Peggy attended St. Matthews Elementary School and St. Hubert High School both in Philadelphia. She married John Evans. John and Peggy lived in Philadelphia and raised their seven children. Mr. Evans passed away 15 years ago. Peggy has 35 grandchildren and 19 great grands.

Peggy well remembers a "big to-do" about the 1976 Bicentennial Celebration in the city of Philadelphia, PA; the birthplace of our Nation's independence. Particularly memorable was an historical play acted out along the Delaware River. Very impressive.

Peggy always loved to sew and paint, but rheumatoid arthritis is limiting what she can continue to do. She misses it. Peggy is a devoted Catholic, presently a member and regular attendee of the Immaculate Conception Church in Perry.
