The Rector writes ...

The visit of Sister Christobel on 10th September was a wonderful occasion. She has this amazing ability of bringing her work to life and she really encouraged us. She told us of her history and of the many poor she and the other sisters have cared for. The film we watched brought us so much closer to her work. We saw her working both on the streets of Bombay and with the children's homes she has built in Goa. We raised £1700 on the night for Mother Teresa's Roses to help provide for a new children's home for boys in Goa. We enjoyed wonderful food and company. She entertained us with some of the songs she sings for and with the children. If you would like to catch something of the vitality of this marvellous woman there are some CDs available which contain a portion of her music. You can obtain a copy of the CD from the Rectory. Indeed we also had a wonderful social evening on 19th August when Miles Jenner came and gave us an entertaining evening talking about Harveys and taking us through two tutored tastings explaining the history behind each item and telling us what to look for when tasting. Like Sister Christobel's visit there was a great deal of laughter and enjoyment with Miles's talk. We raised £800 for Church funds on that evening. Both of these extraordinary events are like two sides of the harvest coin: we use what God has given us in the harvest and we share God's gifts with those who need our help and support. We are going to celebrate harvest in All Saints on 16th October at 10.30am with a sung Family Service. We are going to follow the Service with our annual Harvest Lunch in All Saints Church Annex at 12.30pm. This will be a bring and share meal and all are invited and encouraged to come. All you need to do is bring a plate of food to share and whatever you are going to drink. Hope to see you then. God bless.

Parochial Church Council: As reported in last month's magazine, the Rector and PCC have been discussing instituting additional Services to our usual Sunday Worship. The Rector and Mr Miller, Churchwarden had attended a conference on ministry in Rural Communities and had been struck by the work of the present Vicar of Danehill. He had begun a new service in addition to the regular Sunday Services in his two Churches. It is lay-led and seemed to follow the type of Service we have on Christmas Eve for the Blessing of the Crib. The Rector and PCC

wondered whether this type of Service would be of interest to people and would welcome comments. The Rector suggested that it would be held on the first Sunday in the month at 10am in All Saints as this is the Church in the area where most people live. There would be the traditional formal Services at 8.30am and at 11am as at present. We would like to begin these services on 4th December.

Sunday School: Plumpton & East Chiltington Sunday school will meet at 10.30am in All Saints Church Annex on Sundays 9^{th} and 16^{th} October. All welcome.

Saints Days: We will be celebrating St Wilfrid's Day on 12th October at 11am at All Saints. St Wilfrid was exiled from Hexham by the king of Northumbria and he took refuge in Sussex. He taught the Sussex men how to fish at sea and so saved the area from famine. He is the secondary Patron Saint of the Diocese of Chichester. He eventually returned to Yorkshire and is buried in Ripon Minster.

Pop-in-Parlour: The Pop-in-Parlour will be open throughout October in All Saints Church Annexe for homemade soup, lite-bites and tea and coffee. All welcome just to pop in and meet old and make new friends.

Church Choir: The Choir meets every Thursday evening at 7.30pm in All Saints Church. During this month the Choir will be singing at the Dedication Festival on 23rd October at East Chiltington and on 30th October at All Saints for the Patronal Festival. Bird Watch



Many have seen and commented on the areas of Borage, a blue-flowering plant sown in several parts of the college estate in conjunction with

the work of Brighton University. It is a project to study Bumble Bees regarding their range and feeding. At the height of summer these patches were humming with the sound of wings, theirs and also of many Honey bees. Now the flowers are over, the seeds have set and quite large flocks of finches, seed-eating birds are finding good use of them. Mainly the flocks are of Greenfinches which is good news as only a couple of years ago this species was reported to be in trouble from disease and of a dwindling population.

One of the concerns regarding birds that need a seed diet is the lack of stubble fields available for them to forage over the winter months. With the increase in the number of fields sown with winter wheat and therefore clean of weeds, numbers have declined so perhaps this Borage will be of benefit.


I think that one of the most wonderful sights in Nature is to see a large gathering of birds of the same type massed in numbers for the benefit of them all. Species that flock together do so for many reasons. Many eves will find a food supply on which all can make use and in a similar way many eyes can detect a predator so that all can avoid an attack so that only a slow or sickly bird is taken and the job of the predator done, to ensure that the fittest and most alert birds survive to breed. An interesting feature of birds that flock is that they all have distinctive markings on wings, tail rump or face so that with these contact marks they can easily be recognised as allies within that species.

The huge flocks of Starlings in certain parts of the country attract much comment and are often featured on the television. These are always just before darkness as they prepare to roost in communal places such as reed beds, a grove of trees or on Brighton Pier. Their spectacular swirling and orchestrated movements at that time are to confuse predators. This is so different from the way they leave the roost the following morning when, all keen to find food they fly at about house-top height on a broad

front, covering as much width as possible. In that way a food source will not be missed, so many eyes are seeking it out.

What to eat this month for a gentle detox

Many of us will be carving pumpkins at the end of this month. Before you throw the flesh and seeds into the bin, think about cooking them as this scary veg offer fabulous health benefits. The distinctive bright

orange colour of pumpkins show that they are an excellent source of the antioxidant beta carotene that promotes healthy vision, prevents cataracts and strengthens the immune system. Beta carotene can lessen the risk of heart disease and prevent tumour growth. It is also good for skin health, both outside and in, protecting against eczema, asthma and gut irritation. Beta carotene may also reverse skin damage caused by the sun and it is thought to slow the aging process.

Pumpkin is a good source of fibre. Fibre supports digestion, helps to reduce bad cholesterol levels, balances blood sugar and encourages weight loss. Pumpkin is also a good source of vitamin C which promotes a healthy immune system.

Pumpkin contains good levels of potassium and magnesium. Potassium helps to control blood pressure and balances fluid levels in the body. It is also an important mineral for bone health. Magnesium is also vital for bone health, good muscle function, healthy sleep and relaxation.

In addition to all the health benefits offered by pumpkin flesh, the seeds are powerhouses of many important nutrients. Pumpkin seeds are a good source of magnesium, manganese, iron, vitamin E, zinc, iron and copper. They also contain calcium for healthy bones. They are a good source of anti-inflammatory omega 6 and omega 3 fatty acids, which are vital for mental health, healthy skin and energy production. There is a good amount of protein in pumpkin seeds plus fibre.

How to use. Separate the seeds from the pulp after hollowing out the pumpkin and spread out on a baking sheet. Sprinkle with spices and a little sea salt and bake for 25 minutes at 160°C/325°F. Out of season, pumpkin seeds can be bought plain or seasoned and eaten alone as

a snack or sprinkled onto porridge, muesli or flapjacks. Their nutrients are more readily available if they are ground (in a food processor or blender); they can be kept in the fridge for a week

Pumpkin seed oil can be used in salad dressings or taken in capsule form in order to get a bigger hit of essential fatty acids and the vitamins and minerals found in the seeds.

Pumpkin is delicious in a soup made with onions, carrots and hot stock, flavoured with nutmeg, cinnamon and pepper. As an accompaniment, try baking bread made with grated pumpkin, pumpkin seeds and cheddar. Pumpkin can be briefly boiled and baked in a curry with roasted cashews, vogurt and spices or barbecued in a marinade made from olive oil with lemon, thyme and garlic. It can be made into a savoury gratin with leeks and garlic, thyme, chives, white wine and gruyere, or roasted in an onion and feta tart. Pasta lovers can make ravioli with basil and Gabriel cheese and to the pumpkin or it can be roasted and mashed into flour to make gnocchi. It can be simmered with butter beans, herbs and spices in a Moroccan 'pot' or roasted with star anise, cinnamon, garam masala and bay before puréeing to serve with roasted meats. It can even be made into an unusual crumble with orange, ginger, eggs and evaporated milk. Trick or treat?

Footpath Detective's Diary:



To the Castle and onward to the Chiding Stone

One sunny Sunday this summer I met a friend for lunch at The Spotted Dog, a Kentish pub at Smart's Hill that I used to frequent some years ago when I lived in Kent. Set on the High Weald, its terraced garden has a marvellous view to the northeast over the valley of the early stretches of the River Medway as it meanders as little more than a stream past Penshurst and between Bidborough Ridge and the village of Leigh and on to Tonbridge. As we enjoyed our lunch and the views we planned our afternoon walk. Our destination was Chiddingstone Castle.

For our starting point we dropped into Penshurst and just north of the major road junction in the village we headed west on the Eden Valley Walk path. We were surprised that it was a tarmac path about a vehicle's width for a good quarter mile. It crosses the gently flowing River Eden where there was a good display of Bull Rushes. Our path continued with a mainly firm surface and followed a little ridge although views became obscured by high bushes along both sides. Through the gaps to the north were fields of pasture and to the south were cultivated soft fruit, mostly raspberries.

We crossed the lane that runs from Chiddingstone to Chiddingstone Hoath where our path continued through a small wood known as The Slips. Here the path narrowed to a footpath. At the end of the wood the path, according to my O/S map, was alongside a driveway / track that if we could have followed it would lead into the castle's grounds from the south. We didn't see a way of doing this from our path. Instead our path leads us into the pretty hamlet of Hoath Hill. A right turn onto the lane took us around the western boundary of the castle and to its north and main entrance. This route did afford us a good view of some lovely dwellings.

Chiddingstone Castle was a country house originating in about 1550 and then known as High Street House. It can be easily accessed from Chiddingstone High Street via a gate that leads to a small path to cross the footbridge over

the lake in the grounds. It was the home of the Streatfield family. Its current form dates only from 1805 when it was extended and remodelled in the then popular castle style to the wishes of Henry Streatfield.

The Castle is set in nice grounds, most likely once much more formal than the current lawns. It has a wonderful view north over the Eden Valley to the Low Weald and the ridge of Greensand near Ide Hill. Picnicking is encouraged on the lawns with well placed tables but we enjoyed tea and scones in the Victorian Tea Room courtvard.

Suitably refreshed we crossed the footbridge, admiring the large fish in the lake, and took the path up through the wooded area to the gate onto the High Street. Chiddingstone is a pretty Kent village with a single street with Tudor buildings and partial cobbled and brick pavement. Opposite is St. Mary's Church. We headed east passing the school and took the path to the Chiding Stone, a large boulder of Ardingly sandstone that creates a natural platform. It is said to be a place from which judgement or chiding could have been administered by elders of the village or the local area. In some writings it is recorded as being a Saxon boundary stone.

Having returned to the High Street and a little further east, we took a path on our right to cross some fields. At a path crossing by some ponds we turned left to cross more fields and out onto a lane which lead us south through Weller's Town (a small row of cottages). We took the next path left and south and up onto the ridge to rejoin the Eden Valley path that we had started on and thus make an almost circular route through beautiful Kent countryside with plenty of refreshment opportunities and some interesting history.

Profile on Richard Taylor



Richard was born in Brighton in 1942. His father was in the Navy and during the war worked in the trawlers defending the merchant ships that kept the UK supplied. This meant that Richard and his mother were alone for most of the war and when

his father returned, he wondered who the strange man was.

In 1943 he was shot at whilst in his pram in Portland Roa, by German fighter bombers, fortunately unhurt, though 20 people were killed in that raid. At the end of the war his father became a Civil Servant and in 1947 Richard's sister was born. The family then moved to a council house in Hangleton.

Richard's schooling was at Portland Road infants school, then Hangleton school and then on to Knoll school in the Old Shoreham Road. He left school at 15 with no idea of what he wanted to do. However he was fortunate to get an apprenticeship with Allen West and Co who made electrical equipment for ships and trains. Whilst there he managed to electrocute himself, fortunately he didn't make it. (this was his second lucky escape) It was at this time he met Val. Val and her friends were going to a dance school to learn to dance: Richard and his friends were going to the same dance school to meet girls and he and Val hit it off. She was 16 and he was 17.

However it was not until 1963 that they got married as they were saving up to buy a home of their own. Fortunately Val's grandmother lent them a deposit of £1000 and they bought a 4 bedroom house in Neville Avenue, Hove for £4,600. Richard's parents moving into the ground floor, Val and Richard into the upstairs. This worked well, with Richard's mother teaching Val to cook and providing access to the one television set.

Richard in the meantime had got a job with Seeboard, moving from a hands on job to working as a Work Study Engineer and then in to the data section. After four years living with Richard's parents, they moved to a bungalow in Southwick where the children were born. Jeff in 1967, Karen in 1970 and Robert in 1972. A job then came up in Maidstone and for a while

Richard would commute from Southwick to Maidstone or Rochester. Fortunately another job was offered in Haywards Heath and they sold their bungalow, moving into Wells Close in 1975.

Val immediately got involved in village life, but it was not so easy initially for Richard. However he joined the PTA and after two years became Chairman. Then he got involved in the Pantomine society. The first panto was put on by the PTA as a Thank You to the Village for raising the funds for a swimming pool at the school. Richard was co-erced into making the props and Val pulled the curtains. The Pantomine society has gone from strength to strength and as well as having various parts, Richard took over the lighting, In 1977 a vacancy arose on the Parish Council and Richard applied and was elected. In 1985 he took over as Chair from John Hale who resigned through ill health. This position he held until this year, serving a total of 26 years.

During his years on the Parish Council, one of the major achievements for the village was the building of the new Village Hall. Negotiations had gone on for some years, initially plans to build on the Plaving Fields, combining the Hall with the Pavilion. However over half the village neglected to vote so the opportunity was lost. Then there were plans to build at Woodgate Meadow. However Bob Westgate came up with the offer of land and some money, Lewes District Council offered £50,000 and a grant of £75,000 came from the Sports and Arts Council, Philip Ridlev chaired a fundraising committee in the village to raise the remaining £10,000. Then the shortfall increased to £40,000. The village responded magnificently and eventually raised £45,000 and in 1995, the new hall opened. Richard has also been involved in both Cubs and Scouts and became a Scout leader, helping take groups to camps in various countries. He gave up after 22 years but is still an executive committee member and helps put up the marquees when required.

In 1983, the family moved to Grove Cottage in Plumpton Lane as they needed more space for the family. In 1995, after 32 years with Seeboard, Richard retired and is now self employed, helping out with Rodney Hill's driving school. He does less now, but keeps himself busy, with making models and taking his military jeep to local schools as well as still being on the Parish Council. Thank you Richard for all you have done for the Village.

CHLOE'S GARDENING TIPS

- As we can all see, autumn is upon us, the colours in the trees, shrubs and hedges are performing wonderfully and it will soon be time to clear fallen leaves. The main reason for this task is to prevent the leaves rotting on your precious plants and especially your lawns. Rake them up once a week or once every two weeks and you can compost leaves to create a great fertilizer called leaf mould which can then be added to borders and pots.
- Now is the time to dig up and store Dahlia tubers and Gladiolus corms. This will protect them from the winter frosts and cold soils. For Dahlias, all you need to do is cut back the stems to a few inches off the ground and dig up the tubers. Hang them upside down in a frost-free place for a few days, to help dry them out. Then store them in trays of dry compost for the winter. For Gladiolus, pull the plant up so as not to damage the corm. Shake the soil from the roots and twist the foliage off the corm. Then set the corms out to dry in the sun for a day or two. Store the dried corms in paper bags or onion sacks. Other tubers such as Begonias can be left to dry and stored in paper bags. Lilium (Lilv) bulbs can be lifted or covered with leaves or mulch over the winter.
- Continue to plant any winter and spring flowering bulbs. Add some bulb fibre or a general fertilizer into the planting hole to enrich their roots and ensure successful blooms every year.
- Lay new turf as the soil is moist and warm which aids in root establishment. Towards the end of the month, you can stop cutting grass and then service your mower ready for next season.
- Cut back all perennial flowering plants to ensure nutrients go back into the plants. Lift and divide any overcrowded clumps by cutting in half with a spade and re-planting elsewhere in the garden. If you are not sure where to plant them, put in pots until the spring.
- It's not too late to sow vegetable seeds such as cauliflower, lettuce, broad beans and peas under cover ready for spring. You can also plant strawberries now for cropping next summer. Plant onions, garlic and shallots in the greenhouse or outside under cover.

Harvest your marrows and pumpkins before the first frosts. Lift and store potatoes, carrots and beetroot.

Plants which look fabulous in October include:- Cyclamen (indoors and outdoors), Pyracantha (Firethorn), Callicarna (Reauty Re



Callicarpa (Beauty Berry), Cordateria (Pampass Grass), Prunus (Japanese varieties), Cotinus (Burning Bush), Robinia, Ginkgo and Betula trees, Rhus (Stag's Horn) and Acer (Maple).

A meeting of the Parish Council took place on September the 1st at Beechwood Hall, Cooksbridge. Minutes of this meeting are available on the parish website (eastchiltington.net) and on notice-boards.

SCHOOL BUS AND TRANSPORT ISSUES

Cllr Sarah Osborne updated us on the campaign against the removal of the free discretionary bus service from East Chiltington to Chailey School, At the time of writing, ESCC are still intransigent. However, the campaign has succeeded in generating considerable media interest, with appearances of East Chiltington residents on, 'Woman's Hour' on radio 4, on TV, and in an article in the Guardian. Cllr Osborne is looking into the possibility of assistance for sixth formers to get to college, and reminded us that the Dial-A-Ride service is available for residents who find it difficult to use ordinary bus services. For more information, see the CTLA website: ctla.org.uk. or call 517332.

COUNCIL'S FINANCIAL SITUATION

The council considered its annual financial report, including requests for donations and the level of the precept. In recent years, due to careful financial management and the generation of external funds to support projects, the council has built up its reserves. Taking into account likely expenditure in the near future and allowing for contingencies, the council agreed that it will nevertheless be in a position to lower the precept by 5%. This proposal will need to be ratified at the November meeting of the council.

PARISH MAROUEE

The old marquee, which has been borrowed for parish events over many years, was finally retired this summer after being blown down the night before the parish party. The Parish Council has decided to use some of its reserve funds to purchase a replacement. It is intended that this will be available to residents to borrow for a nominal fee. More information on this will be made available once the marquee has been bought.

THE PHONE BOX

Unfortunately, BT had mislaid the forms (and the cheque for £1!) for the adoption of the phone-box. However, this has been addressed and we are

hoping that renovations should start soon. We are currently intending that the phone-box to be used as a book/produce - exchange, but if you have other ideas, do let the Parish Council know.

PLANNING

Some parishioners have asked for clarification about how the Parish Council works with regard to planning applications. In response to this, we will be adding details to the planning pages on the website. Please do consult this if you would like to know more.

TECT

At a TECT meeting in July, a decision was taken that the Trust will take over management of the field and arrange for the planting of a hay meadow. There are also plans to plant wildflowers in the orchard.

NEXT MEETING OF THE PARISH COUNCIL

The next meeting of the parish council will be on 3rd November 2011 at Beechwood Hall, Cooksbridge, at 7pm. Residents are welcome to attend. Fifteen minutes are set aside at the beginning of each meeting for public questions and comments.

Plumpton Wildlife and Habitat Group



This month members of the Plumpton Wildlife & Habitat Group committee have written about their favourite wildlife places in the parish.

ONE OF MY favourite wildlife sites is near the railway bridge

close to Elmgrove Farm, just south of Shergolds Farm. There is a fine old hedge running south from here that often has vellowhammers in it all vear and in summer turtle dove, whitethroat and lesser whitethroat. The adjoining field used to be interesting when it was conservation land but since it has been farmed by the College it has lost its appeal. However, the whole area, including the railway embankment, is a fine place to be in late April and early May. In the evening, just as it's getting dark, all seems guiet then a burst of song pours forth, a nightingale! I have heard up to five here at the same time, competing against one another. This April, on our Nightingale Walk, we had three belting it out against the background of a thunderstorm. Magical. TP

MY FAVOURITE wildlife spotting spot is at home, in my front room. I've positioned my birdfeeders where I can see them from my desk; I have my binoculars next to the telephone and I can birdwatch all day while (supposedly) working. Many a tedious phone call has been enlivened by the antics of the goldfinches and tits. And in the early evenings I can see the long-eared bats swooping past the window carrying their dinner to feast in my porch. Outdoors, the little stretch of drove road heading north from Dean's Farm is full of birds, wildflowers and other wildlife and is the perfect place to stop, listen, wait and watch. And the station platform is good too - the wildflower verges make waiting for the early train to London a real pleasure. CJ

THIS YEAR WE have again been surveying butterflies for the upcoming Sussex Butterfly Atlas and I 'discovered' a new spot for seeing a wide range of interesting species. On the parish boundary with East Chiltington, just north of the Novington sand pit, there is a little gully with a seasonal stream and little shading, in an arable field sandwich, that is an oasis for wildlife. This little gully probably contains no great rarities and most walkers will not realise it as they walk on by, but if you stop and look closely you will see good diversity of flowers, butterflies, dragonflies and birds. Plus as a bonus the footpath is not as busy as most. *JW*

DROP DOWN from Ashurst Organics, cross the field and into a little spinney at the west end of Mill House. A causeway separates the Old Mill House property and a marshy area to the west, which is actually a designated Site of Nature Conservation Importance. One of the first trees you come to is a rather impressive maple, but what I like about the spot is it's hidden shady quiet; it's good for an early chiffchaff or blackcap, and really quite good for a range of bird species. In the spring, it also has a spectacular display of marsh marigold and, for the more discerning, opposite-leaved golden saxifrage. It's got a bit overgrown recently so you can't see down the marsh so well, where it was possible to see the odd snipe and the like in winter. Spend an evening on the edge of the College field here and you might be rewarded with sight of a badger.

BY AMBULANCE **TO MONGOLIA**



JUST five days after graduating from university. George Denny from West Gate, Plumpton Green set off on a mission to help provide some relief for strugaling people in Mongolia, a country he describes as sparse, rough, barren and with a very hard way of life.

Accompanied by good

friend Rob Anthony from Lewes, he embarked on a journey by ambulance that would cover 9.864 miles travelling through ten countries that involved crossing two mountain ranges and being stopped by the police seven times. That is no mean feat by anyone's standards and it was not at all easy going.

So what was it all about? The short answer is that it was to help a charity raise funds to provide education and medical aid for people in a far off land who cannot even dream of the educational facilities and medical care that we take for granted and often criticise in the UK.

Some people in Mongolia are so poor that they cannot afford to even feed their own children and they abandon them at orphanages to give them some chance in life. As for medical care, it can take days for sick people to reach help points and even then the resources are sparse. These are the stark facts.

Our intrepid voung men decided to take action and joined a rally organised by the charity Go Help that provides healthcare and helps educate children in UlaanBataar. Their first task was to seek sponsorship in the UK and through a variety of efforts they raised some £6,000. A jumble sale and safari supper in Plumpton together contributed a notable sum and various individuals were very generous. Major sponsorship came from the international building supplies company Lafarge, a client of George's dad, Dave and that made the whole thing possible. George is grateful for the immense support that he also received from mum, Anne and was humbled by the generous further support that came from Plumpton residents.

From the funds raised George and Rob purchased a used ambulance which they promptly named Amber. They then set about driving the vehicle nearly 10,000 miles to Mongolia to present her to the charity for the benefit of the locals in and around UlaanBataar. Some of the remaining cash was used to buy supplies in the UK for the Mongolians and the rest was donated. The actual costs of travel for George and Rob came from their own pockets, so none of the money raised paid for their expenses.

The journey for our intrepid duo was the experience of a lifetime. They travelled through some marvellous places, but they also endured some guite severe hardships and have returned by more conventional means with many a tale to

One of the police stops in Eastern Europe was, they believe, prompted by curiosity. The officer involved asked lots of questions, but when he discovered George and Rob lived near Brighton he held a long discussion about the Seagulls! At another they were to be fined for speeding even though there was no indicated speed limit. Some smart talking resulted in only one fine being imposed instead of the proposed two and even that was reduced to something guite modest.

The whole trip took 34 days. Overnight stops were varied. Sometimes they were able to camp, a few times cheap hotels were found but a number of nights were spent stretched out inside Amber in lorry parks. That brought them into contact with many interesting people and George well recalls one Russian lorry driver who, whilst extremely friendly, just could not stop talking and it was suspected that an alcoholic haze had something to do with it.

George has learned that we are not really living in a small world, but that it is vast. He was surprised by the generosity, help and kindness that complete strangers so willingly offered.

The pair had both trials and tribulations. In Kazakhstan they encountered some of the worst roads possible to imagine and travelled 400 kms along what were literally barely visible tracks. However, the people were lovely. By contrast the Russian roads were good, but the people were not.

For George and Rob, being in such close proximity to each other for so long took its toll a few times and arguments developed. However,

Despite losing 19 pounds in weight during the trip George believes that it was the single most fantastic thing he has ever done. Notwithstanding some very hard times he enjoyed it and would not hesitate to do it again.

SAVE OUR SCHOOL BUSES

District Councillor, Sarah Osborne, is stepping up her campaign to protect local children's safety on their trips to and from school. Cllr Osborne has written to Michael Gove, the Secretary of State for Education, calling for changes to the statutory guidelines that are used by councils when assessing the safety of walking routes to school.

The letter has been signed and supported by a selection of community leaders, poverty campaigners, unions and charities including National Union of Teachers, Child Accident Prevention Trust, Association of Teachers and Lecturers and Campaign for Better Transport.

Under the current guidelines the County Council is able to get away with forcing children to make a dangerous 3 mile walk to school along unlit roads with no pavements, 60 mph speed limits and used by heavy commercial traffic.

Sarah Osborne said: "When I realised that up and down the country there were parents, carers and teachers battling their local authorities over cuts to school buses, I felt I had to try and do something to help.

"These cuts are putting the lives of children at risk and leaving parents and carers unable to work. I also know how hard it is for individuals and small groups to get their concerns listened to. I have been shocked by the refusal of East Sussex County Councillors, including my local County Councillor, to walk the route themselves and completely dismissed the parents concerns in the council chamber. We will continue to fight to get the County Council to see sense, and the government to change the rules for the better."

IMPORTANT UPDATE ON **FUTURE** HOUSING FOR THE VILLAGE

Lewes District Council (LDC) has now issued Draft Core Strategy for development in the District. Coupled with this is an updated version of the Strategic Housing and Land Availability Assessment (SHLAA). To explain the two documents -

The **Draft Core Strategy** outlines how LDC intends to meet the housing needs of the district. This proposes Plumpton Green as a suitable location for a minimum of 34 and a maximum of 104 new dwellings, whilst also highlighting a need to further upgrade the rail service and explore traffic calming measures / reduced speed limits to manage the traffic impacts. This document will now enter a period of public consultation which closes on the 11th November, A copy of the Draft Core Strategy he viewed http://www.lewes.gov.uk/corestrategy/index.asp . Once the consultation period is complete, the

comments will be considered and this is likely to form planning policy.

The **SHLAA** outlines potential sites where these dwellings could be accommodated. The sites are evaluated based on a criteria of their Availability (i.e. the land owner is willing to sell), Suitability (i.e. proximity to public transport, schools etc) and Achievablity (i.e. can be developed at a sensible cost). A copy of the updated SHLAA can be found under:

http://www.lewes.gov.uk/planning/shlaa.asp. Yo u may recall the previous SHLAA of 2010 identified four sites in the village as meeting all three of the criteria. This has now increased to five sites, with one dropping out and two new sites being added. The total estimated capacity across these sites is 126 dwellings. The five sites comprise 04PL (The land behind the Church -Yield 30), 05PL (The land behind Premier Garage - Yield 30), 08PL (The land between Westgate and Chapel Road - Yield 40), 09PL (West of Riddens Close - Yield 6), 10PL (Noland Farm - Yield 20), Site 06PL (White House Farm has been withdrawn). http://www.lewes.gov.uk/Files/plan SHLAA bur gess hill ditchling plumpton green.pdf. Another seven sites did not meet the criteria. The SHLAA will now be updated every year with the potential to add new sites as they become available.

The Parish Council has a briefing scheduled with Lewes District Council during September and will provide further updates thereafter. It is also committed to arranging one or more public meetings to enable open discussions and exchanges of views with residents and hopefully the District Council.

Parking at the Playing Field. To ensure that bona fide users of the playing field can park there and to ensure the safety of children it has proved necessary to cordon off an area comprising ten spaces to prevent unauthorised parking. The parking area is intended to facilitate the enjoyment of the playing field, but it has been taken over by non paying commuters and although the Parish Council appreciates that they, the commuters, have parking difficulties the Council has a duty to preserve the amenities and safety of our children and would encourage lobbying the rail companies to provide parking for their passengers.

The Clerk to the Council's tenure expired on 30 September and at the time of writing this report a new Clerk has not been formally appointed. In the interim period any queries or comments for the Parish Council should be addressed to any one of the Councillors, who will ensure that all matters are dealt with promptly and properly.

The next meeting of the Council will be held in the Committee Room at the village hall on Tuesday, October 11 at 7.30 pm and members of the public are entitled to attend.
