teacher organization such as the PTA or School Site Council.

Two other members, selected from the public at large.

Please call Linda Sheridan at (818) 735-3206 for an application. Applications are due no later than December 31, 2008. The Board will then arrange to interview qualified applicants at a public Board meeting and select the committee.

Deborah King's Counselor's Corner



Help your child learn to admit mistakes and make amends



What are the three hardest words to say? They may be, "I was wrong." But helping children learn to own up to the

things they have done wrong is a way to help them develop into mature adults. Here are some tips:

- Think about why your child might not admit she's wrong. Is she afraid to tell the truth? Does she want to blame someone else?
- Think about how you can change your behavior if your child is afraid of your reaction. Stay calm even if you have to give yourself a "time out" before dealing with the situation.

- Help her put herself in someone else's shoes. "How do you think your sister felt when you took her doll away?" This is called *empathy*, and it is a behavior kids have to work to develop.
- Help your child think about a way to make amends. If she sent a mean email about someone in her class, she needs to send another one saying she made the story up.
- Remember that apologies don't mean a lot if your child's behavior doesn't change.

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Tests don't have to be stressful for your child



Parents can ease the natural stress that may occur before and after testing. You can help your child prevent test

anxiety if you:

- Build self-esteem. The goal is for your child to begin tests with confidence, not fear of failure.
 So give him opportunities for success in many other areas.
- Communicate with teachers.

 Stay up-to-date on your child's progress at school. If he needs extra help, the teacher can suggest at-home learning activities.

 Ask how you can help.
- Build your child's vocabulary.
 Talking, reading and word games help your child learn new words.
 You never know when one might pop up on a test.
- Encourage preparation. Plan several study sessions before the test. Provide a study spot where your child can concentrate.
- Give test tips. It's important to read instructions carefully. If something is confusing, ask the teacher for help. Don't get stuck on one question. Mark it, finish easier sections and then return to the trouble spot.
- Don't pressure your child. If he worries too much, his performance may suffer. Emphasize your unconditional love. When the test is returned, talk about it.
 What can he learn from it?
 Compliment his hard work.
